SPEAKER QUINN: And they're all holding medals we just presented to them 'cause the ladies' GAA from New York made it to the All Ireland Finals, which is a huge thing. To put it in New Yorkisms [phonetic] it's as if a baseball team from another country came and ended up in the

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World Series playing the Yankees, so this is a
huge accomplishment. They came in second, right?
Runners up, which is winning, but the great thing
about ladies' GAA, and I want to thank all the
ladies and Larry McCarthy [phonetic] and their
coaches, in particular Rosie O'Reilly [phonetic].
What we have seen with the ladies' GAA is really a
really big step forward in getting women and girls
and young women involved in Gaelic athletics-not
just Irish women, but a very diverse group of
women, and that is incredibly important because it
means more women and girls are being active. More
women and girls are being on teams. Learning how
to work well together. Learning sportspersonship
[phonetic] and I have to tell you, I think
particularly young girls and young women being on
teams is an incredibly important part of
leadership development for women. I was a

ROSIE O'REILLY: I have a small presentation for Christine. It's a statuette of a ladies' footballer.

I just didn't do well. I think you guys should have gotten a jetlagged dispensation. I think it was rigged you had to go back and forth for six weeks. You'd really won hands down if you had been able to sleep enough, so I don't know if we want to hear from anyone from the GAA. Well, thank you all very much, and congratulations and we can't wait to have you back next year when you are not the number two, but the number one, which is what you already are for us. You'll get a key to the City Council and someday, a key to the city. Thank you all very much. Thank you.

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SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you guys, and
thank you for the statute. She is really
terrific. Thank you very much. Bye everybody.
Thank you very much. Congratulations. Thank you.

Alright, and our next ceremonial is going to be led by Council Member Crowley, and it is honoring two EMT workers who rescued an 86 year old woman who was a nun and three others from drowning after a flash flood in Queens, so if I could ask Council Member Crowley and the folks who are here for this ceremonial to make their way to the front.

[background conversation]

COUNCIL MEMBER CROWLEY: Okay.

Good afternoon. If I could have everybody's attention please. In the spirit of this week and honoring those that have given so much, you know, yesterday was September 11<sup>th</sup> and we remember all of our emergency service workers, those that made the ultimate sacrifice and those that risk their lives every day for the safety of the people in the city of New York. There are two people that I'd like to recognize and the Council recognize today, who have gone above and beyond. They are EMT workers

that are fire department personnel that came to
the rescue of three individuals during a
torrential rainstorm-over seven feet of rain
filled an underpass in Glendale, and within
seconds, a car carrying Sister Claudia Bradshaw-
Sister, come up please too—Sister Claudia Bradshaw
and also Joseph and Mary Lawrence. These were the
three individuals in the car that was quickly
submerging itself in water when the call for help
came through 911, and EMT worker Marilyn Arroyo
and EMT worker Jimmy Guailacela came to the rescue
just in the nick of time, and so I'd like to have
Sister Claudia say a few words about her
experience that day. And oh goodness, we are so
glad that you were saved.

SISTER CLAUDIA BRADSHAW: Thank

you. Well, we certainly felt that Marilyn Arroyo

and Jimmy Guailacela was an answer to our prayers.

We were very grateful to them. They came just in

the nick of time because the water was coming into

the car very quickly and we couldn't get out. We

are very grateful and we thank God for them, hope

that He will bless them, and we are thankful to

all of our firefighters and policemen who put

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2	their lives on the line every day to protect the
3	people of the city of New York. Thank you.

5	SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very
6	much, Liz. Thank you, Sister. Michael or one of
7	the city clerks, if we could read the proclamation
8	and then we'd love to hear from our two EMTs and
9	the others they saved. I'm sure the two EMTs will
10	say they have nothing to say, they were just doing
11	their jobs, which is what heroes say, but we are
12	going to ask you when you are listening to the

17	city of New York sis proud to honor FDNY EMTs
18	Marilyn Arroyo and Jimmy Guailacela for their
19	courageous rescue on August 15th-
20	SPEAKER QUINN: [Interposing] Can
21	we get a little quiet?
22	CLERK:and whereas, around 1
23	p.m. on Wednesday, August 15 <sup>th</sup> , 2012, Sister

Claudia Bradshaw, who loves in the convent at St.

Margaret's Catholic Church in middle village was

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in a car with her close friends, Mary and Joseph Lawrence. They were driving to a restaurant in Glendale to have lunch when the sky darkened and sent forth a blinding, torrential downpour. the car they were in continued on its way under an overpass, the engine gave out and the swirling puddle beneath them quickly grew into a lake. They were trapped. At first, the car began to bob floating uneasily, but then water started pouring in through the air conditioner vents, filling up the vehicle up to their shoulders. Sister Bradshaw prayed for deliverance while her friends called 911. Fortunately, both calls were answered. And whereas, with the flash flood turning the puddle into a vortex seven feet deep, enveloping the car, there was not a second to lose. As the water rose toward their necks, FDNY EMTs Marilyn Arroyo and Jimmy Guailacela reached the vehicle moments before the car submerged entirely, pulled all three passengers and saved them from drowning. And whereas, Jimmy Guailacela was born in Manhattan and grew up in Corona, Queens. A father of a three year old son, he has been an EMT for the FDNY since January 2008.

