25	piece of legislation, Resolution 487, sponsored by

COMMITTEE ON CULTURAL AFFAIRS, LIBRARIES & 1 Δ INTERNATIONAL INTERGROUP RELATIONS 2 Council Member Inna Vernikov, a Resolution 3 recognizing April 29 as End Jew Hatred Day annually in the City of New York. 4 We are going to keep this opening statement brief 5 today, but I want to say that I recognize and honor 6 7 the significant of Resolution 487, as it seeks to address to the serious rise of antisemitism and hate 8 9 crimes across the country, as well as right here in New York City. 10 11 Judaism is the second largest religion practiced in our city, and we have the largest Jewish community 12 of any city in the world. It is no wonder that this 13 14 resolution should be important to us. 15 I want to acknowledge some members on this 16 committee, Council Member Ung, Council Member Louis, 17 Council Member Dinowitz, Council Member Farías, and Council Member Hudson. 18 19 I would like to turn it over to committee counsel 20 that we could welcome some testimonies from a panel of testifiers. 21 COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Thank you, Chair. Uh, we will 2.2 23 now... We do not have testimony from the Administration, and we do not have to have read an 24 25 oath.

2	Hello? There we go, thank you
3	COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Thank you so much.
4	NOAM GILBOORD: Uh, good morning Chair Ossé and
5	members of the committee. My name is Noam Gilboord,
6	and I am the COO of The Jewish Community Relations
7	Council of New Yorker.
8	The Nation of JCRC, is to build relationships to
9	advance the values, interests, and security of the
10	Jewish community, and to create a more interconnected
11	New York for all.
12	JCRC serves as the primary community relations
13	agency for the Jewish community in the metropolitan
14	New York area. As an active force in New York civic
15	and communal life, JCRC operates a central
16	coordinating and resource body to be a common table
17	to cultivate understanding and joint action amongst
18	diverse groups within the Jewish community. We
19	cultivate deeper relationships with the broader New
20	York community to address critical issues and
21	engender a shared society for all. And, JCRC ensures
22	the security of the Jewish Community in the face of
23	rising antisemitism.
24

JCRS speaks in favor of Council Resolution Number 487, recognizing April 29 as End Jew Hatred Day annually in the City of New York.

5 Recently, The ADL released a report showing a 39% 6 spike in antisemitic incidents in New York in 2022. 7 New York came in first amongst states having the 8 highest number of reported antisemitic incidents. The 9 organized Jewish community has taken steps in 10 response.

Since 2020 UJA Federation of New York has 11 12 collectively invested millions of dollars in security creating the Community Security Initiative a joint 13 initiative of JCRC and UJA, which is charged with 14 15 providing proactive and reactive security support. From increasing physical security in buildings to 16 17 research on the dark web, these efforts work hand in 18 hand with government to increase safety.

19 Indeed the work of our CSI team has led it to 20 become part of a new umbrella coalition called the 21 Jewish Security Alliance, which will aim to act as 22 the central point of contact for New York City area 23 and New Jersey law enforcement communities on issues 24 affecting all Jewish people.

25 Moreover [TIMER CHIMES]... Oh, well, okay.

5 NOAM GILBOORD: I can finish? Great, two more6 paragraphs.

7 Moreover, as part of our two-pronged approach to addressing antisemitism, JCRC, on behalf of the 8 9 Jewish community, also works intensively to identify common agendas and build bridges with the other New 10 11 York City communities, with the belief that learning 12 and working together, created long term and sustainable trust along with deeper levels of 13 14 understanding that can reduce conflict and fight hate 15 in all its forms.

Yet, in 2022, data shows that New York City has become the most dangerous city in America to be a Jew. There are many theories and factors that may underpin this rise in extremism from intolerance and antisemitism nationally and globally, as well as COVID-19 and the many conspiracies that falsely linked Jews and others to it.

23 We believe in the leadership of actions of 24 Speaker Adams, who has always sought to bring diverse 25 communities together and illuminate those issues and

