18	communication from speaker Adrienne Adams.
19	SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you, Majority
20	Leader, and good afternoon everyone. This week marks
21	the 10 <sup>th</sup> year anniversary since Superstorm Sandy
22	devastated many of our communities and our city. The
23	storm resulted in the deaths of 44 New Yorkers and
24	left thousands of people without power, stable homes,

and access to food and water. A decade later our

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neighborhoods are still recovering. As a city we must be more prepared for the coming storms. In t

4 past two years alone, we have been heavily impacted

5 by Tropical Storm Isaias, Hurricane Ida, among other

6 extreme weather events. We are continuously feeling

7 the effects of climate change, so it is critical that

8 we take the necessary steps to make our neighborhoods

9 more resilient and sustainable. Just yesterday, the

10 | Council Committee on Resiliency and Waterfront

11 | together with the Committee on Transportation and

12 | Infrastructure held a joint oversight hearing on the

13 | 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Superstorm Sandy. In our

14 districts and throughout the City we're hosting

events to commemorate the anniversary, reflect on the

16 lessons learned and compel adequate planning for the

17 future. The Decennial Citywide Climate Adaptation

18 Plan required by a law the Council passed calls for

19 the City to outline measures for resiliency that

20 protects residents, property, and infrastructure. It

21 prioritizes the most vulnerable areas and parts of

22 the City historically harmed by a lack of

23 environmental justice. This plan was due on

September 30<sup>th</sup>, and has yet to be published, and

we're awaiting that plan just like all New Yorkers.

3	facilitate the construction of two six-story
4	residential buildings with approximately 28
5	affordable home ownership units in Council Member
6	Sanchez and Stevens districts. Morrisania Claremont
7	Village Open Door will facilitate the development of
8	two family buildings with a total of 14 new units in
9	Council Member Riley and Council Member Stevens
10	districts. It will include seven affordable home
11	ownership units through the Open Door Program and
12	seven affordable rental units. Additionally, we will
13	also be voting on a transparency resolution approving
14	new designations and changes of certain organizations
15	receiving funding in the expense budget. Lastly, the
16	Council will vote on the following pieces of
17	legislation: Introduction 258A, sponsored by Council
18	Member Rita Joseph, would require the Mayor to
19	designate an agency or office in coordination with
20	the Department of Transportation and Department of
21	Parks and Recreation to report on feasible locations
22	for public bathroom facilities across this city.
23	This bill would also require that the agencies or
24	offices incorporate public and Community Board input
25	regarding locations suitable for public bathrooms.

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Introduction 291A, sponsored by Council Member Carina Rivera and Majority Whip Selvena Brooks-Powers, would require the Department of Transportation and the Department of Parks and Recreation to develop a citywide agency under-- a citywide greenway master plan with the goal of achieving a comprehensive network of greenways. Under the legislation, these agencies would create a working group tasked with identifying locations for possible development into greenways, establishing greenway design guidelines and identifying opportunities for integrating green infrastructure and creating a list of early action greenway projects. The bill would also require that these agencies report annually on the implementation of the greenway plan and engage with Community Boards on all proposals. Thank you staff Elliott Lin [sp?]. Next, the Council will be voting on a package of rat mitigation and sanitation legislation. New York City is currently experiencing a severe rat infestation problem, one that has impacted all communities. increased number of rodents result in more property damage, food contamination and disease transmission, as well as an overall impact on New Yorker's quality The Council is focused on improving the of life.

3	legislative package would bolster efforts to address
4	the surge of rodents throughout this city.
5	Introduction 414A, sponsored by Council Member Chi
6	Ossé, would require the Department of Health and
7	Mental Hygiene to issue an annual report on the
8	City's efforts in rat mitigation zones, submit the
9	report to the Speaker of the Council and the Mayor,
10	and make the report publicly available online. The
11	report would describe the metrics that the Department
12	of Health uses to measure the efficacy of rat
13	mitigation in each zone as well as their outreach
14	effort. Introduction 442A, sponsored by Council
15	Member Erik Bottcher, would require that before
16	permitting authorizing certain construction work that
17	is subject to rodent extermination is issued the
18	applicant certified that a licensed exterminator was
19	retained to effectively treat the premises for rodent
20	extermination. Introduction 459A, sponsored by
21	Council Member Shaun Abreu, would require that the
22	Department of Health and Mental Hygiene designate rat
23	mitigation zones throughout the City. This bill
24	would also allow the Department of Sanitation to