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After honing his skills at Station 4 in Lower Manhattan for a year and a half, he transferred to Queens where he strives each day to give back and make a positive impact in his community. He is currently working toward becoming an FDNY firefighter. And whereas, New York City native Marilyn Arroyo is a single mother of five and grandmother of two. Despite her own admission of being a poor swimmer, Ms. Arroyo stayed with the sinking car as each passenger was plucked out one by one. As a tireless EMT for the FDNY since 2010, she has applied her extensive training to provide the best emergency medical care to countless New Yorkers. She hopes to be involved in emergency medical services as a lifetime career and is currently working towards becoming a paramedic. And whereas, Marilyn Arroyo and Jimmy Guailacela have excelled in their roles as FDNY EMTs and are truly among New York City's bravest. Now therefore be it known that the Council of the City of New York gratefully honors Marilyn Arroyo and Jimmy Guailacela for their lifesaving rescue on August 15<sup>th</sup>, 2012. Christine C. SPEAKER QUINN: I am so sorry. I just want to recognize Israel Miranda, president of the uniformed EMT paramedics and inspectors of the FDNY. I didn't know he was here with us before. Thank you very much, Mr. President, for being with us. We appreciate it very, very much. Thank you. Sorry about that, Vinny.

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[background conversation]

COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: - -

council members sign on to the proc also. Those from Staten Island and Margaret Chin also. Okay. Great. We are here today to honor Office Yi Huang, who is really an example of New York's finest. On July 23<sup>rd</sup>, there was a call that came in that a man had stopped his car on the middle of the Verrazano Bridge and had gotten out and went to the edge of the bridge. When police responded, they realized that the gentlemen did not speak English, and they needed someone who knew Cantonese and so the call went out in the NYPD to find someone who could speak to this individual and they went to the 5<sup>th</sup> precinct in Chinatown to Councilwoman Chin's district and they found police officer Yi Huang, who was born in China in the Guangdong province, right in Taishan? And when he got to the bridge, he lo and behold, the gentleman that was about to jump, and he was on the edge, he finds out he is from his same hometown in the same province, and they immediately had a connection, and yet it took some time because the gentleman was distraught over his daughter and the new

2	culture that she was growing up in America, so
3	Officer Huang spent four hours of intense
4	negotiation in the middle of a rainstorm with
5	lightning and thunder to talk down this gentleman
6	and after four hours gained his confidence and he
7	came down and Officer Huang literally saved his
8	life, so we want to thank him-
9	[applause]
10	COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: And so
11	I'll ask now for the clerk to read the

14	York Proclamation. The Council of the city of New
15	York is proud to join the citizens of this great
16	city in honoring New York City police officer Yi
17	Huang. And whereas, after graduating from
18	Stonybrook University with a degree in computer
19	science-
20	SPEAKER QUINN: [Interposing] If we
21	could get quiet, and let's close the door to the
22	committee room please.
23	CLERK:Officer Yi Huang joined
24	the New York City Police Department. Beginning in
25	2002, Officer Huang spent his first two years on

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the force at Manhattan South. Today Officer Huang, a ten year veteran, proudly protects and serves Manhattan's fifth precinct in Chinatown, home to one of the largest Asian populations within the city of New York. And whereas, at around 12:30 in the afternoon on Monday, July 23rd, police received a call that a man had parked his car on the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge, got out and stepped over the railing. When the emergency service unit arrived, they found the main despondent and standing on the outer edge of the upper level of the bridge and threatening to jump into the water about 400 feet below. As police tried to talk the man down, they discovered he only spoke Cantonese. ESU [phonetic] pulled out a radio call for an officer who could speak Cantonese and that is when Officer Yi Huang answered the call. He noticed he and the man shared a similar accent and soon realized they both hailed from the same village, the village of Taishan, a coastal city in China's southern Guangdong province. And whereas, as the dark sky threatened to downpour and dozens of fellow officers looked on, Officer Huang spoke to the man

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from ten feet away and in his native language found out that the man was worried about his finances and was also upset over arguments he had been having with his 18 year old American born daughter. Having immigrated to America from China when he was just four years old, Officer Huang could empathize with the man and what he was going through as a father trying to understand the clash of tradition Asian cultures and his daughter's American value and relating his own family's experience. Huang urged the man to look to the future and think of his daughter getting married and meeting his grandchildren. And whereas, after four hours of negotiating as wind, rain and lightning started to move in, the distraught man finally allowed officers to pull him to safety. Now therefore be it known that the Council of the city of New York proudly honors New York City Officer Yi Huang for his outstanding service and for going above and beyond the call of duty. So we're just incredibly grateful for your overall service and even more grateful for this particular act of service. Thank you very, very much, and

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we'd love it if you'd say a few words.