COMMITTEE ON CULTURAL AFFAIRS, LIBRARIES & 1 INTERNATIONAL INTERGROUP RELATIONS 2 beliefs that unite as all, rather than focus on what 3 divides us. 4 JCRC is committed to partnering with Speaker Adams, Chair Ossé, Chair of the Jewish Caucus, 5 Council Member Eric Dinowitz, and members of the 6 7 Council, on new and innovative ways to combat antisemitism. 8 9 We believe that the more voices there are, the more voices one lends to the condemnation of hatred, 10 11 not only of Jews, but of any group is suffering the slings and arrows of intolerance and racism, the 12 13 better. We commend Chair Ossé and Council Member 14 15 Vernikov, Council Member Yeger, Council Member Menin, 16 Council Member Gennaro, Council Member Richardson 17 Jordan, Council Member Dinowitz, Council Member 18 Holden, Council Member Lee, Council Member Carr, 19 Council Member Ariola, Council Member Borelli, 20 Council Member Kagan, and Council Member Paladino. 21 And we urge passage of this important resolution, 2.2 thank you very much. 23 COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Okay, thank you so much. We will now move to our next witness, Christopher 24 Leon Johnson, thank you. 25

COMMITTEE ON CULTURAL AFFAIRS, LIBRARIES & 1 10 INTERNATIONAL INTERGROUP RELATIONS 2 CHRISTOPHER LEON JOHNSON: All right, Good 3 morning. 4 My name is Christopher Leon Johnson, thanks for having this panel, Chair Ossé. 5 First off, I have to say thank you for not 6 7 showing up to that presser outside about Bail Reform, 8 because , you know, I am going to talk about this 9 right now, I am for the bill, Intro 487, sponsored by Council Member Inna Vernikov, because first off, we 10 11 have to repeal Bail Reform. The only way you are 12 going to end Jew hatred is by repealing Bail Reform. 13 The problem is, you have so many crimes against the 14 Jewish people, and these DAs of all the five 15 boroughs, including Melinda Katz, are letting these people get with this stuff, because they are scared 16 17 of pissing off certain voting blocks. That should be 18 stopped. We have to repeal Bail Reform. 19 The second thing is, we have to push more 20 Holocaust education inside these schools. We need mandated Holocaust education inside these schools, 21 2.2 especially in the inner districts, because this is 23 where the antisemitism is happening the majority of the time -- it's in those inner districts. 24

2	The third thing is ,you know, I know there are
3	only 14 people that are co-sponsoring this bill, I
4	think that's abysmal. It's horrible. I think it
5	should be more people co-sponsoring this bill. It
6	should be a majority that co-sponsor this bill. I
7	think mostly a super majority should be co-sponsoring
8	this bill. I know that Thursday we have the vote at
9	the Stated Meeting, and I will say this right now to
10	very council member out there who do not want to vote
11	for this bill, if you want to not vote for this bill,
12	fine, it's in America, it's a free country, you can
13	do that. But, remember this ,you know, we're going
14	to vote you guys out. And I hope that people in the
15	Jewish community start running people against these
16	members who vote against that bill and start voting
17	these guys and gals out. Because, this is going to
18	be This is ridiculous where bills like this have
19	to be introduced to The City Council. This should
20	have been introduced a way long time ago. And,
21	that's it, thank you.
22	COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Thank you for your testimony.
23	The next witness will be Gerard Felitti.
24	GERARD FELITTI: Good morning, My name is Gerard
25	Felitti, I am an attorney and Senior Counsel at The

2	Lawfare Project, which fights to uphold the legal
3	rights of the Jewish people worldwide. I am also an
4	activist and counsel for the End Jew Hatred movement.
5	And I would like to thank you, first and
6	foremost, for the opportunity to be heard. That is
7	what End Jew Hate Day is about. It is a day to be
8	heard. It is a day of empowerment and unity to being
9	together everyone in a bipartisan that puts politics
10	aside and addresses the issues that we are facing
11	right now.
12	I don't need to tell you the numbers. You know
13	them better than I do. Antisemitism is at
14	unprecedented levels. Walk up a few blocks to Center
15	Street, there is someone right now at a hearing who
16	is charged with violently beating a Jewish man for no
17	other reason than for wearing kippah. This is the
18	society we live in. This is New York City today. And
19	we need unity and empowerment to combat this. End
20	Jew Hate Day started last year. It started as a
21	project in way of an initiative of the Holocaust
22	Museum and Center for Education and Tolerance in New
23	York. The idea was to select the day after Yom
24	HaShoah, after Holocaust Remembrance Day, as a day of
25	empowerment. A day to look back on the struggles of

2	the Jewish people throughout history, but also to
3	look forward to how we can address the issues that
4	were still dealing with today discrimination,
5	oppression, violence. We see this not just in New
6	York City but across the US. End Jew Hate (the Day)
7	is a day, I keep saying this word, of empowerment.
8	This year, we have gone from having a few elected
9	officials, last year, including Starting with
10	former Senator, Elijah Reichlin-Melnick, to this year
11	now having a bipartisan resolution being put forth on
12	the senate floor of the US Senate. We have Ritchie
13	Torres; we have so many congressmen. We have
14	representatives from multiple states and localities.
15	A little county in Michigan, that I have never heard
16	of, who wanted to do the right thing, issued this
17	proclamation yesterday. And they are so proud to be
18	part of the movement, part of the group of people who
19	want to fight the hatred that we share. Because,
20	without unity, without having a [TIMER CHIMES] day
21	without having day on which we can look just at the
22	issues facing the Jewish people, we cannot address
23	the antagonism, we cannot address the Jewish hatred,
24	and we cannot move forward.

