2	CHAIRPERSON NELSON: Good afternoon
3	and welcome to today's hearing the Committee on
4	Waterfronts. My name is Mike Nelson. I chair
5	this Committee. For most of its history, New York
6	City's waterfront has been an industrial hub and
7	served as a home to marine cargo facilities,
8	cruise ships, factories, waste transfer stations,
9	electric generating facilities and more. During
10	much of this period, the waterways served as
11	flowing garbage disposals for the bone boilers
12	[phonetics], iron workers, printers, potters and
13	other industrial users that lined the banks of New
14	York's waterways. While the quality of our water
15	and waterfronts has made dramatic improvements
16	over the last 30 years, illegal dumping still
17	remains a problem. Dumping is a broad violation
18	that can encompass a wide range of illegal
19	activities from abandoned vehicles into waterways
20	to depositing construction debris in waterways.
21	While the impact of a single incident of illegal
22	dumping is less likely detrimental to water
23	quality than the catastrophic event such as an oil
24	spill or the persistent discharges from combined
25	sewer overflows, the aggregate results of illegal

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2	dumping activity can be quite severe.
3	The Committee on Waterfronts is
4	voting on proposed Intro 53-A. This bill adds a
5	new section, which is 3-121, to the Administrative
6	Code of the City of New York. This section would
7	require the director of long term planning and
8	sustainability along with the commissioners of
9	small business services, environmental protection
10	and sanitation to devise and prepare a plan to
11	combat illegal dumping on the waterfront. Such
12	plan shall include number one, a determination if
13	new rules are necessary for the implementation of
14	this plan; two, creation of a centralized source
15	of information on laws, rules and regulations
16	related to the plan; three, a protocol to
17	coordinate with other governmental entities that
18	have jurisdiction over the port of New York; four,
19	coordinate an interagency enforcement plan,
20	including a waterfront survey to identify dumping
21	sites, periodic inspections of waterfront
22	properties and the posting of signs to discourage
23	dumping and the abandoning of property; and five,
24	a public education and outreach program. This
25	bill requires a director of long term planning and

2	sustainability to submit the plan to the mayor and
3	to the council and to make it available on the
4	city's website. It also requires the director to
5	submit reports on the effectiveness of the plan
6	every two years beginning in 2014. Finally, three
7	months prior to the submission of the plan or the
8	reports, the director must make a draft of the
9	plan or report available to the public for 60-day
10	comment period, and all of the comments that are
11	received must be published with the plan or report
12	as an appendix.
13	Now for the record, the following
14	changes were made to proposed Intro 53-A from the
15	original bill-
16	JEFFREY BAKER: This is Jeffrey
17	Baker. I'm the counsel to the Waterfront
18	Committee, and I'll be reading the changes to the
19	bill from the original.
20	Technical changes were made
21	throughout the bill for the purposes of clarity,
22	to correct references and to revise the
23	organization of the text. Such changes include
24	changes to the title of the bill, creating a new
25	section 3-121 of title 3, rather than creating a

2	new section entitled 22, the renumbering of
3	sections and the merging and renumbering of
4	paragraphs. Definitions for New York City
5	waterways and commissioner were removed. The
6	definitions for director and office were added,
7	and the definition for illegal dumping was changed
8	to waterfront dumping, and now specifically is
9	defined as, "violations of Section 16-119 that
10	occur on the waterfront" and "violations of
11	Section 22-112."
12	The director of long term planning
13	and sustainability, where necessary and
14	practicable the police commissioner were added to
15	the list of commissioners responsible for devising
16	the waterfront plan. The director of long term
17	planning and sustainability is now responsible for
18	creating and submitting the plan, instead of the
19	commissioner of small business services as
20	originally proposed.
21	The promulgation of rules for the
22	safe handling of materials on the waterfront was
23	revised to allow a determination as to whether
24	such rules are necessary, and if it is determined
25	that rules are necessary, they will be promulgated

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2	according to the City Administrative Procedure
3	Act. The role of the waterfront taskforce to aid
4	in devising rules was eliminated. The bill no
5	longer requires a centralized contact for
6	reporting dumping on the waterfront. The director
7	of long term planning and sustainability where
8	necessary and where necessary and practicable the
9	police commission and any agencies that the mayor
10	designates were added to the list of agencies that
11	are included in a protocol to coordinate
12	enforcement of rules on the waterfront. The plan
13	must now be submitted to the mayor and the
14	Council. Such submission must occur on January
15	1 st , 2013, which is one year later than originally
16	proposed to allow relevant agencies adequate time
17	to devise the plan. The date for submission of
18	the required reports was moved back one year to
19	April 1^{st} , 2014 because the date of the submission
20	of the plan had been revised. Required reports
21	will now include information on fines imposed by
22	the Environmental Control Board only due to the
23	difficulty of obtaining such information from non-
24	city entities. Required reports must now also
25	include any changes made to the plan, a summary of

2	any rules promulgated to implement the plan and
3	any recommendations for appropriate legislation.
4	The proposed legislation now requires the report
5	due on April 1 $^{\rm st}$, 2018 by the director of long term
6	planning and sustainability to include a
7	recommendation as to whether future reports are
8	required, and finally, the bill was amended to
9	provide that three months prior to the submission
10	of the plan or of any report, the director of long
11	term planning and sustainability shall make a
12	draft of the plan available to the public for a
13	60-day comment period, and all comments received
14	by the direct shall be included as an appendix of
15	such plan or report.
16	CHAIRPERSON NELSON: I feel that
17	this is an important bill in that for years people
18	just see all this dumping going on constantlyand
19	such an eyesore and embarrassment to the city, and
20	it's certainly detrimental to the eyes our
21	environment, and by coordinating this effort
22	which I hope it comes to fruition-it will be taken
23	more seriously. We welcome Council Member Lander.
24	There will be more eyes and ears in a coordinated
25	effort and perhaps-we'll never eliminate it-but if

2	we cut it down a great percentage, it will be
3	better for all of us in the long run. Thank you
4	for all being here. We have Council Member
5	Vallone, Council Member Ulrich, Council Member
6	Lander and Council Member Brewer all together
7	here, and we can commence with the vote please.

10	on Waterfronts Introduction 53-A. Council Member
11	Nelson?

15	and obviously thank the Chair, but particularly
16	thank Jeff Baker, who put a lot of time into this
17	and helped us understand why in the world business
18	services was involved. I guess it was the
19	rendition from Ports and Terminals, and that's why
20	they have it, but the fact of the matter is this
21	is the first time that I think this issue has been
22	addressed, so congratulations.
