Good morning, everyone. My name is Nantasha Williams,
and I serve as Chair to the Committee on Civil and
Human Rights.

I'd like to thank my Colleagues for joining me today for the vote on Proposed Resolution number 296-A sponsored by Council Member Althea Stevens. This resolution calls on the Governor to sign Senate bill 4266-A, Assembly bill 5088-A, which establishes a task force on missing women and girls

who are black, indigenous, and people of color, also known as BIPOC.

According to the National Crime Information Center, there are about 270,000 women and girls listed as missing in the United States in 2022. About 98 percent of these women and girls are black despite only making up about 14 percent of the overall population. Historical trauma, systematic racism, sexism, racial stereotyping, and sexual objectification of BIPOC women and girls have all contributed to the disparities in missing persons. These injustices are often further compounded by poverty, homelessness, child welfare involvement, domestic violence, sex trafficking, and fear of law enforcement. While the Senate bills and Assembly bills are critical to advance equity throughout New York State, it is particularly relevant for New York City. In the City, people of color make up nearly 70 percent of the population. This proportion is 1.5 times higher than for the State as a whole. New York City is also home to the highest number of indigenous Americans in the country, and the metropolitan area is home to the largest immigrant population nationwide.

The task force on missing BIPOC women and girls would work to create policy change in New York State aimed at addressing the lack of care and concern over the missing women and girls who are BIPOC and would also mobilize resources to raise awareness and provide training within BIPOC communities to prevent and respond to missing BIPOC women and girls.

I applaud my Colleagues in Albany for passing this crucial legislation and urge the Governor to sign as soon as possible.

As always, I'd like to thank Committee Staff and my Staff for their work leading up to this vote.
