ladies and gentlemen. Welcome to the Committee on Rules, Privileges and Elections. My name is Joe Rivera and I chair the Committee. Before we begin, I'd like to introduce the other members who are here with us today. To my left, we are joined by Council Member Vincent Ignizio. We are joined by Council Member Leroy Comrie, Council Member Gale Brewer, Council Member Elizabeth Crowley, Council Member Karen Koslowitz. To my right, we are joined by Council Member Jimmy Vacca, Council Member Lew Fidler, Council Member Inez Dickens, Council Member Vincent Gentile, and we're also joined by Charles Davis, Lamon Bland, Jasmine Vega [phonetic] and Ernest Stuart [phonetic]—the team

Today the Rules Committee will be considering the following matters: Mr. Damien Griffin is being considered for appointment by the Council to the New York City Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors. If Mr. Griffin, a resident of the Bronx, is appointed, he will fill a vacancy and serve for the remainder of a three-year term that expires on December 31st,

on the Rules Committee staff.

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Guastella, a resident of Richmond County, is being considered for appointment as the Democratic Commissioner from Richmond County on the New York City Board of Elections. She will fill the vacant position previously held by Michael Ryan. Her appointment is for the remainder of a four-year term that began on January 1st, 2009 and ends December 31st, 2012. For the record, her certificate for party recommendation was properly formatted and submitted.

First, I will briefly explain the functions of the Soil and Water Conservation
District Board. We've also been joined by the
Minority Leader, Jimmy Oddo. In 1991, pursuant to
Section 5 Paragraph 4 of the New York State Soil
and Water Conservation District Law, the mayor of
the city of New York established a Soil and Water
Conservation District encompassing the five
counties of New York City. The district is
governed by a board of directors, who have the
power to conduct surveys, investigations and
research relating to the character of soil
erosion, flood water, sediment damages and non-

point source water pollution and preventive and
control measures needed and to publish the results
of such surveys, investigations or research.
Additionally, the directors can disseminate
information concerning preventive and control
measures and develop comprehensive plans. The
board consists of nine members, seven of whom
shall be appointed by the mayor and two of whom
shall be appointed by the City Council, all of
whom shall be residents of the city. Of the
members appointed by the mayor, one shall be
appointed upon the recommendation of each of the
borough presidents and such members shall be a
resident of the borough of the borough president
making such recommendation. Each of the remaining
two mayoral appointees may be a resident of any
borough. All appointments are subject to
confirmation by the City Council. Vacancies in
the membership of the board are filled in the
manner provided for original appointments.
Members serve three-year terms, commencing on
January 1 st and ending on December 31 st . Members
receive no compensation.

Welcome, Mr. Griffin. Will you

care of our wastewater, reduce the amount of storm

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water that's going into our drains and improve the water quality of all the water around New York

City. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: We're going to delay the questions until after we're done with Maria, and then we will just have all questions together. Now we will go with Ms. Guastella. I will briefly describe the functions of the Board of Elections.

The Board of Elections consists of ten commissioners, two from each of the city's five counties, who are directly appointed by the New York Coty Council. Not more than two commissioners shall be registered voters of the same county. Each commissioner serves a term of four years until a successor is appointed. The commissioners shall be registered voters from each of the major parties in the county for which they are appointed. The board and its commissioners are responsible for the maintenance and administration of voting records and elections. The board also exercises quasi-judicial powers by conducting hearings to validate nominating petitions of candidates for nomination to elective

2	office. The board is required to make an annual
3	report of its affairs and proceedings to the New
4	York City Council once every 12 months, and no
5	later than the last of January in any year.
6	Commissioners receive a 300 per diem for each
7	day's attendance at meetings of the board or any
8	of its committees, with a maximum of 30,000 per
9	year. Welcome, Ms. Guastella. Will you please
10	raise your right hand and be sworn in?
11	SERGEANT AT ARMS: Ms. Guastella,
12	do you swear or affirm that your statements will

14	MARIA GUASTELLA: I do.
15	SERGEANT AT ARMS: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Perfect. Does any of my colleagues have any questions? I know that Council Member Vincent Ignizio would like to make a statement.

