25 New York City Councilmembers, I bring greetings to

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from Baraka Baptist Church, located in Canarsie section of Brooklyn, New York. Special thanks to my Councilwoman Mercedes Narcisse in the 46th district.

A Baptist minister missionary named Arthur Ward once said, "Flatter me, and I may not believe you.

Criticize me, and I may not like you. Ignore me, and I may not forgive you. But encouraged me, I will not forget you.

Today I will not forget this body of New York

City Council because you have encouraged me. As a

Haitian pastor of one of the largest Asian churches
in New York City. You've encouraged me in three

ways. I am encouraged because there are four Haitian

American Councilmembers in this chamber, Che Ossé,

Councilwoman Rita Joseph, Councilwoman Farrah Lewis,
and my very own councilwoman, Mercedes Narcisse. I

am encouraged.

The second reason I'm encouraged is that the

Haitian American Councilmembers were all appointed to

chair positions. That is very encouraging.

And the third reason I am encouraged is because this body, the councilmembers, on August 11, the day after my birthday, passed the historic maternal health package. This is amazing. And I am so proud

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of you. I thank God for you. I'm more encouraged because this bill that was passed helps the Haitian women in New York City specifically and more so because they have the highest rate of maternal morbidity than any other race and any other woman. am grateful.

So I want to encourage you as you've encouraged me, because they say, hurting people hurt people. But I say encouraged people encourages people. And I want to encourage you with Hebrews chapter 10, verse 24, and 25. "And let us consider how we may spur on one another, towards love and good deeds, not giving up together, meeting together, as some have in the habit of doing but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the day approaching." And then the prayer of Moses says, "May the favor of Our Lord our God rests on us, establish the works of our hands Yes, establish the work of our hands." Father God, bless this meeting, bless the councilmembers, continue to strengthen them that they may do your work. We ask this in Jesus name.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you and thank you for joining us here today. I'm not going to ask

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councilmember Mercedes Narcisse to put the invocation on the record.

COUNCILMEMBER NARCISSE: I am delighted to welcome pastor Mallory Jean Pierre of Baraka Baptist church located in the 46th district to the city council chambers today and thank him for delivering today's invocation. Baraka Baptist, which he leads is a religious institution which has contributed immensely to the ethical and spiritual values of the Canarsie community and beyond. Pastor John Pierre has built a reputation of being a deeply caring pastor, who is always on call for his congregates and community. Pastor John Pierre, like myself was born in Haiti. He was born to a Haitian father and a Dominican mother. He's married to a Jamaican wife. He has a Puerto Rican daughter in law, and African American son in law, and a Trinidadian sister in law. His family is truly the epitome of what makes New York City such a beautiful and great place.

Again, I thank him for his outstanding efforts in the 46th Council District, and for bringing a small taste of Baraka Baptist Church and Haitian to the council chambers today. Thank you.

24 SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you very much Majority

Leader. Good afternoon, everyone. I'd like to begin

today by addressing the issues related to the
thousands of people arriving in New York City who are
seeking asylum from their home countries. Some have
been sent from other states here to New York City in
political acts that are dehumanizing. These are
human beings, many of whom are fleeing desperate
economic conditions and political violence. They
have been through so much already, and it's important
that they are met with the compassion, care and
decency that they have been deprived of. Even before
their arrival, our city was already grappling with a
housing crisis and high rates of homelessness. There
are continuing problems with the shelter intake and
placement process, the poor conditions of shelter
facilities themselves, and a lack of access to
healthy food safety and wraparound services. In many
ways, the focus on those seeking asylum and how to
meet their needs has highlighted the deficiencies in
our current processes that must be addressed.

