SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you so much Majority Leader. Good afternoon, everyone. Hi. I'd like to remind everyone that Tuesday, November 8, is indeed Election Day. I know, I don't have to tell anyone in this room. But let's remind everyone else that if they have not already voted during early voting, please, please exercise this fundamental right that is a pillar of our democracy. And please don't forget to flip the ballot to vote on the four ballot proposals that are up for consideration this November, including three initiatives that were developed by the New York City Racial Justice Commission. And I want to thank all of the councilmembers who participated in the council's racial justice ballot Day of Action last week to engage and educate New Yorkers about the ballot

proposals. Let's continue to get the message out and
urge all New Yorkers to flip the ballot on Tuesday.

Before we continue, I do want to take a moment to honor the life of Reverend Dr. Calvin Butts. Dr. Butts on October 28. He was a great community leader who dedicated his life to serving his beloved Harlem and the entire state of New York. He led the historic Abyssinian Baptist Church with such passion and care, which extended to a stewardship of Abyssinian Development Corporation, to SUNY Old Westbury, and many other educational and community institutions. Dr. Butts' legacy of public service, community empowerment, justice and equity will live on through the people he inspired and all New Yorkers who have benefited from his actions. As a council we will continue to uplift and honor his memory by advancing many, many of his efforts for our city and its people. Our prayers and condolences are with Dr. Butz family, friends, and of course, the Abyssinian Baptist Church community. I was privileged indeed to call him a friend. And like all New Yorkers, I will miss him dearly. Please join me in a moment of silence to remember Reverend Dr. Calvin Butts.

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SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you. November is Puerto Rican Heritage Month and as we begin the new month, I... I want to honor the many contributions and accomplishments of our Puerto Rican communities. Puerto Rico is often considered New York City's sixth borough because of our close relationship with the island and its people. Puerto Rican New Yorkers helped shape our city into what it is today, and it is important We acknowledge those continuing contributions not only throughout the month of November, but every day. November is also National Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month. Alzheimer's affects more than 6 million Americans, and it is important that we recognize not just those who have been diagnosed with this disease, but also the families and caregivers who support them. I know this is an important month for Aging chair, Councilmember Crystal Hudson, whose care for her mother brought her into this great work. I want to thank Councilmember Hudson for her fierce advocacy and leadership of the aging committee, and all members who continue to advance the care we need for older adults in our city. Thank you.

In a few days, colleagues, we will be observing

Veterans Day. That happens on November 11. And this
day is meaningful for all of us, especially veterans
and families of those who have served in the armed
forces. My father, my father in law, and my husband,
all served in the United States Air Force.

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So as for many of you, this day is very personal for me and for my family and I thank all of our veterans for their service and sacrifice for our nation. Have a very safe and meaningful Veterans Day.

Now let's move on to our stated agenda. Today we're voting on several legislative and finance items. We will be voting on the following finance

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item: Resolution 362, sponsored by Finance Chair

Justin Brannan, pertains to an increase in the annual expenditure for the 125th Street and DUMBO business improvement districts. This resolution sets the date, time, and place for the hearing of the Local Law, increasing the annual expenditure for these bids. The council will also vote on important pieces of legislation to help improve the diversity of the New York City Fire Department, a struggle that has been underway for decades.

Today, we're voting on a package of bills to improve the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion practices at the FDNY. Our city's firefighters define what it means to be New York's Bravest. Their heroic work saves lives every single day. And as the largest fire department in the country, the FDNY responds to over 1 million emergencies every year. As the mother of an FDNY paramedic, I am incredibly proud of the FDNY and our first responders. However, we cannot deny that the fire department still does not accurately reflect the rich diversity of our city. The statistics are striking. The department is still disproportionately made up of white men. Only 8% of our firefighters are black. 13% are Latino, and just

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2% are Asian. The gender... the gender disparities are far worse. While we certainly celebrate the appointment of Laura Cavanaugh as the first woman in our city's history to serve as Commissioner of the Department, the reality is that just 1% of firefighters are women. The overall lack of diversity within the FDNY is something we must address, and as a council we are committed to advancing solutions that can help correct this historic injustice. This critical set of bills we're voting on today are focused on boosting diversity in the department by requiring the implementation of substantial efforts confronting exclusionary practices that undermine diversity and increasing transparency on the FDNY is ability to maintain a diverse workforce free from harassment and discrimination.

