SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning. This is a sound check for the Committee on Environmental Protection. Today's date is April 11, 2023. Located in Committee Room. Recorded by Steven Sadowsky.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning and welcome to the New York City Council vote of the Committee on Environmental Protection.

At this time, could everyone please silence your cell phones? Thank you for your cooperation.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Okay. I'm ready. Is everybody else ready? Okay. Like now? Okay, fine. Both sides, we're good.

[GAVEL] Good morning. I am Jim Gennaro,
Chair of the Committee on Environmental Protection,
Resiliency and Waterfronts, and today we'll be voting
on two pieces of important legislation, Intro. 606A
by Council Member Aviles which would prohibit idling
in or adjacent to any park under the jurisdiction of
New York City Department of Parks and Recreation, and
Intro. 239A sponsored by this guy Gennaro requiring
the Department of Buildings to conduct targeted

outreach to educate building owners about the benefits of installing solar and green roof systems.

Regarding 606A, an idling vehicle releases harmful chemicals, gasses, and particulate pollution into the air contributing to ozone, regional haze, smog, whatever, and, of course, global climate change. Idling also reduces your vehicle's fuel economy, costs you money, and creates pollution. Sometimes some of the pollution when you're idling goes in the car and can hurt kids that are sitting inside the vehicles. That's a bad thing.

Regarding Intro. 239A, solar installations can help reduce energy usage, lowering our carbon footprint as well as energy bills while helping to create a more resilient distributed grid. Green roofs provide shade and insulation to buildings, keeping them cooler in the summer and warmer in the winter. Green roofs also help to store and filter stormwater, reducing the burden of our wastewater infrastructure and can even help the heat island effect.

Both pieces of legislation will help increase local resiliency, decrease our reliance on fossil-fuel-based energy generation, and improve our
