2	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Good morning.
3	I'm pleased to call this meeting of the City
4	Council Land Use Subcommittee on Landmarks, Public
5	Siting and Maritime Uses to order. I'm City
6	Council Member Brad Lander. We are joined this
7	morning by Committee members Dan Halloran of
8	Queens, Jumaane Williams of Brooklyn, Annabel
9	Palma of the Bronx—Council Member Palma wins the
10	timeliness and patience prize for the Subcommittee
11	this morning—and Maria del Carmen Arroyo from the
12	Bronx and James Sanders from Queens, who is right
13	there, and there are also other members of the
14	Land Use Committee with us this morning, including
15	the chair, Leroy Comrie. We'll have the Land Use
16	meeting in just a minute.
17	So this meeting is being called
18	back from recess from yesterday's meeting and
19	there were a couple of items we talked about
20	yesterday that Council Members who were not there
21	will vote on, but we are mostly this morning
22	reopening four Land Use items, Land Use No. 622,
23	623, 624 and 625, all in Speaker Quinn's district,
24	32, 34, and 36 Dominick Street house as well and
25	the Dennison and Lydia Wood House. As people will

1 SUBCOMM ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING, MARITIME 3 remember who were at our Subcommittee meeting, the 2 three Dominick Street buildings occasioned a 3 4 thorough, significant and I thought one of our 5 quite thoughtful debates about land marking. The owners of 34 and 36 came and raised objections. 6 We looked at pictures and because 32 still has the 7 8 dormers intact, which in many ways for people as 9 sort of the key visual symbol of a federal style house. I think people asked a lot of questions. 10 11 We learned a lot about Flemish bond style 12 brickwork and all the various features of federal 13 houses. I do think it was a good education for Committee members on what the elements are of 14 15 federal houses and why we're trying to preserve 16 them. We agonized about this and thought a lot 17 about in Committee and after our hearing, I know 18 that Speaker Quinn in whose district these 19 buildings reside and Community Board 2 also 20 agonized about it a lot, consulted with the 21 owners, looked at the buildings, consulted with 22 the preservation community and consulted with the 23 LPC. And after that consideration, both Speaker 24 Quinn, the Council Member for the district and 25 Community Board 2 by a significant margin

SUBCOMM ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING, MARITIME 1 4 reaffirmed the preference that 32, 34 and 36 as 2 well as the Dennison and Lydia Wood House be 3 designated as landmarks and that the existing and 4 5 remaining features of these federal style houses be preserved and with that in mind, I am 6 7 recommending to members of the Subcommittee that we vote aye on all four of these items. Unless 8 9 anyone has a statement or a question or a comment, we will go ahead and ask the-Council Member 10 11 Halloran? 12 COUNCIL MEMBER HALLORAN: I'm going 13 to break my norms and actually say something, 14 right? I've been quite since my surgery. Haven't 15 I? No? Mr. Chair, I appreciate that this body 16 looked very deeply at these issues, and of course, 17 when we were first presented with them, we didn't 18 actually have word from the Speaker's Office as to 19 how the Speaker felt about something in her 20 district and I'm glad that we have that 21 information now. It is clear to me that 32 meets 22 the criteria outlined by the LPC. What is also 23 clear to me is that neither 34, 36 or 38 come 24 close to meeting the criteria. There have been 25 substantial alterations to those buildings over

The cost to these individuals to revert if 2 necessary-and that was why I asked that question, 3 "What would happen if someone wanted to replace 4 5 the currently existing structures of the building as it is right now when its designated?" And the 6 7 answer was they could not. They must go back and 8 replace them as if they were never there and 9 revert them to the federal style accouterments 10 that would be necessary and that ran from 11 everything from windows and doors to bricking, 12 façade, and even lintels. I don't think that is 13 fair. I don't think we have a right to tell a homeowner who has been in a house for two, three 14 15 generations as it is in the case of 34, that they 16 have to take on this burden because the city of 17 New York is willing to be so flexible in its 18 definition of what a federal style house is, a 19 definition that actually as I pointed out again 20 based on architectural digests is not the same criteria being used by the city in that 21 22 designation process. I urge my colleagues to 23 realize the private property has an essential and 24 core value to it and that we cannot strip our 25 property owners of their rights simply because we

Now in the case 32, it is very clear 2 that there have not been substantial alterations 3 to that building and that it remains from top to 4 5 bottom as it was fairly much when constructed. The other buildings have not and it is not the 6 7 place of this body to substitute our desire to landmark over that of the owners' given a lack of 8 9 criteria to the LPC. I urge my colleagues to 10 realize that there are very real people sitting in 11 the audience right now, including the owner of two 12 of those buildings who will be severely 13 financially impacted by this in a time where we 14 can't afford to put them in any more harm's way 15 economically than they are already in because of 16 the state of this country with a 10% unemployment rate in New York City alone and a 4% property 17 18 penalty that they will pay if they choose to sell it because of Obama Care. I know you don't 19 20 realize that-21 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: [Interposing] 22 Council Member, up 'til now, alright? Let's cut 23 it out - - healthcare. 24 [crosstalk] 25 [break in audio]

