SERGEANT AT ARMS: Good morning and welcome to today's New York City Council hearing for the Committee on Fire and Emergency Management. At this time we ask that you turn all cell phones and electronic devices to vibrate or silent. Thank you for your cooperation. Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON ARIOLA: Good morning. name is Council Member Joann Ariola, Chair to the Committee on Fire and Emergency Management. I'm joined by Council Members Carr, Schulman, Riley, Feliz, Holden, and De La Rosa. Today, we will be voting on a package of five bills that intend to improve fire safety by better regulating powered mobility devices such as electric bikes and scooters, as well as increasing fire safety standards for lithium ion batteries. As we learned from our hearing on e-bikes and lithium ion batteries this past November, there has been an expediential growth in deadly fires related to the misuse and improper storage of lithium ion batteries, specifically those used to power mobility devices. The Fire Department has investigated over 200 lithium ion battery-related fires in 2021. The 2022 total more than doubled the number of battery-related fires from 2021 and

COMMITTEE ON FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES quadrupled the number of such fires in 2020. Clearly, this city is faced with a severe public safety concern. These five bills that we will vote on today which I will now detail aim to protect customers from dangerous products and increase public awareness regarding the fire safety risks posed by lithium ion batteries and motorized bikes and scooters. Introduction number 656A, sponsored by Council Member Brewer, requires the Fire Department to develop an informational campaign to educate the public on fire risks posed by powered mobility Intro 663A, sponsored by Council Member devices. Feliz, prohibits the sale of power mobility devices and storage batteries for powered mobility devices that are not approved by a recognized testing laboratory. Intro Number 772A, sponsored by Council Member Holden, requires the Fire Department to report on safety measures to mitigate fire risks associated with power mobility devices. Intro 749A, sponsored by Council Member Avilés, relates to providing food delivery workers with information on safety measures that mitigate the fire risks posed by powered mobility devices, and Intro number 752A, sponsored by Council Member Brewer, prohibits the sale of a

COUNCIL MEMBER HOLDEN: Thank you, Chair. And today we are voting on my bill Intro 722A as part of a package of bill, like the Chair said, addressing the tragic fires caused by unregulated batteries in e-bikes, e-scooters, and other powered mobility devices. My bill would require the Fire Department to report annually on each fire involving a powered mobility devices and annual review of the existing fire code and regulations pertaining to the powered mobility devices and a summary of actions taken by the FDNY to reduce these types of fires. Now, again, I want to thank the Speaker and Chair Ariola and the 11 co-sponsors who helped move this bill through the legislative process. I also want to thank the Legislative Division and my staff for their help. The Council is taking important steps here to prevent future fires from occurring, but more needs to be We need Albany to pass legislation requiring

COMMITTEE ON FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES these devices to be licensed, insured, and registered. This is why I've also introduced Intro 758 requiring that every bicycle with electric assist, electric scooter, and other legal motorized vehicles that are not otherwise required to be registered by the DMV be registered with the DOT and receive an identifying number which would be displayed on a visible plate affixed to the vehicle like other vehicles we have on the streets of New York City. These fires have caused too much heartache already in our city, and these devices have become dangerous on our streets, our sidewalks, and of course, in our homes. And let's work together to resolve this matter quickly, and I thank the Chair again. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ARIOLA: I'm sorry. Council Member Feliz?

COUNCIL MEMBER FELIZ: Thank you. Thank you so much, Chair Ariola. New Yorkers are very concerned about a sharp rise in fires related to e-bike batteries. New Yorkers are concerned, and their concerns are real. Last year we had approximately 220 fires in 365 days, 220 fires. That's a fire every day and a half. And this year, the numbers are

COMMITTEE ON FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES very similar. We just concluded the month of February and we've already had approximately 25 to 30 fires caused by these batteries. These fires are a These fires are powerful and they're also They destroy our homes. destructive. They displace our families, and they put our lives at risk. cannot wait for another tragedy to happen like the one that we saw last year in Twin Parks, so I'm proud to be joining all my colleagues in taking action to help resolve this fire safety challenge. We also know that not all batteries have created these problems. Batteries that are certified, have gone through safety testing, which help ensure that these batteries have tools that prevent malfunctions that lead to fires, and that is what my bill will be requiring, requiring that batteries before they're sold that they go through safety testing and that they get certified. So I want to thank all my colleagues that have taken action. This is a very thorough package to help resolve the growing problem related to e-bike batteries, and I want to thank you all for working on this. And this is only a first package. We still have more work to do, and I look forward to continuing to work with all of you.