Yet the support needs for those seeking asylum is both unique and in some ways common to longtime New Yorkers who require comprehensive support getting back on their feet. It requires the type of coordinated services across agencies that we must

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make available for all New Yorkers facing significant challenges, whether it's mental health support, food assistance or support for school aged children of affected families. We also know that the city cannot solve this international crisis by itself. We need support and assistance of our state and federal partners to humanely care for the migrants who are arriving in our city. There are employment barriers that must be removed by the federal government, funding assistance from other levels of government, and additional support. As a council, we are focused on identifying the gaps, facilitating the coordination with our government and nonprofit partners, and advancing solutions to ensure that everyone gets the help they need. Through our oversight capacity and other actions. We will work to confront this challenge and meet the needs of those seeking asylum in a comprehensive manner. have already held one hearing on the issues prevalent in our intake and shelter system. Tomorrow, we will hold another hearing on the various issues that those seeking asylum face in accessing stability in our city. This is a pivotal moment for our city, one that will be watched closely around the world. It's

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up to us as New Yorkers to show leadership, empathy, and kindness to people who have already endured so much. We will show that we can come together as a city, put aside our differences, and work collaboratively towards solutions. We can demonstrate what New York City's about, our values and our commitment to all who come here seeking refuge and help.

I also want to acknowledge the devastating toll and impact that hurricane Fiona has caused the people of Puerto Rico, the Dominican Republic, and other Caribbean islands. Puerto Rico is often called New York City's sixth borough. Because of our long established relationship with the island and its people. Our city would not be what it is today without the contributions of our Puerto Rican and Dominican communities. That's why our city is responding with such urgency in the aftermath of Fiona. It has only been five years since Hurricane Maria left Puerto Rico devastated and without electricity and clean drinking water. It destroyed homes, displaced families, and upended communities in the process. As a city and country we must do everything we can to provide immediate relief for

those impacted not just by contributing to the on-
the-ground recovery efforts, but also advocating for
necessary policy changes. Earlier this week, I'm
proud to have joined our council colleagues of Puerto
Rican descent to send a joint letter to Washington,
urging our federal government to create a waiver for
the Jones Act, so essential supplies reach the island
faster and deliver the resources that people need. I
know so many of us in this room have visited the
island, are supporting fundraising efforts, or are
collecting donations in our individual districts.
New Yorkers are once again demonstrating care and
compassion in the wake of tragedy, and I want to take
a moment to thank everyone who continues to support
the families and people devastated by Hurricane
Fiona.

Over the past month, our city has been mourning the loss of two New Yorkers who died while on the job. On September 12, 46-year-old Papa Cooley died while working on a 14 story project at a construction site in Greenpoint, Brooklyn. He leaves behind a family and we send love and condolences to them for their loss. On September 14, a 30-year-old Ronald Ortiz, a construction worker and electrician was shot

2 and killed during his lunch break in East New York.

3 He is remembered by family and friends as a

4 gentleman, a kind soul who excelled at sports. We

5 also send love and condolences to his family, friends

6 and community.

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This week, our Jewish communities here in New York City and around the world celebrated Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish new year I hope Everyone has a happy and sweet new year filled with peace, prosperity and good health.

Next week marks the start of Yom Kippur, the holiest day of the year so I want to wish all New Yorkers who are observing an easy and meaningful fast, and for those celebrating... I'm gonna get this right... suk... suk... I wish you all a... chag sukkot sameach.

In the coming days we will be celebrating several important cultural holidays including Nigeria

Independence Day on October 1, Iraq Independence Day on October 3, Uganda Independence Day on October 9,

Cuba Independence Day on October 10, and indigenous peoples Day on October 10. October marks the start of Filipino American Heritage Month, German American Heritage Month, Italian American Heritage Month...

Heritage and culture month, and polish American

Heritage Month. Our city's beautiful diversity is

something to cherish and appreciate. And I join all

5 New Yorkers in celebration of our cultures.

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This month is also a time to shine a light on many afflictions that impact millions of people across this country. October is AIDS Awareness Month, Breast Cancer Awareness Month, Down Syndrome Awareness Month, dyslexia Awareness Month, and World Autism month. We recognize the efforts of all New Yorkers who continue to support those impacted by these diseases.

And finally, October is National Domestic
Violence Awareness Month when we highlight domestic
violence and its devastating consequences,
acknowledge its survivors, and uplift their voices.
Nationally, one in four women and nearly one in 10
men have experienced sexual or physical violence by
an intimate partner during their lifetime. We know
there is an undercount due to the trauma and stigma
around domestic violence, resulting in people living
in fear and silence. There is much work to do to end
gender-based violence, and this council has
prioritized responses and services to help reduce

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this violence and help survivors. We will continue to champion these resources that help people to be safe and recover.

