CHAIRPERSON DILAN: Good morning and--good morning everybody, my name is Erik Martin Dilan and I'm the Chair of the City Council's Housing and Buildings Committee. today, the Committee will conduct a hearing for the purposes of a vote on Proposed Intro 576-A, which is a Local Law to amend the New York City Building Code, in relation to the regulation of concrete washout water. The second item will be Intro 578-A, a Local Law to amend the Administrative Code of the City and the Building Code, in relation to the reclamation of asphalt pavement. And the last item on the agenda will be Intro 592-A, a Local Law to amend the Mechanical Code in relation to filtering soot from income air in our buildings. All three bills on the agenda have been amended from their original versions, which the Committee initially heard on June 21st of this year, and for a list of the amendments please see the Committee report. Proposed Intro 56--576-A prohibits concrete washout water produced at construction sites from entering any New York City sewer, catch basin, drain or body of

water, or from leaking into the ground, and
requires that all concrete washout water be
collected and contained either in or on the
concrete mixer truck, or in a pre-manufactured
watertight containers designed and fabricated for
the purpose of collecting and containing concrete
washout water onsite. Furthermore, rinsing
operations and concrete washout water must either
be transported offsite for treatment and disposal
or contained onsite until completely evaporated.
Small jobs, equivalent to 1.5 cubic yards of
concrete, are exempt from the requirements of this
bill. Proposed Intro 578-A would require that all
non-heavy duty asphalt used in the City of New
York contain a minimum of 30 percent recycled
asphalt as measured by weight, beginning January 1
of 2015. All approved heavy duty asphalt would be
required to contain a minimum of ten percent
recycled asphalt as measured by weight. And that
also will begin effect January 1 of 2015. In
issuing specifications for work on City streets,
the City must make best efforts to encourage the
greatest use of recycled asphalt as possible. The
Commissioner of Department of Buildings and the

Commissioner of the Department of Transportation,
after consulting with each other and local asphalt
plants, have the right to waive compliance with
the recycled asphalt requirement, if they find
that a sufficient supply of reclaimed asphalt is
not available. These requirements would not apply
to projects where asphalt content is governed by
federal or New York State law or regulation.
Lastly, proposed Intro 592-A requires new heating,
ventilation and air conditioning systems, or HVAC
systems, installed after January 1 of 2013 to have
a filtration system with a minimum efficiency
reporting value of 11, which will filter 65 to 80
percent of particles between one and three microns
in size, and 85 percent of all particwow, this
is extremely technical, guys. [laughter]
However, alterations or repairs of mechanical
ventilation systems that were installed prior to
January 1 of '13, do not need to meet the
requirements of proposed, of 578-A unless the
replacement or addition of air handling unit
occurs. Air handling units with a design capacity
of less than 5,000 cubic feet are exempted from
the bill, as well as the replacement of air

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nandling systems which cannot be made to comply
with power limitations of the New York City Energy
Conservation Code, as determined by the Department
of Buildings. At this time[background comment]
Abso[laughter] Absolutely not. [background
comments] Well, we have good staff, I'll tell you
that, guys. At this time, I'd like to call on
Council Member Jim Gennaro who is the sponsor of
Intro 576-A to make a brief statement.

Mr. Chairman, I'm grateful for your leadership for bringing these bills forward and working with me, working with the Green Coast Taskforce, working with the industry, working with all stakeholders, you know, to make sure that we had a good outcome, both on 576, regarding concrete washout water and recycled asphalt. You've covered most of the main points of the bill, so I'll speak very briefly about some of the points on 576 and 578, if that's okay, just, I'll just get it out of the way, if that's okay, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRPERSON DILAN: Sure.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENNARO: And with regard to the concrete washout water, this is

something that's already regulated by a DEP rule,
but it's not very effective. And as a result, you
know, there is concrete washout water which does
get into the sewer system, which does hurtgod
bless, and that's on the record, I said god bl
I'm blessing someone on the record, I've never
done that before, so it feels good in the holiday
season to do that. And so as a result, you get
the concrete washout water, which is bad for
marine life, it's bad for the sewer system, you
know, bad for the sewage, for the sewage treatment
plants, when the, you have this very, very caustic
type of material, it's on a level of like a Drano
kind of substance. This is not good for many
reasons, and as you stated, Mr. Chairman, this
will be something that the, that the Buildings
Department can now enforce, they'll have to have
the containers, the containers can't be too, you
know, close to sewer drains, and it's, itit was
a good bill when it started, and made better by
your leadership and by you working with
stakeholders. So, I'm grateful for that. And
with regard to the asphalt bill, Intro 578, this,
you know, really moves the City forward. Right

now, we're, we're kind of the capital of, of
millings from asphalt, most of that goes to
landfills or it goes out of town. Now, you know,
we'll take the, a large amount of the one million
tons of asphalt that are removed every year and
put that back into productive use. This is going
to triple right away the amount of recycled
asphalt that the City uses while having healthy
respect for those heavy duty applications where
you might not want to use as much of the recycled
asphalt. And regarding the supply of asphalt, we
don't think that that's ever going to be a proble
because we have over one million tons that are
basically harvested every year, and will be put t
good use. So, like you, Mr. Chairman, I'm happy
to have been able to bring these bills forward,
and I urge a yes vote of all our colleagues on
these bills. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON DILAN: And I'd like to recognize Council Member Chin on the air quality bill, Intro 592-A.

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you, Chair. First of all I wanted to thank you for your leadership and your support on this bill.

This is a very exciting bill, because it will mean
that New Yorkers, especially residents and workers
in my district in Lower Manhattan, which we have
construction going on on a regular basis, that we
will be able to build better quality air. And
this legislation I especially wanted to thank Jeff
Baker, and all the Committee staff, for really
working on all the fine details and all the,
getting all the expertise on this, and educating
us on what all the MURF [phonetic], you know,
requirements are. But asking the, to increase up
to MURF 11 means that we can filter out some of
the most small particles that can cause, you know,
respiratory disease, like asthma. And I think for
young children and for senior, this will be an
added benefit, and I really urge all of my
colleagues here to support this bill, so that we
can finally have better air quality. And it's
been estimated individual spends about 90 percent
of their time indoors, whether it's at home or at
work. So, if we can improve the air quality, we
can improve our health. Thank you very much.
