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CHAIRPERSON FOSTER: Good morning
and welcome. My name is Council Member Helen
Diane Foster, and I am chair of the State and
Federal Legislation Committee. Today are meeting
to consider a resolution to support President
Obama's American Jobs Act of 2011. First, I'd
like to introduce my Committee members. We are
joined by Council Member Larry Seabrook of the
Bronx, Council Member Joel Rivera of the Bronx and
Council Member Lew Fidler from Brooklyn.

On September 8<sup>th</sup> of this year,
President Obama presented Congress with the
opportunity to pass the American Jobs Act of 2011.
The President's proposed plan would provide for a
\$447 billion package of tax cuts for workers and
businesses; an investment to put people back to
work. The President has stated that the purpose
of this is not only to stimulate the economy, but
also to rebuild it. The cornerstone of the
President's proposed plan seeks to promote job
creation, growth and stability.

Since the recession in 2007, unemployment rates remain high. The nation unemployment rate is 9.1%. New York State is 8%

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and our city is 8.8%. The staggering statistic has affected all New Yorkers, but certain boroughs remain more affected than others. The Bronx has the highest unemployment rate in the city and the state with an unemployment rate of 12.3% and there are three members of this Committee that represent the Bronx and know firsthand how real that number is. Now these figures do not factor in those New Yorkers who would like to work, who have searched for work, but have given up finding a job. Ιt also does not include those who are underemployed, long-time unemployment and if they were counted, unemployment in New York City would be more like 10.5%. The percentage of those New Yorkers who are suffering from long-term unemployment and underemployment is even more staggering. numbers for unemployment, underemployment and long-term unemployment amongst black and Latino men and women are the highest. 15% of the American population is living in poverty-more than any industrialized nation. More and more Americans are going hungry. It is necessary to find a solution to this problem. It is my belief that President Obama's American Jobs Act of 2011

Council Member Seabrook?

COUNCIL MEMBER SEABROOK: Thank you very much, Madam Chair. I think this is certainly appropriate when we look and see the devastation of unemployment that takes place within our communities and certainly within the Bronx and then as we look at consistency of African American males who consistently are unemployed at the rate of 50% in this entire city itself is a clear indication why this resolution that sets forth in terms of supporting the President is important, and I'd certainly like to be listed on this resolution. I think is apropos for the situation in which we are in, and that the President understands how to get out of this. We need to support it 100%. Thank you very much.

CHAIRPERSON FOSTER: Thank you.

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2	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Thank you.
3	You know, this resolution supports a program that
4	has been the policy of this City Council for as
5	long as I've been here. If you look at the
6	elements of the plan that include cutting taxes or
7	small businesses, supporting teachers from
8	layoffs-keeping them from being laid off, and
9	perhaps, most relevant the investment in the
10	capital program of infrastructure. I believe a
11	few years back when the mayor of this city wanted

to cut the capital program, about 40 some odd

13 members of the Council joined me in a letter to 14 him saying that cutting the capital program and 15 disinvesting in our infrastructure was 16 counterintuitive. This is what puts people to 17 work in the city of New York, and I think is one of the reasons why as bad as things are here in 18 19 the city, they're better here than they are in 20 many other places. I think the policy made sense for New York and it makes sense for the United 21 22 States, and so, I will be supporting this 23 resolution as well today.
