We pray for every legislator that has been given the opportunity to serve. We pray that every law that is passed will reflect justice and equity for all of our citizens. We pray for those who are marginalized in our city; those who depend on our just laws so that they may all have access to good healthcare, education, fair housing, and a safe place to call home. We pray for those who do not have a voice and who rely on their public servants to speak for them. We pray for those who are on the forefront for the cause of justice; grant them perseverance and courage to continue in the things that will bring about a better society. And, so, we pray for New York City, that it will prosper, and that the issues that unite us will take precedent over the things that divide us. Lenox Road Baptist Church has been a staple in our community, and I am forever grateful for their contributions and commitment to the 40th Council District. I make a motion for unanimous consent to spread the Invocation in full upon the record.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will now turn to Council Member Lincoln Restler for the Adoption of Minutes.

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Dinowitz's districts. And just this week, four

2 people were killed in a fire sparked by a lithium-ion

So far this year, we have lost 13 people to lithium battery fires, most of which were preventable. There is more work to do at every level of government to fix this critical issue because lives depend on it.

As we continue to negotiate the City's Fiscal Year 2024 budget, we remain committed to restoring critical investments in essential services that our families, communities, and city rely on to succeed, but were left out of the Mayor's proposed budget.

While we understand the future budget challenges ahead, our city cannot undermine itself and worsen them by failing to invest housing, education, libraries, mental health, and economic opportunity. The next several days will be critical for New York City and the communities we represent. We cannot pursue a path that destabilizes working families. We must choose the responsible, smart approach that makes necessary investments and protects against future risks. For the health, safety, and well-being of our city, the choice is clear.

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This past Sunday, colleagues, was Father's Day.

Fathers, grandfathers, and father figures play an integral role in the health, safety, and stability of our families. They are role models who shape our lives for the better. And I want to give a shoutout to all of the fathers in the council chambers today.

I hope all of you had a happy, happy, Father's Day.

On Monday, we celebrated Juneteenth, a day in which we recommit to the work of achieving equity and justice for Black people across our city and nation. We take this day to commemorate the ongoing struggle for liberation and freedom, and reflect on the path forward. Here in the Council, we have a Juneteenth legislative package introduced by Council Members Barron, Hudson, Louis, Nurse, Stevens, and Williams.

Coming to terms with the truth of our past is critical to our future. It requires honesty and transparency, which are critical steps towards healing and reconciliation as we address the institutional legacies of past harms. And I hope all New Yorkers had a reflective and meaningful Juneteenth.

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June 19th was also World Sickle Cell Awareness 2 3 Day, which was designated with a goal of increasing public awareness of sickle cell disease, and 4 5 supporting those who have been diagnosed with this blood disorder. Sickle cell disease 6 7 disproportionately impacts African-Americans, yet not enough people know what it is or the pain it causes. 8 We hope the continued spotlight on this condition 10 will finally bring the necessary resources and 11 treatment that patients and their families deserve.

Tuesday was World Refugee Day, a time when we celebrate refugees living here in New York City and around the world, and honor those who we have lost in pursuit of safety and opportunity. We are proudly a city of immigrants, and we welcome those who seek refuge in our great city.

Finally, on July 4th, we will celebrate

Independence Day, and I wish you and your families a
happy, safe 4th of July.

and public places, based on the requests of

4 communities and council members.

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Introduction 227-A, sponsored by Council Member Gale Brewer, this bill would require a City agency or office designated by the Mayor to publish on its website biographical information pertaining to a person or entity for whom a street, park, playground, facility or structure owned by the City is renamed or ceremonially co-named by the Council through legislation.

And Introduction 7-A, sponsored by Deputy Speaker Diana Ayala, would codify free youth memberships for the City's 36 recreation centers operated by The Department of Parks and Recreation into law.

Currently, the City offers discounted memberships to seniors, people with disabilities, and veterans as well. We thank our staff members, Kristoffer Sartori and Patrick Mulvihill.

Next, a bill from our Youth Services Committee,
Introduction 54, sponsored by Council Member Farah
Louis, would require The Department of Youth and
Community Development to include financial
empowerment education in its Youth Employment and

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Runaway And Homeless Youth Programs. We thank our staff member, Christina Yellamaty.

