22	Before we begin, I would like to extend heartfelt
23	greetings to our visitors, the College Access
24	Students from the Brooklyn YWCA!

[APPLAUSE and CHEERING]

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We welcome you to City Council Chambers today and all of our visitors in the balcony.

Before we begin, I want to honor the lives of two construction workers who died while on the job at JFK International Airport earlier this month.

Our hearts go out to the families and loved ones of 41-year-old Francisco Reyes and 28-year-old Fernando Lagunas Pereira. Our City's construction workers are pivotal to the success and growth of New York City, especially JFK Airport, which serves as our gateway. We must ensure that essential workers who contribute to the building and daily activities of our city are safe.

I also want to take a moment to wish a speedy recovery to 22-year-old Officer Brett Boller of the 103rd Precinct in Jamaica, Queens who was shot in the line of duty last week. We thank him for his public service to the people of our city, and we certainly want to see him get well soon.

Since the last time we have met, we have lost at least six New Yorkers to fatal fires that took place across our city. These fires occurred in Council Member Rivera's district, Council Member Brewer's district, Council Member Schulman's district, Council

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Member Hudson's district, and just yesterday, in Council Member Cabán's district, where two people were killed in a fire sparked by a lithium ion battery.

These losses are heartbreaking, and the pain inflicted on families and communities is immeasurable. We have much more work to do to prevent these deadly fires. And as a council, we remain committed to taking action to advance these efforts.

There is absolutely no place for hate in New York City, and we must denounce it swiftly whenever we see it. I was disturbed to learn that an anti-LGBTQIA+ attack took place in Hell's Kitchen just last week. There was also a Pride Flag that was taken off a restaurant's flagpole, torn and burned in Bay Ridge, Brooklyn in Council Member Brannan's district.

As Council Member Bottcher eloquently put it, "We will not be cowed. We will not be intimidated. We will always stand up against hate of all kinds."

This past Friday, a federal judge in Texas issued a dangerous and unprecedented ruling to invalidate the FDA's approval of mifepristone, also known as the abortion pill. This preliminary ruling threatens the

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health of millions of women and birthing people across the country who rely on this FDA approved drug. In fact, mifepristone has provided more than 5 million people with safe and effective access to abortion and miscarriage care for over 25 years --SAFELY. We must be clear that taking away this drug will lead to unnecessary harm, and it is an attack on both reproductive health care and the entire practice of medicine. Last year, our women majority council enacted the historic New York City Abortion Rights Act, including legislation by Council Member Carlina Rivera to require The Department of Health and Mental Hygiene health clinics to provide free abortion medication. As a result of our efforts, access to abortion medication is now the law. Here in New York City, mifepristone remains available to anyone who needs it, including at the Morrisania Health and Mental Hygiene Clinic in the Bronx, Health + Hospitals public hospitals, and private health clinics. Our women majority city council, and the men who get it, will continue to defend, support, and expand access to abortion and reproductive health care. New York City will remain a beacon for safe and accessible care for all.

Last week, the Council released its official
response to the Mayor's Fiscal Year 2024 Preliminary
Budget. We made clear our vison for the City Budget,
one that invests New Yorkers, delivers essential
services for New Yorkers, and supports the economic
health and stability of our city. The City's
Preliminary Budget response accounts for all of the
economic and budgetary challenges that potentially
lie ahead; any potential economic downturns or
additional costs of basic services for those here in
our city seeking asylum in the United States. It
also covered payments of new labor contract
settlements for the municipal workforce. Out of \$2.7
billion in available funds that our budget response
identified, we proposed setting aside \$1.4 billion
for reserves to protect our city from these various
potential risks. The other \$1.3 billion should be
invested in essential services such as education,
housing, food assistance, libraries, legal services,
community safety, and other programs that New Yorkers
need. These are the types of investments that keep
our city healthy, safe, and stable to successfully
recover and weather any expected challenges. What
New Yorkers cannot afford; however, is another round

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of budget cuts that threaten to undermine our neighborhoods and recovery.

