SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning and welcome to the New York City Council vote of the Committee on Criminal Justice.

At this time, can everyone please silence your cell phones? Thank you for your cooperation.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: [GAVEL] Good morning.

I am Council Member Carlina Rivera, Chair of the

Council's Committee on Criminal Justice.

I'd like to welcome you to our vote on three pieces of legislation I sponsored, Proposed Introduction 589A, Proposed Introduction 806A, and Proposed Resolution 156A.

I want to recognize my Colleagues who are here, Council Members Carr, Schulman, Narcisse, Hanif, Stevens, and Restler.

The legislation we are voting on today will help bring about much needed transparency and spur action towards reducing our jail population for a safer and more humane New York City.

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Proposed Intro 589A will mandate new reporting requirements on medical care and outcomes for incarcerated pregnant persons. This bill will ensure this population with unique health needs including women with higher rates of trauma and mental illness are getting the proper care while in custody prior to, during, and after childbirth.

establishment of a new borough-based population review program to identify people in custody whose cases could be resolved or who could be safely released into their community so they will not be unnecessarily exposed to the conditions on Rikers Island. Several jurisdictions outside of New York City have already adopted this approach, and it has been proven to be effective. Reducing the jail population benefits those who are released and eases the burden on the jail system as we get closer to closing Rikers Island in 2027.

Proposed Resolution 156A calls upon our

State Legislators in Albany to pass the Treatment Not

Jail Act sponsored by Senator Ramos and Assembly

Member Forrest. This bill would expand the successful diversion model by enabling anyone with a functional

impairment to participate in judicial diversion
regardless of the crime with which they are charged.
Research shows that incarceration is destabilizing
and traumatizing, especially for those with mental
health and substance abuse challenges. We must
swiftly enact this bill in Albany to move us close to

a criminal legal system that acknowledges and works
to address the root causes of people's medical and

mental healthcare rather than creating additional

11 harm.

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To close Rikers Island on schedule in 2027, a deadline that the City is obligated to meet by law, we must be diligent in reducing the jail population and ending the cycle of recidivism. Rikers Island keeps no one safe, and it must close. With innovative policies like the establishment of new population review teams and expansion of judicial diversion, this goal is entirely within our grasp.

I'm proud to be joined by many Members of this Committee as Co-Sponsors of this important legislation.

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	First, I am proud to Co-Sponsor Intro.
589A which	is designed to help incarcerated pregnant
people get	the medical care they need while in the
custody of	the Department of Correction.

With regard to Intro. 806A and Reso.

156A, while I had some initial concerns, after some deep research and discussions with experts and members of my community, I am convinced that Intro.

806A and Reso. 156A will enhance public safety by expediting case reviews and getting people with severe mental health issues and other impairments the care and support they need so they do not fall through the cracks of the criminal justice system and potentially become harmful to themselves and others.

With that, I vote age on all.

COUNCIL MEMBER CARR: Aye on Intro. 589A and no on the rest. Thank you.

COMMITTEE CLERK WILLIAM MARTIN: Okay. By a vote of seven in the affirmative, zero in the negative, and no abstentions, we have Proposed Introduction 589A adopted by the Committee.