From the Public Safety Committee, Introduction 1001-A, sponsored by Council Member Lynn Schulman, would permit enforcement agencies to fine commercial property owners who lease to unlicensed and unlawful sellers of marijuana or tobacco products. Thank you to our staff members Jeremy Whiteman and Chad Benjaman.

Introduction 561-B, sponsored by Council Member
Crystal Hudson and Council Member Carlina Rivera,
would authorize the City of New York to establish or
fund unconditional guaranteed income programs for
certain eligible low-income families and individuals.
It will set up a framework for such programs to
perverse participants' access to public benefits to
the greatest extent possible and provide data for the
purposes of analysis and policy making. We thank our
staff members, Wesley Jones and Jessica Boulet.

Finally, we will vote on some of the legislative proposals that are part of the Council's Mental Health Roadmap, envisioned by our Mental Health Committee Chair, Linda Lee. Council Member Lee, Majority Leader Keith Powers, Council Member Botcher,

2 and I released this roadmap with advocates to improve

3 mental health in our city. It focuses on addressing

4 existing challenges in the City's mental healthcare

5 landscape and strengthening the infrastructure and

6 investments in evidence-based solutions at the

7 community level to improve mental health outcomes for

Keith Powers, calling on the New York State Office of

Mental Health to expand enforcement of mental health

and substance use disorder insurance parity and apply

for federal grants to enforce insurance parity, so

insurance discrimination is reduced as a barrier to

mental healthcare access.

Resolution 588-A, also sponsored by Majority

Leader Powers, calling on New York State to

collaborate closely with New York City to achieve

their shared goal of developing 35,000 units of

supportive housing.

Resolution 589, sponsored by Majority Leader

Powers, calling on the Federal Government to ensure

that calls to the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline

program are routed based on geolocation rather than

area code, so people are routed to appropriate

services based on their geographic location rather

than simply the area code of their phone.

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And Resolution 592, sponsored by Council Member Lynn Schulman, calling on the New York State and Federal governments to expand the availability of mental health professionals for low and moderate income New Yorkers by increasing Medicaid reimbursement rates for behavioral health services.

Now, on to the introductions from the Mental Health Roadmap we will be voting on:

Introduction 706-A, sponsored by Council Member Shaun Abreu, would require the Mayor's Office of Community Mental Health (OCMH) to maintain on a public, searchable online database of available mental health services provided in New York City on its website. This would improve access to mental health resources for New Yorkers.

Introduction 1006-A, sponsored by Council Member Erik Bottcher, would require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH) to develop and implement a public awareness campaign and conduct outreach on mental health and behavioral health programs in New York City that provide low-cost and no-cost services, specifically to those who do not qualify for health insurance based on federal guidelines. Thank you to our staff members Sara Sucher and Christie Dwyer.

economies, reduce income inequality, and offer their

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vulnerable constituencies a lifeline that affords
them greater economic and social freedom. With the
passage of Introduction 561-B, my block agenda for
New York City is becoming a reality. And New York is
taking a historic critical step forward to offering
all marginalized New Yorkers direct cash assistance.
I thank Speaker Adams for her leadership, and the
countless advocates for their continued fight to

ensure this bill became law.

I am also proud to be passing Resolution 199, which declares June as Caribbean Heritage Month. The Caribbean diaspora in New York City is strong, bold, and vibrant with over 800,000 New Yorkers hailing from the Caribbean. Marking June as Caribbean Heritage Month is a recognition of the vast, varied, and storied contributions of our Caribbean neighbors and my colleagues here in The City Council, whose lineage comes from the great countries of Jamaica, Haiti, Puerto Rico, La República Dominicana, Panama, and many others.

Lastly, we are voting on two co-namings in my district.

The first honors the late Edward Carter, a community activist, Executive Director of the Fort

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Greene Youth Patrol, longtime member of Brooklyn

Community Board Two, and the unofficial mayor of

Forte Green. I would like to thank Tyrana Carter for
her dedication and work to secure the co-naming for
her father.

