Reverend Diane Lacey Candidate for Re-Designation and Re-Appointment Health and Hospitals Corporation Board of Directors

Josephine Bolus Candidate for Re-Designation and Re-Appointment Health and Hospitals Corporation Board of Directors

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Lacey will serve the remainder of a five-year term 2 that will expire on March 20<sup>th</sup>, 2014. And 3 Josephine Bolus, a resident of Brooklyn; good 4 5 morning, is a candidate for re-designation and 6 subsequent reappointment by the Mayor to the 7 Health and Hospitals Corporation board of directors. If re-designated and subsequently re-9 appointed, Ms. Bolus will serve the remainder of a five-year term that will expire on March 20th, 10 11 2013. The Rules Committee was scheduled to 12 consider the designation of Robert Nolan for 13 appointment to the HHC; however, due to 14 conditions, Mr. Nolan could not make it here 15 today. We will consider his designation on February 16<sup>th</sup>.

> I'll briefly describe the functions of the Health and Hospitals Corporation, known as the HHC. HHC is a public benefit corporation charged with the duty of providing high-quality, dignified and comprehensive healthcare and treatment to the public, especially to those who cannot afford such services. HHC's Board of Directors consists of 16 members, who administer HHC. Included within the board's membership in

support of Reverend Diane Lacey, who has
continuously been a tremendous asset to the Health
and Hospital Corporation's Board of Directors, but
more importantly, she has effectively represented
our residents that are services by HHC facilities
to receive high-quality and dignified care.
During her service, Reverend Lacey has chaired the
HHC Board's Governance Committee for Community
Relations Committee and the Audit Committee.
These positions allowed her to guide HHC's
response to community needs and fiscal
accountability. In addition, as a member of the
Corporation's Equal Employment Opportunity
Committee, Diane, if I may be so bold, has been a
staunch supporter of increasing diversity and
fairness within HHC.
Along with her previous service,

Along with her previous service,
Reverend Lacey's qualifications also merit
mentioning. She has been a development consultant
and director at Hunts Point Multi-Service Health
Center, the community relations and development
coordinator at St. Barnabas Hospital and of
course, most recently servicing as co-pastor at
the Church of Gethsemane located in Brooklyn of

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	which	we	will	forgive	her	for	relocating.

COUNCIL MEMBER DICKENS: Reverend

Lacey's qualifications even include being born at

Harlem Hospital. That's right. Say it again. In

an economic climate that forces our government to

be inventive, focused and compassionate and all

during the same time, we are luck to have Diane

Lacey as a member of the HHC Board. In these

difficult austere times, Reverend Lacey will

continue to fight for affordable healthcare for

all. Her years as a community activist have

prepared her to serve the people of New York City.

And I urge my colleagues to vote yes on her

appointment, re-appointment. Thank you.

ACTING CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Any other member would like to comment on either of the candidates? Council Member Fidler?

COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: I actually have to wait for a second 'cause I want to be sure that you've confirmed that you voted in last year's election. I was checking on that.

[laughter] Actually, I've known Josephine Bolus for probably about 30 years, and when we appointed

her in Brooklyn, the Brooklyn delegation
recommended her, I think it's still the case, she
is the first nurse to serve on the HHC Board. I
think that alone is-justifies her continued
service and just was quickly looking over the
information in the book. I mean her attendance is
better than most of ours here. And she is-
represents a particular expertise that I can't
imagine the HHC Board not having, so she's a
terrific lady, for those of you that don't know
her, you should get to know her. And if you look
at her resume, you can see how involved she is
throughout Brooklyn and as active as a member of
the Board. So I'm very, very pleased to finally
see a candidate come from the Rules Committee that
is actually from my district. I'm always jealous
of you know, when they say, "they come from
Councilwoman Dickens' district, and she supports"
Well, this one comes from Council Member Fidler's
district and he enthusiastically supports her and
I urge you all to do the same and as long as
Reverend Lacey has moved her church to Brooklyn, I
think we should support her as well.

be renewed and clearly, diversity is extremely

important in our great city of New York City, and

so I'm happy to see that you're advocating for

diversity and also that you now have the diversity

of growing up and living in Manhattan and now

living in Brooklyn, so you have the true diversity

of our great city as far as boroughs.

And as far as the other candidate that's in front of us, Ms. Josephine Bolus, let me thank you for also considering to be on the board. And as our colleague, Lew Fidler, said I believe he said you're going to be the first RN on the board.

