you. I just wanted to take this opportunity to

honor someone who did something exemplary. We, as

women of New York City, when a woman is attacked,

it's really an attack on all women. And Freddy

Neri was a man who was just sleeping at home and

heard a woman screaming in the early, early hours

of the morning and decided to leap out of his bed

and go to her rescue. And he was able to stop a

woman from becoming a victim of a rape or an

assault, or even worse, a murder.

So today, with the women's delegation, we honor you and thank you for daring, for not thinking twice, for hearing something and doing something. So we thank you from this chamber. And, as you can see, many of the women are wearing pink also today, and we're trying to honor Breast Cancer Month. But it really is apropos, here in Women's History Month, that we

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Fred. We're gonna ask the clerk to please read the proclamation, and then if you or anybody else wants to say anything, that would be great.

THE CLERK: Council, City of New York Proclamation.

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of
New York is proud to honor Freddy Neri for his
heroism; and

WHEREAS, born and raised in Brooklyn, Mr. Neri is a proud father of three sons and a daughter and works as a cook at Sergimmo Salumeria. On Sunday, August 14, 2011, around 6:15 a.m., he was asleep in his family's Chelsea apartment when he was suddenly awoken by screams for help coming from the lobby a floor below. Without getting dressed and without concern for his own safety, Mr. Neri raced downstairs where he discovered a 27-year-old man overpowering a young woman in an attempted sexual assault.

The suspect had followed the woman into the building and, until Mr. Neri arrived at the scene, the woman had only her door keys to

defend herself; and

WHEREAS, when the assailant saw Mr.

Neri and tried to flee, Mr. Neri grabbed him by

the neck, got him off the victim and a struggle

ensued. Suddenly, it was the assailant trying to

escape, but Mr. Neri refused the man's frantic

pleas to let him go. Between a neighbor's call to

911 and the police making the arrest, Mr. Neri

even asked the assailant, "Don't you have a

mother? Don't you have a sister? Why do you come

here to do these things?" And

WHEREAS, although we may never know the attacker's motivations, Mr. Neri's courageous intervention offers a clear message: Sexual assault and any other form of sexual violence are unacceptable at all times. All too often, it has become culturally accepted as "the price you pay for being a woman." Sexual assault is a community problem, and ending it requires the participation of both men and women. It is a great privilege to recognize Mr. Neri for, in answering a stranger's call for help, he revealed the strength of character that is the mark of a great New Yorker.

Now, therefore, be it known that

WHEREAS, in celebration of Hispanic
Heritage Month, the Council of the City of New

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| York is proud to honor the life and memory of |
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| Ralph Mercado for his extraordinary contributions |
| to Latino culture and for his unwavering |
| commitment to the continued growth of self- |
| comprehension and pride among Latinos through New |
| York city; and |

WHEREAS, October is celebrated as
Hispanic Heritage Month to provide a special
opportunity to recognize the common culture and
bonds of friendship that have united the United
States and Hispanic countries for centuries, and
to recognize the profound contributions that
Hispanic-Americans have to made to New York city
since its earliest days. This is a fitting
occasion to pay tribute to Ralph Mercado, for he
was a visionary promoter who spread his passion
for Latin music the world over; and

WHEREAS, born in Brooklyn on
September 29th, 1941, to a Dominican father and a
Puerto Rican mother, Ralph Mercado became a
driving force of the nascent Latino music culture
that emerged from New York city's inner
neighborhoods that eventually led to what is
popularly referred to as the salsa explosion of

the 1970s; and

whereas, Mr. Mercado also built an empire as the founder of the RMM recording and publishing label, which recorded more than 130 artists and genres, including salsa, Latin jazz, Latin rock, and meringue. He managed stars like Tito Puente and Celia Cruz, and discovered and helped shape the careers of others, like Marc Anthony and La India. He was also responsible for the global reach of the salsa music industry by coordinating and producing and collaborating on concerts throughout Europe, Asia, Latin America, and the African Continent; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Mercado created an internship mentorship program at RMM, Inc. that gave hundreds of young men and women the opportunity to learn about the industry and prepare for successful careers by working in the music business in RMM's market in New York City, Chicago, Los Angeles, Miami, San Juan, and the Dominican Republic; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Mercado truly distinguished himself as a musical titan and as a loving husband, father, and grandfather, and his

Last week--and we thank her so much for this--Council Woman Margaret Chin accompanied Private Chin's devastated parents to JFK Airport to meet their son's remains for a dignified transfer and burial. Private Danny Chin's funeral was held this past Thursday on Mulberry Street. Our thoughts and prayers go out to his parents, relatives, and friends.

And if I could call on Council Member Chin for a few words.

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you,
Speaker. Their families were very gratified to
have so much support from families and friends and
also elected officials. But they also asked us to
support them to call for a full investigation to
the death, and I think that's what we would
support them on. And they thank us for all the
condolences that were sent.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very

| much, Council Member Chin. I also want to note |

| the passing on October 7th, after a long and |
| valiant battle with ovarian cancer, of Paula |
| Ettelbrick, 56, who was the former legal director |
| at Lambda Legal. Paula was a lifelong activist |
| for LGBT equality and social justice, and for part |
| of her time, she was the executivepart of her |
| life was the executive director of the Stonewall |
| Community Foundation. She also worked at the |
| Empire State Pride Agenda. She served there as |
| their legislative director and she served on the |
| board of many national organizations, and was a |
| lecturer and adjunct professor on sexuality and |
| the law on LGBT human rights at NYU, Barnard, |
| Columbia, and the University of Michigan Law |
| School. |

As Rabbi Sharon Kleinbaum mentioned during the Yom Kippur services, Paula "fought with ever fiber of her being."