Before we get into the specific bills, I do want to acknowledge the work of so many advocates who have fought for decades to increase diversity in the FDNY.

Organizations like the Vulcan Society have been leaders and partners in this work, and the many firefighters who are women and people of color have blazed a trail and fought for equitable treatment and

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2 equal representation. This legislation comes out of

3 | years of efforts by so many of them who continue to

4 advocate fight and push without the scale and

5 strength of backup and support that exists today. I

6 also want to thank the council's Black, Latino and

7 Asian caucus for its leadership on this package of

8 Bill's, as well as our fire and emergency management

committee chair Joann Ariola, for shepherding through

10 \parallel for shepherding it through the committee.

The first bill is my own, Intro 516A that would require the FDNY and consultation with the Department of citywide Administrative Services to develop and implement a plan for the recruitment and retention of firefighters from underrepresented groups within the department, including female firefighters and firefighters of diverse racial and ethnic backgrounds. The FDNY would also be required to report annually on these efforts.

And I just want to say this about my own legislation and this entire package: Achieving diversity and equity requires more than just words. It requires intentional planning, implementation, transparency, and accountability. And that is what these bills are all about. My legislation is focused

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on requiring the type of planning and implementation for recruiting and retaining firefighters from groups that are underrepresented in the FDNY. It also includes important transparency about these efforts and their outcomes, and the council will be in the position to hold the administration and FDNY accountable. We know from history, that many barriers have existed to stifle diversity in the FDNY, from the firefighter exam being discriminatory against women and applicants of color to hiring practices, and it was not until 2014 Just eight years ago, that the department settled a discrimination lawsuit for \$98 million and agreed to make changes to its hiring practices. By passing this package of bills today, we hope to move the FDNY forward to achieving a workforce fully reflective of the diversity of our city.

The next bill is Intro 519. A sponsored by our Fire and Emergency Management committee chair, Joann Ariola. It would require the FDNY to survey each firehouse to determine permanent facility upgrades necessary to create a workplace environment that supports a mixed gender workforce. Now, this is the year 2022. And this is the legislation that we are

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upgrades.

passing in the year 2022. The bill would also employ interim measures to ensure privacy, including physical barriers at locations awaiting such

Upon completing the survey, the department would be required to report its findings to the council and mayor and provide information related to any current or forthcoming construction plans to make relevant upgrades to areas such as bathrooms, changing unrest areas and any interim measures taken at firehouses to accommodate a mixed gender workforce until permanent upgrades are made.

Next we will vote on the following bill sponsored by Councilmember Kevin Riley, Intro 552A would require the FDNY to produce an annual report on the number of firefighters assigned to each fire company, and special operations unit within the department, disaggregated by the gender and race or ethnicity of such firefighters. Additionally, the FDNY will be required to provide demographic information of the population residing in the immediate service area of each fire company in the city. This will provide information revealing whether the demographics at a firehouse actually reflect the community that they

2 serve. Introduction 553 A would require the FDNY, in

3 consultation with the Department of Citywide

4 Administrative Services, to develop and implement a

5 plan to provide the annual training and education to

6 all employees regarding diversity and inclusion,

7 including on the department's anti-harassment and

8 anti-discrimination policies. Firehouses where

9 | multiple instances of harassment or discrimination

10 take place would receive additional targeted and

11 interactive training.

