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SERGEANT AT ARMS: Good morning, good morning,
this is mic check. This is mic check on today's
Committee vote on Finance in the Committee Room,
recorded by Walter Lewis.

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Good morning and welcome to the New York City Council Hearing of the Committee on Finance. At this time, can everybody please silence your cell phones. If you wish to testify, please come up to the Sergeants desk to fill out a testimony slip. Thank you for your cooperation, Chair we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON BRANNAN: Thank you Sergeant.

[GAVEL] Okay, good morning. Welcome to today's

Finance Committee Meeting. I'm Councilman Justin

Brannan, I have the privilege of Chairing the

Committee on Finance. We've been joined this morning

by Council Members Louis, Barron, Ossè, Sanchez,

Carr, Hanks, Won, Ayala, and Farias. Moya is on

Zoom. Brooks-Powers is also here. Today, the

Committee will be hearing and voting on five items:

Intro. 1070A; two Article 11 Tax Exemptions and

Intro. 1209 and 1210.

We'll start with Intro. 1070A sponsored by
Council Member Gutiérrez would reinstate the biotech

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tax credit against the city's unincorporated business tax, general corporation tax and corporate tax of 2015 capped out nearly \$3 million for a period from January 1, 2023 through January 1, 2026.

Next the First Article 11 Resolution is for a full 40-year exemption for three buildings in Council Member Salamanca's district. The exemption would allow for rehab and energy efficiency upgrades to the buildings and it will place the buildings under an HPD regulatory agreement setting rent and income restrictions as well as reserve 15 percent of the units for homeless referrals.

The second Article 11 Resolution is for a full 40 year exemption for six buildings in Council Member Richardson Jordans district. The exemption would allow for rehab of the buildings and place the buildings under an HPD regulatory agreement setting rent and income restrictions, reserve 10 percent of the units for homeless referrals and impose HPD's Aging in Place Initiative.

Finally, Intro 1209 would amend the district plan of the Westchester Square Business Improvement

District to allow for a change in the assessment methods of the BIDs District charge. The change

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would require the BID to more equitably access properties based on linear frontage along the main retail, commercial, and professional side of the property as opposed to assessing the property based on the longest frontage overall. The authorized budget for the BID would remain unchanged.

And lastly, Intro. 1210 would authorize four BIDs to increase the amounts they expend annually to the amounts as follows: the Village Alliance BID to \$1,900,000; Brighton Beach BID to \$300,000; Fordham Road Bid to \$1.5 million; and the Meatpacking Area BID to \$6.2 million.

The Council previously approved Resolutions 807 and 808 on October 19, setting today as the date for a public hearing on these two items. The Amendment and the budget increases have been requested by the property owners within the boundaries of each BID and would be used to enhance the services provided.

The details about which BID would see increases and the amount sought are set forth in the briefing documents prepared by the Finance staff. To adopt this, we must make sure that proper notice was given and that the increase in annual amounts to be expended are in the public interest and that the tax

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and debt limits prescribed in the law will not be exceeded.

Deputy Commissioner Calvin Brown from SBS is here to testify regarding the requested assessment increases and representatives from the two BIDs are here to answer any questions that my colleagues may have. I'll now turn it over to Committee Counsel to swear in Deputy Commissioner Brown.

COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Good morning. Raise your right hand please. Do you affirm that your testimony will be truthful to the best of your knowledge, information and belief, and that you will respond honestly to Council Member questions? Deputy Commissioner Brown?

CALVIN BROWN: I do.

COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Thank you, you may begin.

CALVIN BROWN: Thank you. Good morning Chair
Brannan and members of the Finance Committee. I'm
Calvin T. Brown, the Deputy Commissioner for
Neighborhood Development at the Department of Small
Business Services.

I'm joined today by Leslie Velazquez, the
Director of the BID Development and Legislation and
members of my team. I wish to express our support

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for the laws provided and increase in amount to be expended in the four business improvement districts, often referred to as BIDs and authorizing the amendment of the district plan for the Westchester Square BID. At SBS, we are working hard to open up the doors for New Yorkers across the five boroughs focusing on creating stronger businesses, connecting New Yorkers to good jobs and fostering thriving neighborhoods.

We oversee and support the city's network of business improvement districts and groups who wish to form new BIDs in their communities. We believe BIDs are central to these efforts as valuable, improving partners in fostering of the vitality of the city's, neighborhoods and commercial districts.

The Mayor's Economic Blueprint also place BIDs front and center in several initiatives to rebuild and reinvent our commercial corridors and central business districts.

Part of our role in overseeing and supporting the existing network of 70 plus BIDs, includes guiding them through the legislative process, including increasing their assessment caps and amendments to their district plans. To propose an assessment

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increase or an amendment to a district plan, BIDs must complete a multistep review process that is overseen by SBS.

The BID Board of Directors which includes local property owners, merchant and residents as well as representatives from the City Comptroller's Office, Borough President, City Council and SBS must review and approve and propose assessed increasements or plan amendments.

For assessment increases, SBS requires all bids to submit a five part justification outlining how the increase will be allocated minutes from the board meeting, when the increase was approved and letters of support from all the City Council members represented in the BIDs boundaries. SBS then reviews these justifications and determines whether they are sufficient to bring to City Council.

The District Plan Amendment goes through a similar process plus an additional requirement to host a public meeting to present the plan and allow stakeholders to comment. As required by law, each of the five BIDs published a notice of this public hearing at least once in a local newspaper having general circulation in their districts, specifying

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the time, place in today's hearing and stating the change to the assessment or the district plan.

It is priority of SBS that assessment increases proposes focus on enhancing programs and services provided to the district. The four BIDs proposed and assessment increases are doing so to address vital needs and changing conditions on the ground. The increases will further expand, reinforce and strengthen core services currently provided in the business district including funds for additional streetscape improvements, open street programming, new public events and added staff capacity.

Additionally, portions of these increases will be used to sustain or increase the current levels of sanitation and public safety programs and services impacted by the rising cost related to inflation and minimum wage increases.

The proposed increases vary according to the BID size, district size and proposed changes in programs and services. The proposed increases are Brighton Beach Avenue BID from \$220,000 to \$300,000, Fordham Road BID from \$1,010,0000 to \$1,510,000. The Meatpacking Area BID from \$3,200,000 to \$6,200,000 and the Village Alliance BID from \$1,400,000 to

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\$1,900,000. A district plan amendment is most often used to revise the assessment formula to more equitably assess the properties within a district.

The proposed Westchester Square District Plan

Amendment will provide additional details to the

assessment formula which will address any ambiguity

about the assessment for corner properties.

Currently, the corner properties are assessed based

on the length of the longer side of the building.

This proposed law will amend the method of assessment

to clarify that corner properties should be assessed

based on the linear frontage of one of the main

retail commercial or professional side of the

property.

The Amendment also increases the base fee of the corner properties with commercial uses that are above grade level from \$300 to \$500. This amended method of assessment is more equitable because it is based on the length of the commercial frontage, rather than the longest linear frontage.

Representatives from each of the BIDs, requesting
City Council Finance Committee approval for their
legislative changes are present to answer any
questions pertaining to their specific requests.

Council Members Powers, Hudson and Stevens. Do we have any questions from any of my colleagues? Okay, alright, thank you Commissioner.

CALVIN BROWN: Thank you.