Paula is survived by her family, which includes her partner, Marianne; her former partner, Suzanne, with whom she was raising their two children--Adam, 14, Julia, 12--her brother, Robert; and her sister, Linda.

| 8 | King once called Reverend Shuttlesworth "the most |
| 9 | courageous Civil Rights fighter in the South." |
| 10 | And I'd like to call on Council |
| 11 | Member Helen Diane Foster to make a few comments, |
| 12 | and thank Council Member Foster for noting this |
| 13 | passing so we could note it today. |
| 14 | COUNCIL MEMBER FOSTER: Thank you, |
| 15 | Speaker Quinn. Many of us wouldn't be here in |
| 16 | this elective office today if it wasn't for |
| 17 | Reverend Shuttlesworth. He is probably the most |
| 18 | significant leader in the civil rights movement |
| 19 | along with Dr. King. He was the non-passive |
| 20 | person to Dr. King's passive approach to the civil |
| 21 | rights movement. He was called the wild man from |
| 22 | Birmingham. |
| 23 | On Christmas night, when the KKK |
| 24 | threw six sticks of dynamite in to his house to |

blow it up, his mattress flew up in the air, and

when he wasn't heard--hurt, excuse me, he said,

"God must have made me dynamite proof."

He was beaten severely by the KKK with brass knuckles and bicycle chains when he tried to enroll his daughter into an all-white school, and when he survived, the doctor said he is surprised that he only had a concussion, and he said, "The Lord had me living in a hard town so He gave me a hard head." He was and is probably the last of the big Civil Rights.

He will be laid to rest this
weekend in Birmingham, and many people from the
New York City area are going down. Former
Manhattan Borough president and council member, C.
Virginia Fields, was actually one of the little
girls who participated in his marches when he was
in Birmingham.

And to honor him, the City of
Birmingham renamed its airport the BirminghamShuttlesworth International Airport. And when
they did the commemoration of the march from
Thelma to Montgomery and crossing the Pettus
Bridge, it was then Senator Obama who pushed him
across the bridge in a wheelchair. And in 2008,

And Intro 155A is a piece of legislation we are calling the School's FACT Act. With FACT standing for Facility, Accountability—I can't remember the C--R.J., what does the C stand for? Capacity, we got it there, okay. The FACT Act stands for Facility, Accountability, Capacity, and Transparency. I'll say it again now that I've remembered it. The School's Facility, Accountability, Capacity and Transparency Act.

Why do we need a school's FACT Act?

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| Because we actually don't have any annual |
|--|
| documentation and reporting from the Department of |
| Education that answers simple questions like: |
| Does the school in my neighborhood have a gym; |
| does the school in my neighborhood have an art |
| room; does the school in my neighborhood have a |
| library; my child has special needs; are there |
| rooms for speech therapy; will speech therapy be |
| conducted in the hallway? None of that |
| informationnot in the Blue Book, not anywhere |
| is that information reported. |

The School's FACT Act will require that that information, amongst other information around facilities and capacity, will be reported annually to the City Council and be completely transparent to the public.

It will also require that that information not come in some huge citywide form, but broken down by school district, by community board, by borough, by council district, so you can actually say, let me compare one school in my neighborhood to the other school. Let me see what the school is like by where I work versus where by I live. So you can be empowered as a parent to

Beyond that, it will give us a much better picture of overcrowding, of facility space, and that information will be an incredibly powerful tool to help council members, parents, unions, activists, and others fight to make the schools in our city better places. If you don't know what is there, you can't accurately fight to make it better.

So I want to thank everyone who has brought us this piece of legislation--first and foremost, the chair of our Education Committee.

And this is another step forward in our effort to improve the schools of our city. I want to also thank, Make the Road New York, the UFT, the CSA, Class Size Matters, Campaign for Fiscal Equity, and so many other advocates who worked with us on this piece of legislation.

And now call on the chair and sponsor of the bill, Chairperson Jackson.

perfect our Union. America owes Reverend

Shuttlesworth a debt of gratitude.

This past weekend, Council Members Jackson, Williams, Rodriguez, and myself had the opportunity to travel to Washington, DC, as they commemorated the memorial of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.--and Sanders as well. The memorial, standing almost 30-feet tall, positioned between

It was an honor to visit it with Council Member Sanders, Jackson, Williams, and Rodriguez. Thank you.

you very much. Today I'm introducing a bill that

would require the Department of Consumer Affairs

to post approved sidewalk café drawings on its

website. Currently, when applying for either an

unenclosed or enclosed sidewalk café, restaurants

are required to submit to DCA a set of self-

| certified architect renderings or drawings, |

| detailing both the space a sidewalk café will |
| occupy and the configuration of the tables and |
| chairs within the café's space. While the public |
| has access to sidewalk café drawings at Community |
| Board meetings, the technology obviously exists to |
| make these drawings easily accessible 24 hours a |
| day, 7 days a week online. |

Intro 692 would help resolve any disputes that may arise regarding a sidewalk café's approved boundaries or the permitted number and configuration of tables and chairs. Public access to an architect's sidewalk café drawings is very simply a matter of transparency, and I encourage my colleagues to join me in signing on to this legislation. Thank you.