OFFICER YI HUANG: I'm not used to being in the spotlight. I'm sweating more than when I was on the bridge. I'd like to first off thanking the Council Members Gentile and Chin here for giving me the opportunity to receive the award. I'd like to thank my parents. They provided me the best of both worlds. I was able to understand the cultural clash between the jumper and his daughter. I had the same clashes with my parents, and also I'd like to thank my wife for supporting me and finally learning to accept my weird schedule I have. I'd like to say the NYPD, we are always ready to do exactly what is needed. I'm pretty sure any officer would have done the same thing. I'd like to also thank the PBA member [phonetic] who is here. Thank you. Thank you all.

consulate grounds. Ambassador Stevens was the
first U.S. ambassador to be killed in an attack
since 1979. Prior to serving as ambassador to
Libya, he was the U.S. envoy to the Libyan rebel
movement that overthrew Gaddafi last year. We
stand here today thinking of Ambassador Stevens
and the other three Americans who were killed and
their families. Our thoughts and prayers go out
to them and of course, our voice goes out
condemning this murderous attack on any diplomat,
but in this case an American diplomat.

Sadly, on August 31<sup>st</sup>, 2012 Diane
Rivera - - at 55, sister of our Majority Leader,
Joel Rivera, and Assemblywoman - - Rivera and
daughter of Assemblyman Jose Rivera passed away in
her New Jersey home with her husband and mother at
her side after a long battle with ALS. She was
first diagnosed with Lou Gehrig's Disease in 2007.
Diane became a tireless advocate for those

suffering from ALS, even in 2010 with her father
testifying at state senator committees about the
importance and the need for medical marijuana and
the difference between medical marijuana and
illegal drugs. In a statement released by the
Rivera family, they said while Diane worked hard
to bring light to her debilitating disease she
also dedicated her life to raising money and funds
for many causes. After the 9/11 terrorist attack,
she volunteered to cook for rescue workers at
Ground Zero and for many years Diane even
volunteered at a senior medical day center. Her
husband Paul said that, "She fought very hard and
now she doesn't have to fight anymore." Diane's
funeral was held this past Saturday and our
thoughts and prayers go out to our wonderful
Majority Leader, Joel Rivera, to Diane's husband,
to her parents and the entire family. Thank you,
Mr. Majority Leader.

4	New York City over the past few years a problem of
5	apartment buildings being converted in hotels. We
6	have seen individuals love for a long time in a
7	residential rent protected apartment building and
8	slowly but surely landlords empty those buildings
9	out, convert them into transient hotels. We have
10	seen some entire buildings be lost in this way, We
11	have seen individuals—one we heard from at our
12	public hearing on the bill and at today's press
13	conference-live in the building where he didn't
14	really have a lot of neighbors anymore. The
15	people who were coming in and out of his building
16	literally yelling at him for the poor service he
17	was getting from the hotel staff, even when he
18	claimed he was not a hotel staff member. He was
19	in fact a tenant of that building. In May of
20	2011, the state legislature strengthened the law
21	in this state to deal with it—a court lack of
22	clarity and made it very clear that residential
23	apartments were not designed to be used as
24	transient rental apartments, transient hotels.
25	This piece of legislation follows on the heels of

the work of Senator Krueger, Senator Duane,
Assembly Member Rosenthal and Assembly Member
Gottfried and will expand and increase the fines
for illegal conversions of residential dwelling
units into transient hotels. I want to thank
Council Member Brewer for her work on this. I
want to note that the piece of legislation is
supported by a broad array of community based
organizations, by the Hotel Association and by the
Hotel Trades Council. Let me again thank Chair
Dilan and call on Council Member Brewer.

very much, Madam Speaker, and I want to also thank the individuals you mentioned, all of the advocates, the tenants, certainly Council Member Dilan, who shepherded this through, the staff and the hotel union and certainly the Hotel Association, and there are really just three reasons; one, of course is we need every stabilized unit possible, and in some cases, not all, by having this particular illegal hotel situation, you do take away rent stabilized units desperately needed in the city of New York.