The second, honors Tomchei Tmimim. The central Yeshiva Talmudical academy of the Chabad-Lubavitch Hasidic movement, founded in 1897 by Rabbi Sholom Dovber Schneersohn, that has grown into an international network. Notably, today holds significant importance for the worldwide Chabad-Lubavitch community, whose headquarters are located in my district, because it is the anniversary of the passing of the revered Lubavitcher Rebbe, Menachem Mendel Schneersohn, who resided in my district and build the International [TIMER CHIMES] Chabad movement. I would like to thank Yakov Bierman (sp?) and Rabbi Yossi Langsam for shepherding this conaming through the process. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we will now go to Council Member Lynn Schulman, followed by Council Member Gale Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: Thank you, Majority Leader.

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Illegal weed shops have been proliferating in New York City, putting our communities at risk. The cannabis they sell has been found to be adulterated; they sell to children, and they prevent licensed sellers from opening legitimate businesses.

That is why I am extremely proud that the Council will be voting on Introduction 1001-B this afternoon, which will create a penalty structure to hold landlords accountable for knowing leasing commercial premises to illegal businesses.

The hope is that this legislation will incentive landlords to do the right thing and keep our communities safe by only leasing commercial space to legal licensed businesses. This is a game changer, because right now, enforcement efforts are aimed at the sellers and not the landlords who are leasing to them.

I want to thank the Speaker for her leadership and support on this issue, as well as the Public Safety Chair, Kamillah Hanks, committee staff, and I also want to acknowledge, uh, Jeff Baker -- who doesn't always get acknowledged on these intros, but he was very committed to working on this with me, so thank you -- advocates, and the many community

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28 members who share my deep concern for the safety of our neighborhoods. I also want to thank my Chief of Staff Jonathan Boucher, and my Legislative Director, Kevin McAleer, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we will now go to Council Member Gale Brewer, followed by Council Member Julie Won.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much.

I am talking about Introduction 227. I want to thank The Speaker; I want to thank Parks Chair, Council Member Krishnan; also Kristoffer Sartori, and Patrick Mulvihill from the Parks Committee; and all of the Council staff for their support of this bill -- which I introduced in 2004! I don't know if everybody was around then. Probably not. But, I want to say it is really important to be passing today.

Currently, other than within supportive documents for each Local Law, there is no biographical or background information for the ceremonial street conames that are posted on any city agency website and readily available to the public.

When you see a street sign with a co-naming, you don't really know who that person is, and certainly neither do tourists or school children.

2	In my district, I have ,you know, famous artists
3	listed on the street signs, like Alvin Ailey, Isaac
4	Bashevis Singer, Edgar Allen Poe, but most street co-
5	namings are for everyday heroes, not for famous New
6	Yorkers. And I want to add that after 9/11, in our
7	neighborhoods, many, many street co-names were added,
8	based on people who died in 9/11. And in my
9	district, my predecessor, Helen Rosenthal's brother
10	died in 9/11, and I remember going with her and her
11	mother to 72nd Street, and putting the sign up for
12	Josh Rosenthal. That would be an example of somebody
13	who was a hero, but is not well-known, and should be
14	on a site. My understanding is that the, uh,
15	municipal library website will be where this is
16	placed. We will go back at least to the 1990's, and
17	if I have my way, I am going to fight to have even
18	longer biographical information up on the website.
19	Today, also, we are passing a co-naming Bill for
20	Didi Ford, who name will be added to the corner of
21	West 94th Street and [TIMER CHIMES] Amsterdam Avenue.
22	She was a River Park nursery school teacher for 50
23	years, and she was the first African-American woman

to teach there. She is just as deserving of people

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2 knowing her story as those with more recognizable names, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we will now hear from Council Member Won, followed by Council Member Joseph.

COUNCIL MEMBER WON: Today, I hope you will join me in approving the intersection of 45th Street and Newtown Road in Astoria as Dolma Naadhun Way. And this is in memory of Dolma Naadhun, who was a 7-yearold child who was hit by a car this February, crossing the street on her way back from a playground. And it is incredibly heartbreaking, and we know that the street co-naming will not bring this child back, but we have been fortunate to be able to honor her memory. Special thanks to Council Member Tiffany Cabán, Assemblymember Jessica González-Rojas, Senator Mike Gianaris, as well as Council Member Selvena Brooks-Powers, and Transportation Commissioner Rodriguez; we were able to, in a very quick period of time, honor the Tibetan tradition of the 49-day period after her death, that we are not only co-naming the street, but we are also able to put in a street light, so that this intersection... the traffic signals will make this intersection much

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safer. So, I say with a heavy heart, we are sorry for her passing -- way too soon -- but we honor her family, especially her father, Tsering Wangdu, who has been a fierce advocate to make sure that no child's life is ever taken away in this intersection

ever again. And thank you so much for the support.