2	So, I think Council Member Vernikov for her
3	leadership in this. I thank all of the co-sponsors of
4	this legislation. And I thank all of you for the
5	opportunity to be heard. And I encourage all of you
6	to move this in to a bill, to move this into law, to
7	have this day of empowerment where the Jewish people
8	feel heard, respected, and helped, thank you.
9	COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Thank you so much for your
10	testimony.
11	And before we move to Mr. Komatsu, our final
12	witness, just a reminder, if you are present and

25	testified just talked about the right to be heard.

I also took a look at [INAUDIBLE] Louis is also illegally using her 4 cell phone during this public hearing, public forum. 5 Mr. Ossé, I just looked at you while you would 6 7 using... while you were also using your phone. Prior to the start of today's hearing, I asked 8 9 the City Council staff if people could present video recordings in conjunction with their testimony, in 10 11 conjunction with their First Amendment and 14th Amendment rights; however, they're telling me, sorry, 12 but we have rules for the council, you have to comply 13 14 with them. And, then, this hearing begins, Ms. 15 Hudson is still on her phone. Uhm, Miss Louis was on her phone. So, with regards with the right to be 16 17 heard at a meaningful time in a meaningful way, 18 tailored to their circumstances in the capacity to be 19 heard with regards to a US Supreme Court decision 20 that itself issued two orders yesterday about granting petitions for Writ of Certiorari about 21 public forums. Where is compliance for [INAUDIBLE] 2.2 23 legal standards? Uhm, the point of today's hearing is about 24

25 ending, uhm, antisemitism against Jews. Guess what?

4	people, illegally prevented me from attending public

7	oral arguments hearing on the same day I had parallel
8	litigation. Miss Vernikov, you're attorney, so I
9	think you, uhm, more than others would understand
10	what I'm talking about. Meaning if you had an oral
11	arguments hearing and had a date to appear in court,
12	you prepared for your hearing, the other side stole
13	your hearing, stole your first amendment rights, you
14	would be royally pissed about that. So, the point is
15	if there was a town hall meeting shortly thereafter,
16	I tried to walk through the doors, A Public Resource
17	Hearing meeting, I tried to walk through the doors,
18	the illegally did not let me walk through those
19	doors. So, those are Jewish people. I'm Jewish.
20	That oral arguments hearing [TIMER CHIMES] the legal
21	adversary, was Jewish. So, with regards to, I
22	guess
23	CHAIRPERSON OSSÉ: You're at time, sir.

18	I would like to welcome the sponsor of the
19	resolution, Council Member Inna Vernikov, and invite
20	her to provide remarks on her legislation.
21	Council Member Vernikov?
22	COUNCIL MEMBER VERNIKOV: Thank you very much.
23	Thank you, Committee Chair and my colleagues in this
24	committee for hearing and voting today on my
25	resolution to proclaim April 29 as End Jew Hatred

COMMITTEE ON CULTURAL AFFAIRS, LIBRARIES & 1 18 INTERNATIONAL INTERGROUP RELATIONS 2 Day. I also thank all of my colleagues who signed on 3 and all of those who came here to testify today. I am 4 proud of the bipartisan support this resolution has received. 5 The Jewish community, within five boroughs of New 6 7 York City, represents the largest Jewish community of any city in the world, with nearly half of New York 8 9 City's Jew living in the borough of Brooklyn. Judaism is the second largest religion practiced 10 11 in New York City, and yet, the Anti-Defamation League records 2,717 antisemitic incidents which occurred in 12 the United States in 2021 alone, averaging out to 13 14 more than seven incidents per day, representing a 34% 15 increase in acts of harassment, vandalism, and 16 assault since 2020. 17 The ADL also found that in 2021, the highest 18 number of antiemetic incidents took place in New York 19 State with 51 anti Jewish assaults taking place in 20 New York City. 21 In 2021, there were more assaults on Jews in 2.2 Brooklyn than anywhere else in America. And 23 according to a report compiled by Americans Against Antisemitism, 94% of anti Jewish assaults targeted 24 identifiable Jews. 25

It is unthinkable to imagine that in this modern day and age, in the great United States of America, the place of freedom and tolerance, and in the great New York State, the beacon of democracy, our believed New York City, the most tolerant and accepting city in the world, there can be so much hatred against this ethnic minority. This must end.

