2	CHAIRPERSON MARK-VIVERITO: We	
3	project this hearing will be quite quick, but good	
4	afternoon, everybody. I'm Council Member Melissa	
5	Mark-Viverito, Chair of the Committee on Parks and

LO	thoroughfares and public places throughout the	
11	city of New York, and if there is anyone that is	
12	here to speak on any of the street namings, we	
13	would ask that you speak now or let us know that	
L4	you are going to speak. You would have to sign	
15	in, but we can have you do that afterwards if you	
L6	want to get up on the table-yes, and after we hear	
L7	from the public on any of these, then we would ask	
L8	any colleagues that want to speak to any of the	
L9	street namings that they could do so. So with	
20	that, if you would like to-I think you have to	
21	turn on the mic. It's behind. Yes. There's a

FRANK CARUCCI: [Interposing] Yeah,
hi. My name is Frank Carucci, former vice

president for the United Federation of Teachers

and now in a different capacity, long term

president of La MaMa Experimental Theatre Club on

East 4th Street. I'd like to speak, if I may, on
the renaming of East 4th Street for Ellen Stewart,

the founder and artistic director of La MaMa.

Okay. I guess many people know of Ellen and her work internationally with theatre groups, bringing people together, young people, new artists, giving them opportunities to create, but I want to talk about her involvement with the community. It was in the late '60s that my college drama teacher brought me to La MaMa, when they opened at 74 East 4th Street. My experiences ever since watching that community change and grow from an area that you would be afraid to walk around in the '60s and '70s to a flourishing community now filled with people, artists, restaurants, other theatre groups—I call East 4th Street the 42nd Street of off off Broadway because there's so many theatres working there now. Ellen

was a visionary. She found two buildings on that street that she saved that might have been ripped down. One of them has since been landmarked, but she has used those buildings to help with the community. We've had wedding receptions there. We've had memorial receptions, and of course, we do shows every night of the week—three or four a day, sometimes ten or twelve different productions going on—again, many of them with international companies, bringing new cultures and new ethnic groups to La MaMa and to the street. We are planning a block party on Sunday, October 16th, which is the actual 50th anniversary of the founding of La MaMa, and we're hoping to rename the street for Ellen Stewart, the founder.

Ellen died on October 13th this year, and I have to tell you, we had the most beautiful funeral mass at St. Patrick's Cathedral on Martin Luther King Day, but the actual wake was held at the Church of the Nativity on 2nd Avenue, right around the corner from La MaMa, so that the community and people would have an opportunity to visit. I think you will find that her reputation and her popularity walking around that

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neighborhoodeverybody would pop out from	
windows, from stores to say and greet her. So I	
think she's a beloved personality and certainly	
has done so much to make that community what it i	s
today. I don't if you have a question or-I just	
feel that's my passionate words on her behalf.	

CHAIRPERSON MARK-VIVERITO: I want to thank you for taking the time to come down to speak on behalf of this street naming. I know that my colleague, Rosie Mendez, who introduced this, is here. I just want to recognize my colleagues on the Parks and Recreation Committee that have joined us. We've got Danny Dromm. We also have Council Member Jimmy Van Bramer, and I know that Council Member Rosie Mendez is joining us to speak on behalf of this street naming, so colleague Mendez, if you would like to say a few words...

COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Thank you,

Madam Chair, and if I could speak on another

street co-naming just slightly outside my district
after this?

CHAIRPERSON MARK-VIVERITO: Of course.

On another matter, I always forget because our districts are so close—I want to talk in support of Harry Wieder Way, which is just slightly outside my district in Council Member Margaret Chin's district; however, Harry Wieder was my appointee to Community Board 6 and Margarita's appointee to Community Board 3 during my tenure and during Margarita's tenure. Harry was a renowned gay rights and disability activist. He was a man of short stature, but great heart.

great thing and would also help keep 4th Arts Block

alive and well on 4th Street.

It was pretty incredible to be out with Harry in
the street because inevitably, when we would be
campaigning on some issue, kids would stare and he
would engage the kids in a conversation and say,
"Yes, I'm a small adult" and he would help get
kids over their curiosity or any prejudices and he
was tragically run down by a taxi cab when he was
leaving a Community Board 3 meeting approximately
a year ago. To my good friend and a great
activist, Harry Wieder, it would be wonderful to
rename the street-it's on Forsyth Street where he
lived, and we look forward to that. Thank you,
Madam Chair and thank you, Frank, for coming here
today and speaking on behalf of Ellen Stewart Way-
FRANK CARUCCI: [Interposing] Thank
you all. I appreciate the opportunity.
CHAIRPERSON MARK-VIVERITO: Thank
you, Council Member Mendez. I know we have been

you, Council Member Mendez. I know we have been joined by someone else from the audience who does want to speak on one of the street namings... Okay, Tracy Steward, when they return, we will get them to speak. I know that Council Member Jimmy Van Bramer had a statement he wanted to make.

COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: Thank

you very much, Madam Chair. First, I wanted to encourage my colleagues to support Winged Fist Way in my district, which is going to honor the Irish American Athletic Club, which was founded there and operated there for many, many years, and it has been a terrific effort on the part of Ian McGowan and some terrific folks in my district to have that history recognized where the Celtic apartment complexes now reside, and I'm proud to sponsor this legislation and look forward to it being passed and unveiling that street sign.

