SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Check one, two. This is

CHAIRPERSON MENIN: [GAVEL] Good morning.

I'm Council Member Julie Menin, Chair of the

Committee of Small Business, and I thank you for

joining today's Small Business hearing vote on three

bills, which are my bills, Proposed Introduction 845
A and 1083-A and Proposed Resolution 243-A.

I really want to thank my Council

Colleagues for joining us here today. We've been

joined by Majority Whip Selvena Brooks-Powers,

Council Member Sandra Ung, Council Member Marjorie

Velázquez, Council Member Darlene Mealy who is

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joining us virtually, and we've got other Colleagues who will be here shortly.

New York City small businesses are integral to the landscape of our city. Our small businesses contribute to the vibrancy and uniqueness that make New York City so special. Over the last three years, we've seen that these small businesses struggle in response to the COVID pandemic. Reports show that since the beginning of the pandemic almost 26,000 small businesses were forced to shut down permanently. In response to the financial hardships from the pandemic, businesses had to draw on a range of resources, including government programs as well as private loans and cash advances. However, in some of these cases, predatory lenders embedded a confession of judgement in their contracts, which when attached to a business loan deprives borrowers of their right to due process. This allows lenders to obtain judgements without court approval. New York State has proposed legislation to ban the use of confessions of judgement in business loans in New York, and my bill, Proposed Resolution 243-A, calls for the State Legislature to pass these measures.

2	In addition, my bill, Proposed Intro.
3	845-A, would build on previous efforts to reform
4	burdensome penalties. In 2021, Local Law 80
5	effectively reduced regulatory burdens and compliance
6	costs by eliminating penalties for certain first-time
7	violations and creating an opportunity to fix or cure
8	these violations before being charged a fine, also
9	known as the cure period. Subsequently, Mayor Adams
10	issued Executive Order 2 to further review compliance
11	costs and burdens to small businesses. The resulting
12	recommendations for reform extend across multiple
13	City agencies including Department of Consumer and
14	Worker Protection, the Department of Health and
15	Mental Hygiene, Department of Environmental
16	Protection, and Sanitation. These recommendations
17	which include penalty reductions for certain
18	violations and new opportunities to cure violations
19	have been brought together in my bill, Proposed
20	Intro. 845-A. Small businesses are vital to New York
21	City's world-renown nightlife. However, the nightlife
22	industry faces a uniquely complex regulatory
23	environment. As a result, in 2017, the Office of
24	Nightlife was established in the Mayor's Office of
25	Media and Entertainment, otherwise known as MOME, to

support these businesses' ability to comply with
government requirements and foster positive
relationships with residents. Under my tenure as
Commissioner of MOME, I was proud to create the
Office of Nightlife and hire the City's first Night
Mayor, which took inspiration from visits to other
cities like Amsterdam that have their own night
mayor. As the Office of Nightlife continues to
support the nightlife industry, it has increased its
collaboration with the Department of Small Business
Services, which has helped it to deliver increased
services to their constituents. SBS has been a vital
resource for the small businesses in our city,
especially post-pandemic, and nightlife
establishments deserve the same access and support as
other small businesses. SBS is therefore particularly
well-suited to support the needs and growth of the
Office of Nightlife. My bill, Proposed Intro. 1083-A
recognizes the resources provided by SBS for small
businesses and would move the Office of Nightlife
from MOME to SBS.