JOSEPHINE BOLUS: I am.

And I appreciate that because I do think that the Health and Hospital Corp you're dealing with health and hospitals, and we need people in the field that know what they're doing, and know what it is to be a professional that's working in the field—and I say that as a father of a daughter that's an MD that works in an emergency room at Children's Hospital in Washington D.C., as an uncle of my niece who is a critical care nurse at

Harlem Hospital right now, as an uncle of my other nephew who lives in L.A. He's a trauma surgeon and he heads the surgery department at a hospital, so I do know it's important to have people in the field that know what they're doing and know what it is, so that when votes come up, they can then go from your personal experience by being in there, so let me congratulate both of you and I also urge all my colleagues to vote aye.

other members with concerns, comments? Only two items at hand. Well, then I want to thank Mr. Davis and Mr. Bland for all their work for putting the packages together. Oh, do we want to hear from the candidates? Oh, I guess. Oh, I'm sorry. I'm sorry. I am so sorry. Would the candidates like to say anything about their re-appointments? Since this is a love-fest, I guess you should say something as well. I'm sorry. I'm forgetting my protocols this morning. Would you like to say anything?

DIANE LACEY: I'd like to thank the Council Members who have spoken so glowingly. My leader Council Member Inez Dickens, I thank you.

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I'm going to inhale those remarks and try to live
on those for awhile. And I thank you for saying
those good things about my colleague, Josephine
Bolus. She is an outstanding leader in her field
and she has brought such strength to the board.

It certainly has bolstered my time there.

These are difficult days as you know and the corporation is both the first and last resort for most New Yorkers and we're talking life and death. And the sad this is that just like the economy, our system is called on to shrink often in times when there's great public need. We face the HIV/Aids crisis. We faced last year's flu epidemic. We're dealing with results of the closings of hospitals in Brooklyn and Manhattan and so there's greater pressure on the system at a time when we're dealing with close to a two billion dollar deficit in the corporation. And the days ahead with the governor's budget and the talk of taking the money out of Medicaid, these are going to be the toughest times I think that we've faced since I've been on the board. And I really do want to be there to be the advocate for the patients and for the workers and

will tell you that we're doing 20 patients to one

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RN and that's what they're being forced to do,
that's hard. You simply cannot give quality care
that way. We can't afford all the cuts that we're
going because it's reflected in our patient care
and we try our best, but we just simply cannot do
it without the funds to hire enough people,
qualified people to work in these areas. And
that's where the biggest cut shows with the care
that we're giving and how we're being forced to do
so much more with less. I don't know how to
restore money, I'm not that kind of person. I
don't know that, but I know that I can advocate
for our patients who are getting quality care, but
at the expense of the staff and I don't know how
much longer they will hang around with the cuts
that tell them they have to do more with less.

DIANE LACEY: Can I make one other statement? I didn't want to neglect the strength and the support we receive from the City Council. So often when some draconian cut is before us, the Council steps right up and provides money to fill that gap, so it's an honor to be the designee of the City Council and to be able to be independent and to be able to have that back up and that

3	Wessler, the chair, the executive director of the
4	Commission on the Public's Health. And she's an
5	outstanding representative of community advocacy
6	and community organization working on behalf of
7	the public system and the public to help make sure
8	that elected bodies and other groups, communities
9	continue to support our mission. So we're really
10	grateful to have her here today.

JOSEPHINE BOLUS: And personally I'd like to say thank you to Lew Fidler because I was enjoying my retirement; I'll tell you that right here and now.

JOSEPHINE BOLUS: I was enjoying my retirement until this man convinced me to go on the board and - - stop being so retired. And I thank him. I really do.

ACTING CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: I want to thank both of you for wanting to continue to serve on HHC. I think that you presence on the board of HHC has helped to make it the strongest hospital system in the city. HHC is now, I know,

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received awards. Queens Hospital, which serves a
lot of my constituents and that I have all my
medical checkups and I had both my kids there
yesterday 'cause they were both slipping and
sliding in the ice yesterday, is a hospital of
excellence and it's due to the fact that there's
been a motivation and desire to see staff taken
care of, patients advocated for and a whole
lessons of excellence permeate throughout the
Queens Hospital and through the HHC system. I'll
speak for Elmhurst Hospital as well, but Ms.
Bolus, you weren't retired. You were active with
the Lions, you were active with the precinct