And then I also just wanted to say because many of us knew Harry Wieder up here, and I know Council Member Dromm feels the same way, Harry was a very, very special person. I knew him for a very long time. He came to my 30th birthday party a long time ago. He was a lot of fun. He used the Queens Library all the time 'cause even though he lived and did much of his activism in Manhattan, his parents lived in Queens and so he was always at the Central Library in Jamaica and I would see him often just using the computers when I was working at the Queens Library. I'm so happy this is happening for him.

And then I also just wanted to—if it's alright with you—because Councilwoman and Chair Melissa Mark-Viverito is honoring Phil Reed, who I was friends with and admire and is one of the two openly gay men serving in the City Council now. Phil Reed was one of the few openly gay Council Members back in the day, and he did so much for so many people. He was really, really funny and always supported me, so I want to thank the Chair for honoring Phil Reed in that way. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you for those words and I am the Council Member that came after Phil Reed, and obviously, he is very loved in the community, and so this was a way of being supportive of what the community had put forth, which is to name a street in the district that he represented for so many years in honor of the work and commitment that he gave. I was enjoying Council Member Dromm's street naming—that looks like the letters of the Scrabble game, so I don't know if you wanted to say a few words, Council Member?

COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: Thank you.

I wasn't really going to say anything, but yes,
Scrabble was invented in Jackson Heights, and we
had a sign up there, but it was not properly
placed in the past, but this time around it will
be. The number designations after the letters are
indicative of the value of each letter in the game
of Scrabble, so we thought that would be something
very nice for the community to have and to
recognize part of the history of Jackson Heights,
and in particular, the corner on which that's
going to be placed is the Community Methodist
Church, which also has a very long history in the
community.

Also, I have another street naming in for Richard Cecere. He was a very close friend of mine and the founder of one of my democratic clubs, and the chair of Community Board 3. He passed away at a very early age—very sad disease, a type of cancer that's very, very rare. He was totally involved and dedicated to Community Board 3, in particular, to Jackson Heights as well. It's a pleasure to be able to have that introduced at this time. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON MARK-VIVERITO: Thank

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you, Council Member Dromm. We've been joined by
Council Member Vacca and Council Member Crowley.

Is Tracy Steward here? You wanted to speak on one
of the street namings, correct? If you could sit
at the table, please... Once you sit down, if you
could just identify yourself for the record, and
then you can feel free to present your testimony.

TRACY STEWARD: Good afternoon. My name is Tracy Steward. I'm here to speak on behalf of my mother Odessa Steward, who worked in the 24th Precinct for approximately 43 years, basically all of my life. She grew up down south, but she moved to Frederick Douglas community in the projects in 1954. She worked in the precinct as a volunteer. She wanted to join the force, but they said that she was too short at the time, so she wound up working there for a year as a volunteer and they wound up hiring her as a receptionist. During this time working at the 24th Precinct from 1967, she became the first precinct receptionist within New York City. When she was offered the position to work full-time, she jumped on it immediately. She held this position for 30 years.

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During this time, she presented to
the administration-being that the receptionist
position was going so well, she wanted to add more
receptionists throughout the precinct, and they
agreed. They would up hiring 65 more
receptionists for each precinct within the New
York City area. At this time, she was the
president of the receptionists.

My mother has done a lot of things for this community. She worked with the homelessness. She started the housing tenant patrol in 1969. She was the vice president of the tenant patrol. She created the Children's Christmas Party, which still goes on to this day every year-where they give out toys to underprivileged children. She created the Mr. Peanut contest, which is a program that they do every year for kids to practice physical fitness and stuff like that. She has done a lot for the community. I could go on and on as to the things that she's done. She was given so many certificates and awards that I can't even name. My mother was a beautiful person. She passed away in December. Her memory in that community is

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profound. Everybody knew my mother from the precinct, all the precincts in the area, from the west side to the east side. I think renaming the street where I still live at and to look out my window and see this would mean so much to her memory because she has been such a positive enforcement in that neighborhood. Even kids today they ask me-some of them don't even know that my mother passed away-they ask me how my mother is doing and stuff like that. It would mean a lot to the community, not just to me and her family, but to the community in general. She's helped people get out of trouble. She helped people get jobs. She's just been a remarkable person in this neighborhood and I would like to keep her memory going, if we can rename that street after her.

CHAIRPERSON MARK-VIVERITO: Well,
Mr. Steward, I want to thank you for coming. I'm
the Council Member that represents you and we are
submitting this—I know you had contacted Joe
Taranto from my office. I think you have been
working on it. I'm glad that we were able to get
it in for this package of bills. I think that
what you've made out and looking at her

information is a real example of what we need-real civic engagement, community involvement, really committed to making our community a better place, and all of that involvement that you laid out is indicative of what we need more in this city. So I want to thank you for doing this and I'm glad that we will be able to honor her memory and her commitment through this street naming. After this, we will be voting on it in another hearing, and then it will go before the full Council, so thank you very much for joining us here today—

TRACY STEWARD: [Interposing] Thank you. I appreciate it.

CHAIRPERSON MARK-VIVERITO: I don't know if any of the other colleagues have anything to say on any of the street namings? If not, I want to also thank the staff 'cause there's a lot of vetting that goes into all of these. It's 56 street namings, so everyone has to be vetted and research has to be done to make sure that they meet the criteria and the guidelines. I want to thank Kris Sartori, Patrick Mulvihill and Cheema Albichair [phonetic] for their work on the Parks Committee, and if no one else has anything else to