Now, let's move on to our stated agenda. we're voting on several legislative land use and finance items. We will be voting on the following land use items: 231-06 Northern Boulevard will facilitate the enlargement of the Misumi restaurant. It will also permit local retail and services on neighboring properties. The council is modifying the application to reduce the size of the area of the proposed overlay by changing its eastern boundary from 234th Street to 233rd Street in Councilmember palominos district. 2017 Grand Concourse will facilitate a new 9-story residential building containing approximately 33 affordable housing units, eight of which will be provided to formerly homeless seniors through the EHRS program in Councilmember Sanchez's district. Halletts North rezoning this project and Councilmember Cabán's district will facilitate a significant new mixed-use development on the waterfront of the Halletts Point Peninsula in Northwest Queens. It will include a projected 1340 housing units, 333 permanently affordable units, 525

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parking spaces, 525 Bicycle spaces, 1800 square feet of commercial use, 21,500 square feet of community facility space, and approximately one acre of open... open space including a waterfront esplanade. The council is modifying the application to map the MIH option to include the deep affordability and amend the site plan to restore the pedestrian walkway to its regulated width of 10 feet. I want to emphasize the commitments that were secured by Councilmember Cabán and the Council for this project to benefit the entire community.

NYCHA's Astoria Houses Tenant Association will receive \$1 million to benefit its residents.

Outstanding. There will be 10,000 square feet of community facility space set aside for urban upbound to manage a job incubator program and provide local programming, as well as Zone 126 to us as its new headquarters for \$1 in annual rent. Outstanding.

There is a labor agreement with 32BJ SEIU and a commitment to hire an experienced maintenance crew to provide the upkeep of rain gardens, shoreline plantings, and other landscaping in the public promenade. And finally, a partnership with NYC Kids

Rise has been established to benefit scholarship programs for local youth. Outstanding.

These are tremendous wins for current residents, future residents, workers, the entire community, and our entire city, and I thank Councilmember Cabán once again for her work on this important project along with everyone who played a role, including the local community, and our very own Land Use staff. Thank you all so much for this.

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Additionally, we will also be voting on the following finance items: Proposed Resolution 306 A, which will set October 12, 2022 as the date for a public hearing on legislation to authorize increases in the annual expenditures for five business improvement districts. The Fifth Avenue BID the 125th Street BID the Columbus Amsterdam BID, the DUMBO BID, and the Court-Livingston-Schermerhorn BID.

We will also vote on a transparency resolution approving new designations and changes of certain organizations receiving funding in the expense budget.

Lastly, the council will vote on the following pieces of legislation today. Intro 116 A, sponsored

Menon, would require the Department of small business services to create an online small business one stop shop portal that includes all permit and license applications, as well as related applicable information needed to open and operate a small business of any kind in New York City. The portal, which would be required to be available in English and 10 other languages, would allow business owners to track the status of their permit and license applications and allow business owners to settle or pay outstanding balances on notices of violation.

Next Intro 383 A, sponsored by councilmember Gale Brewer, would clarify the dates by which a commercial landlord must notify the city if a space has become vacant. The city would then keep a more up-to-date registry of storefront vacancies that would be made available to the public. This bill serves as a continuation of legislation the council passed at the request of then Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer, which created a citywide commercial premises registry. Thank you to staff Rachael Cordero, and David Seitzer for your work.

