SPEAKER QUINN: We have a number of different legislative items that we are voting on, but obviously, one of the biggest things, in addition to the three veto overrides on the West Side rezoning that we are voting on tonight, is the budget for the fiscal year that starts on July 1st. And I just first of all want to start by thanking all of the Members of the Council, in particular, the budget negotiating team and my leadership team for all of your hard works

throughout this entire budget process.

You know, if you think about it, there is no document whether it's for a company, a government, your home, that speaks more about what your priorities are than your budget. What a government or a person spends money on speaks volumes about that person or that entity and what they hold dear and what is important to them. And through the work we did in this budget, I think we sent a clear message that our priority is the children of New York City, and that our priority is making sure that every child has the best possible foundation so they can move forward and excel in academics and live whatever their dream

is.

And we've done that in this budget by making sure our daycare that we're subsidizing are now academic daycares, if you will. Also by making sure that younger children have the opportunity to be part of that daycare. But we also did it by recognizing that community-based organizations that have been working, in some cases, with families and children for decades and decades and decades need to be part of that early childhood education foundation.

And the work we put into this
wasn't just putting money back into the budget,
which isn't easy, but it was more than that, it
was putting money back in and putting it back in a
very specific way, that identified groups that had
to be part of this new process and ways we could
make sure that groups that wanted to be, but
needed a little extra technical assistance got
that technical assistance. We also made sure in
this budget that after school programs, which are
so incredibly important, to making sure children
have a little extra academic tutoring, making sure
children have access to arts and music and

athletics, things that excite them and energize
them, making sure that children had a place to go
that kept them out of harm's way and off of the
streets, that those programs remained intact for
this summer and the entire upcoming year.

This is a budget that sends a message, I hope, to working families that they and their children are our priority.

Now I have a bunch of thank yous I want to make, but first and foremost, I think I speak for all of my colleagues when I say that our Finance chair has done an unbelievably outstanding job this year.

And but you know what, in all of that fun and all of that ice coffee, Domenic never--with like 18 Splendas and scented milk and there's like very little caffeine after Domenic [off mic] is mixing his coffee--but within the midst of all that fun, Domenic never once in this process took his eye

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off the prize.

And when he heard, for example, that there were pending layoffs of 650 Department of Education workers, most of them teacher aides, he could have said, well that really wasn't part of the executive, he could have said there were no teacher layoffs, he could have said there's no attrition of teachers, he could have said we're taking care of EarlyLearn and Out-of-School Time and that's enough, but he didn't. In literally the final hours of the budget, Domenic locked himself, Dennis Walcott, the Department of Education, and DC 37 in a room and stayed in that room until concessions were made that prevented those layoffs. That is the kind of can-do, hard working, focused on the children of the city of New York Finance chair that we have. And, Domenic, we are incredibly lucky and the 8.4 million people of the city of New York are incredibly lucky that you are our Finance chair. So thank you so much.

With a little creativity and teamwork, we were able to come together and find the resources necessary to deliver a smart and workable budget for New Yorkers across all five boroughs.

Remember, this budget also stands as a testament to what we care about as a city. This year, it was all about our children and our future. By working together with Mayor Bloomberg, the City Council was able to achieve our greatest success, which was restoring daycare and after school programs providing tens of thousands of children with quality care.

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One daycare center that stood out
that we got so many calls and e-mails was the
Children's Growing Placea child care center
housed in a domestic violence shelter. We support
this center and others throughout the city to
ensure that our children have a safe place to go,
a place that cultivates their talents, and is
conducive to economic achievement.

Another priority was keeping New Yorkers employed. As we try to shape our city and work with our city, we must listen to all of the people that have a stake in the city, and Mark Weprin has been a great Subcommittee chair. So I want to thank him and thank all of the Members of the Land Use Committee for their attentiveness to detail with this complex situation.

Dinerstein, Laura Smith, who is an amazing public servant, and David Karnovsky, managed to take a very complicated issue, do an extensive amount of research, and point out the unique, as Council Member Comrie indicated, character of the Upper West Side, including the land use and residents' concerns, they met and talked to the owners, as well as the BIDs, and the Chambers of Commerce, and the residents. And I think what we have is a proposal that is uniquely configured to address the needs of our community on the Upper West Side and it is not applicable to other city neighborhoods.

And to reiterate, this proposal will not affect existing stores, only the frontage of new or expanding businesses. It does not restrict stores or prevent chain stores from coming into our neighborhood, it does not limit the size of stores, only the ground floor frontages, and it doesn't limit how many businesses of a certain type may operate in the neighborhood. What the regulations do is to ensure that over time the general multi-store character of our beloved Amsterdam and Columbus

This override which you are about to do over responsible banking act, it really enacts the strongest local community reinvestment law in the nation. This act emphasizes transparency and encourages community reinvestment. Unlike the Mayor's protests, we do not require banks to do anything. What we do is focus on transparency. And unless you identify transparency as being a requirement, definitely it does not require, but it does shed the light, it does have involvement, it does let everybody in the city of New York know what's going on, and it does create an advisory board and the banks are represented on that board. What they will do is to assess what's happening in your neighborhoods around the city in terms of what their banking needs are.

