SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning and welcome to the New York City Council's vote on Transportation and Infrastructure.

At this time, we ask that you silence all electronic devices.

At no time is anyone to approach the dais.

Chair, we're ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON BROOKS-POWERS: [GAVEL] Good morning and welcome to this hearing of the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure. I am Selvena Brooks-Powers, the Chair of this Committee.

Today, we will be voting on Introduction

172 sponsored by Majority Leader Amanda Farías, a

local law in relation to the compensation received by

for-hire vehicle drivers for advertising on the

interior of for-hire vehicles. This bill would amend

Local Law 33 of 2024 which we passed last session and

would clarify that any driver of a for-hire vehicle

with an approved tablet in their vehicle would

receive a minimum of 25 percent of the gross revenue

COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE 3 generated by such tablet in their vehicle. It also would set the fee for the interior advertising company license at 500 dollars.

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I will now allow Majority Leader Farías to speak on her bill.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you, Chair. As many of us can imagine, driving a rideshare vehicle is a tough job. It often requires 10-or-morehour days going back and forth between some of the furthest and busiest corners of our city and, even still, a lot of drivers are not bringing home the profits they need to support their families and build the intergenerational wealth that our hard-working families in New York City deserve. New York City is home to roughly 100,000 rideshare drivers, and our rideshare economy has continuously provided a huge opportunity for working-class and immigrant communities to have financial stability and upward economic mobility. That's why we passed Local Law 33 to allow for drivers to opt in to interior advertising in for-hire vehicles, providing drivers with an opportunity to earn a passive income from advertisements and still allowing customers to mute or turn off the tablet, play games, connect with our

drivers, and see local businesses on their screen.
That is about allowing for more money for hard-
working drivers and creating a bridge between the
driver and New Yorkers through personalized questions
to learn more about our drivers. This amendment we're
passing today makes a very important clarification
that drivers would receive a minimum, and let me say
that again, a minimum of 25 percent of the gross
revenue generated from the in-car advertising. Adding
the word minimum language will encourage competition
among tablet providers and rideshare companies that
would benefit drivers directly. Adding gross revenue
language is to ensure that drivers receive their
share of the overall revenue and any administrative
costs are not borne by the drivers. So many New
Yorkers depend on our drivers daily to get them
around our city safely. It is about time we show up
for them and expand the opportunities they have to
generate more income for themselves. This bill puts
New York City rideshare drivers first, and ${\tt I'm}$
incredibly proud to have gotten this done for drivers
across the city. Thank you for the time, Chair.