Elijah graduated from my school, from PS 6, and went on to MS 2 Academy in May of 2020; continued his education at Clara Barton High School where he was well received and respected by his peers and teachers. Sadly, due to gun violence, Elijah was taken from his family and friends on December 30, 2022. We are asking for you

This introduction acts on what hundreds of thousands of New Yorkers voted on and advocated for by codifying structural change into our City agencies, who are the most outward facing, such as our Human Service contractors.

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If history is our guide, it is our goal that it is attainable only if we strive to change not only the law, but the attitudes, beliefs, and the individual and collective consciousness of those persons now mandated to uphold it.

Every day, New Yorkers are impacted by the decisions and work of public servants. That is why we need to support all of our City workers to be equipped with a deep understanding and bias, which in turn will help our workers perform their duties without intentionally and/or unintentionally discriminating and perpetuating racism.

We need to lead from the front and show New Yorkers across the City what it means to be truly anti-racist. I urge all of you in this room to sign on to this critical piece of legislation, thank you.

Fairness and Apartment Rental Expenses or Fair Act.

Currently, tenants often pay broker fees totaling

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thousands of dollars when moving into a new rental even if they did not hire the broker. This is often prohibitively expensive and it doesn't make sense. Growing families that need and extra bedroom, young New Yorkers graduating out of their parent(s)' houses, voucher holders with nowhere to run, single mothers on a fixed income, or folks just moving to a new neighborhood should not be held down by fees for a service they simply did not pay for (*TRANSCRIBER'S NOTE: hire). This is not revolutionary; this bill is simple. It is common sense and it's fair. New York is the only major city in which tenants pay this fee for a service they did not hire.

Under the Fair Act, the one who hires is the one who pays. It's easy. It is a little surprising that this is not already the case, but it is time to catch up with the rest of the country. Let's be clear, this bill does not cap broker fees in any way. Any fees that would be charged before would still be charged. Any services previously provided will continue to be provided. The only change would be that the hiring party pays for the services they contract. If a renter hires a broker to find an new home, the renter will pay for the service. If a

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2 landlord hires a broker to help them find a new 3 tenant, the landlord will pay for the service.

I urge all of my colleagues to sign on to this common sense bill mandating that people pay for services they hire, and do not pay for services that they do not hire, thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: Thank you, Majority Leader.

Colleagues, a 2017 wage theft study by the

Economic Policy Institute found that 32% of New

York's construction workers earn wages that were not
paid. It is the highest share out of any industry

surveyed through the state and impacting our city.

In 2017, an estimated 12.6% to 21 % of construction workers were either misclassified or working off the books. The groups that are susceptible to this wage theft are, of course, most likely to be Black and Latino workers, undocumented persons, and un-usually low-wage workers.

And, so, today, I am introducing Introduction
1117, which would require the Department of Consumer

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and Worker Protection to develop information

regarding prevention of wage theft, and require

construction sites to post information on how to file

wage theft complaints to the State Department of

Labor and the New York State Attorney General - and

to do so in multiple languages.

Introduction 1117 builds on recently passed state legislation that strengthens wage theft protections by ensuring workers are made aware of their rights -- how exactly they can file complaints with the State Department of Labor and the New York State Attorney General.

With this, I just urge you all to join in this legislation to protect our construction workers, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we will now go to Council Member Hanks.

COUNCIL MEMBER HANKS: Thank you, Majority Leader Powers.

I am proud to be a co-prime sponsor of

Introduction 1098, which is being introduced today
with my fabulous colleague, Council Member Shaun

Abreu, along with others.

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This bill will make meaningful strives in keeping our community safe by developing and distributing materials about the risks of keeping a gun in the home, and gun buyback programs, and best practices protocols for maintaining safety.

As the Chair on The Committee on Public Safety, saving lives is my priority, and I am confident this bill in fact help save the lives of our City, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. I want to call on Council Member Velázquez.

COUNCIL MEMBER VELÁZQUEZ: Thank you, Mr. Majority Leader.

I would like to ask for unanimous consent to be able to vote on all items on today's agenda?