It will determine if the banks

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where we give the taxpayers' money are, ir	ı fact,
addressing those needs. This is very impo	ortant,

A significant bill, thank you. We did the right thing, I know we're going to reaffirm that legislation by voting again, hopefully, unanimously with a couple exceptions, for a very significant bill. Thank you.

much, Al. And lastly, we are going to vote to override the veto of Intro 251-A, the living wage bill. I want to thank Council Member Koppell and Council Member Palma, who were the prime sponsors of this legislation. This bill just quite simply says that if you are a business or a company that decides to take a significant amount of taxpayer dollars, with that decision comes the obligation to pay workers a living wage. It tracks consistently with the living wage legislation this

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Council passed and Mayor Bloomberg signed in 2002,
a piece of legislation that, when it was enacted,
had no negative effect on the healthcare and
social service sectors that it addressed. We
believe this bill will help raise wages and
support working families and be the right thing
for taxpayer dollars.

And I'd urge everyone to vote to override all of these vetoes, to vote for the budget, and to approve the West Side rezoning.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very much, Madam Speaker. We now move on to Discussion of General Orders. Council Member Garodnick?

COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK: Thank

you very much. And, Speaker Quinn, first I want

to congratulate you and the rest of our colleagues

for your dedicated work and advocacy over the past

several months to ensure that we have a budget

that is passed on time with maximum collaboration

and minimal acrimony. Of course, the Finance staff--Preston, Domenic, we know how hard you have worked to make that successful. And I'm relieved that we're able to work through the budget dance to restore critical funds to our childcare programs, our firehouses, libraries, and other critical needs.

And while I am pleased to vote in support of the budget today, I just want to take this occasion to raise a word of caution about where we are headed. This year's budget relies extensively on one-shots to the tune of over \$2 billion to bring it into balance without the need for tax increases or layoffs. For example, we rely on a total of \$605 million as a result of settlements with SAIC for the CityTime scandal, and ING Bank, due to record falsification.

We also assume \$635 million from the sale of taxi medallions. However, given that the courts are currently deciding the fate of this plan, we may need to make significant mid-year cuts to address the absence of this revenue.

We also lean on another billion dollars from the Retiree Health Benefits Trust

2	Fund. I should note that our unfunded post-
3	employment benefit liability for city retirees,
4	not including pension costs, is a massive \$84
5	billion. These obligations will come due and we
6	need to remember that for the sake of our
7	retirees.
8	One-shots can have an important
9	place in a budget process, particularly in times
10	of emergency, like right after September 11th,
11	however, we are running the risk of becoming too
12	reliant on this tool. We will face, not only
13	budget gaps in the coming fiscal years, but also
14	fewer one-shots to plug those holes.
15	So let's be honest with ourselves,
16	that is going to present new challenges for us.
17	So as we celebrate tonight a balanced budget, let
18	us steel ourselves for what lies ahead. Thank
19	you.

colleagues, I want to say to you that we live in the richest city in the world and for years we've been doing this budget process. Seventy-three

we first started, we had 83,000 slots for summer
youth workers, it went down in '09 to 55,000
slots, now we're down to 31,000 slots140,000
young people are going to apply for those jobs.
We are going to have a long, hot summer in the
richest city in the world, \$68 billion. Our
daycare vouchers, we restored the cut from last
year, they're down \$2,700 a voucher, we need
\$5,000 a voucher for those slots and that's not
sufficient.

The Peter Vallone scholarships for the CUNY students are zeroed out for the second year in a row. It's going to hurt CUNY students. In the richest city in the world.

The EarlyLearn process should have been halted. There's a lot of providers that will lose out on that, and those providers who should have had four-year contracts, particularly in the Black, Latino, and Asian communities, will now have one-year contracts because of our discretionary restoration.

This budget does not reflect what

However, however, it is a compromise that restores the baseline items with one-time fixes from prior budget surpluses without resolving our long-term shortfalls. There are ever-increasing debt services, the overreaching spending of this government, and a near-crisis pension situation which goes unresolved in this budget. We are short-term funding in a unsustainable manner on a hope--a hope that the Independent Budget Office of the City of New York says is unrealistic which will lead to a \$2.5 billion shortfall next year. In as soon as six months, even the New York Times acknowledges that

we will not have enough to track the budget that
we've passed. This is not a solution. It only
delays the day of reckoning to make that later
solution even more onerous and severe.

In addition, our outer boroughs, particularly Queens, are not equally compensated in proportion to their size, population, or contribution to the tax rolls. It is a long-term deficit that has never been remedied by City Hall. We continue to be in danger of driving out small business owners, homeowners, and the middle class with overregulation, city taxation, and the gotcha mentality of our agency revenue programs from parking tickets on our streets to water bills in our homes. These approaches are not responsible, they are unsustainable, and we will be back for PEGs in the fall.

And the city budget of 2014 will require us to face choices like massive layoffs, cuts to vital services, and huge hits to discretionary and capital spending in this city and a very deep and transparent tax increase, unlike the ones contained in this budget. We have a moral and fiscal obligation to the citizens of

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2	this city, we have been shirking it for years and		
3	failing to act. Today, there is a hope for a		
4	brighter tomorrow even as the storm clouds are		
5	gathering.		
6	Regrettably, I must vote no on
