MALCOLM BUTEHORN: We will hear from Dan Steinberg from the Mayor's Office of Operations. Do you swear to tell the whole truth, and nothing but the truth before this Committee and to answer Council Member questions honestly?

DAN STEINBERG: Yes.

MALCOLM BUTEHORN: Then you may begin when ready.

DAN STEINBERG: Thank you. Good

afternoon Chair Ung. My name is Dan Steinberg, a

Service Director at the Mayor's Office of Operations

and Chair of the Report Advisor Board Review

Commission which I will refer to RABRC for short.

Joining me today is Kevin Tschirhart, Senior Strategy

and Engagement Advisor at the Mayor's Office of

1 COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENTAL OPERATIONS 2 and will oversee RABRC efforts moving forward. 3 RABRC which was created in 2010 following a 4 referendum under Charter Review Commission proposal is a vital activity at the Mayor's Office of The Commission chaired by the Director 6 Operations. 7 of the Mayor's Office of Operations is comprised of 8 representatives from the City Council Law Department, Department of Information and Technology Telecommunications, now known as the Office of 10 11 Technology and Innovation and the Office of Management and Budget. RABRC's mission is to review 12 13 and assess the continued usefulness of reporting requirements and advisory boards established by the 14 15 City Charter, Administrative Code and unsolicited 16 provisions of local law. RABRC's focus is on 17 identifying and eliminating outdated duplicative and 18 unnecessary reporting and Advisory Board Requirements 19 with the goal of enhancing government efficiency and 20 productivity. In weighing whether to grant or report waiver RABRC considers four primary criteria that are 21 2.2 outlined in the Charter which are utility, 2.3 redundancy, relevance and overall benefit. recent RABRC cycle began in February 2022 when we 24

contacted agencies and solicited reported they would

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eight reporting requirements? Or can the public
access information in new ways?

DAN STEINBERG: So the vast majority of the data available in these reports is either available on open data and improved data formats or it doesn't exist because it measures an obsolete function of city government. For instance everything is available on open data from the reports end, directory assistance calls, service request calls, small purchases, and, and small purchases is also available on passport public and checkbook NYC and in terms of the other reports that where we start to see obsolete functions of government. There is an article 214 closings report that the OB doesn't issue Article 214 actions anymore. The Neighborhoods Slow Zones report has moved because we lowered the speed limit so there is no longer a slow zone to oppose to the rest of the city and Vision Zero has replaced obviously a lot of that data and work through its program, website and open data. The ship work gambling report isn't needed because the city hasn't considered a single application for ship work gambling in over two decades. And so there are several data points from the other three reports that

2 RABRC Commission determined were either higher

3 quality data or more meaningful data appearing in the

4 Mayor's Management Report or other data resources.

But to the extent we wanted to discuss any of those very granular data points we are very happy to.

CHAIRPERSON SANDRA UNG: Thank you. And are RABRCs required to hold public hearings on these potential waivers before holding the vote? Was there any comments received by the Commission in favor of any of the eight waivers?

DAN STEINBERG: Yes. Re-Invent Albany submitted testimony in support of the eight waivers. And we also, you know, obviously it's sort of it is all governed by the open meetings slot which means that we advertise the hearings in, in the newspaper and city record but we also conducted some proactive outreach to the government groups because this Commission had been dormant for some time and we really wanted to sort of make sure that we were being as transparent as possible. And so I have a list of other groups who we solicited from but Albany was the one that submitted testimony.

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2 CHAIRPERSON SANDRA UNG: Thank you. Was
3 there any comments that was in opposition to the
4 eight waivers?

5 DAN STEINBERG: No. There was no 6 opposition.

CHAIRPERSON SANDRA UNG: Okay. That's good.

DAN STEINBERG: Yeah.

CHAIRPERSON SANDRA UNG: Thank you. And the last question for me is based on experience in the past what process improvements are you looking to make for the next cycle?

DAN STEINBERG: Yeah. Well, just to say it again, we really consider this a sort of mile of collaboration and transparency between the Administration and the Council that we, we're really working on it's a sort of joint inquiry you know where we apply this criteria and so, we we're very pleased with the partnership and want to maintain that. To allow agencies, operation staff and RABRC to make sure there is more time to formulate and review waiver requests, we anticipate RABRC will operate on a two year cycle moving forward. We tentatively plan to open the waiver request window

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this spring and hold a hearing this fall. We plan to hold two RABRC hearings with agencies for Q and A in early 2024 before holding a RABRC hearing in the fall of 2024 to vote on the selected reports and happy to

CHAIRPERSON SANDRA UNG: No, no. I'm good. Thank you. Council Member Hanif?

