2	CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Okay. We're
3	ready to start. Good afternoon. My name is
4	Daniel Dromm and I'm the chair of the Immigration
5	Committee. Today the Committee on Immigration
6	will vote on proposed Introductory Bill No. 656-A,
7	a local law to amend to Administrative Code of the
8	City of New York in relation to persons not to be
9	detained. I would like to thank Council Member
10	Melissa Mark-Viverito, the lead sponsor of this
11	very important piece of legislation and Speaker
12	Quinn for her continued interest in and
13	longstanding dedication to immigrant New Yorkers.
14	Before going any further, I'd like to now
15	recognize my colleagues who have joined us today.
16	To my left, Council Member Charles Barron from
17	Brooklynthank you. And to my right, Council
18	Member Mathieu Eugene from Brooklyn and Council
19	Member Jumaane Williams from Brooklyn. I guess
20	Brooklyn is in the house today.
21	[background conversation]
22	CHAIRPERSON DROMM: We have learned
23	from two hearingsthe first in November 2010 and
24	the second that took place last monthas well as
25	from various articles and meetings with advocacy

organizations that the Department of Corrections'
current involvement with Immigrations and Customs
Enforcement under the Criminal Alien Program, the
purpose of which is to detain and remove criminal
non-citizens, has in fact resulted in the
detention and removal of individuals who have not
been convicted of a crimeindividuals who are
still presumed innocent, individuals who have been
wrongly convicted of a crime and even victims of
crimes. Additionally this working relationship
between the Department of Corrections and
Immigration and Customs Enforcement has resulted
in deportation of thousands of immigrant New
Yorkersthe separation of families, the removal
of individuals who are breadwinners and primary
caretakers of their families and major
contributors in our community and fear within
immigrant communities of local law enforcement.
The purpose of proposed Introductory Bill No. 656-
A is to ensure that the Department of Corrections'
cooperation with ICE is solely for the detention
and removal of criminals. If enacted, this bill
would limit the Department of Corrections'
cooperation with ICE by creating a category of

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persons not to be detained, and would require the

Department of Corrections to complete an annual

report of the actions taken on immigrants in its

custody to be posted on its website. With that,

I'd like to give Council Member Mark-Viverito, the

lead sponsor of proposed Intro 656-A, the

opportunity to speak. Council Member?

COUNCIL MEMBER MARK-VIVERITO:

Thank you, Chair Dromm. I really could not be happier to be here today for the Committee vote on Intro 656, the bill I have sponsored that will limit the collaboration between the Department of Corrections and Immigration Enforcement agents. Tomorrow we will make history by being the first large city to pass this type of legislation. is truly a pivotal moment for New York's immigrant communities and our city as a whole as we send a strong message that we will no longer be complicit in this country's broken immigration enforcement system. Over the past year and a half, we took great care to craft a piece of legislation that will balance the safety of our communities with the need to reform the way in which ICE agents have unfettered access to New Yorkers that find

themselves at Riker's. I want to thank Speaker
Quinn, who has shown extraordinary leadership on
this issue and of course, all of the advocates,
especially Make the Road New York, the Cardozo Law
School for their steadfast commitment, strong
support and hard work on this matter. I want to
thank particularly also our chair, Council Member
Danny Dromm, and all of the staff, especially Alex
, Rob Newman [phonetic], Jolene Beckford
[phonetic] and Jennifer Montalvo [phonetic].
Finally, I do also want to thank the Bloomberg
Administration, who truly came around in offering
their support and being willing to consider
additional changes to the bill that have helped to
ensure that it will fulfill its intent. Clearly
their support is important because that sends a
very strong message from New York City and this
municipality about howwhat level of involvement
we want to have with this broken immigration
system. I want to thank everyone that's involved.
Clearly, there's a lot of work ahead of us; not
everything is complete with this bill, but a
long long way and I really want to thank everyone
that made it possible today. Thank you, Chair.

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2	CHAIRPERSON DROMM:	Thank you,
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Council Member Mark-Viverito. And now I'd like to give an opportunity for Council Member Eugene to make some remarks.

COUNCIL MEMBER EUGENE: Thank you very much, Mr. Chair. I just want to take the opportunity to thank you for your leadership and also Council Member Mark-Viverito for introducing and being a very strong advocate for immigrants. I think this is a very important bill and this is a milestone for all of us who are fighting for immigrant rights, and I want to congratulate also--to commend all the advocacy groups and all those who have been working to make this possible because it is very important. If you think a little bit about the contribution of immigrants to New York City, to this country, and those people who have been part of the fabric of the city and for most of them, they came to the United States very young. After living in the United States for 25-30 years, those people they don't belong back home; they belong to the United States. Also they have families; they have children. Deporting people like that we have broken families,

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traumatizing the children. This is not beneficial
for New York City. And by trying to prevent that
to happen, I think it is a win-win situation. I
commend all of those who have been part of that
and this is a big milestone. We have to continue
to fight and to make sure that immigrants are
respected and they are treated with dignity.

CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Thank you, Councilman Williams?

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank
you, Mr. Chair. Congratulations to the Chair and
a big congratulations to Melissa Mark-Viverito. I
think this is a fantastic bill. It's an amazing
bill that we're getting through here. It is
historic as you mentioned. Even more
congratulations for getting the administration to
be agreeing with it--that's a feat in and of
itself. I'm hoping--I imagine this is going to go
through pretty easily. Both my parents are from
the Caribbean. I'm a first generation Brooklynite
[phonetic] from immigrant parents. The vast
majority of my district is also immigrants--just
like a good portion of New York City. This does

2	hit very, very close to home. I'm hoping we can
3	also build on this and close some of the things
4	that I think are missing, such as making sure that
5	people arrested for marijuana use and very small
6	things that are being abused don't still catch
7	people in the places that we haven't closed up,
8	but congratulations.

CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Thank you,
Council Member Williams. And now Council Member
Barron.

very much. I just wanted to say that this
legislation hopefully will have greater impact on
the whole question of immigration even nationally.
When immigrants were European, no question, there
was discrimination against Italians, Irish,
Germans, but they basically made it through
because of the complexion of their skin. White
immigrants had a way of making it up the ladder in
spite of the discrimination, but when immigration
because African and Caribbean and Latino and
Asian, all of a sudden, we want to build walls; we
want to criminalize instead of making them
citizens. Immigrants contribute tremendously to

the economic base of this country and this city in
particular to the intellectual and cultural base
of this city and this legislation is providing
some leadership in the direction to bring greater
respect to immigrants and see them not as illegal
aliens like some people from another plant, but
from undocumented individuals and sometimes
residents who are not having citizenship yet, and
they should be getting the respect that everybody
else gets because of the great contributions.
This bill heads in that direction, and so I
enthusiastically support it.
