3	COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Good
4	morning.
5	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Nice to see
6	you. All right. No, that's good. Good morning,
7	I'm Brad Lander, the Chair of the Council's Land
8	Use Subcommittee on Landmarks, Public Siting and
9	Maritime Uses, we're very happy to be here today
10	for our last Subcommittee hearing of 2010. We've
11	got a great project to close the year out with.
12	We're joined by Council Member Halloran, who's
13	here first, Council Member Williams, Council
14	Member Arroyo and Council Member Chin, who's not a
15	member of our Committee, but whose district this
16	project is in. The sole item on our calendar for
17	today is the Loew's Canal Street Theatre, which
18	must have some numbers somewhere, Land Use #272,
19	and we'll invite Jenny Fernandez from the
20	Landmarks Preservation Commission to come up and
21	present the project to us.
22	MS. FERNANDEZ: Thank you, Chair
23	Lander and members of the Committee. My name is
24	Jenny Fernandez, Director of Intergovernmental and
25	Community Relations for the Landmarks Preservation

2	Commission. I'm here today to testify on the
3	Commission's designation of the Loew's Canal
4	Street Theatre in Manhattan. On June 22 <sup>nd</sup> , 2010
5	the Landmarks Preservation Commission held a
6	public hearing on the proposed designation of the
7	Loew's Canal Street Theatre. Seven people spoke
8	in favor of designation, including the owner of
9	the property, Council Member Margaret Chin, and a
10	representative of the historic district's council.
11	An additional statement in support of designation
12	was also entered into the record at the hearing.
13	There were no speakers in opposition to
14	designation. On September $14^{th}$ , 2010 the
15	Commission voted to designate the building a New
16	York City individual landmark. The Loew's Canal
17	Street Theatre at 31 Canal Street on Manhattan's
18	Lower East Side was constructed as a neighborhood
19	movie house in 1926-27 at the beginning of what is
20	generally regarded as the golden age of cinema.
21	It was commissioned by Loew's Inc., which was one
22	of the so-called "Big Five" within the Hollywood
23	studio system, and was designed by the nationally-
24	known firm of Thomas W. Lamb Inc. The emergence
25	of the motion picture industry coincided closely

2	with the growth of the Lower East Side as the
3	city's most prominent immigrant district. The
4	earliest experiment in the medium began in the
5	1870's, and the first commercial exhibitions took
6	place in the 1890's, right as hundreds of
7	thousands of newcomers, many of Jewish faith, were
8	settling in the area. By the early $20^{th}$ century,
9	the neighborhood could claim the nation's densest
10	concentration of both human population and movie
11	houses. Marcus Loew, the founder of the theater
12	chain, was born to immigrant parents on the Lower
13	East Side and became involved in film exhibition
14	during its earliest days as a peepshow novelty.
15	From the earliest days of cinema, the Lower East
16	Side contained one of the highest concentrations
17	of motion picture theaters in the country. The
18	Loew's Canal Street Theatre was one of several
19	large movie houses constructed in the neighborhood
20	during the 20's as the national chain competed
21	against the smaller M&S circuit for the control of
22	the local market. Of these theaters, the Loew's
23	Canal Street Theatre was one of the largest and
24	most architecturally distinguished, with an
25	exuberant terra cotta façade facing bustling Canal

2	Street. It is also certainly the best preserved.
3	The Commission urges you to affirm this
4	designation.
5	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you very
6	much. We were going to ask for a demonstration
7	here. Council Member Chin, we have the owner
8	here, and she's or a representative of the
9	owner, and she's going to testify in just a
10	minute, but if you would like to make some remarks
11	or ask a question of Ms. Fernandez.
12	COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you.
13	Thank you, Chair. It's really great that it
14	finally comes to this point, and I just wanted to
15	thank the owner for their support, Mr. Sung, and
16	also for the Landmark Commission. It's such a
17	treasure in our community, and hopefully in the
18	future we can work with the owner to really turn
19	this back into a great performing arts center.
20	Thank you.
21	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Are there
22	questions from the Committee? And again as I
23	said, we have a representative of the owner who is
24	going to testify in just a moment, so. You can
25	tell that we're a little, you know, we have the

3	Fernandez, thank you very much for your … do you
4	have something else to add?
5	MS. FERNANDEZ: Yes.
6	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Please.
7	MS. FERNANDEZ: I just wanted to
8	say that we want to thank the owner, of course,
9	for working with us tirelessly over a long span, a
10	period of time. As we arrive at this point, and
11	of course the Commission is very excited that it
12	is at this point, we thank you very much, of
13	course, for the support of Council Member Chin in
14	this effort as well.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Okay, thank
16	you.
17	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you, and
18	thanks for your year of work with us. All right,
19	so I will now call up Vera Sung, who's a
20	representative of Thomas Sung, the owner of the
21	property. If you can make sure that the light is
22	off, which is counterintuitive, that will mean
23	that your mic is on.
24	MS. SUNG: Oh.
25	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: And then state

3	MS. SUNG: Okay.
4	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: For the
5	record, and.
6	MS. SUNG: Good morning, my name is
7	Vera Sung. In answer to your question, Council
8	Member, I don't think we're going to be doing
9	peepshows. So, okay, honorable City Council
10	members, thank you for agreeing to postpone the
11	meeting on this matter till today. My father,
12	Thomas Sun, who is the owner of 31 Canal Street,
13	really wanted to be here to give his testimony,
14	but he's actually for health reasons, he has to
15	stay home. So I'm going to deliver to you his
16	testimony, which I believe you have a written
17	statement in front of you. I'm just going to read
18	that into the record. Approximately a year ago we
19	were informed by the Landmarks Preservation
20	Commission that our building at 31 Canal Street
21	was being considered for landmark designation.
22	Our family has actually owned this building for
23	more than 30 years, and it has been largely vacant
24	since its acquisition. Therefore the cost to
25	carry the property has been substantial.