9 On April 29, 2022, when the End Jew Hatred Day proclamation was signed into law in New York State, 10 11 and the Nassau County Legislator declared that End Jew Hatred Day will be recognized annually on April 12 13 29th. Our city must do the same. This resolution 14 will send a strong message that New York City does 15 not and will not tolerate any form of hate, bigotry, 16 and specifically antisemitism, and will commit to 17 working together to end Jew hatred.

18 I ask this committee to vote in support of this 19 resolution, thank you all.

20 CHAIRPERSON OSSÉ: Thank you, Council Member21 Vernikov.

Finally, I would like thank my staff as well as the committee staff and others who worked on preparing this legislation including Naomi Hopkins, my Chief of Staff, May Vutrapongvatana, and my Budget

COMMITTEE COUNSEL: And, just to check, I'm just, 11 uh, confirming that Council Member Moya is present 12 online, and Council Member Hanif is also here. 13 We 14 are just waiting for the clerk. It should just take 15 one moment, and then we will be moving to the vote. But, we have no other witnesses present or 16 17 online, so this concludes the public testimony 18 portion of this hearing. And we will just be one 19 moment until the vote. Thank you so much. 20 And just so everyone knows, the clerk is coming 21 from 250, from another hearing room, so it will just

22 be one moment, we will be starting again in just a 23 moment, thank you for your patience.

2	I do want to recognize my colleagues one again,
3	Council Member Ung, Council Member Joseph, Council
4	Member Dinowitz, Council Member Vernikov, Council
5	Member Hanif, Council Member Farías, Council Member
6	Hudson, and online, Council Member Moya, Council
7	Member Louis.
8	I want to turn it over to Billy, so that we can
9	take a vote on this resolution.
10	COMMITTEE CLERK: William Martin Committee Clerk
11	Roll Call Vote, Committee on Cultural Affairs,
12	Libraries and International Intergroup.
13	Chair Ossé?
14	CHAIRPERSON OSSÉ: Antisemitism is on the rise
15	across the globe and in our city. We see it in the
16	hate crimes Jews increasingly face while minding
17	their own business walking down the street. I see it
18	in my district representing a Jewish constituency.
19	We also see it in the Republican party's attempt
20	to smear opponents by falsely painting them as
21	beholden to the Holocaust survivor, George Soros.
22	With perhaps the most significant implication for
23	public policy, we see antisemitism rear its ugly head
24	at the top of one of two major party tickets.
25

2	Indicted former President Donald Trump's
3	decisions to welcome avowed neo-Nazi's, like Nick
4	Fuentes, in to his home and into his inner circle, is
5	terrifying and should be disqualifying. Still he
6	seems to only continue to consolidate Republican
7	support nationwide and right here in New York and
8	within our Council.
9	Recognizing the dangers presented by the virus of
10	antisemitism in both personal acts of violence and in
11	the GOP's standard-bearers decision to embrace the
12	worst offenders, I understand the importance of this
13	resolution. I vote aye.
14	COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you

8	against our AAPI, LGBTQ+ especially trans folks,
9	immigrants, and undocumented neighbors, and Latinos
10	that go uncounted and underreported. We need to
11	stand with everyone experiencing unnecessary hate,
12	violence, in intolerance in this city and everywhere.
13	Thank you, and I vote aye.
14	COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you
15	Council Member Hanif?
16	COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: I abstain.
17	COMMITTEE CLERK: Council Member Hudson?
18	COUNCIL MEMBER HUDSON: Permission to explain my
19	vote?
20	CHAIRPERSON OSSÉ: Permission.
21	COUNCIL MEMBER HUDSON: Thank you.
22	Today I will be voting aye on this resolution,
23	but I would be remiss if I did not point out the
24	irony of sending a letter supporting transphobic
25	legislation that prevents trans kids from playing

2	sports, and then asking this body support legislation
3	to combat hatred of another marginalized community.
4	To paraphrase Pastor Martin Niemöller, We must

7	to, the Jewish community, of which I also represent.
8	We must end hate in all forms and against all
9	people. And I look forward to working with this
10	council to meet that goal. I vote aye.
