RABBI STEINMETZ: It is a new year and a new session of the city council. But today the blessing that I am praying for is not something new. Instead,

25 it is an age-old blessing. In the Bible, there is a

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Birkat Kohanim, a priestly blessing, which has been recited in the prayer service for thousands of years. This concise, 15-word, blessing concludes with the phrase, "v'yaseim l'cha shalom", "may God grant you peace." The Talmud comments on how this is the most essential blessing, because peace is a blessing that contains within it all other blessings. Without peace, every other gift is empty. With peace, every blessing is possible. And that is the blessing I am praying for today.

Oh mighty God, we ask you for the blessing of peace. Grant us peace from violence so our citizens can live in safety. Grant us peace from hatred in all its forms, peace from racism, bigotry, homophobia, and antisemitism, so that every New Yorker can feel at home in our beloved city. Grant us peace from polarization and division so that we can remain one city and one nation, indivisible. We do not ask for unanimity. Honest and thoughtful debate is the very foundation of our country. But may you grant our leaders the spirit of cooperation and unity to stand together, shoulder to shoulder, in service of our community. Almighty God, grant us the blessing of peace, and bring the spirit of unity and

Yorkers.

Washington Post, Daily News, Toronto Star Gazette, Jerusalem Post, and many other newspapers, but I wanted him to thank him for the service to my district and of course to the whole city here, and of course no better meeting to be at to have your blessing here today, than to join the one where we're starting off again a New Year and a new start. So I want to thank you, and thank you for being with us today, and I wish you and your whole congregation a very happy New Year and blessings as well.

SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you so much, everyone. Good afternoon and thank you especially to Rabbi Steinmetz for that beautiful Prayer of Peace. Good afternoon, everyone, and welcome to the charter meeting of 2023. You made it.

[APPLAUSE]

I hope you had a wonderful holiday season and New Year's celebration with your loved ones. And as we begin our second year together, I'd like to take a moment to reflect on our shared accomplishments, especially as the first women-majority and most diverse Council in our city's history. Colleagues, together we advanced health, public safety, affordable housing, and opportunities for New Yorkers while tackling longstanding inequities that have not previously been prioritized. I'm proud of the work we've done together. And as we kick off 2023 I look forward to continuing to deliver for all New Yorkers with you.

The start of the new year also represents the beginning of our deliberations about fiscal year 2024 city budget. As our city and the entire nation faces

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economic headwinds and braces for challenges, it is critical that we establish priorities for the city to negotiate with the Administration in the coming weeks and months.

Our response to the looming physical fiscal challenges cannot be to simply cut essential services and the safety net that New Yorkers rely on. The city is already struggling with the negative impacts of understaffing and under resourcing city agencies that provide vital services to New Yorkers. Our city's most vulnerable, including those who receive SNAP benefits, rental housing vouchers, and many others are not receiving the resources and support that help them and our city. This is unacceptable.

As a Council, we must advocate for and advance a different vision for our city, one that centers the needs of New Yorkers to safeguard our city. City government should recommit to investing in the services that address the root causes of our challenges, supporting the social safety net, housing, education, and economic opportunities. We must provide comprehensive and accessible mental health services to ensure all New Yorkers can thrive in their communities. We can achieve a healthier,

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2 safer, and stronger New York City through a

commitment to maintaining essential programs and
services.

This should be and will be our focus. And I look forward to working with each of you, our partners and all stakeholders to secure success for our city.

January 9, marks exactly one year since the Twin Parks Northwest building fire that claimed the lives of 17 New Yorkers, including eight children, in the Bronx District of councilmember Oswald Feliz, and adjacent to Councilmember Pierina Sanchez's district. It has been a devastating year for the families and communities impacted by this tragedy, and it's incumbent on all of us to continue to support them. Last May, we passed a package of legislation to strengthen fire safety measures in New York City in hopes of preventing future deadly fires like this from ever happening again. We know continued efforts are necessary and will continue to fulfill our role to protect New Yorkers. There will be remembrances in the coming days and I want to extend my heartfelt condolences to the friends and families who lost loved ones during this tragic fire one year ago.

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January 1, represents not just the first day of the new year, but also Haitian Independence Day...

[APPLAUSE]

...which commemorates Haiti's liberation from colonial rule in 1804 as the world's first black-led republic. This is a proud and meaningful day, during which we celebrate the rich history and traditions of Haitian communities across the globe. To all of our members of Haitian descent, and all Haitian New Yorkers, I hope you had a wonderful Haitian Independence Day. Sak pase!

In just two days, communities across our city will be celebrating Three Kings Day, a significant holiday that is also known as the Feast of Epiphany. It's a day of gathering with family members, exchanging gifts, and sharing meals. For all New Yorkers who are observing, I wish you a happy Three Kings Day.