CHAIRPERSON ARIOLA: Thank you. Thank you, Council Member Feliz. We will now hear from Council Member Gale Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much, Madam Chair, because you've been interested in this from the beginning of our discussions and I appreciate it. I also want to thank all of the deliveristas and the people, 65,000 of them who are delivering our food. I think it was actually Council Member Feliz and others who when we were in Albany for the conference there was even a bicycle-- thank goodness nobody was around -- but the battery blew up on the plaza in Albany. I saw it myself. So, this is not just individuals who are concerned generally, it is a real fire hazard. Council Member Feliz gave some of the numbers. But just to repeat, in 21 there were 104 fires, 79 injuries, and four deaths; 22, 216 fires, 147 injuries, six deaths; and today, to-date in 23, 22 fires, 36 injuries, and 2 deaths, and people particularly in communities where there are individuals who are delivering food, one of the hardest jobs-- give them so much credit, but when

COMMITTEE ON FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES they're in the elevator with the bicycle, then I get calls-- I'm sure others do-- concerned. And so we have to be aware. We hope that this package helps. One of my bills 656 basically asks the Fire Department to do what they are doing, which is to give out information about the concerns, the fire risks posed by these devices, and then the other one which is the bill that has a little bit more teeth, 752-- and again, we're just trying to figure out how we can be successful in supporting the deliveristas at the same time being safe. One of the challenges of these batteries is that when you have three batteries a day, you're working goodness knows how many hours, you need to charge them and then you also need to be safe. So this bill talks about not reselling batteries that -- lithium ion batteries that use cells removed from used storage batteries. layman's terms, to me that's a battery that has been re-constituted in certain different ways. And the good news is it might make us safer. The bad news is a new battery is going to cost more. So the question to me is how do the apps, the big seamless Uber Eats, Grub Hub, how do they help with some of these costs. And so we're saying today let's be safe, but at the

Now, what's happening, and to the credit of the Fire Department, they are going to the place where these batteries are being sold and stating you could be selling something that's dangerous. Make it new battery even though they don't have the authorization or the seller doesn't have to do that until we pass some of this legislation. I mention this because it makes it even harder to get things charged. So the deliveristas are a little bit-- are in a bind. have to make sure they're not in a bind by getting them places to charge, and at the same time making sure that the batteries are safe. So this is a new disrupter. We had Uber. We had Airbnb, and this is a new disrupter that we need to make sure works in our city, because it delivers food and people can't get to the store, survived the pandemic with the help of these deliveristas and now we have to figure out how they can be safe, they can be safe at home, we can all be safe at home at the same time they can do their job. Thank you very much, Madam Chair.

And I also want to thank Andrea Vasquez [sp?] from the Legislative Division, everyone who has been working behind the scenes to make this possible. Thank you so much.

want to thank all of you for the leadership. There was a devastating fire in my own district just a few weeks ago, and I understand the-- really the urgency of this package of legislation. So I thank you all for your leadership. I do want to speak on behalf of the workforce that is dependent and reliant on these bicycles in order to make 12, 14, 16 hours of work

COMMITTEE ON FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES happen daily. That means they need, as Council Member Brewer said, several batteries at a time. Remember that this is population that is marginalized, often times living in apartments that are overcrowded with no storage possibilities or options for them to store their e-bikes. They also have, unfortunately, to depend on cheaper products that have caused this unsafety across our city. And so I just look forward to us centering the voices of those workers, continuing to have these conversations and listening actively to this workforce that we are dependent on during the pandemic. If you ordered a burger, if you ordered, you know, a bowl of salad during the pandemic because you couldn't go outside, these were the workers that risked their lives to bring you your food. They are the workers that live in our communities and that traverse our city every single day, and so I look forward to being an active partner with our colleagues in presenting the followup package of bills that I hope includes this swap, this idea of a battery swap. We need to make sure that there are financial incentives as well for these swaps to happen and these companies should have a stake in ensuring that their workers are safe.
