2 CHAIRPERSON VACCA: Good afternoon.

My name is James Vacca, and I'm chairman of the Committee in Transportation of the New York City Council, and I'd like to thank everyone for their hard work and input on the bills we're voting on today—Intro 490, 546 and 610 in particular. I want to thank the sponsors of the measures we're voting on today for their hard work. We're also—oh, I'm sorry—and Intro 301. Four bills. Sorry. I also want to mention and thank for his help, Mr. James Huntley [phonetic] of 1181, who was part of the consultative process during the discussions that took place.

The Department of Transportation as you know is currently in the process of converting all the meters in New York City to muni metered parking, and Intro 490 by Council Member Gennaro is designed to protect motorists who are issued a violation for not paying a muni meter even though they can produce a muni meter receipt, showing that the actually paid for parking. This bill gives a five minute grace period to allow people time to pay the meter and get back to their car with the receipt. Under current law, a motorist

can dispute such a ticket by requesting an in	
person or online hearing. Proposal 490-A allow	/S
traffic agents to cancel such a violation upon	
presentation of a valid muni meter receipt as l	ong
as the receipt is within the five minutes.	
Similarly, Council Member Garodnick allows a	
motorist to use a muni meter receipt as an	
affirmative defense to a parking violation. The	ıe
receipt will be admissible at an on person hear	ing
or by mail, in so much as the defense is	
concerned.	

Proposed Intro 546 by Council

Member Greenfield prohibits the use of adhesive

stickers in the enforcement of alternate side of

the street parking rules. Currently, violators of

alternate side parking rules are given a violation

and then they have this bright yellow/green type

sticker places in their window. While the

Department of Sanitation has argued that this

practice is meant to deter alternate side

violators such a practice really amounts to double

punishment. It's the feeling of this Committee

that the parking violation is sufficient to

address anyone who violates alternate side parking

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2 rules. There's not a need for that sticker based 3 on the fact that that person will get a summons.

4 Intro 610 by Council Member Sanders 5 is a straightforward bill that prohibits the Department of Finance from assessing late fees for 6 at least 30 days after a determination has been made or in the case of an appeal at least 30 days 9 after an appeal determination has been made. bill will ensure that motorists in our city have 10 11 sufficient time to dispute a parking ticket 12 without having to worry about late fees. I think 13 all these bills will make our city a better place 14 to live and a fairer place to live and I hope the 15 Committee will vote yes on these bills. Again, I 16 thank the staff as well, the Committee staff and my staff for their hard work, and for all the 17 18 stakeholders who participated in discussions 19 during the process. I would like to call on any of the sponsors, if they wish to say anything 20 21 about the bill that they have before the Committee 22 today. Are there any sponsors who wish to be 23 heard? Council Member Garodnick?

COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and I'll be extremely brief

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because I think that you laid out the contours of
301-A, which is the bill that I introduced
perfectly. I think that the bottom line is that
too frequently muni meters are down the block.
They take time to access. Sometimes there's a
line. Sometimes the person who is seeking a muni
meter can't move all that quickly for one reason
or another. This bill allows you to successfully
contest a ticket if you can produce that receipt
within-showing that it was issued within five
minutes of the time of the ticket. My view here
is that nobody should be punished for going to do
precisely what it is that they're supposed to do.
I thank you for your interest in this bill and I
thank my colleagues on the Committee.

CHAIRPERSON VACCA: Thank you,
Council Member Garodnick. Council Member
Greenfield?

COUNCIL MEMBER GREENFIELD: Thank

you, Mr. Chairman. You know, first, I do want to

congratulate my colleagues--I'll start with Dan

Garodnick-not just for the email that he just sent

me, but for the bill that he is passing today

along with Council Member Gennaro and James. The

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theme of all these bills are they're common sense
pieces of legislation. We should not be nickel,
diming New Yorkers. We should be trying to make
people's lives a little bit easier, not that much
more difficult. My bill is a simple bill.
Basically everyone in this country is innocent
until proven guilty, except until this point when
the Sanitation Department decides to slap a
sticker on your car that is almost impossible to
remove unless you have advanced training in
chemistry, and so, I'm very grateful to the
Committee and to the Chair, the staff and the
Speaker for passing my bill, passing the package
of terrific bills today, and I encourage everyone
to vote yes.

CHAIRPERSON VACCA: Are there any other members besides the sponsors who wish to be heard at this time? Council Member Mealy?

COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: Yes, I just want to congratulate my colleagues, Dan Garodnick, Greenfield, Gennaro. This package is an excellent package, but at the hearing before I asked for my name to be taken off, and I'm glad to say that now I've spoken to the president of 1180 and they feel

that this legislation is good for their union, but
I just hope that this measure has a potential to
save time and money for all parties involved.
Drivers who purchase a muni meter ticket in a
timely fashion will not have to miss work to
defend themselves against a charge that will
probably be dismissed. Traffic will be able
to devote this saved time to other enforcement
work. I believe this increased efficiency
justifies support for the proposed legislation.
Nevertheless, I am concerned that confrontations
between agents and drivers will be increased by
drivers who scramble to beat the clock and chase
down agents to demand cancellation. For this
reason, I ask that the Commissioner closely
monitor incidents of assaults on traffic agents
that occur following implementation to this
measure and include this information in the
required annual report. Such assaults can and
should be prosecuted as felonies in which already
we know that if you do assault a traffic agent, it
is a felony as has been allowed under the New York
State law since 2008; same as I guess now bus
operators, it's a felony. This information will

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allow us to determine if traffic agents' safety is
compromised by this legislation and respond
accordingly, and I'm glad to hear that the Finance
Department will give the unions training to make
sure that they know how to handle these situations
and I would like to come on to the bill now.
Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON VACCA: Thank you,

Council Member Mealy, and please add the Council

Member's name as per her request. I do want to

indicate to all that this Committee's committed to

an oversight insomuch as these bills and other

bills we pass are concerned and I want to thank

the union again for their input in this process,

and thank Council Member Mealy. Many of the

concerns that she addressed at our previous

hearing were addressed when the bill was discussed

among the stakeholders. I thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: Thank you, Chair.

23	exception of 490-A. While I wholeheartedly agree
24	with the intent, I am concerned about agents
25	adjudicating tickets on the spot in the field, so

4	on all, but I really believe this Committee has
5	its work to do as far as ensuring that our
6	personnel are not being abused in the city of New
7	York. Thank you.