Taking away libraries, education programs, and other essential services will destabilize communities and result in harm to New Yorkers. We cannot and we will not accept that. This council is fully prepared to fight for our budget vision to meet the needs of New Yorkers.

In the coming weeks, our focus will be on supporting communities across the city in their recovery, pushing back against excessive and unnecessary cuts that will hurt the health and stability of our city.

And now for all Muslims New Yorkers who are continuing to observe Ramadan, I hope you continue to enjoy this blessed season with your family and loved ones, Ramadan Mubarak.

I also want to wish our Jewish neighbors a peaceful and joyous Passover. This important holiday is a reminder of the importance of cherishing rights and freedoms and why it is imperative to continue passing on shared history and its lessons to future generations. To everyone celebrating Passover, Chag Pesach! Chag kasher v'sameach!

And this past Sunday, many New Yorkers across the city celebrated Easter also known as Resurrection Sunday. This season symbolizes renewal and rebirth, and it offers all who celebrate the time to reflect and embark on new beginning.

Orthodox Easter will be celebrated on April 16th, so I want to wish everyone who observes, a very Happy Easter.

April is Autism Acceptance Month, which aims to promote acceptance and uplift the voices of people with autism. New York will always be a city that supports the well-being of people of all abilities and spectrums of neurodiversity. And as an aunt of one who is a part of this brilliant population, I celebrate with you, my nephew.

April is also National Sexual Assault Awareness
Month during which we raise awareness and advance
public education about the prevalence of sexual
assault across the country. As a city, we must
continue to empower survivors and support them with
necessary resources and pathways to healing from
trauma while working to prevent sexual assault.

And, I cannot forget Intro 992, we need to divert young people to community-based organizations in lieu of arrest. I support that in full force.

So, thank you so much for your time. So, my colleagues, please help me out, thanks.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Council Member.

We will now hear from Council Member Bottcher, followed by Council Member Holden.

COUNCIL MEMBER BOTTCHER: Today I am introducing legislation that will really help us address an issue that has held us back in our efforts to address sanitation in New York City. We fought really hard over the last year and four months for more basket

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pickups, street sweeping, et cetera, but you could have all of that funding, but if property owners do not adequately clean the sidewalks and gutters in front of their property, we are not going to have a clean city. And while many property owners to the right thing, some don't put much care into the front of their property. The Department of Sanitation has expressed to us that is difficult for them to enforce the rules, because they can only do that for 2 onehour periods a day. So, today, the legislation I introduced would expand those hours to the hours of operations of those businesses. It is going to really help address the cleanliness in our neighborhoods. I want to thank co prime sponsor, Council Member Sandy Nurse and everyone who is supporting this legislation.

I also want to thank Council Member Schulman and Council Member Menin for their legislation regarding unlicensed cannabis shops. It is a total embarrassment how our state has botched the legalization of cannabis by legalizing it and then waiting two years before issuing legal licenses. So, now I think we have like four legal licenses in the state and thousands of unlicensed cannabis sellers in

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sellers.

our district. They are next to schools. They are selling to minors. They are undermining the system for everyone who is trying to go by the rules. And not enough is being done to close down the unlicensed sellers and promote the... and expand the licensed

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will hear from Council Member [TIMER CHIMES] Holden, followed by Council Member Feliz.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOLDEN: Thank you, Majority Leader Powers.

I am introducing two bills today that I need everyone's support on.

The first bill, which I am introducing with my colleagues of The Common Sense Caucus, Intro 991, seeks to create cure periods for certain violations issued by the various city agencies to veteran service organizations like our legions, American Legions, halls, and posts. Veteran service organizations or VSOs, operate on a very thin margin, and they all need our help. So, we should not penalize them, but allow them to fix any issues and assist them. Our veterans served this country and we should help them.

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The second bill, Intro 990, which I am introducing with Council Member Lincoln Restler, would require the Department of Homeless Services, DHS, to ensure that single adult shelter residents are provided with at least individual sleeping areas that are partitioned off from other residents that allow for individual privacy. Everyone needs privacy. This bill aims to provide much needed privacy and dignity to homeless individuals while they stay in our shelters.