And on January 13, we will be celebrating Korean-American Day, a time when we highlight and honor the many contributions of Korean American communities.

I'm proud that our historically diverse Council includes the first two Korean-American Council members, Linda Lee and Julie Won.

Leader, and Good afternoon colleagues.

20 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Quiet please.

21 COUNCILMEMBER HANIF: Thank you. As many of you

22 know, I am a lupus survivor. Next month I turn 32,

23 | making 15 years with this incurable, unpredictable

24 disease that has resulted in three hip replacement

25 surgeries, one shoulder replacement surgery,

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countless drugs, more hospitalizations, X rays, MRIs, and scans than I can count. And so much blood has been drawn from me to understand what is going on in my body. While I'm light-hearted and say I'm bionic or a cyborg, the reality is I have a lifetime of

procedures and flare-ups that await me.

I'm fortunate to have been a city employee when I did to have access to high-quality health insurance when I needed it most, and even more fortunate to have been elected by district that understands we need impacted leaders in office to demand better and guaranteed health care for all.

One day I will be a retired city worker, and much like the hundreds of constituents I have heard from I am shocked by this administration's callous attempt to strip existing healthcare coverage from thousands of our city's retirees and stand firmly in opposition. I reject any changes to Admin Code 12126. The privatization of health care for our city's retirees is an abject failure. I cannot in good conscience support this legislation, and will vote no if it moves to the floor. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go to Councilmember Ari Kagan.

COUNCILMEMBER KAGAN: Thank you. I would like to reiterate my opposition to the proposed change of Administrative Code 12126. For many decades, municipal employees were promised certain pension and health care benefits. And now during the time of rising inflation, hundreds of thousands of municipal retirees are being told to switch to Medicare Advantage. But a promise was made and a promise should be kept. I stand together with my Republican and Democratic colleagues in New York City Council who support our municipal retirees and oppose any changes to their current health care insurance. I urge the administration and municipal Labor Committee to come back to the negotiating table and to find a sensible compromise that will result in long term health care savings, and evade the need to cut vital benefits to either active or retired city workers. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go to Councilmember Barron, and last Councilmember Joseph.

COUNCILMEMBER BARRON: Thank you colleagues. Happy New Years to everybody. And this should be our

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year, the year that this becomes The People's
Council.

I wanted to remind you of the difference between power and influence. Power is when you have the ability to act, regardless to the opposition of others. You have that actual power to act.

Influence is when people try to persuade people with the power to act in their best interests. So the mayor, as it relates to this, voting on budget and laws has influence. The speaker, as it relates to our body has influence, not power.

The power of the speaker and the power of the mayor only becomes that when you yield your power to them. So we have to become The People's Council. In the Black Panther Party, we said "all power to the people", and that's what we meant: That the people elected us and the people we should empower.

Remember that when we come to budget time. Remember that when we come to these proposed rule changes coming up. Make sure they don't disempower you and give more power to others. And also, remember the Public Advocate's Office -- not the individual -- the Office of the Public Advocate should be a partnership with the City Council, not being removed from

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consideration in a lot of areas of these new proposed 2 3 rules coming up.

So remember: All power to the people. why we said it in the Black Panther Party. remember: You pass the budget, not the mayor. You pass the laws, not the mayor. And you pass land use items, not the speaker, nor the mayor. All power to the people.

[APPLAUSE]

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Councilmember. We'll go now go to Councilmember Joseph.

COUNCILMEMBER JOSEPH: Thank you Majority Leader. According to the CDC, the leading cause of death among young people is gun violence. In fact, in 2019, a young person was killed every 2 hours and 36 minutes.

Today, I rise not only as a Councilmember, but as a teacher and a mother to hold space for my former student, Elijah, who was yet another unfortunate victim of gun violence. This is a historic Council because for the first time many of us are mothers. So we must do everything we can to protect our city's future, which starts with ensuring our communities

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are properly funded, so no one feels the need to pick up a gun in the first place.

May God bless Elijah and all of those who have lost to senseless gun violence. Thank you Majority.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. And we have one addition. We're going to call on Councilmember Ariola.

COUNCILMEMBER ARIOLA: Thank you Majority Leader.

I'd like to just weigh in and say that our municipal retirees dedicated their entire careers towards serving the people of New York City. In return, we made a promise that they would be able to enjoy their golden years with high quality insurance without additional out of pocket expenses.

I will always support our city's retirees and fight to keep that promise. And as such, I stand with my colleagues and call on the administration and the Municipal Labor Committee to return to the negotiating table and allow our retirees to keep their insurance that they worked so hard to earn. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Council Member.