determine the times during which buildings must set

2	out their garbage and recycling for collection.
3	Introduction 460A, also sponsored by Council Member
4	Abreu, would require buildings which receive two more
5	rodent-specific maintenance codes or two or more
6	rodent-specific health code violations place their
7	refuse in rodent-proof containers for at least two
8	years. The bill permits the Department of Sanitation
9	to waive this container requirement wherever it would
10	cause an undue hardship or public safety hazard.
11	Thank you to our staff Jessica Steinberg Ablin [sp?].
12	Finally, as we conclude Domestic Violence Awareness
13	Month, it is important that we continue to address
14	gender-based violence and support its survivors with
15	the care and services they need to heal. To end

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COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: I just wanted to highlight two bills being introduced today that I'm cosponsoring and encourage my colleagues to sign The first is Intro 790, led by Council Member Brewer, which would allow asylum seekers to obtain IDNYC cards by making certain federal documents eligible as proof of identity. This is absolutely critical for these folks, being able to access a number of City benefits that they need to be able to thrive in their new home. The second is Intro 806, led by Criminal Justice Chair Rivera and Speaker Adams, which will create jail population review These teams would bring together stakeholders including DOC, DOP, MOCJ, CHS, and public defenders twice a month to review and identify cases where detained people can be safely released into the community. This is critical to our goals of decarceration and closing Rikers by 2027. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go to Council Member Ariola followed by Council Member Kagan.

7	will always remain a mystery. Some say it may be th

LO	school and go to the shore with some friends.
L1	Unfortunately, Ryan and Daniel did not return safely
L2	home, and instead drowned after falling into Jamaica
L3	Bay in an area where swimming was prohibited.
L4	Shortly after meeting with the school community and
L5	hearing about the harrowing events that took place
L6	when the school learned that the students had
L7	drowned, I wondered how soon the parents were
L8	notified that the students had not been marked
L9	present at school that day. After further inquiry,
20	came to learn that every school within the DOE has
21	their own policy of absentee notification. Most
22	schools have an automated system that alerts parents
23	and guardians of a child's absence from school.
24	However, there is no set time for that notification.

I found schools who notify absenteeism at noon, some

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after dismissal time, and many at 6:00 p.m. or later. In a world where both parents and guardians are more often than not working and unable to constantly check apps like Life360 to see where their child is, early notification from the school that a child has not been marked present is important so that the process of finding that child can begin. The timely alert could be life-saving. I saw it in my own district on June 10th and that is why I'm introducing Resolution 361 calling on the DOE to institute early notification of students' absence, which will allow the parent or quardian to respond in a proper and timely fashion. Resolution 361 calls for the DOE to issue a policy that notification of a student's absence should be no later than 9:00 a.m. for elementary school students and second period for middle and high school students so that the

There's an African proverb that says, colleagues. "Take care of those who may have lost their teeth, because they took care of you when you were teething," and that is the protection of our seniors. I have a bill Intro 787 that would make it more difficult for a landlord to evict an elderly or a senior person. They would have to provide information to the Commission on Human Rights, and the Commission will evaluate that information to base and make the basis whether the eviction is reasonable, affordable to the senior, and whether all of legal apparatuses were followed for those seniors. In addition to that, this would also require the landlord and the City to help the senior provide-provide the senior with legal assistance. We should make it very difficult for people to evict our seniors. Often times they're taken advantage of because they may not have computer skills. They may to understand everything, and they may have some difficulties navigating this complicated system. So

2 | this bill, and I hope we all sign on to it, would at

3 least say you're going to have to really go through a

4 lot to evict our seniors, and they have to be

5 assisted legally or else the eviction will be

6 nullified. So I encourage all of you to help our

seniors, because you know the bottom line, capitalism

8 has gone mad.