Lastly, we will be voting on Intro 568 sponsored by Councilmember Nantasha Williams. This bill would require the FDNY to produce an annual report on complaints filed with the department's Equal Employment Opportunity office regarding potential violations of the city's Equal Employment Opportunity policy. The report would include information on the number of complaints that were received and closed during the prior year. Information on types of misconduct alleged in such complaints, and case outcomes including any corrective action taken by the department. We want to thank staff Rachel Cordero,

Josh Kingsley, and William Hangac.

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Thank you for your attention. Now I turn it back into the hands of our Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Speaker Adams. We're now going to move in discussion of general orders. We will first hear from Councilmember Williams.

COUNCILMEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank you. I am thrilled to cast my vote today for my third bill to pass this year, Intro 560 which will make the EEO violations of the FDNY more transparent.

Since the DOJ Vulcan lawsuit against the FDNY in 2007, there have been regular public reports regarding the hostile work environment within the fire department faced by women, ethnic minorities, and members of the LGBTQIA+ community.

Various news agencies have highlighted hazing incidents within the firehouses, an issue that some claim perpetuate the lack of diversity and attrition issues within the department. In 2021 a lawsuit was filed against Queens firefighters, who allegedly hazed a rookie colleague for being Hispanic and suffering from PTSD after his service in the military. In 2022, and openly gay firefighters sued the Department for discrimination based on his sexual

3 homophobic slurs. Additionally, following numerous

orientation and claiming he was repeatedly called

4 incidents of racist and discriminatory behavior

5 within the department, particularly during a time of

6 civil unrest following the murder of George Floyd in

7 2020, the FDNY initiated disciplinary actions against

nine members with punishments involving suspension

9 without pay up to six months for some offenders.

10 These incidents including the use of inappropriate

11 and racist comments made by uniformed firefighters is

12 something we are looking to address. Intro 560 would

13 help these issues by creating better transparency

14 around EEO complaints and corrective actions. I want

15 to thank all who helped to make this happen, past and

16 Present, Chair Ariola, and of course, Speaker Adams.

I would also like to congratulate my colleague,

Councilmember Riley, who also has bills in this

19 package, and I'm honored to have a bill as well so

that we can truly fight firefighter discrimination.

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COUNCILMEMBER RILEY: Thank you Majority Leader.

It is fitting and significant that in today's historical diverse Council, we make our mark to address the systematic disparities in our infrastructure, as well as to create more welcoming and safe workplaces for all New Yorkers. As Co-Chair the Black Latino Asian caucus, it is a priority for the caucus that all legislation passed through the council upholds the true means of diversity and inclusion that seeks to benefit and protect all New Yorkers. And that's what Intro 552A, and 553A will be doing.

I would like to thank my colleagues in government for backing this transformative legislation, and also the thing to Bronx Borough President, Vanessa Gibson, for her hard work and partnership on these bills.

But most importantly, thank you to the Vulcan Society, Arc Of Justice, and all the advocates. And thank you to the FDNY. We are grateful to the leadership service and sacrifices that our fire members perform daily to keep our families and our community safe. This package of legislation will only strengthen the department and our city to ensure that all our heroes are well supported and protected.

When I was first here, Paul Washington, who was a black firefighter, and head of the Vulcan Society, we did the same kinds of things. And you know what, the percentage is still the same: 7% black, 2% female. We've got to come down harder on the Fire Department.

They also have complaints when they come into our community, most white male firefighters, God forbid, that you have a pot on fire, they'll wreck your whole apartment, saying they're trying to put the fire out on the pot on the stove. So this kind of stuff has got to stop. When with this legislation, we have to

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put more teeth into... once this legislation has passed, we need to bring the fire department in here constantly. And as a body, we need to go to the fire department even if we have to continuously protest until they pass... hire more of us and stop some practices. In one instance, they had a noose in the locker room in front of one of the firefighters. this has been like 20 or 30 years, and we've come up with similar legislation. I appreciate all the work that was done. I supported and voted for it 100%, but when it comes to execution and implemented, no pun intended, but the fire department needs heat. They need some heat on their racist policies so that we can make sure that we are respected. So thanks to my colleagues for what you're doing. But we need to get a little stronger because it's been decades. we have the same thing.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: We'll now go to Councilmember Feliz.

