2	CHAIRPERSON SANDERS: This hearing
3	will now come to order. Good morning and thank
4	you for coming. My name is Council Member James
5	Sanders, Jr. and I am the chair of the Committee
6	on Civil Service and Labor. Again, I need to
7	announce that the Council recently started webcast
8	hearings live on our websitejust so that we are
9	aware that we are live and archived forever on the
10	Council's website. This morning we will be having
11	a second hearing and voting on proposed Resolution
12	1319-A, which calls upon the legislature to pass
13	and Governor Cuomo to sign into law Assembly 99148
14	and Senate 6413, which would raise the state's
15	minimum wage from \$7.25 an hour to \$8.50 an hour,
16	and unlike the current law, the rate would be
17	increased automatically due to inflation. To
18	reiterate what we have learned at last week's
19	hearings, New York's minimum wage was last
20	increased in 2009 from \$5.15 an hour to \$7.25 an
21	hour. Today \$7.56 would be required to buy what
22	\$7.25 worth of goods would have been in 2009. I
23	think an increase to \$8.50 is modest and
24	reasonable. This is a no brainer. \$7.25 is
25	currently the federal minimum wage, but the law

allows states to set a higher rate. The idea that				
the same wage applies to every state when it's far				
more expensive to live in some places like New				
York, it's already problematic. So the fact that				
it is so controversial to require employers to pay				
\$8.25 an hour in New York in 2012 is beyond me,				
but here we are, calling upon the state to the				
right thing for our city's most vulnerable				
workers, many of whom work in some of the most				
difficult jobs imaginable. We have to thank				
Council Member Jumaane Williams for sponsoring				
this resolution. We have been joined by Council				
Members Seabrook of the Bronx and our Chair of				
Finance Recchia of Brooklyn. Other members have				
been in and are coming back to this hearing. We				
want to thank the Committee staff, Matthew Carlon				
[phonetic], who is counsel, and Faith Corbett				
[phonetic], our policy analyst and Alex Kevorkian				
[phonetic], senior economist. We look forward to				
a good vote on this issue.
