2	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Good morning,
3	ladies and gentlemen. My name is Joe Rivera. You
4	ready? Okay. My name is Joe Rivera. I chair the
5	Committee on Rules, Privileges and Elections.
6	Before we begin, let me introduce the members who
7	are here with us today. We have two my life, we
8	have Council member James Vacca, Council Member
9	Van Bramer, Council Member—he's joining us, but
10	not a member of the Committee. We also have to my

20	before us. Before us we have Erika Thomas-Yuille,
21	a Manhattan resident is a candidate for
22	appointment by the mayor to the Conflicts of
23	Interest Board. If the Council gives its advice
24	and consent, she will replace Angela Fyer

[phonetic] and serve for the remainder of a six

We'll begin with Ms. Thomas-Yuille. I will			
briefly explain the functions of the Conflicts of			
Interest Board. The Conflicts of Interest Board			
is the entity that serves to provide clear			
guidance to public employees regarding prohibited			
conduct through training, education and the			
issuance of advisory opinions. The Board also			
adopts rules to implement and interpret the			
revisions of the Conflicts of Interest Code. It			
reviews and decides on alleged violations of said			
code with the power to impose fines that can be as			
high as \$10,000 or includes suspension or			
dismissal from city service where appropriate.			
The Board also collects and reviews financial			
disclosure reports. Board members are entitled to			
receive a per diem in the amount of \$250 for each			
calendar day that they perform work for the board.			
The chair receives \$275. Do you have an opening			
statement?			

ERIKA THOMAS-YUILLE: [off mic]

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Just press the mic and state your name for the record, and you may begin.

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ERIKA THOMAS YUILLE: Erika Thomas-
Yuille. Very briefly, I feel honored to be
considered for appointment as a member of the
Conflicts of Interest Board, so I thank the City
Council and the Mayor's Office for this
opportunity. In particular, I thank Council
Member Dickens, and I understand that she is not
able to be present today. I've been a practicing
attorney in New York City for 18 years, and my
background and experience in private practice, in
government and now in the corporate sector gives
me a unique perspective that I look forward to
contributing as a member of the Conflicts of
Interest Board.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Perfect.

We'll save the questions until all of the presenters speak. Next is Mr. Shpetner. I will briefly explain the functions of the Environmental Control Board. Within the New York City Office of Administrative Trials and Hearings (OATH) there is an Environmental Control Board (ECB) that adjudicates notices of violations issued by various city agencies, including the Department of Environmental Protection, Police, Sanitation,

2	Health and Mental Hygiene, Fire, and Buildings.
3	ECB has the power to render decisions and orders
4	and to impose civil penalties under law. ECB may
5	apply to a court of competent jurisdiction for
6	enforcement of any decision, order or subpoena
7	that it issues. Among the provisions of the law
8	enforced by ECB are those relating to the
9	cleanliness of city streets, the disposal of
10	waste, the prevision of a pure, wholesome and
11	adequate supply of water, the prevention of air,
12	water and noise pollution, the regulation of
13	street peddling and the city response to
14	emergencies caused by releases or threatened
15	releases of hazardous substances. ECB has the
16	authority to make, amend or rescind such rules and
17	regulations as may be necessary to carry out its
18	duties. Also ECB has concurrent jurisdiction with
19	the Board of Health to enforce those divisions of
20	the health code and the rules and regulations
21	relating thereto that the Board of Health shall
22	designate. ECB consists of the commissioners of
23	the Department of Environmental Protection,
24	Sanitation, Health and Mental Hygiene, Buildings,
25	Police, Fire and the chief administrative law

2	judge of OATH as well as six persons appointed by
3	the mayor with the advice and consent of the
4	Council. The chief administrative judge of OATH
5	serves as chair of ECB. Within its appropriation,
6	ECB may appoint an executive director and such
7	hearing officers including non-salaried hearing
8	officers and other employees as it finds necessary
9	to properly perform its duties. Members other
10	than agency commissioners may not be employed by
11	the city. Five of the six non-commission members
12	must possess broad general background and
13	experience—one in each of the following areas: air
14	pollution control, water pollution control, noise
15	pollution control, real estate or the business
16	community. This sixth non-commissioner member
17	represents the general public. Members other than
18	the agency commissioners are compensated and
19	receive a \$175.10 per diem when performing the
20	work of ECB. Members' terms are for four years.
21	Do you have an opening statement?
22	THOMAS SHPETNER: Yes, thank you.
23	Very briefly-
24	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: [Interposing]
25	Just state your name for the record.

THOMAS SHPETNER: Oh, pardon me.