COUNCILMEMBER FELIZ: Thank you Majority Leader.

I want to start by thanking members of the fire

department every single day we see them risking their

lives to save the lives of people in burning

buildings. I'm very thankful for the service that

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they do every single day at all hours. However, we've had challenges with our fire department, historical challenges obviously related to racial diversity, gender diversity, and diversity in every way. I want to thank my colleagues, Speaker Adams BLAC Co-Chair, Kevin Reilly, Councilmember Natasha Williams, for their leadership on these bills. live in a diverse city. We need to make sure that every single government agency, including our fire department, but every single other government agency as well, is as diverse as... as our city. Diversity creates strong fire departments. Diversity creates strong communities. And we need to make sure that everyone growing up in the city of New York, regardless of your race, or gender, you could see yourself and you could become a firefighter. want to thank all of you for your work on these very important beliefs. We're building a better New York City for all of us and for future generations. you.

I just want to take this moment to honor a family and my district. This Sunday morning we saw a tragic fire in the Castle Hill community that took the life of four of my neighbors: 10 year old Kalheed Waleed Ban Saleh, his 12 year old brother Mohammed Waleed Ahmed, their older brother, 22 year old Ahmed Saleh Sally, and his 10-month-old baby girl, Barah Saleh. There's also a 21 year old woman, their mother and a 44 year old man, their uncle, who are still in critical condition. I and my community are heartbroken to see our neighbors gone too soon and their families suffer from the wreckage of this fire. I have spent time with the family and want to honor

2 | them today and express their appreciation for the

3 outpouring of support, not only from our community,

4 but from the city. My office and I are continuing to

5 do everything we can to help and I just want to

6 appreciate the condolences from Madam Speaker, Mayor

7 Adams, Borough President Gibson, and my colleagues in

18 Month most folks know by now that I cared for my

20 | Alzheimer's disease. And while those eight years

21 | weren't at all easy -- they call it the long goodbye

 $22 \parallel -- \text{ I'm grateful for the time I had with my mother,}$

and I was able to keep her at home until her last

24 breath.

2	My office gets calls often from constituents who
3	are concerned about older neighbors who seem to be
4	exhibiting signs of Alzheimer's disease, and I can't
5	imagine my office is the only one receiving those
6	calls. More and more older adults are living alone
7	isolated and finding themselves without the care and
8	resources they deserve. Currently, more than 6
9	million Americans live with the disease and by 2050,
10	that number will grow to almost 13 million. One in
11	three seniors dies with Alzheimer's or another
12	dementia, and while Alzheimer's has been such a
13	significant part of my story, I am most certainly not
14	the only one with a story. And I want to just
15	mention I sent an e-mail. We will be doing an info
16	brief with an organization called Caring Kind that
17	delivers services and resources to families
18	experiencing Alzheimer's disease, and I encourage
19	everyone to join. I can't remember the date off the
20	top of my head right now. But please check your
21	emails and all the information is there. Thank you.
22	MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We will hear
23	from Councilmember Bottcher followed by Councilmember
24	Cabán.

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COUNCILMEMBER BOTTCHER: So today I'm introducing a bill that will clarify and strengthen the rules around those sidewalk news boxes. Most of them are fine, but some of them as we all know, become abandoned, broken, soiled, vandalized, tipped over. And I've in the past tried to address this but there's really not much the city can do about it under the current rules. So the introduction that we are submitting today, would have some... just some common sense stuff like requiring them to put the owners of the boxes, which is often not even the publication... put their contact information on the box. So there's someone to contact, a way to have an I want to thank my co-sponsor, Sandra Ung, Councilmember Ung, and everyone who has signed on. Thanks so much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go to Councilmember Cabán, followed by Councilmember Restler.

