SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: This is a microphone check for the Committee on Parks and Recreation, recorded in the Committee Room on December 20, 2023, by Layla Lynch.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning and welcome to the Committee on Parks and Recreation.

At this time, we ask that you please place phones on vibrate or silent mode. Thank you.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON KRISHNAN: Thank you so much,
Sergeant. Good morning, everyone. I am Shekar
Krishnan, Chair of the Committee on Parks and
Recreation. It's so nice to see you all today.

Today the Parks Committee will vote on a pre-considered bill that would ceremonially name 117 thoroughfares and public places throughout the City of New York.

As I always say, the street namings that we don't simply co-name a street, but they permanently change the landscape of New York City to reflect people who have left a lasting imprint and legacy in our lives, in our communities, and in our city. I'm also proud to be joined today by my Colleagues on the Committee for this vote, and they

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Of the many honorees proposed by this piece of legislation, I'd like to call attention to a couple of co-names that I'm proud to have sponsored. My first nomination is to co-name 26 blocks in Jackson Heights in my District on 34th Avenue Open Street, known as Paseo Park. As I've noted many times, my District ranks second to last, and after redistricting, possibly last, in the amount of park space or green open space per person in New York City. This was unfortunately highlighted to our community during the height of COVID pandemic where my District with Elmhurst Hospital was the epicenter of the epicenter of the pandemic across the country. This drove our community, in conjunction with the Department of Transportation, to transform 34th Avenue between 69th Street and 93rd Street as an open street, and I know I'm biased, but I believe it is the best open street in all of New York City, certainly the longest. It brings our communities

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together, where children walk every single day, my own included, to school, thousands of children, at drop off time, at pick up in the afternoon, where seniors come together to sip coffee and talk, where we have dance performances, and so many cultural celebrations. Our 34th Avenue Open Street, now also known as Paseo Park, has been a lifeline for our community, a vibrant network of safe, open spaces, and now, with six schools, six car-free pedestrian plazas in front of each school where our students go to play for recess or during their morning drop off time. Its name, 34th Avenue Open Street Paseo Park is meant to acknowledge the diverse immigrant communities that line the open street while also evoking the new purpose of the street space. Paseo in Spanish means stroll. The result has been that the establishment of Paseo Park has drastically increased neighborhood wide access to public green space where it is sorely needed. It is beloved in our community and has brought us together in a way that we never could have imagined. Today, renaming its 26 blocks as Paseo Park provides a crucial opportunity to honor and celebrate the work that we are doing in Jackson Heights with our 34th Avenue Open Street Coalition

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with the Alliance for Paseo Park to transform and create a linear park in our neighborhood.

Murphy, who advocated for more green space in Jackson Heights. Lawrence played a crucial role in establishing the Jackson Heights Green Alliance, which focused on creating and maintaining public open spaces and green areas. Some of his efforts resulted in Traverse Park being expanded, the only park that we have in Jackson Heights, the Grow a Park campaign successfully turning private school land originally into public parkland and dramatically increasing our park space in our community. Lawrence Murphy's work, both with Traverse Park, also helped to pave the way for the effort now to create Paseo Park 34th Avenue Open Street.

Lastly, Gerard Neufeld was a beloved member of our community in Elmhurst who ran funeral services in the 1940s and provided his services to help the families of the young servicemen and women who died in World War II to give them proper burials. His community work also extended to founding the Newtown Civic Association, the Elmhurst Chamber of Commerce, and the Elmhurst Lions Club. It's an honor

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I'd like to welcome all who have come to participate in this hearing, and I urge all of my Colleagues to vote in favor of the legislation before us. Thank you all so much.

I'd like to also acknowledge that we've been joined by Council Member Lincoln Ressler, late but still here, and Council Member Carr as well, who is on time. This is coming from me who is late to everything, made the admission, but I was on time today, so I'll take it.

Now it's an honor, we are joined today by two individuals in particular who will testify in a bit, provide meaningful testimony about one of our street namings happening in Brooklyn. Before we welcome them, I'd like to turn it over to our Colleague, our dear Colleague, Council Member Rita Joseph, to talk about the street naming in particular in her District.

COUNCIL MEMBER JOSEPH: Thank you, Chair, and good morning, all.

I'm going to talk a little bit about Duane Joseph. The street co-naming will serve as a

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lasting testimony to his legacy and reminders of the values he held dear so Parkside Plaza will be co named Duane Joseph Plaza in honor of Duane Joseph. It will stand as a beacon of unity, compassion, and community service. It will be a place where we can come together just as Duane would have wanted to celebrate our shared history and build a brighter future. Rest in peace, my dear friend. You will forever be cherished, part of our community, and your legacy will continue to shine brightly here at Parkside Plaza will be co-named in honor of Duane.

I have his widow here and his dad. Thank you for being here and thank you for sharing Duane with us, and it'll be an honor to co-name Parkside Plaza after he fought so many years to get that plaza into the District. Thank you for sharing. Thank you for him being my brother, my friend, my counselor when I needed him, and his favorite language was always saying, Council Member, don't let them punk you so I know not to be a punk, and it is because of him I have the strength and courage to lead my District as well. So thank you, Chair.

CHAIRPERSON KRISHNAN: Thank you so much, Council Member Joseph.

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With that, I'd like to call up for testimony Caroline Davis Joseph and Claxton Joseph.

CAROLINE DAVIS JOSEPH: Good morning, all. It is a pleasure. Thank you for having myself and my bonus dad, Mr. Claxton Joseph. My name is proudly with great honor, Caroline Davis Joseph, and if I could share anything of why this is so important. As a Bronx girl, my husband was definitely a king from Kings County, and I don't say that just because he was my husband, but the idea of equity and making sure that the Park Plaza represented every individual of Brooklyn and he not only participated in the community for the sake of titles or recognition, it was actually who my husband was. In fact, he'd probably be a little annoyed that we're actually here wanting to have his legacy as a street name because he liked being in the background. Because we were married only for a short six months, we didn't have the opportunity to have children yet, this is so powerful because it allows his legacy to live on, but it also allows the Joseph family name to live on. With that definitely, I hope that you would definitely understand how meaningful this is and what this means to not just us as a family, but as the

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to my dear dad.

Brooklyn community, see I'm used to saying the Bronx, as a Brooklyn community but even overall in New York City, because he was a big black man that not only represented the positive that's not shown in our society, but he walked it. That was who he was as an individual, and he never looked for any recognition. That's just who he was. So with that, I'll set aside

CLAXTON JOSEPH: Good morning. My name is Claxton Joseph, Duane's dad. It's an honor for me to be here today in the midst of you all. 45 years ago, I never thought that a situation like this would come up. That's 45 years that Duane has been around. Duane came to the United States when he was 13 years old, just about 13 years old, and I never knew at that time that situations like this would develop. Fast forward, Duane has grown to be a gentle giant. In stature, he was a giant. Attitude, gentle, and painstaking. He has done so much in the community that I, even I, was unaware of until the celebration of his life service. I must say how pleased I am today to be here to accept the honor of whatever is given to him on behalf of the Joseph family, I thank you and I appreciate every one of you for what