SHAHANA HANIF: Thank you so much Chair
Ung and it's really wonderful to be here for this
hearing which I find very unique and area of our work
that is in the weeds. And so I'm really excited to
join you all and thank you for being here. So

Council Central Staff did their own due diligence in
identifying outdated, temporary, duplicative and
unnecessary provisions in both the chart and Admin

Code. This word began last session and involved
extensive collaboration with the Administration and
the Law Department and these Bills also contain
measures identified by the RABRC Commission. For the
record could you please explain how the Commission
identifies reporting provisions to be submitted as
candidates for waiver?

DAN STEINBERG: Sure. So the Commission conducts out-, starts by conducting outreach to the

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City agencies and soliciting sort of nominations regarding reporting requirements that meet the criteria. And then we internally vet them and the last agency survey was conducted in February to March 2022 and that's what yielded the Universe of 62 candidates. And from there it gets whittled down to the sort of collective inquiry. So the agency submitted these 62 we review each and consider the criteria, utility, redundancy, relevance and benefit. We then share this 62 reports with the RABRCs Commissioners including, which includes the Council representatives along with our recommendation. that's really the kickoff for, for the work because from there the Commissioners often have lots of questions for the agencies which are required and it really takes due diligence to make sure that we're not elevating, reporting, that isn't otherwise available. And, and really assessing the, the merit, you know up against this criteria. You really have to understand you know, you have to get in the weeds. It's the only way.

SHAHANA HANIF: Absolutely.

DAN STEINBERG: Yeah. So, so, we then prevent the -- we provide this information to the

Commissioners, we go back and forth through the
agencies with the follow up questions. So it's
really kind of an exhaustive collaborative process
and, and we work for it as a Commission because there
is no point in retiring old reports when the Council
has every right and ability to restore them
afterwards. So the whole sort of point of the
commission work is to bill consensusing and that was

SHAHANA HANIF: That's really good. And how long is this process of evaluation and vetting and the consensus building?

sort of the process by which we arrived at eight.

DAN STEINBERG: About a year. And one that is one of the reasons we wanted to do it every two years is because otherwise we end up looking at the same reports potentially every year.

DAN STEINBERG: It's been every, we've been, well so, actually RABRC went dormant for almost a decade and the office of operations and the current administration sort of restored it.

SHAHANA HANIF: Uh-huh.

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DAN STEINBERG: And, and so we did it,
when we restored it we did it two consecutive years
annually and now that we've sort of gone through this
long list you know because of this sort of negligence
of the previous administration not to keep this going
we feel like we've sort of exhausted the top current
pool of candidates and moving to an interior cycle is
more rational because otherwise we would just be
considering the same reports.

SHAHANA HANIF: So every two year cycles?

DAN STEINBERG: Yes.

SHAHANA HANIF: Got it. And could you share how many Commissioners there are?

DAN STEINBERG: Sure. The Commissioners include me as the Chair, the Council, the Law Department, OTI and I'm missing someone, Doris is an advisory member. Yeah, so seven total Commissioners. Yeah. So seven total Commissioners. Yeah.

SHAHANA HANIF: Got it. And then through this process of vetting and evaluations is there like an equity component? How do you address the equity piece for some of the reporting that I know exits to center a more equitable reporting of issues of the city?

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DAN STEINBERG: That's a really good question. Equity is a very important criteria or lens by which we sort of approach all of our work and operations and I think in this case obviously having a public comment process is one way so we did, you know, practically reach out to the government groups.

SHAHANA HANIF: Uh-huh.

DAN STEINBERG: One of which at least submitted testimony so we felt like you know I think from an equity perspective it is important to publicize this work and make sure that there is general awareness of it. I think that we are sort of very focused on the desegregation of data as an office in terms of you know really measuring disparities across populations and in really trying to understand how every issue has had implications and so I think with this work, you know equity isn't one of the four formal criteria but I think as part of the general assessment and as we sort of debate the merits of any report that equity is clearly one of the benefits that should be considered. And if we are eliminating something that undermines the city's ability to develop inequitable policy then it is something that would be lagged along the process.

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DAN STEINBERG: Thank you.

SHAHANA HANIF: This would be excellent to hear. And my final question is could you share how the entire RABRCs Commissions process can actually enhance compliance work with respect to getting agencies to comply with reporting laws that currently exist?

DAN STEINBERG: Yeah. I think actually just by having a formal process by which all of the reports are documented, you know, endorsed with the department of records was a partner in making sure that we had the full documentation of all the mandated reports which do get lost between the cracks over the years. I think we are bringing a lot of attention to mandated reported and have discovered some reports that along the way that were valuable and needed to be sort of publicized more in order to be meaningful. And so I think generally it just creates a lot of work and attention around reporting which is a good thing.

SHAHANA HANIF: That's really great.

Well thank you so much Commissioner and I am really grateful to the Commissions work. Thank you.