COUNCILMEMBER CABÁN: Thank you. I just wanted to highlight for folks that right outside of city hall today, there are family members and loved ones of people killed on Rikers Island, who had been there since 6 a.m., along with advocates that are calling

2 for the end of solitary confinement and the closure

3 of Rikers Island. Initially, when they started

4 planning the event, it was supposed to be 16 hours,

5 and then became 17, and now 18, because in those

6 couple of short weeks, we saw more lives lost on

7 Rikers.

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And I want to share very briefly the story of the Tavidas family, who was the 17th victim on Rikers, who had spoken to her son who seemed... who struggled with mental health issues... struggled with mental health issues, and seemed hopeful that he might be able to come home and access a program and services in just a few weeks. And two days later... She lives in public housing. That's an important thing to note. Two days later, a bunch of men in matching jackets showed up at her door -- English is not her first language -- and she let them in. And she said, "I thought I have so many open tickets in my apartment, everything is broken, nothing works. I let them in because I thought I thought they were here to fix something. Finally, I thought they were here to fix something in my apartment." And she let them in. And they told her that her son was dead.

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And it is no coincidence that this family, relegated to public housing could not get a damn thing fixed in their apartment, who had a son with mental health issues, who couldn't get access to services, but had access to Rikers Island, and then was killed there.

We have to understand the trajectory in this pipeline and end the practice of solitary confinement, in addition to the people dying.

Recently, a corrections officer stabbed 18 times.

People are not safe there. We need to decarcerate.

We need to end solitary. And for folks who are still on the fence on signing onto that really important legislation, please: The empirical evidence, the data, the research shows that conditions of solitary, exacerbate and increase violence, and that there are proven methods to decreasing the violence on all sides. So I'm asking my colleagues, please sign on to the Halt Solitary Bill. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go to Councilmember Restler, followed by Councilmember Holden.

COUNCILMEMBER RESTLER: Thank you Majority

Leader. Firstly, I'd like to just echo the eloquent

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sentiments of Councilmember Cabán. I couldn't agree with her more strongly.

Also just wanted to mention that today I'm introducing intro 816 to suspend ASP during Tisha B'av, and Tisha B'av is a day of communal mourning. It's one of the holiest days in the Jewish calendar, commemorating the destruction of the first and second temples in Jerusalem, and other tragedies that occurred on that same date. Constituents in my district and folks all across the city mourn from the earliest hours until late in the night, and they cannot be bothered by ASP on a day of such importance. So I hope that we can remove this burden together, I want to thank the bill drafter and, and the folks on my team who worked on it, and especially the folks in the community of Williamsburg, who brought this issue to my attention. I think it's a sensible modification that I hope we can adopt. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. And now we'll hear from Councilmember Holden.

COUNCILMEMBER HOLDEN: Thank you, Majority Leader and today I'm introducing Intro 813 a bill that will help our small businesses compete with larger chains

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on third-party delivery apps. My bill will keep fee caps in place as mandated by this council. But it will also allow restaurants the option to opt out of

5 regulations that can hurt their marketing efforts.

Providing small businesses more options is good for business and good for all consumers who use third party delivery apps like GrubHub and UberEATS. I want to thank... thank you to consumer and Worker Protection Committee Chair, Marjorie Velazquez, and to all my colleagues on the Council for being preintro sponsors. I ask my colleagues to sign on to this important bill, and thank you Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Councilmember Holden. Do we have anyone else signed up to speak? Seeing none on that call Speaker Adrienne Adams to close today's Stated Meeting.

SPEAKER ADAMS: Before we close I'd like to acknowledge that a longtime staffer of ours will be leaving us on Monday. She's in the balcony. Let's everybody wave to Jenny Lowe.