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Finally, a series of 311 related bills from our
Technology Committee. Intro 206 A sponsored by
councilmember Sandra Ung seeks to increase
transparency regarding the wait times experienced by
individuals who request an interpreter during their
calls to the 311 customer service center. It would
require the Commissioner of DOIT to compile and make
publicly available a monthly data set, including the
wait times in number of seconds experienced by
individuals who request an interpreter during their
calls to the 311 customer service center. Intro 296
A also sponsored by Councilmember Ung, would require
the development and updating of a protocol for
identifying the languages spoken by callers to 311 in
order to better facilitate requests for
interpretation services. The bill would also require
this protocol and any subsequent updates to the
protocol to be posted to the 311 Customer Service
Center website within seven days after implementation
and updating respectively. The 311 Customer Service
Center would additionally be required to report on
the implementation of an updates to the protocol.
And Intro 240 A, sponsored by our Technology

Chair Jennifer Gutierrez, would require that within

2	30 days of the effective date of the law, city
3	agencies must notify the 311 customer service center
4	of the possible need to add or update a service
5	request category on all 311 platforms. This bill
6	would also require reporting on all set additions,
7	and updates and would require 311 to create a
8	publicly available data set including information on
9	submission of correspondence from the public
10	requesting the addition to or updating of 311 service
11	request categories. Thank you to staff Irene
12	Byovski, Brad Reed, Malok Niserdine, and Janita John.
13	Congratulations to all of my colleagues who will pass
14	this important legislation today. Thank you all for
15	your attention. And now I turn it back into the
16	hands of our Majority Leader Keith Powers.

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Speaker Adams. We're now going to move into the discussion of general orders. We have two people signed up right now. We're first going to hear from Councilmember Palladino.

COUNCILMEMBER PALLADINO: Good afternoon everybody. And I'm I want to vote yea, with an explanation for the expansion of the 230-106 Northern Boulevard commercial overlay rezoning. Since

January, I've hosted meetings with Mizumi, CB11,
Douglaston Civic, and the borough president. I've
done my research, listened to all sides and made the
necessary adjustments to arrive at a compromise that
benefits everyone. Masumi is a family-owned multi-
generational small business serving the Douglaston
community for many years. The owners initially
sought to expand the BSA variants, but that goal was
made impossible. After several years, Masumi changed
its course and now seeks approval of the rezoning to
establish a C22 commercial overlay within the
existing R1-2 residential district from Mizumi to
234th Street. Through extensive discussion with the
community and Mizumi, I have decided to reduce the
extent of the rezoning to 233rd Street in order to
minimize the potential effects of rezoning. I have
also secured a commitment on the maximum size and
capacity of this expansion so that it is less likely
to cause any disruptions to traffic.

My vote today establishes predictable zoning controls on Northern Boulevard. Because of the underlying R1 R2 zoning remains in place, no tall buildings or apartment buildings of any kind will be permitted. Instead the rezoning gives the property

2 owners the ability to invest in their businesses

3 | without extensive and costly government oversight.

4 With this vote, I helped small businesses to grow

5 while blocking over development.

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I was elected to serve District 19 to both preserve our neighborhoods and to support our small businesses. With my vote to approve this commercial overlay with some common-sense modifications, we will achieve both goals. I have already I have always practice transparency in my district. No matter which problems I tackle, I strive at solutions that are best interest to all. I thank you all very much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Councilmember Palladino. We will now hear from Councilmember Brewer, followed by Councilmember Sanchez.

Okay, we're now going to go to Councilmember Sanchez,

COUNCILMEMBER SASNCHEZ: Thank you, Majority

Leader. I want to speak in support of my... the

project that is going through in my district, 2017

Grand Concourse, which is 100% affordable housing

development. It's going to be 34 units and a very

small site. And it was it was previously, not as

affordable. I... we kind of got into it during our

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first discussion with the developers, which is actually the day that we had a shooting in front of my office. And I was in the middle of saying to them right before we heard pop-pop, literally, that we needed more and deeper affordability in every single development that was going to come to our district with city support. And they obliged. It's a third of homeless set-aside, and 10% of 30% AMI. just very proud to support this project, and urge all of us -- congratulations to Councilmember Cabán -- to always just be very attentive to these projects, because they get subsidized at really high levels. This one is \$782,000 per unit, to preserve the long term affordability. And so when we have the right, and we should and must demand every time that these projects come to our district, that we are getting exactly what our communities need. So with that, thank you so much. And I hope that you all join me in supporting.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

