CHAIRPERSON OSSÉ: Good morning. I am New York City Council Member Chi Ossé, Chair of the Committee on Cultural Affairs, Libraries and International Intergroup Relations. My pronouns are he/him/his.

Today, the Committee will both vote and hear on one piece of legislation as well as a vote on two additional pieces of legislation.

We will both hear and vote on Reso.

number 813 sponsored by Council Member Amanda Farías,
a resolution recognizing April 13th annually as

Borinqueneers Day in the City of New York in honor of
the courage and wartime contributions of the U.S.

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Army 65th Infantry Regiment and their lasting legacy, and we will also vote on Proposed Intro. number 1184-A, sponsored by myself, a Local Law to amend the New York City Charter in relation to requiring the Commissioner of Cultural Affairs to report annually on Department funding of art and cultural organizations and institutions and Reso. number 586 sponsored by Council Member Nantasha Williams, a resolution designating May 10th annually as National Pan-Hellenic Council Day in the City of New York to recognize the contributions made to social change by members of nine black sororities and fraternities known as the Divine Nine.

Now, I would like to welcome Council

Member Farías to provide remarks on her legislation
on Borinqueneers Day, which the Committee is hearing
for the first time today. Council Member Farías.

COUNCIL MEMBER FARÍAS: Good morning and thank you for that pronunciation, Chair Ossé. The acknowledgement of the Borinqueneers in New York City is a vital recognition of the contributions and sacrifices made by this distinguished group of Puerto Rican soldiers. The Borinqueneers, the 65th Regiment of the United States Army, played a significant role

2 in various conflicts including the Korean War,

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demonstrating courage, valor, and patriotism.

Recognizing the Borinqueneers in New York City is a

5 powerful affirmation of the Puerto Rican community's

6 historical role in defending and upholding the values

7 of the United States. By acknowledging their service,

8 New York City not only pays homage to the bravery of

9 these soldiers but also honors the broader Puerto

10 Rican heritage woven into the City's cultural fabric

11 | through the passage of Resolution 813. We are showing

12 as a City a deep appreciation for the diversity and

13 contributions of different communities, enriching the

14 | City's narrative and promoting inclusivity.

15 | Furthermore, it serves as a reminder of the shared

16 | history and the collective commitment to freedom and

17 | justice emphasizing the importance of preserving and

18 | commemorating the stories of those who have served

19 and sacrificed for the greater good.

Thank you to the hard work of our bill drafter, Regina Paul, and my Deputy Chief-of-Staff, Rebecca Nieves, and to all my co-prime sponsors and everyone else that signed on to support. I encourage my Colleagues to vote yes in support of this bill.

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CHAIRPERSON OSSÉ: Thank you, Council

Member Farías, and my apologies to the Puerto Rican
community.

This Committee heard the original version of Proposed Intro. number 1184-A and Reso. number 568 at our hearing on September 26, 2023. At that time, in relation to my bill, I said that I was particularly concerned about public reporting on the distribution of DCLA's Cultural Development Fund grants disaggregated by geographic area and characteristics of the organizations being funded. This bill would require DCLA's annual report to include the Council District, ZIP code, and Community Board for each organization being funded. Since being heard, this bill was amended to require the Commissioner to report demographic information pertaining to the communities served by Departmentfunded arts and cultural organizations. Such information would include race/ethnicity, age, disability status, and sexual orientation. If known to the Department, additionally, the Commissioner would be required to report demographic information pertaining to the leaders of such organizations if disclosed to the Department for purposes of the

report. This report will bring more transparency and insight into the CDF process, a grant that many of our cultural organizations rely on. By having more transparency with the reporting, we will be more equipped to advocate for our cultural community and see how effective reforms are.

I want to thank the entire cultural community for their advocacy on this legislation, which started before my time in the Council. I especially want to thank Lucy Sexton the community at Culture at 3 for helping us shape this legislation to what it is today.

Finally, I would like to thank my Staff as well as the Committee Staff and others who worked on preparing this legislation including Naomi

Hopkins, my Chief-of-Staff, and proud member of Delta

Sigma Theta; May Vutrapongvatana, my Budget and

Policy Director; Christina Yellamaty, Legislative

Counsel to the Committee who negotiated and amended the bill, thank you, Christina; Regina Paul,

Legislative Policy Analyst to the Committee who drafted the two resolutions; and Sandra Gray, our

Financial Analyst.