I urge all of you to support these bills by signing on to them. These are common sense approaches to serious problems, and we owe it to our veterans and homeless individuals to provide them with the necessary support and protection. Thank you for your time and consideration.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Council Member We will now hear from Council Member Feliz, followed by Council Member Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER FELIZ: Thank you, Majority Leader.

If you live in the City of New York, you have probably seen paper license plates on our cars -- many of them are legitimate, and many of them which are fake, fraudulent. Fraudulent paper license

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plates have created a new problem for our city -"ghost cars". Ghost cars are being used to violate
our traffic laws, including parking related rules,
speeding rules, red light camera rules. But also
ghost cars are being used to commit other major
crimes. Fake plates have created new problems,
problems that we don't want or need in our
communities. These two bills will hopefully help
resolve the problem by discouraging individuals from

selling or using them to evade our traffic rules.

Speaking about selling, there was a report that basically said one individual, uh, generated approximately \$300,000 by selling these fake plates - \$300,000. They generated \$300,000 at the expense of our safety on our roads, at the expense of safety in our communities, and also at the expense of our recourses that we unfortunately have to use to tackle this problem.

So, these two bills are important steps. We need to do much more, though. We need to work with marketplaces such as Craig's List, Face Book, eBay, so that they can do more to detect and remove listings related to this paper license plates.

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We also need federal action. A lot of these plates are coming from different states, including Georgia, Texas, Delaware. We can implement rules, but if other states don't have these standards apply to them, we are going to go back to square one. So, we also need federal access to resolve the problem.

I want thank the prime co-sponsors of these bills including our very own Majority Leader, Keith Powers, also our Majority Whip and Chair of Transportation, Council Member Selvena Brooks-Powers, and also Council Member Marjorie Velázquez, Council Member Lincoln Restler, Council Member Rafael Salamanca.

We hate fines. Our goal is not to fine [TIMER CHIMES]. Our goal is to deter individuals from selling and using plates that are fraudulent, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will now hear from Council Member Brewer, and finally, from Council Member Restler.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much.

I rise to talk about something very controversial, which my understanding is some federal officials are coming to New York simply to chastise District Attorney Alvin Bragg, for whom I have great

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respect. He is a Harvard trained attorney. He worked in the city council in the General Counsel's Office. I know I have constituents who take umbrage with some of his decisions, but he has met with them on a regular basis. He runs a good department in Manhattan. And the way that he has been treated by certain federal officials, I find very offensive.

So, I just want to bring to this audience's attention, that there is certainly room for disagreement, we can do that, but don't do it in a way that borders on racism and that chastises somebody who has the intelligence of a very brilliant man. Talk about the issues, but don't bring up this kind of accusation. Thank you very much.

[APPLAUSE]

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We will now hear from Council Member Restler.

COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: Great, thank you so much, Majority Leader.

I would firstly like to just say goodbye and good riddance to Patty(sp?) Lynch. For too many years, he has made bigoted, racist, inflammatory statements that have undermined stability in our city. And, I,

2 for one, am not at all sorry to his tenure come to an

3 end at the PBA.

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I would also like to just thank my colleagues,

Council Members Feliz and Holden, on great

legislation that I am proud to be co-priming with

them today -- especially Council Member Holden's

legislation that will bring privacy to individuals in

our single adult shelter system. When you are

struggling in our shelter system, and there are 10 or

12 or 20-odd people in a room, it is... And, you

have no privacy whatsoever, it is extremely

challenging. And the partition model that he has

developed is one that I think has a lot of promise

and would be very beneficial to individuals who are

struggling with homelessness in New York City.

And, then, lastly, I just want to thank Council

Member Riley; today he and I introduced a plan for

how we can actually get the closure of Rikers on

track. I think many people in this body have

strongly their support for the closure of Rikers, but

it not going to happen on its own. We need to make

deliberate policy decisions and investments that will

actually drive down the population. The decision for

how many people are incarcerated in New York City is
