pounding) Good morning and welcome to today's vote of the Civil Service and Labor Committee. I am Council Member Carmen De La Rosa, Chair of the Committee. It is the City Council's responsibility to conduct rigorous oversight of public sector wages and recruitment to ensure these jobs remain competitive. Public sector employment has long been a source of economic security for women and people of color. City jobs are coveted because they are — they are more likely to be unionized, well-paid and provide benefits and protections for workers. We must safeguard these jobs to ensure that they supply family sustaining wages to New Yorkers. That's why I

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FARAH LOUIS: Good morning and thank you Chair De La Rosa for your leadership and support through this process. I'm excited to join Speaker Adams, Chair De La Rosa and Members of the Civil Service and Labor Committee to advance a piece of Legislation today which will bring New York City one step closer to its goal of being a place where people can live, work and thrive equitably. Today the Council will be voting on Intro 541-A which will amend local law 18 and build on its ability to dig into disparities we still see in New York City Government pay. This amendment is the next step in how we achieve pay equity for the City's essential and diverse workforce. New York City has been on a pay equity journey for some time now. In 2019, City Council passed Local Law 18 which began the process of collecting data to understand pay disparities within the City's workforce. What we found is that New York City has some work to do. Women of color that are City employees still make 73 cents to the \$1 that their male colleagues make. New York City's men

1 COMMITTEE ON CIVIL SERVICE AND LABOR 2 of color employed by the City of New York make 79 3 cents for every \$1 made by their white counterpart. 4 And you better believe that female employees of color are still getting the short end of the intersectional 5 stick which black women making an appalling 69 cents 6 7 on the dollar when compared with their white male 8 counterparts. We still have work to do. numbers represent the non-adjusted pay data. adjustment tells us that the occupational segregation 10 11 is the driving force for pay and equity across New 12 York City municipal workforce. I don't need to tell 13 you that this is unacceptable because we know it is. 14 We have been having the conversation about pay equity 15 for many, many years. Talking about it is not 16 solving the problem. These disparities exist across 17 sectors, employs in red states and in blue states. 18 We need data. We need action on what the data tells 19 Anything less than that is lip service and we 20 are tired of lip service. So here is how the Bill 21 works. Introduction 541-A will require the 2.2 administration to provide additional reporting 2.3 metrics to the Council to enable us to dive deeper into the quadrant of pay disparities that were 24

exposed in Local Law 18. Since 2019, the Council has

1 COMMITTEE ON CIVIL SERVICE AND LABOR 7 2 only had access to this pay data for 90 days. 3 has limited the type of analysis we have been able to do crucial work with for the data that was presented 4 My Bill removed the 90 day window and gives the Council Data Team access to the information it 6 7 needs year round. Removing this limitation will permit the Council to study pay equity issues within 8 the City of New York's Municipal Workforce ongoing. It sends a message that we prioritize this and it 10 11 gives us the tools to act and to act fast. Pay 12 equity is the cornerstone of a just society. With it 13 employees face unequal opportunities that harms them, 14 their families and their communities. I want to 15 thank Speaker Adams, Chair De La Rosa for their 16 leadership on this pay equity package and all bill 17 sponsors or joining us on these bills. 18 specifically want to thank Malcolm Butehorn 19 for his tireless effort to get this bill 20 to the finish line.
