SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Check one, two. This is a prerecorded sound test for the Committee on Public Safety. Today's date is April 27, 2023. It's being recorded by Michael Leonardo in the Council Chambers.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning, everyone, and welcome to today's New York City Council vote on the Committee on Public Safety.

At this time, please silence all electronic devices.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON HANKS: [GAVEL] Good morning.

My name is Kamillah Hanks, and I am the Chair on the

Committee of Public Safety.

I would like to welcome you to our vote today on Proposed Introduction 273B sponsored by Council Member Mercedes Narcisse, myself, and Council Member Mealy.

I would also like to recognize my fellow

Council Members that are here today, Council Members

Brannan, Holden who's joining us virtually, Bottcher,

De La Rosa, Stevens, Ariola, Mealy, and Narcisse.

This legislation will make our city safer for everyone by requiring NYPD to receive regular training on recognizing and understanding autism

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spectrum disorder. Specifically, this bill mandates that autism awareness training be conducted for NYPD recruits at the academy and every two years for uniformed service members. We know encountering an individual with autism spectrum disorder can present unique challenges for law enforcement. Behaviors associated with the disorder can often be misinterpreted as an individual acting noncompliant, threatening, or disorderly. Regular training can provide officers with the tools to recognize the manifestations of autism spectrum disorder and strategies to respond safely and effectively. Sadly, across the country, we've seen tragic examples of police interactions becoming dangerous and even deadly for autistic individuals. Ensuring that all police officers receive this critical training will prevent misunderstandings which can have devastating consequences.

With that, I would like to turn it over to Council Member Narcisse to deliver a statement about her bill. Council Member.

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We are better when we make the effort to protect the more vulnerable citizens among us. When we lead with kindness and compassion, our City moves in the right direction.

Today, with the passage of Intro. 273, we are doing that just that. Unfortunately, the rates of New Yorkers diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder are on the rise. The increase inevitably will lead to more interactions with police. This training supported by the NYPD and developed with the assistance from the amazing autism advocates will help NYPD officers increase their recognition of autistic behaviors and help avoid misinterpretation and escalation. Intro. 273 would potentially save lives. The bill states that training would include enhancing their awareness and building a practical understanding of autism spectrum disorder and how to safely respond to calls involving these potentially vulnerable New Yorkers. The bill also would require development of interpersonal skills to safely respond to emergencies involving someone with autism spectrum disorders and instruction on interviewing and investigative techniques to utilize in cases involving individuals with autism spectrum disorder.

COUNCIL MEMBER DE LA ROSA: Permission to explain my vote?

I'm voting in favor of this legislation today because I believe there is good intention behind this bill. I want to highlight the reality of what we have seen. We cannot train patterns of excessive and often deadly force that our police departments have shown in their interactions with those often in crisis. New Yorkers who are living with developmental disabilities are especially vulnerable. When a family calls for help, they should not see their children hospitalized or, even worse, on the other side of that interaction. Our investment should be in services, social work, mental health specialized teams that are equipped to navigate these interactions, and I look forward to continuing to work with my Colleagues to ensure that these vulnerable New Yorkers are treated with professionalism, dignity, and compassion in these interactions. I vote aye.