COUNCIL MEMBER IGNIZIO:

Thank you very much. I know it's somewhat unorthodox to hear from a Republican with regards to a Democratic appointment, but I can tell this Committee that there is nobody in this room, outside of her parents, that probably knows her longer than me, since I grew up at 198 Eltingville Boulevard and she grew up at 199 Eltingville Boulevard, so we know each other a very long time. I want to speak to her character and speak to what a great Board of Elections commissioner I believe she will be. She is a woman of distinction and honor in the community, one that we call a friend, one that has been working with Legal Aid and helping giving back to this community for quite

some time. She is genuinely a person that cares,

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much.

and I, without nesitation, tell this board that I
believe that she should be approved and move
forward into a great job and do a great job at the
Board of Elections. Anything else you wanted me
to say, Maria? I'm kidding. So that's it. I
wanted to be on record of my support for her and
to let people know that I've known her for a very
long time, and I know that she will serve us with
honor and distinction and will be an asset to the
Board of Elections that sorely needs hardworking,
honest, credible people at its helm. She
demonstrates all those qualities. Thank you very

Member Gale Brewer had a question, but I think she
has stepped out. Does any other members have any
questions for the candidates? We've been joined
by Council Member Robert Jackson. We'll just give
Gale a second 'cause I know she did want to ask
some questions. Council Member Vincent Gentile
would like to say a few words.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Following the other Vinny on the other panel here, it's very interesting. I got a

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chance to say hello to Ms. Guastella earlier
before the hearing and I didn't realize that we
had met earlier some years ago in Staten Island.
Although I don't know as much as my colleague
Vinny Ignizio does about Ms. Guastella, everyone
that I know on Staten Island that I respect very
much respects Ms. Guastella, so if nothing else,
that is a good recommendation in my book. Ms.
Guastella reminded me that I gave her an award ten
years ago, so I think I got it right then, and
hopefully, get it right today. I think I'm going
to do that.

MARIA GUASTELLA: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: So it sounds

like you have bi-partisan cross endorsement by a

Republican and a Democrat for the position, so

that's always great. We're still waiting for Gale

Brewer to join us 'cause I believe she wanted to...

Okay, I'm going to call the roll. We'll let

Council Member Brewer just make her statement when

she gets a chance to vote. Just as a quick note,

19	at ten in the affirmative, zero in the negative,
20	zero abstentions. We'll hold the vote open for 15
21	minutes.
22	COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you
23	very much. I'm Gale Brewer, and I am the Council
24	Member for the Westside, and I chair Governmental
25	Operations, which oversees the Board of Elections,

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so I really appreciate and I've heard good things about you from people from Staten Island.

> MARIA GUASTELLA: Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: I think I have a couple of issues. One is there are a lot of discussions about who is going to be leader; I think you actually have some leadership there now that's doing a great job under very challenging circumstances, but between the press and perception or not and as well people from internal, even though I think the leadership is doing as good a job as they possibly can, there are a lot of challenges. So my question is do you have some ideas about how you'd like to improve-even though there's a good base there—the Board of Elections? What are your visions, so to speak?

MARIA GUASTELLA: My visions are making sure the people that are there and the people that follow are qualified. I did do a lot of background-pulling up old articles, and there was a lot of negativity surrounding qualifications and my role—and I'm anxious to get in there and get started—is to make sure that anybody that is hired from now is a qualified person.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: I chaired
3	the Technology Committee before, and I'm a tech
4	nerd would be the best word, so I would love to
5	see more webcasting and other ways of using
6	technology to be sure that the public is informed
7	of hearings and of course, the public participates
8	and makes it as easy as possible to register and
9	to vote. Do you have any technology ideas or are
10	you willing to be open to ideas that might be
11	relevant?
12	MARIA GUASTELLA: I'm open to
13	ideas. I'm not a technology person myself, but I
14	would like to see it advance as time goes on.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Okay. I
16	know you indicated earlier to your credit that you
17	want people who are qualified—this whole issue of
18	the executive director is a political football.
19	Do you want to expand on what you stated about
20	making sure that whoever is there-somebody who is
21	there now or somebody comes in—is qualified? How
22	would you go about making sure that person is
23	qualified?

