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CHAIRPERSON JULIE MENIN: (gavel pounding). Good morning. I am City Council Member Julie Menin, Chair of the Committee on Small Business and I want to welcome everyone to today's Committee on Small Business. We are going to be voting on two bills. The first bill which I am the sponsor of is Intro 116 which is co-sponsored by Super Majority of 40 Council Members. It will create a one-stop shop NYC Business Portal that will be accessible in 11 different languages. This bill will consolidate all City Permits for Small Business into one website, one app. Additionally a business can review and pay outstanding balances on any existing violations. This portal will be easily accessible and easy to navigate and SBS will be required to review this portal every three years and survey small business owners to obtain feedback for how effective and efficient it is for users. Small businesses frequently cite and alphabet soup of city agencies as a barrier to running their business. For example,

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according to the Institute of Justice just running a restaurant requires an owner to submit 20 separate forms, engage with eight different City Agencies and pay thousands of dollars for licenses, permits and registrations. Opening a barber shop takes an average of 56 steps, 12 of which must be completed in person. As a former small business owner, these processes can be overly complicated and burdensome and there is no reason for small business owners to have to take off multiple days from work simply to get a license or permit. Due to the pandemic according to the 2020 Partnership for New York City report, at least one-third of the 240,000 small businesses in the City may shut down. We need to do all we can to help our small businesses and that starts with a simple process that takes away the bureaucratic burdens put on small business owners. This legislation will streamline New York's regulatory process. The second bill Intro number 383 by Council Member Gale Brewer would amend the commercial property vacancy register law which changes to registration requirements and require the Department of Finance to release related supplemental registration data 60 days after the reporting

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deadline. I am very proud of the legislation before our Committee today as it will transform New York

City with a critical platform that makes it easy for small businesses to manage everything needed for their business. I want to thank my Chief of Staff,

Jonathan Sheck [phonetic]. Legislative and Budget

Director Brandon Jordan, Jess Baker, Andrea Vasquez,

Rachel Cordero and David Sitzer for their work on

Intro 116 and thank you and now I'm delighted to call on my colleague, Council Member Brewer to deliver opening remarks.

GALE BREWER: Thank you very much Council Woman Menin and I want to say also thank you to staff because there was a lot of negotiation on Intro 383 particularly to change as the Chair mentioned from 90 days to 60 days. I think one of the topics that New Yorkers want to know is why is this vacancy store, store vacant for so many days, years, decades and although there is no easy answer. There is no write off City, State or Federal. There is a question of keeping the data and some of you know that I'm very focused on open data and data in general. And as Borough President I was proud to pass Local Law 157 of 2019 which established the City's first database

2 to track vacant ground and second floor store fronts 3 and we did with then Council Member Helen Rosenthal. 4 This database is unique as it includes individual building information as well as an aggregate information and I want to say we had as Borough 6 President a large group task force on the issue of 8 stores and vacancy in general and they do support even as owners this kind of database because it's not extra work. This is information that owners already 10 11 include as part of their submissions to the City. So that database went live in 2021. The work needs to 12 be done to increase its usefulness as a tool to 13 14 address the commercial vacancies. And I know that 15 during the pandemic there even more, there are a few 16 right now but before the pandemic tons of vacancies 17 particularly now in larger store fronts. 18 Neighborhood City Groups use the database to map 19 vacancies in their areas as well as people looking 20 for storefronts and owners to use the database to 21 fill with new businesses. Data however is not shared 2.2 in a timely manner. Hence the information is 2.3 provided currently with a long lag and can be updated. This bill would require more timely 24 updating of information which would render this 25

dataset significantly more helpful to business
owners, to policy makers, and to the community that
wants to know what is going on. This Bill will
require reporting on vital information to assess the
proliferation of commercial vacancies including
whether ground floor commercial properties are
currently vacant. If the owner or commercial tenant
occupies them and the expiration date of the last
lease. I hope this information will provide more
data to make better decisions. I do want to thank
the staff of the Department of Finance because they
have been working to improve the storefront vacancy
database bill and I think this will be even better.
We need more timely data. We need better compliance
and I really do want thank my staff, Shirley Schuler,
Puter, Leo Balluaro and the amazing staff in
