CHAIRPERSON DILAN: If I could ask the chamber to come to order, we will begin this afternoon's hearing. Good afternoon. My name is Erik Martin Dilan, and I'm the Chair of the City Council's Housing and Buildings Committee. Today the Committee will be conducting a hearing for the purposes of a vote on two legislative items. Two bills before the Committee today are proposed Intro 585-A, which is a local law to amend the Administrative Code of the City in relation to establishing limits on the missions of volatile organic compounds in carpet and carpet cushions. The second is a pre-considered Intro that we heard earlier this week to amend the Administrative Code of the City of New York in relation to carbon

Regarding proposed Intro 585, volatile organic compounds or VOCs are known to cause acute and chronic health effects according to the Environmental Protection Agency, including eye, nose and throat irritation, headaches, loss of coordination, nausea, liver damage, kidney and central nervous systems. Additionally some VOCs I won't read them all, but they're attached are also

In a different vain, the preconsidered Intro on carbon monoxide detectors
would require property owners to replace carbon
monoxide detectors that are currently required to

be installed by law when they exceed the 2 manufacturer's suggested use for life with devices 3 4 that are equipped with an audible warning chip. 5 That does not exist in the equipment in homes today and it's good that these chips will be now 6 included into the new apparatus, so individuals while at home will indeed know that their carbon 9 monoxide detector is not functioning and they can replace it. On this bill, the city may contain 10 11 carbon monoxide detectors that have passed a use 12 for life since the industry average use for life 13 of these products is six years from the date of 14 installation and many carbon monoxide detectors 15 were installed as a result of this Committee's 16 passage of similar legislation in 2004, which 17 first mandated the installation of these carbon 18 monoxide detectors in dwelling units are not 19 indeed equipped with the most up to date 20 technology, which includes the audible warning 21 chip that I mentioned earlier. As I said earlier 22 this Committee heard testimony on this on December 13th and I would like to ask my colleagues to vote 23 24 in favor of the two items today. If the members 25 are in agreement as a matter of time, we can skip

Thank you. I vote yes on both.
