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CHAIRPERSON DILAN: Good morning everybody. My name is Erik Martin Dilan and I'm the Chairperson of the City Council's Committee on Housing and Buildings.

Today, the committee will consider two items for the purposes of a vote. The first of which is Intro 808-A, which is a local law to amend the Plumbing Code of the City of New York in relation to bringing it up to date with the 2009 edition of the International Plumbing Code, with differences that reflect the unique character of the City of New York.

The second item will be Intro 730-A, which is a local law to amend the Administrative Code of the City of New York in relation to disclosure of information regarding certain construction projects.

Intro 807-A would amend the City's

Plumbing Code to include selected changes

presented in the 2009 International Plumbing Code

and would also make changes specific to New York

City. Proposed Intro 807-A has been amended since

it was first heard in May, and I ask that you

refer to the committee report for those updates

and the review of the substantive changes in the code that's presented in the bill before us today.

4 Intro 730-A will enhance

transparency of HPD's process for selecting developers for housing development projects. This bill will require HPD to post information online, including how certain developers were selected and provide information on the project's location, size, number of dwelling units and affordability levels. It will also require HPD to provide information to the public regarding post-construction conditions that tenants or homeowners of affordable housing have experienced.

Intro 730-A was first heard by this committee on January 30th of this year. Since first hearing this item, my committee staff has met with an array of stakeholders. The final version of this bill we will vote on today takes into account many of the concerns expressed by such stakeholders. As is in 807-A, I'd like to just ask that any persons interested refer to the committee report on the changes made to this bill.

I'd like to ask for both items to be coupled and ask the clerk to call the roll.

CHAIRPERSON DILAN: I vote aye.

CLERK: Rivera?

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: I vote aye.

CLERK: Brewer?

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: I'd like to vote aye, but with an explanation regarding Intro 730-A. I think certainly the credit goes to Laura Rogers in particular, counsel to the committee, who has helped me draft this. I appreciate her briefing me on the specifics. I do think that in the future when we have a bill that has so many changes that are of concern to the community at large, it would be good to have a second hearing. I am just as guilty for not having brought this to the attention of our wonderful chair, because we probably could have scheduled it. So that's my fault. But I want to indicate that in the future we should all be cognizant of more discussion. Even though it may be a great bill, we just need to understand it.

Number two, I think with perhaps more understanding, I would have understood more questions related to the 8020, which I think could be answered as to why those particular projects are exempted. I think I also would have understood a little bit more about the complaint-driven system, if a business has got a complaint, what that means and who made it and how it will be investigated, so there are no problems for the person who was the subject of the complaint but maybe it was a bogus complaint. All those issues are often an issue in government in general. It would have been good to have answers to those questions.

On the other hand, I do believe that people should be transparent about wage issues for the benefit of the workers and the public at large. As somebody, for those of you who know, who has spent many years in the last few years looking at payroll companies in support of a certain bill, I know that the issue is burdens are not as drastic as some may think, if one has a reputable payroll company. That payroll company can adjust their material to have a streamlined

impact on the company in specific. If you don't
have a payroll company, then it's a challenge, but
I do think increasingly even small businesses do.
I ran a nonprofit, three people, and we had a
payroll company.

Thank you very much, Mr. Chair, and I vote aye.

CLERK: Gennaro?

COUNCIL MEMBER GENNARO: Yes.

CLERK: Jackson?

COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: Pass.

In addition to that, I am very much

COUNCIL MEMBER JAMES: I, too,
express my concerns with regards to Intro 730. I
recognize that this is a transparency bill and a
wage reporting bill. But I am very much concerned
about small local and minority businesses,
contractors, subcontractors and employees and
their ability to comply with the requirements.

concerned about the administrative costs.

Although I do support transparency and believe that a significant number of workers have been exploited, I do believe that we really should

report the wages that we are paying these

employees and ensure that we are paying them

consistent with the law.

But to that extent, I would hope that we could revisit this bill at a later point.

I, too, want to join with Council Member Brewer and express my concerns with regards to the process. The fact is that this bill has been changed multiple times and it should have triggered a second hearing so that all of these issues could have been fleshed out. Nonetheless, I support the objectives. And if in fact it has an adverse impact on affordable housing, I would hope that we would revisit this bill sometime next year or when there is a report on its impacts.

Again, I vote aye.

CLERK: Mark-Viverito?