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COUNCILMEMBER RESTLER: Firstly, I just like to congratulate my good friends at the DUMBO BID and the Court-Livingston-Schermerhorn BID on increasing their... their annual expenditure. These are two really wonderful business improvement districts that do so much to improve the dynamism and the cleanliness, and just the activation of our communities in downtown Brooklyn and DUMBO. future, I hope that we can start including marketrate residential rental properties in these Business Improvement District assessments, as, you know, these areas have gentrified enormously and the residents benefit so much from the services of the BID. I'm very pleased that we are helping to allow these organizations to do even more good work in our communities. And while I have a great deal of appreciation for the Italian American community here in New York and across the nation. I think it is wrong that we continue to celebrate Columbus Day. And it is Indigenous Peoples Day that we should be honoring and celebrating this coming... two Monday's from now, and, you know, I hope that we as a chamber can do more to, you know, rename places like Columbus Park in downtown Brooklyn to better celebrate the

2 folks who made contributions to our communities.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

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COUNCILMEMBER YEGER: Thank you very much, I'm not going to wish anybody any kind of happy anything. [laughter] Instead said I'm going to talk about the taxes that we are on a... on a march towards raising today. You may not notice that if you take a look at the agenda because it's hidden. It's a hidden tax on people all across the city. And it's the rubber stamp that we wield when we say let's set a public hearing for the increase in the annual expenditure that a number of BIDs are going to spend. good public hearing just like anybody else. lot of fun. 14 days from now, people all across the city will be invited by a publication in a newspaper of record that any of these five BIDs choose to come here into this building, go into that room next door at 10 o'clock in the morning, and tell us why they don't think they should pay any more. How many people do we really think are going to show up? BIDs are wonderful. I've said this before. They're there to pick up the slack for when the city has failed neighborhoods. So the BIDs get created. And then the tax goes on people's bills. They have to pay it. They don't get a credit against the

property taxes that they're already paying. There
are BIDs that we are going to... we're doing the...
the march towards acceptance, and make no mistake,
this is a rubber stamp. This is you know... we're
setting the public hearing, but we're going to pass
it the increase is going to happen. It's not like

you know, in a couple of weeks, we're going to come

9 back and say oh, no, we're not passing any increase.

10 It's happening.

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One of these BIDs, I'm sure they do wonderful work, \$8 million, is how much they're going to spend. Another one is \$1.8 million. The money's coming out of people's pockets. We talk a lot about how we don't raise the tax rate in the city. We haven't increased the tax rate on... on the property taxes. But this is a hidden way to do it. So I'm going to vote no, with respect to my colleagues who love these BIDs, and I love them too, but I don't love the taxes that they take out of people's pockets. No on Resolution 306. I also vote no on Introduction 383, consistent with how I voted on the underlying statute, and I abstain on Resolution 327. Thank you very much.

COUNSEL: Thank you. Powers?

2 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: I vote aye. Speaker 3 Adams?

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SPEAKER ADAMS: Well, unlike my colleague I am going to add another happy Diwali on October 24. To all who are celebrating with that I vote aye on all.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: All items on today's general order calendar are adopted by a vote of 50 in the affirmative, zero on the negative, with zero abstentions, with the exception of Intro 383 A, adopted by a vote of 43 in the affirmative, 7 in the negative, zero abstentions, resolution 327 adopted by a vote of 42 in the affirmative, 7 in the negative, and 1 abstention. Land use items 90, 91, 94, 95 and accompanying resolutions adopted by a vote of 49 in the affirmative, one of the negative, resolution 306 adopted by a vote of 49 in the affirmative, 1 of the negative and zero abstentions.

We'll now move in to the introduction of reading of bills.

SPEAKER ADAMS: All bills have been referred to committees as indicated on today's agenda.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. There are no resolutions on today's agenda. So we're now going to move into general discussion.

We'll start with councilmember Kagan.

COUNCILMEMBER KAGAN: Thank you Majority Leader
Powers for the opportunity to speak. For too long
New York City Housing Authority has avoided having to
answer for the abysmal response times for housing
residents concerns. I have seen on multiple
occasions, service requests be marked resolved, while
nothing had been done. Meanwhile, some property
managers seemingly go out of their way to avoid
addressing resistance issues concerns, taking weeks
if not months to make even the simplest fix. It is
unacceptable that residents have to wait for so long
to get even the most basic services, and NYCHA must
be held accountable.