My name is Thomas Shpetner. I'm 43 years old and a longtime resident of Park Slope in Brooklyn. I have two little boys we're raising there. I'm honored and pleased to be considered by the Council and I want to thank the Mayor's Office for proposing me. I have a long history of public sector awareness, beginning with my parents who were both school teachers, and have worked in various capacities, including for HHC and for the United States Securities and Exchange Commission and I'm very eager to apply my experience and my background to the functions of the ECB, so thank you for your consideration.

Will now move to Bishop Taylor. I will briefly describe the functions of the Civilian Complaint Review Board. The Civilian Complaint Review Board aka CCRB is an independent body charged with the duty to investigate complaints of misconduct by police officers toward the public. Board members are required to reflect the city's diversity. The Board consists of 13 members—5 designated by the Council for appointment by the mayor, 5 appointed

by the mayor and 3 designated by the police commissioner, which are the only members who have law enforcement experience. CCRB has a civilian staff responsible for conducting investigations of complaints received by the Board. CCRB jurisdiction is limited to complaints claiming excessive force, abuse of authority, discourtesy or use of offensive language. The Board operates in panels of at least three members. All CCRB members are eligible for compensation on a per diem basis. The current per diem rate is \$315 per

morning, everyone. I'm Bishop Mitchell Taylor, the senior pastor of the Central of Hope
International and the general overseer of the Hope
Fellowship of Churches International and also the founder and president of the East River
Development Alliance. I've had the wonderful privilege of living in New York all of my life, growing up in Queensbridge Houses and living around Queensbridge, Long Island City all of my life. I've had the privilege of serving on the Civilian Complaint Review Board for the past two

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2	and a half years. I think that my experience in
3	growing up in public housing and serving residents
4	that live in public housing, not only in
5	northwestern Queens, but city-wide, gives me a
6	unique perspective on some of the things that take
7	place in the streets with our officers and our
8	citizens of New York, and being able to jockey
9	between both of the opinions and allegations that
10	are penned [phonetic] in the complaint takes
11	someone that has a sense of what's happening in
12	the street as well as what's happening with the
13	police department, and I think I have a unique
14	perspective on both, serving in many capacities in
15	the city of New York over my 25 year tenure as a
16	pastor. I can go on and on, but I guess I'll
17	stop. I'm a preacher. What do you expect?
18	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: We expect you
19	to preach. Thank you very much. We've also been
20	joined by Council Member Erik Dilan and Alicia
21	Vassal [phonetic] from the Committee as well, and
22	before we go on to a vote, I'm going to ask
23	Council Member James Van Bramer who is with us

here today to say a few words...

COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: Thank

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you very much, Mr. Chair, for allowing me to visit your distinguished Committee and say a few words about a great constituent of mine, Bishop Mitchell Taylor. We work very closely together. we were together about 10pm last night celebrating Black History Month in Queensbridge and he has served with great distinction on the CCRB for two and a half years, and as you can see in the booklet is a terrific member and as well as a great preacher. I attend services at Center of Hope periodically and in fact, attended with my mother a few weeks back. Of course, the Eastern Development Alliance and the work that goes on there is really changing lives every single day, so I can't think of a better person to be on the CCRB and I want to thank Bishop for volunteering and serving the City of New York in so many different capacities. Given all that he has got on his plate, we're lucky to have him, and I know many of my colleagues already know Bishop Taylor and the work that he does, but I wanted to be here today to say a few good words and of course, urge everyone to support it. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very

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2	much. We also have a written statement by Council
3	Member Inez E. Dickens in support of the
4	appointment of Erika Thomas-Yuille to the

> It states, good morning. I would like to express my support for the appointment of Erika Thomas-Yuille to the New York City Conflicts of Interest Board. quickly, Mr. Chairman, and you know, the investigative booklet we get on each of the candidates has certain information, and I just wanted to make sure if something in here is not correct that you correct it—I've noticed of the three candidates only Bishop Taylor, according to this book, voted in 2011, and the other two candidates last voted in 2010. That's what the book says. If it's incorrect, I'd give you the chance to correct it on the record.

THOMAS SHPETNER: Okay, to the best of my recollection, I've never missed a vote. If that is not in fact the case, I am just sitting her confused.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: It says it's based on BOE records, so that's why I wanted to just put it out there if that's not correct.

THOMAS SHPETNER: The morning of 9/11 I voted in the Democratic primary and didn't make it to work that day. I was employed at the Securities and Exchange Commission, so if anyone understands the importance of voting, I'll vote for a dogcatcher. If there's a mistake in there, I'll certainly amend it.