COUNCIL MEMBER MARK-VIVERITO: I'll be voting age on this bill as well, but I think I just want to add my voice to the concerns that have been expressed by Council Members Brewer and James. There were a lot of changes done, a lot of input that was provided. So I think that it speaks to the ability of this Council to really

2	sit and listen to various points of view. But					
3	still, there are additional concerns that have					
4	been raised. As indicated, once this bill is					
5	implemented, the hope is that we can look at it					
6	carefully across time, and if it does have any					
7	type of adverse impact on our MWBEs and our small					
8	developers that we can revisit portions of this					
9	bill. So with that being said, I will vote aye.					
10	CLERK: Mendez?					
11	COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: I'd like to					
12	be associated with the comments of my colleagues					
13	Brewer, James and Viverito. I think they've said					
14	it all. We'll be looking at what the impacts will					
15	be on affordable housing and minority and small					
16	businesses and women owned businesses. But I will					
17	vote aye.					
18	CLERK: Crowley?					
19	COUNCIL MEMBER CROWLEY: I vote					
20	aye.

22	COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: I vote aye.					
23	On Intro 730, I do want to flag that there's					
2.4	really two iggues being addressed here. One is					

broader contract transparency on which I think 730

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is a very strong step forward and really doesn't
raise that many issues and that the amendments
made are good ones. On the wage reporting, I also
share some of the concerns mentioned. I do
believe, given the prevalence of payroll companies
and the requirements already in place as a result
of last year's Wage Theft Prevention Act that the
burden will be less than people believe.

That said, you know, I hear, I've heard, I've talked a lot with my many good friends in the affordable housing development and construction world, coming from that world for a long time, and I share the commitment of other members of this Council that we will continue to monitor and pay attention and see what we can do to make sure this is implemented effectively and that if there are things that need to be adjusted in the future that we'll do so. Thank you, Mr. Chairman, for your work on this process, and I vote aye.

CLERK: Comrie?

COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: I'm going to vote aye. I echo most of the remarks that Council Member Lander said. I did review and talk

2	to a lot of the entities regarding the bill. I					
3	understand all of the people that expressed their					
4	opinions regarding Intro 730. In this world of					
5	transparency that we live under, crossing every I					
6	and dotting every T is part our requirement. If					
7	we live under that rule, I understand most people					
8	can live under it also. If there are some major					
9	tweaks that needs to be done to try to make sure					
10	that everyone can be competitive and stay					
11	involved, we will be willing to listen to them,					
12	but I think overall Intro 730 is about making sure					
13	that the playing field is equal for all. Aye.					
14	CLERK: Oddo?					
15	COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: Yes.					
16	CLERK: Jackson?					
17	COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: May I be					
18	excused to explain my vote?					
19	CHAIRPERSON DILAN: Council Member					
20	Jackson to explain his vote.					
21	COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: Thank you.					
22	Obviously this is in front of us right now, and					
23	quite frankly I received last minute briefings					
24	from my staff on this particular matter, along					

with a memo outlining changes in the bill from our

policy analysts of the Housing Committee, along
with talking to some affordable housing people.

I've listened to my colleagues in voting yes and
expressing their concerns.

Clearly, I am, as an individual, for transparency and accountability. That's extremely important overall in anything that we do. But also I'm very concerned because one of the primary issues that impact the City of New York is affordable housing and the building of affordable housing. Obviously, the first hearing that we had, I listened to what everyone had to say, including residents that own and live in affordable housing and complained about some of the shoddy work and how difficult it is after they've owned their own homes in dealing with some of the issues and concerns.

I do believe, though, that all things considered that as a city and as a body we need to have transparency, we need to have accountability and we need to have more affordable housing in New York City.

So while I'm concerned on some of the issues, so for example, one of the issues that

was raised, which is an appropriate issue. It says here "contractors and subcontractors who miss a quarterly report are then removed from HPD's pre-qualified list and placed on the disqualified list." I don't know and I don't know whether or not anyone knows how long are they going to be there, and is it for a certain period of time? Can they appeal? These are all issues and concerns I guess that I have.

But also I have a very serious issue about the concern of MWBEs. I co-chair the New York City Council's Black, Latino and Asian Caucus. In fact, we passed Local Law 129, which was to increase the amount of contracts for MWBEs. So obviously that's a huge concern of myself and the caucus overall.

But considering the fact that we are here now where we have to vote yay or nay, based on all of what I've said and my concerns and I've listened to my colleagues and I adopt those concerns. I vote yes on 730-A and also yes on the other bill which is 807. With that, I express those concerns. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON DILAN: Thank you.

11	to be associated with this bill are as substantial					
12	as are being alleged. For that reason, I vote					
13	aye.

15	affirmative, zero in the negative and no					
16	abstentions, both items have been adopted.					
17	Members, please sign the committee reports.					
18	CHAIRPERSON DILAN: We'll leave the

21	hearing will be adjourned.