That is why I'm introducing to the Intro 724, requiring NYCHA to report on their responsiveness to tenants complaints and service requests. These requests cannot be left unanswered and cannot be put on the back burner, and NYCHA must address these issues in a timely manner. I urge all my colleagues to sign on Intro 724, and hold it accountable for their mistreatment of tenants. Thank you.

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we'll now go to Councilmember Lee followed by Councilmember Brewer.

We'll go to Councilmember Brewer and then come back to Councilmember Lee.

COUNCILMEMBER BREWER: I have three bills that we're considering today. One has to do with stolen property. I believe that many of us are experiencing theft from stores, and this would make it a misdemeanor if it is placed on the open market online.

Number two, the issue of public space: I know that we are all enjoying plazas, we are enjoying activities that take place on them. But there isn't a lot of coordination in terms of what is going on. There are different agencies involved. So this would make a better coordination taking place at the city level.

And then the final issue is just trying to... or the issue of... the very important, one that we've been working on for a long time, which is figuring out how to have a land bank. And I think if we have a hearing then there'll be many additions that I know Councilmember Nurse and others have suggested, but we

2 do have the opportunity now with land to be actually

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3 in the perpetuity of affordable, because I know too

4 many times even when a nonprofit takes over a

5 building, it gets sold to the highest bidder and you

do not have a permanently affordable structure even

7 | though that is what it is intended to do. The land

8 bank within that.

Those are the three bills that are being considered for today, and I look forward to your support. Thank you very much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll go to Councilmember Lee followed by Councilmember Farias.

COUNCILMEMBER LEE: Okay. Good afternoon, Madam Speaker, Majority Leader and colleagues. I'm proud to introduce legislation today that will create a website for DOE schools to post their surplus supplies and to facilitate school-to-school exchanges. The legislation Intro 725 was actually driven by a conversation at the grassroots level in my district where we learned from a local teacher about the need for a system that school administrators can use to communicate and coordinate with one another about their inventories and

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resources to save precious taxpayer dollars and also not let supplies go to waste.

Given the fiscal predictions and as we head into another budget cycle legislation that promotes efficiency and reduces waste is badly needed. So I wanted to say thank you, and hope all of you can sign on in support.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're going to Councilmember Farias followed by Councilmember Cabán.

COUNCILMEMBER FARIAS: Good afternoon colleagues. Happy fall celebration is definitely in the air this month with several holidays taking place. So first I want to start off with saying we welcomed little Amal this morning here at City Hall. She represents a message of hope and solidarity for displaced people everywhere. Thank you to Amal for joining us on the steps today. It was really an honor to have you here and we wish her a safe continued journey.

I want to wish all my Hindu neighbors and those who celebrate Navaratri a happy Navaratri. I hope the next six days are filled with joy and celebration as we honor Goddess Duka.

It is also Hispanic Heritage Month, y'all. This month, and every month we take time to highlight and celebrate all that our Latino culture has to offer, and all that we have given to make this city, state, and country great, and I want to especially acknowledge the diversity we have in this body.

Next up, additionally, I want to wish a happy
Rosh Hashana to all of our Jewish community members
and everyone who celebrates. Lastly, we have October
10, coming up which is Indigenous Peoples Day, and
this day celebrates, recognizes, and honors the
beautiful traditions and cultures of the indigenous
people not just here in America, but around the
world. It draws attention to the pain, trauma and
broken promises that were erased by the celebration
of Columbus Day.

Today where I have two bills being introduced on the floor, first with Councilmember Menon, Intro 727, which would require the mayor's office on ending domestic violence and gender-based violence to operate Family Justice centers 24 hours a day seven days a week and to conduct a public campaign to inform the community of this change.

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My second bill is with Councilmember Salamanca, that would increase the quality of life for all our seniors in nursing homes. Currently nursing homes have to pay out-of-pocket for private collection businesses. Intro 720 would require the DSNY pickup of those wastes from nursing homes at no cost to the homes. And I urge my colleagues to sign on. Two minutes.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll go to Councilmember Cabán followed by Councilmember Baron.