3	no on 34 and 36 and 38. 38 is not here, right?
4	36. And vote yes to 32, if we feel the federal
5	building is appropriate as a landmark.
6	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you,
7	Council Member Halloran. Just so I'll clarify for
8	people, what we have before us are Land Use No.
9	622, 623 and 624 are 32, 34 and 36 Dominick
10	Street. 38 Dominick Street is not before us
11	today. It was originally proposed but then
12	decalendared [phonetic], so it is not on the table
13	todaya fact which I will note Community Board 2
14	is unhappy about and wishes that we were in fact
15	designating 38 today, but 32 is the one that has
16	the dormers. 34 and 36 do not. Land Use 625 is
17	another unconnected but nearby federal style
18	building, the Dennison and Lydia Wood House at 310
19	Spring Street, which I think the prevailing
20	sentiment at the Subcommittee was met everybody's
21	tests for what a federal style building is, so the
22	two that are more contentious are 623 and 624, 34
23	and 36 Dominick Street. I do feel compelled to
24	note that actually the bottom-they're not quite
25	top to bottom the same, even 32 because the bottom

2	was a good six or eight feet lower at one point in
3	time, but that was before the Holland Tunnel.
4	Anyway, I do think that having-the Subcommittee as
5	well as Speaker Quinn and the Community Board I
6	know, it mattered a lot to have the owners speak
7	to us to present and that we don't act lightly
8	when we impose a regulation and that the belief
9	that it's worthy of preserving federal style
10	architecture even when it has been in some cases
11	modified and especially when there is several
12	adjacent buildings merits the actions that we're
13	taking today. So let's end the debate there. If
14	folks want to make brief statements with the
15	votes, obviously they can. I urge a vote of aye
16	on all and ask our counsel, Christian Hilton, to
17	call the roll.
18	COUNSEL: Chair Lander?
19	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Aye on all.
20	COUNSEL: Council Member Sanders?
21	COUNCIL MEMBER SANDERS: Yielding
22	to the district Council Member, I am persuaded
23	further by the Chair, I vote aye on all.
24	COUNSEL: Council Member Palma?
25	COUNCIL MEMBER PALMA: Permission

SUBCOMM ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING, MARITIME 1 9 to vote on the items that were voted on yesterday, 2 and with that, I vote aye. 3 COUNSEL: Council Member Arroyo? 4 5 COUNCIL MEMBER ARROYO: Also requesting permission to vote on L.U. 636 and L.U. 6 7 649 adopted yesterday and the rest of today's 8 calendar. Aye on all. 9 COUNSEL: Council Member Williams? COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: 10 11 Requesting permission to vote on items voted on 12 yesterday and permission to make a statement 13 before I vote. So my plan was to come in and vote 14 yes for 622 and no for 623 and 624. Having heard 15 from the Speaker's Office, who I know probably had 16 some more information that I didn't, still not fully persuaded, still have some concerns, so I'm 17 18 going to abstain from 623 and 624, vote aye on 622 19 and the items that were voted on yesterday. 20 COUNSEL: Council Member Halloran? 21 COUNCIL MEMBER HALLORAN: 22 Permission to explain my vote? 23 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Granted. Ι 24 thought you did. 25 COUNCIL MEMBER HALLORAN: Just I

1 SUBCOMM ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING, MARITIME 10 appreciate the fact that the Speaker has a 2 district and I will vote aye on 622; however, I 3 4 cannot in good conscience vote aye on the rest, 5 and so I will vote no. б CHAIRPERSON LANDER: On 625 as 7 well? 8 COUNCIL MEMBER HALLORAN: No, no. 9 On 625 as an aye as well. 10 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Okay. 623 and 11 624. 12 COUNCIL MEMBER HALLORAN: No on 623 13 and 624. COUNSEL: Okay. Final vote of the 14 15 Subcommittee on Landmarks on L.U. 636, 649, seven 16 in the affirmative, none in the negative and no 17 abstentions. On L.U. 622, six in the affirmative, 18 none in the negative and no abstentions. On L.U. 19 623, four in the affirmative, one in the negative 20 and on abstention. On L.U. 624, four in the 21 affirmative, one in the negative, one abstention. 22 On L.U. 625, six in the affirmative, none in the 23 negative and no abstentions. 24 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: And just for 25 the record, 636 is the Park Slope Historic

2	District extension, which had enough votes
3	yesterday, but now is unanimous seven to nothing,
4	and I want to thank my colleagues. It's a
5	wonderful extension. My community is thrilled
6	about it. And 649 is in Council Member
7	Garodnick's district, so we're glad that he is
8	here. It is the Barbizon House for Women for
9	which there was also a unanimous vote yesterday,
10	but we're grateful to have the remainder of our
11	colleagues. Thank you very much. This
12	Subcommittee meeting is adjourned.