2	Naturally we were concerned that the landmark
3	designation would reduce the value of our
4	investment because of the restrictions. However,
5	with the information and assistance from the very
6	able staff of the Landmarks Preservation
7	Commission, we learned about the historical value
8	of our building, and the need to preserve the
9	façade. We have since cooperated fully with the
10	Commission. Knowing the growth of the Chinese-
11	American population, the transformation of the
12	downtown community and the Lower East Side, and
13	the lack of suitable facilities for the performing
14	arts downtown, we hope to restore the building as
15	a performing arts center to enrich the cultural
16	and ethnic diversity of this city. Development of
17	the project will entail substantial loss of
18	economic benefit to us, but the social value to be
19	gained by all will be even more substantial. As
20	the project proceeds we will need to see private
21	and public funding, and the cooperation of other
22	city agencies. We hope that we will have your
23	support. I actually serve as a member of
24	Community Board #1 and I am a long-time resident
25	of the South Street Seaport. My sister Jill lives

2	in Tribeca, my other sister lives in Battery Park
3	City, so we all are residents of downtown, and we
4	all actually have a keen interest in seeing this
5	project to its fruition. So thank you for all
6	your kind attention, and happy holidays. And any
7	questions, I'll see if I can answer, but all the
8	ideas are in my father's head at this point.
9	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: First let me
10	say thank you for being here today, and to you and
11	your family, you know, the kind of stewardship
12	that, you know, looks to take care of a building
13	like this. Of course, you know, wants to know
14	what something like this means, but the fact that
15	you worked with the LPC and, you know, coming
16	before us today to talk about the goals of
17	renovating it and having it being a cultural and
18	performing arts center, but also are open to
19	landmarking, is really great, and we thank you for
20	it.
21	MS. SUNG: Thank you.
22	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Are there any
23	questions from you have a question?
24	COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Yes. Thank
25	you. I just wanted Ms. Sung to share some of your

2	family history, and also that in Chinatown right
3	now we have no theater. But there are many, many
4	cultural groups, opera groups that love to
5	perform, and love to really show off their talent
6	and their skills, and in our community there's no
7	place to do it. So we're really looking forward
8	to this project. But maybe you could share your
9	family background, your grandmother.
10	MS. SUNG: Oh yes.
11	COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: To make it a
12	little bit more interesting.
13	MS. SUNG: I was just … my
14	grandmother actually was an opera singer, so on
15	my mother's side, so she's a musician. So she
16	performed western opera, Madame Butterfly, so in
17	our family, you know, we have a true interest in
18	the performing arts. And that's where it comes
19	from as well too. So, western, eastern, opera,
20	all different, you know, things.
21	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Okay, thank
22	you.
23	MS. SUNG: Okay.
24	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Christian
25	Hylton, our counsel, reminds me that, you know,

2	there's two other, you know, Loew's theaters,
3	Loew's Paradise in the Bronx, and Loew's Kings in
4	Brooklyn, where there are efforts underway. I
5	guess the one in the Bronx has actually been
6	renovated, and designated. I don't think we've
7	designated Kings in Brooklyn, but there's a
8	substantial effort underway that the borough
9	president and EDC and others are trying to kind of
10	bring it back. So, wonderful to have this going
11	on, thank you very much.
12	MS. SUNG: Thank you.
13	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: All right, we
14	have no one else signed up to testify, so unless
15	someone speaks right now, we'll go ahead and close
16	the public hearing on this project and move
17	forward to a vote. I'll ask Christian to call the
18	roll. The Chair recommends a vote of aye.
19	COMMITTEE COUNSEL HYLTON: Chair
20	Lander.
21	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Aye.
22	COMMITTEE COUNSEL HYLTON: Council
23	Member Arroyo.
24	COUNCIL MEMBER ARROYO: I hope your
25	dad gets better soon, and congratulations. I vote

4	Member Williams.
5	COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Aye.

8	COUNCIL MEMBER HALLORAN III:
9	Permission to explain my vote?
10	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Of course.
11	COUNCIL MEMBER HALLORAN III:
12	First, let me commend the LPC for looking at a
13	theater and its possible renovation. I hope that
14	the funding and the assistance will be there from
15	the government in order to make this a plausible
16	package. I also congratulate the family who have
17	made a very difficult decision to, in a way,
18	sacrifice their economic rights to their property
19	in the interests of the community. I think that's
20	commendable, and I'm glad to see it's being done
21	voluntarily. Please continue to press your
22	Council member and to the Council itself, to make
23	sure that money is available for you to do these
24	things. And in turn we will get the arm put on
25	us. So congratulations and of course I'll vote

3	COMMITTEE COUNSEL HYLTON: By a
4	vote of four in the affirmative and none in
5	negative, no abstentions, LU 272 is approved and
6	referred to the full Land Use Committee.
7	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thanks very
8	much, we'll hold the vote open for ten minutes.
9	Thanks very much, this meeting of the Committee is
10	adjourned.
11	COMMITTEE COUNSEL HYLTON: Council
12	Member Mendez
13	COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: I vote aye.
14	COMMITTEE COUNSEL HYLTON: The vote
15	now stands five in the affirmative, none in the
16	negative, no abstentions.
17	COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: The
18	meeting is now adjourned.
