SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning and welcome to the New York City Council vote of the Committee on Civil and Human Rights.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON WILLIAMS: [GAVEL] Good morning, everyone. My name is Nantasha Williams, and I serve as Chair to the Committee on Civil and Human Rights.

I'd like to thank my Colleagues for joining me for today's vote on Proposed Intro. 1101-A sponsored by Council Member Amanda Farías and Proposed Intro. 1118-A sponsored by myself.

Intro. 1101-A would require the Chief
Equity Office in consultation with key stakeholders
to create an anti-racism training for employees of
human service contractors who deliver essential

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2 services to various communities on behalf of the
3 City.

Intro. 1118-A would require the

Department of Citywide Administrative Services in

consultation with the Office of Racial Equity and the

Commission on Human Rights to create an anti-racism

and anti-racial discrimination training for City

agency employees including agency interns,

independent contractors, and volunteers.

Dismantling the longstanding systems of oppression that perpetuate discrimination and racial inequity is a long-term battle, and one of the best tools we have at our disposal is education. As Chair of this Committee and a prime sponsor of one of the bills we are voting on today, I am proud that these bills aimed at educating and training the City's workforce will be able to aid in our ongoing work toward creating a safer and more equitable environment for all New Yorkers.

As always, I'd like to thank my wonderful Committee Staff, my personal Staff in my District Office for their work leading up to this vote.

I will now turn over to Council Member Farías for some remarks on her bill.

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2 COUNCIL MEMBER FARÍAS: Thank you, Chair 3 Williams.

Anti-racism training is of paramount importance for human service contractors as it addresses systematic inequities and ensures a more just and inclusive provision of services. Human service professionals frequently engage with individuals from various racial and ethnic backgrounds, making it imperative to dismantle ingrained biases that may perpetuate discrimination, especially here in New York City. Anti-racism training equips contractors with the knowledge and tools to recognize, challenge, and actively combat racism within their organizations and service delivery. By fostering a deep understanding of the historical and structural aspects of racism, professionals can work towards dismantling discriminatory practices, advocating for equitable policies, and promoting culturally competent care. This is the much-needed approach we need for our community members day in and day out. The work we're trying to accomplish with my bill, Intro. 1101-A, and Chair Williams' bill, Intro. 1118-A, is to ensure the essential part of creating environments that are

2 | welcoming and supportive for all clients, regardless

3 of their racial or ethnic backgrounds. It goes beyond

4 individual awareness to instigate systematic change.

5 Ensuring that services are not only free from

6 prejudice but actively contribute to dismantling

7 racial disparities. Anti-racism training is a crucial

8 step for human service contractors and their

9 commitment to promoting social justice, eliminating

10 racial inequalities, and fostering a more inclusive

11 and equitable society.

I would be remiss to end with a thank you to all the hard work from our advocates who wanted their work around anti-racism and bias training to be expanded throughout a sector. We in this Council appreciate the example that has been previously set.

Thank you to my bill drafter, Jessica

Boulet; my Deputy Chief-of-Staff, Rebecca Nieves; and

Chair Nantasha Williams for working on this with me

and our Juneteenth bill package, and I urge my

Colleagues to vote yes. Thank you.