MARIA GUASTELLA: Well, obviously someone that's number one registered to vote and

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has voted in the past, understands the system, knows what it means to get petitions, how to get a candidate on the ballot and those type of things.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Okay, and then the other question is do you have any ideas about how to increase voter registration and then get people to vote? There are two problems—you get them registered and they don't vote.

MARIA GUASTELLA: Right. I think we have to move away from-often times I speak to people and they look at voting as a chore or a hassle. They don't want to go. They don't want to wait on the lines and things like that. As far as getting people to vote, I think we need to start younger-getting younger people involved; perhaps in the high school level and actually explain to them what it means to vote and empowering them. When I was in law school, I started a clinic in a women's shelter in Queens and one of the things I did was voter registration and it was amazing to me that the women didn't realize that they could register, number one, and they could actually vote even though they were homeless or living a shelter or hiding from their

2	partners. That was pretty amazing to me. For
3	some reason and I'm not sure why exactly we could
4	only do it for two days, which was sad, and we
5	basically were closed down. We couldn't give
6	legal advice any longer. I believe outreach is
7	going to be very important, and not justas I
8	said in my statement-calling somebody and having
9	them come down and put something together, but
10	actually getting out there and physically—maybe
11	doing rallies and seminars and getting people
12	excited about voting, so that when they're 21
13	years old, they don't find it as a chore or a
14	hassle and I'm amazed to find out how many people—
15	adults-have never voted before. When I speak to
16	them about registering them, they believe they are
17	registered and in fact, they've never registered,
18	which tells me they've never voted.
19	COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Okay.
20	[off mic conversation]
21	SPEAKER QUINN: It's okay; no
22	problem. Speaking of voting sorry.
23	COUNCIL ATTORNEY: Speaker Quinn?
24	SPEAKER QUINN: I vote aye.

COUNCIL ATTORNEY: The vote now

2 stands at 11 in the affirmative.

question I have is do you think that—there is another challenging issue is the mayor's management report that lists how the city agencies are doing in terms of data—how they're doing on the homeless, how they're doing on purchasing, how they're doing on all aspects — a lot of material. The Board of Elections believes that it should be kept internal — their data—that they have their own annual report and it shouldn't be part of the MMR. Do you have an opinion on that or?

MARIA GUASTELLA: I think once I get in there and actually see what the reporting mechanisms are, then I'll be able to better answer that question. If we want to meet at another time, maybe after I have a couple of meetings...

appreciate your taking the extra time. I can tell you that there is a huge need for improvements, not to say that there isn't a good base from which to work. I hope that you will—I think you will stick very with your statement that you want to

2	make sure that everybody who comes in not only are
3	they registered to vote in New York and a true New
4	Yorker, but also that they have experience in
5	whatever position they are seeking because in your
6	role with this bipartisan—and you know like I said
7	a political football, anything can happen. I urge
8	you to please make sure—there are tons of
9	qualified people who could fill jobs and there are
10	unfortunately lots of nonqualified people who
11	could fill jobs. This is such an important aspect
12	of our country needless to say. I think there's a
13	lot of on this particular city and/or state
14	agency and it's not been a positive one. So I
15	look forward to working with you.
16	MARIA GUASTELLA: I look forward to
17	working with you too. Thank you.
18	COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much.

COMMITTEE CLERK: The final vote in the Committee on Rules is 11 in the affirmative, zero in the negative and no abstentions. Thank you. This hearing is now adjourned.
