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SERGEANT-AT-ARMS SADOWSKY: This is a microphone check. Today's date is December 21, 2022, on the Committee on Governmental Operations located in the Committee Room, recorded by Steven Sadowsky.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning and welcome to today's New York City Council vote for the Committee on Governmental Operations.

At this time, please silence all electronic devices. Chair Ung, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON UNG: Good morning. I'm City

Council Member Sandra Ung, Chair of the Committee of

Governmental Operations. I would like to welcome my

Colleagues who have joined us today, Council Member

Hanif, Council Member Brewer, and Council Member

Ayala.

At today's hearing, the Committee will be voting on a package of bills that are designed to provide critical language access for our immigrant neighbors and small business community. New York is a city of immigrants. It's also one of the most linguistically diverse cities in the world. New Yorkers speak over 200 different languages, and nearly half of all city residents speak a language other than English at home. Roughly 25 percent of all

English-speaking neighbors.

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New Yorkers are considered limited English proficient. These limited English proficient New Yorkers are an integral part of the city and its economy. Immigrant New Yorkers, 50 percent of whom have limited English proficiency, own half of New York City's businesses. They should not receive second-rate service simply because they speak another language. They deserve the same level of access to government resources and information as their

In 2017, the City passed Local Law 30, which requires certain city agencies to provide language access service in the 10 designated citywide languages, but even with this landmark law, gaps remain. The three bills being voted on today by the Committee will help further improve language access for New Yorkers with limited English proficiency.

The first bill, Intro 382 sponsored by
City Council Member Gale Brewer, requires each
settlement offer sent by the Department of Consumer
and Worker Protection and the Department of Health
and Mental Hygiene to be accompanied by a
multilingual notice that informs the recipient that
they're receiving a settlement offer because they're

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languages.

being charged with a violation of the law and also directs the recipient via a QR code or a similar mechanism to a portion of the agency's website with plain language information about the recipient's options for responding to the settlement offer. Both the notice and the online information will need to be translated into each of the designated citywide

The second bill, Intro 697 which I am happy to say is one I introduced, will expand upon Local Law 30 by requiring agencies to provide services in additional languages as necessary to respond to emergencies in which a large number of people who do not speak one of the designated citywide languages arriving in the city and seeking city services.

The third bill, Intro 700 sponsored by Council Member Julie Won, would expand upon Local Law 30 and require each covered agency to translate those documents most commonly distributed to the public that relates to the compliance of local laws and rules.

With that, I want to thank C.J. Murray and Erica Cohen from the central staff for their work

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on these bills as well as my Chief-of-Staff Alexander

Hart for his assistance.

Now, I'd like to turn it over to Council Member Brewer, sponsor of Intro 382, to give a statement on her bill.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much, Madam Chair, and it was interesting to me that when we were listening to the two days of Committee on the Whole here at City Hall language came up, and it was interesting to me that people in the nonprofit sector, because we're always told call the Language Line, they say it's backed up and they weren't able to access it so thanks to you and others and certainly this particular legislation, 382, we're very clear that language has to be on the ground and has to be much more accessible than just the Language Line. The reason I suggested and I'm delighted that it's on the agenda today, 382, is because it's more nuanced. This will be for those that are, unfortunately, getting some kind of a summons from the City, and so many of our small businesses are run and owned by people who speak a different language and they don't know what they're getting and they don't pay it and then they're in more trouble so

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plain language information about the recipient's options for responding to the settlement offer as an example in a language that can be understood. That's incredibly important. I just want to say I started working on language issues, I think it was the first bill every passed in 2002, maybe there were earlier ones, with then Council Member John Liu. That law, Local Law 73, mandated services in language appropriate for the non-profit sector and for those working in the human services sector, and that was an example of just the beginning and now we have many more challenges in terms of language and even more

Thank you very much, and we know many people in New York speak another language, which is an asset, and we should be building on that. Thank you very much.

importance for having this kind of legislation.
