18	pieces of legislation, Proposed Introduction number
19	687-A sponsored by Majority Leader Powers and

Proposed Introduction number 968 sponsored by Council Member Narcisse.

 - I am proud to be a sponsor on both of these bills. Yesterday, I joined the Mayor and the Health Commissioner to announce the launch of Healthy NYC, a new campaign to increase New Yorkers' life expectancy by 2030. It is unquestionable that these bills will help us move towards achieving those goals.

Introduction 687-A will require chain restaurants to post added-sugar icons and warning statements next to menu boards, menus, and on or near food items on display that exceed a specified level of added sugars. According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, eating and drinking too much sugar can lead to health problems such as weight gain and obesity, type 2 diabetes, and heart disease. I would like to invite Majority Leader Powers to make a brief statement on his bill.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you to

Chair Schulman and thank you for your support. Good

morning and thank you for letting me give a brief

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statement on Intro. 687-A, the Sweet Truth Act, which the Committee is voting on here today. I'll keep my remarks short and sweet.

(INAUDIBLE) bill to help New Yorkers make dietary decisions and lead healthier lives. With diabetes and heart disease claiming far too many lives each year, the Sweet Truth Act is a necessary step to inform New Yorkers about the added sugar they're consuming when they eat out at large chain restaurants. Research has shown that about one New York City resident dies every 90 minutes from diabetes-related causes. With November marking Diabetes Awareness Month, there couldn't be a better time for the City Council to take this important step forward to address this national epidemic.

The Sweet Truth Act builds on a law that we passed last term requiring chain restaurants in New York City to post a sugar warning icon on the menu next to all items that exceed the FDA recommended daily value for added sugar. Just as we've been accustomed to seeing calories, sodium warnings, and other nutritional information when we're ordering food, this bill will raise awareness

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about added sugar so we can better regulate our
intake.

I want to thank my partners in this

legislation including Chair Schulman and all the

Health Committee Staff, Manhattan Borough President

Mark Levine who spearheaded this issue last term, and

my 37 Colleagues who have signed on as co-sponsors. I

want to thank the advocates who have supported this

legislation, particularly the Center for Science in

the Public Interest who are here today, the

Interfaith Public Health Network, Korean Community

Services for Metropolitan New York, Gambian Youth

Association, and the Association of Senegalese of

America.

All of us deserve to know what's really in our food so we can keep ourselves and our families healthy. I think today is a big step to make sure that when we talk about sugar we're giving New Yorkers a better opportunity to regulate and eat healthier.

Thank you, again, and I look forward to passing this important legislation.