COUNCILMEMBER CABÁN: Thank you. I want to take just a couple of minutes to talk about Puerto Rico. The last time I was on the island I met with organizers. I visited farmers hitting the mountains. I visited my family, and Puerto Ricans are tired. They've had to survive all manners of disaster, hurricanes and earthquakes which by the way, Puerto Rico is one of the top five places on the planet most affected by the climate crisis. And so what's happening there is all of our futures. And they have also had to survive the disasters of imperialism and colonization.

And if you want to help Puerto Ricans, we need more than offering water and generators as aid after

2 disasters, but a commitment to support Puerto Ricans

- 3 ability to thrive and make their own future.
- 4 Organizers there shared that it's really hard to
- 5 | mobilize when you feel like you don't have the energy
- 6 to get up. It's la brega, the perpetual struggle.
- 7 And we the diaspora, and also all people who support
- 8 justice everywhere need to support this freedom
- 9 | fight. We need to end the Jones Act, not just simply
- 10 | waive it. We need to end Promessa, the fiscal board,
- 11 | we have to cancel the debt, and we have to say afuera
- 12 to Luma and the privatization of energy, and fight
- 13 for Puerto Ricans right to self-determination, the
- 14 | right to decide our own futures.
- And so I hope that others will join in in
- 16 supporting those efforts of the folks again that
- 17 | are... that are on the island living through the
- 18 struggles every single day. So thank you.
- 19 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll go to
- 20 | Councilmember Baron, followed by Councilmember
- 21 Avilés...
- 22 COUNCILMEMBER BARON: Um, I want to commend
- 23 Council...
- 24 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: ... followed by
- 25 | Councilmember Avilés, and then we'll go to

Councilmember Bottcher. And if anybody else has things, they can sign up. Thanks.

COUNCILMEMBER BARRON: Does that mean I go?

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: You're up.

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COUNCILMEMBER BARRON: Ah. I want to commend the Councilmember Avilés for a powerful, strong hearing that you provided for us and people of NYCHA. You made us feel proud. You were strong. And we say NYCHA stop privatizing and start sanitizing your water because that's the real issue. So congratulations on a powerful hearing.

As far as Columbus is concerned, most historians said he never stepped foot on American soil, most historians said he left Spain on the Nina, the Pinta and the Santa Maria and went to Hispaniola, where he raped, murdered, was a racist colonizer and even if you're a Italian, you should not celebrate a colonizing, racist, rapist, and we should stop lying to our children. Columbus did not discover America for two reasons. One, he never stepped foot in America. And two, you can't discover a place where people already exist. And if you could do that, then I'm discovering Manhattan. [laughter] It never happened. We should not celebrate Columbus and some

2 people say let's do both. No, not a colonizing,

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Bottcher.

3 rapist, murderer, should not be celebrated. Thank
4 you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: We'll now go to

Councilmember Avilés. Finally we'll hear from... and
then after that, we'll hear from Councilmember

COUNCILMEMBER AVILÉS: Colleagues, I emphatically support Councilmember Cabán's remarks and Councilmember Baron's remarks.

For those of you who represent districts with an industrial business zone, chances are you know quite well the challenges faced by rapid proliferation of last-mile logistics facilities. Chances are that if you represent communities that have seen the rapid proliferation of last-mile you also represent environmental justice communities where decades of discriminatory planning has caused black and brown communities to suffer the brunt of the impact of environmental contaminants. Our communities exhibit disparate health outcomes, as a result, including elevated asthma rates and elevated pedestrian safety risks to name just a few that relate directly to the growth of these facilities. While I continue to

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mile facilities in the interim, I'm introducing legislation today that is intended to mitigate the impacts of the massive uptick in delivery vehicles in my district, especially in the community of Red Hook. These delivery vehicles are congesting our roadways and poisoning our air. Today I'm introducing Bill 707, in conjunction with the Bronx Borough President, Councilmembers Cabán, Gutiérrez, and Restler, which calls on New York City to begin monitoring air quality at designated heavy use thoroughfares.

