CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: [GAVEL] All right, good morning. Thank you all. I'm Council Member

Jennifer Gutierrez, and I'm the Chair of the

Committee on Technology.

I would like to thank my Colleagues from the Committee on Technology for joining today,

Council Member Vickie Paladino, Council Member Shaun

Abreu, Council Member Julie Won, and Council Member

Bob Holden who is joining us through Zoom.

Today, we'll be voting on two bills aimed at closing the digital divide in our city. These two bills are targeted important programs that will help our seniors navigate the increasingly online world we live in and use the resources of the City, in this case the surplus computers and computer equipment, to

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support organizations who train, teach, and otherwise help New Yorkers in need. These bills represent straightforward and effective ways to make our City more technologically knowledgeable and, by doing so, making our City more equitable.

Proposed Intro. 664A which I sponsored would require DCAS to implement a process to donate unneeded and unused computers and equipment to public schools, libraries, other secular educational programs, and not-for-profit institutions serving persons with disabilities, senior citizens, or low-income individuals. The donation recipient must provide the Department with a specific plan for the beneficial use of such equipment and software with public schools and libraries receiving first priority for any donation. The bill also requires an annual report to the Mayor and the Speaker of the City Council on the donations made in the last year. This Local Law would take effect 120 days after it becomes law.

Proposed Intro. 665A which I also sponsored would require the Department for the Aging, or DFTA, in collaboration with the Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications along

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with any relevant stakeholders to establish and implement an online digital literacy program to serve older adults by December 31, 2024. The program would be offered at no cost and would include information on various topics including navigating telehealth services, social media platforms, and government benefit websites. It would also focus on identifying and avoiding online scams. The program would be offered in one senior center or library in each Community District in the city in the appropriate prevalent spoken languages.

I'm excited to move these bills forward after hearing from advocates and New Yorkers about the impact they would have. The City, through donated computers, can help schools, libraries, and non-profits, both big and small, to further their mission to help New Yorkers and will prevent these computers and other equipment from going to landfills.

In regards to 665A, testimony in support of a digital literacy program for seniors showed just how much our seniors are in need of continued digital skill building. These skills will mean that seniors stay connected to their friends, families, and
