Today, the Committee will vote on a package of legislation related to childcare. There are seven bills and one resolution in this package, which our Committee will be voting on today.

This includes Intro 242-A sponsored by

Council Member Gutiérrez, a Local Law and the

establishment of a Marshall plan for a moms taskforce

to develop and issue recommendations on how to

support working mothers, other parents, and

caregivers.

Intro 477-A sponsored by Council Member
Hudson. A Local Law to amend the Administrative Code
of the City of New York in relation to establishing a
childcare taskforce.

Intro 485-A sponsored by Council Member Menin. A Local Law to amend the Administrative Code of the City of New York in relation to an electronic childcare directory.

Intro 486-A sponsored by Council Member

Menin. A Local Law to amend the New York City Charter

in relation to establishing a childcare advisory

board.

Intro 487-A sponsored by Council Member
Menin. A Local Law to amend the Administrative Code
of the City of New York in relation to establishing a
childcare subsidy information portal.

Intro 488-A sponsored by Council Member
Menin. A Local Law to amend the Administrative Code
of the City of New York in relation to establishing a
childcare grant pilot program.

Intro 489-A sponsored by Council Member
Menin. A Local Law to amend the Administrative Code
of the City of New York in relation to guidance to an
owner of real property regarding facility
requirements for a childcare program.

Finally, Resolution 69, also sponsored by Council Member Menin. A Resolution calling on the New York State Legislature to pass and the Governor to

7615, Assembly side 8625. Legislation supporting the
provision of financial assistance to families and
childcare providers in order to make childcare more

Childcare is not only essential for working parents but for a just and equitable society, and I commend my Colleagues of the Council for making this issue a priority.

Before moving on to the vote, I would especially like to recognize and welcome the Bill's sponsors who are present today and invite them to provide remarks on their legislation. I will start by handing it over to Council Member Menin.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENIN: Thank you so much.

I first of all want to thank Chair Caban for today's vote and for her leadership on bringing these bills forward. I want to congratulate my Colleague, Council Member Gutierrez, on her Marshal plan taskforce as well as Council Member Hudson.

Childcare is in a state of crisis. It costs on average over 18,000 dollars a year for childcare. During the COVID pandemic, it's estimated

that over 375,000 parents and caregivers in New York

City have left the workforce or downsized their jobs

because of high childcare costs, and that is actually

costing the City over 2 billion dollars a year in

6 lost revenue. Additionally, there aren't enough

7 childcare providers, creating childcare deserts all

8 over the city as over 1,400 facilities have closed in

9 recent years.

My package of bills, the Universal

Childcare Act, is a critical step in addressing this issue. Today's vote means that New York City would become the first city in the country to enact a comprehensive legislative package that implements and mandates universal childcare. The package includes five bills.

Intro 485 creates an electronic childcare directory of every provider in the city, and that would be available in 11 different languages.

Intro 486 creates a permanent childcare advisory board that would make recommendations on legislation, policies, and initiatives to make childcare affordable, and it puts the City on a five-year plan to implement universal childcare.

Intro 487 creates a childcare subsidy information portal, which again would be available in 11 languages so that parents and caregivers could find out if they qualify for federal, state, and city subsidies, and it connects them directly with the forms needed to qualify for those subsidies.

Intro 488 establishes a three-year pilot program that gives childcare grants to struggling providers.

Finally, Intro 489 requires the

Department of Health to create a package basically of
a state tax abatement, which would allow us to open
up more childcare facilities to address this
childcare desert situation that we have.

This package collectively along with my Colleagues' addresses a longstanding issue of affordability and accessibility that affects so many New Yorkers. Today's legislative package ensure affordable, high-quality childcare can finally be a reality for our city.

In closing, I want to thank from the Speaker's office Brenda McKinney, Jessica Foong, Sara Liss, Andrea Vazquez, Jeff Baker, and from my office, my Chief of Staff Jonathan Szott, my Legislative and

COUNCIL MEMBER GUTIERREZ: Thank you,

Chair. The bill in this package, the Marshall plan

for moms, calls for a historic investment in

caregivers' economic recovery and empowerment,

especially against the backdrop of the pandemic's

impact on mothers and working caregivers. That's why

I'm so excited, and I'm so proud of this package of

bills. It is the beginning of something historic.

I also want to recognize the lead

Sponsors from other bills in this package including

Council Member Menin and Council Member Hudson. All

in solidarity, we are sending clear signals that this

City Council which is composed of mothers,

caregivers, aunties, godmothers, we are ready to

build and work towards a path of revolutionizing the

economy of care. When we continue down this path, we

will fight for watershed investments that would

support not just the half a million children under

five in our city but the providers of that care as

well, which is a workforce that is predominantly made
up of women and women of color. This investment would
help the parents in the city, many of which are
people of color, 32 percent of whom are single moms,
and it would help ease the cycle of poverty so many

find themselves in. I'm so proud to be standing with this group of Colleagues.

I also want to shout our wonderful and illustrious Chair, Council Member Cabán, for prioritizing these packages under her Committee and her staff, and I'm also proud to take the first small step towards a true vision of universal childcare. Thank you.