I'm also going to be introducing... also introduce Intro 708, calls on the DOT, to undergo a redesign, and to improve safety, reduce congestion and mitigate harmful impacts and emissions that are continuing to have community health and wellbeing impacts. I urge all of my colleagues to sign on to engage in conversations around the impacts of these incredible facilities. And lastly, I want to thank my colleagues for their support of Puerto Rico and the Dominican Republic, and to call attention to the island of Cuba, who also was battered by a storm, Hurricane Ian. Please support Cuba. Please support

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2 the resolution to lift the embargo and end the travel
3 ban. The Cuban people need our support.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we're going to hear from Councilmember Bottcher and then Councilmember Ossé.

COUNCILMEMBER BOTTCHER: Illegally covered up license plates allowed drivers to evade camera tickets 1.5 million times between March of 2020 and January of 2022. But the only reason we know that is because of a Freedom of Information Act request filed by the city... the publication of the city. That information should be made publicly available, so we know more about the issue that we're trying to solve for. So today I'm introducing a bill that would require the Department of Transportation to post this information publicly and regularly, so we can monitor progress on this issue. And I want to wish a happy Indigenous Peoples Day to my colleagues.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. And finally we hear from Councilmember Ossé.

COUNCILMEMBER OSSÉ: Thank you so much majority leader. I do want to echo the sentiments shared by our speaker at the beginning of the Stated Meaning in regards to New York City's handling of the migrant

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crisis. As many of us all know, conservative governors across this country that tout the words of Jesus Christ and the Bible, are sending migrants to New York City expecting us to turn them away or treat them poorly. Last Friday, I had the privilege to go on an unannounced tour of a shelter within my district with Councilmember Hudson, and I was fairly impressed with the work that was being done by the provider there.

Brooklyn is also bearing the brunt of the influx of migrants. Thus, the resources that we have are quite limited. So I'm hoping that the leadership in this council, all of our colleagues in this Council, as well as colleagues in government, continue advocating for resources from the state and federal level, to keep our migrant neighbors safe and provide them with the resources that they need to get back on their feet. But I'm very proud of New York City for... for doing what we're doing in terms of handling the crisis. It's not perfect, but we're getting there. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. And I believe lastly we'll hear from Councilmember Feliz.

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I want to take a second to briefly talk about the Gun Violence Crisis affecting our city. I'm looking at the numbers now. This year we've had 1246 shooting victims, 1246 people who will live the rest of their lives with so much trauma, not only the victims but their families. Our families deserve safety, regardless of their income, regardless of the neighborhood that we live in. If we don't have safety, nothing else matters.

I visited so many of my schools in my district, and the issue that consistently comes up is safety. And how can our children feel safe? And how can our children focus on school if they don't feel safe? How can children take advantage of opportunity if they don't feel safe, if they feel that a shooting can happen any second?

As I mentioned, in the last meeting, there's a park in my district received the most state of the art renovation that I could imagine: \$15 million in renovation, and the people in that community, the families in that community, and the children in that community could only see that park from a distance. Because there's... there's shootings, and there's

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gunshots ringing on a nightly basis. Everyone

deserves access to safety, regardless of the income

or neighborhood that they live in. Again, 1246

shootings this year in the city of New York, that is

wild. That is crazy.

We need to be asking ourselves many questions.

One of the questions that we've been talking about is, where are these ghost guns coming from? That is one question that we've been asking ourselves, where are they coming from? And what can we do to stop them? But another question that we need to ask ourselves: This year, we've seized approximately 4500 guns in our streets. The second question that we need to be asking ourselves is why are people feeling so comfortable carrying these weapons?

Weapons that we know that are dangerous, and weapons that we know could and are being used to cause the worst harm that any family can imagine.

Yesterday the first shooting... I could use just 10 more seconds.

Yesterday, the first shooting in my district happened at 6am. The next one happened a minute away from a school at 7am. No family deserves to live like this. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. I now call on speaker Adrienne Adams to close today's stated meeting.

SPEAKER ADAMS: I thank all of my colleagues for their attendance and participation. Thank you. The stated meeting up September 29, 2022, is hereby adjourned.