Number two, when I first heard about this problem

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some years ago, one of the first agencies to bring it to my attention was the fire department because when you are in an illegal hotel situation the fire department is concerned. The sprinklers are not correct. They are not up to the standards of a hotel. The issue of where are the walls, where are the bunk beds, where is the second egress—all aspects of a hotel that are very stringent and are adhered to by the hotel industry are not in an illegal hotel. And finally, there is just the issue of the experience of the tenant who is living next door to somebody who is in an illegal hotel situation. The problem is in some cases, not all, the walls are very thin, the individuals I call them the backpackers, they are students, they're having a great holiday in New York. goodness they are here, but they can be noise. They have different hours than a working person, and the elevator in that building in many cases is stressed. You've got a lot of bags, you've got a lot of people, you've got a lot of traffic in the lobby. It's just a different kind of experience, and so I'm very clear that the need is there for the tourists and we need perhaps more quality, but

lower cost tourist accommodations, but it
shouldn't be at the expense of safety, it
shouldn't be at the expense of stabilized units,
and it shouldn't be at the expense of individuals
who have to get up in the morning. I want to
thank Ann Cunningham, who is here who is a long
time tenant activist who brought this issue to my
attention originally and again, I want to just
thank everyone who has worked hard to keep
permanent residential units safe in our city and
who understand it is not good to reward illegal
behavior. I also want to thank the Mayor's
Office, Ms. McGee [phonetic] is head of it now.
Ms. Hyman [phonetic] was head of it before. They
both have done a great job of looking at
enforcement and I'm sure they will continue to do
so. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

I just think that a no vote helps sort of bring attention to their cause, and I think that in an era when all of us regardless of party affiliation, regardless of level of government are talking about jobs and small business and the need to grow this economy. think we need to do everything we can to foster these businesses and help grow them, and hopefully, however this bill is voted out, we as an institution need to go to our colleagues in Albany and say regulate them, put rules in place, but let's help turn that \$150 million industry into a \$300 million industry, et cetera, et cetera, so I'll be voting yes on all with the exception of Intro 404-A, on which I will vote no.

the last one is Resolution 1493 calling upon the
New York State Liquor Authority to improve public
and police access to liquor license information by
posting online the method of operation for each
and every liquor license issued by the State of
New York. Pretty simple and clear. Make it
transparent so that the police and the public will
have access to know what your methods of operation
are, so I ask you to sign on to Intro 925, Reso
1492 and Reso 1493. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: Council Member Vallone?

My colleagues, today I'm introducing a bill which would create an animal abuse registry, which is similar to the sex offender registry that exists right now. Right now these abusers can be working among us and we don't know it, but more importantly pet stores don't know it and animal shelters don't know it. Those dogs we saw recently on TV, kicking a dog in an elevator or throwing a dog out a window like happened in my

district, they can go and get a new dog from a
shelter tomorrow, and there is nothing preventing
that. We need to prevent that. We need to be a
beacon for the protection of helpless animals for
the whole country to see. They will follow our
lead as they have in so many other bills. This is
a bill that exists now in Suffolk, and I want to
thank them for their actions and groups like the
Animal Legal Defense Fund that's working for this
throughout the country, but as I said, we should
lead the way here to protect these helpless
animals. We all know that people who abuse
animals, that is just the beginning. They wind up
doing much worse, much worse, and at a minimum, we
should stop them from getting another animal.
This bill will put them on a list. If they adopt
another animal, that would be a crime, and they
could go to jail for up to a year. So I ask you
in joining me in this very simple protection for
animals, who can't protect themselves. Thank you.
MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: Thank you
very much. Next we have Council Member Recchia
followed by Council Member Gentile.

COUNCIL MEMBER RECCHIA: Yeah.

they're expanding through the whole city. Well,		
they never told us. We never had a chance to have		
a hearing on the booting program, never had a		
chance to analyze what was going on, so now this		
is where before they go forward with the pilot		
programs, they have to lay it off for all of the		
community boards, so people in our communities		
know what exactly is going on. Not that they walk		
outside and they see a boot on their car. They		
have no idea what this is-what's happening. No		
one gave them prior notice. This has to stop.		
These pilot programs have to get under control		
because they are trying to abuse the process.		
Thank you.		

MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: Council Member Gentile?

COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: Thank you.

As a co-prime sponsor to Intro 933 with Councilman Vallone, Councilman Crowley, I ask you to also sign on because in story after disturbing story abusers repeat their violent crimes against helpless animals and have a proclivity to even become violent towards people. The animal abuse registry will keep our animals safe and with

proper screening will actually help make sure that
animals who have survived any cruelty or neglect
will find safe homes in which they'll be treated
with respect for the rest of their lives. It has
been said that if society is based on how-it's
judged based on how it treats its most vulnerable,
then this bill Intro 933 is a leap in the right
direction. I ask your support. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: Thank you very much, Council Member Dromm followed by Council Member Oddo.

very much. I'd like to ask my colleagues to sign on to resolution 1491. This resolution is calling upon the American Psychological and American Psychiatric Association to immediately pass resolutions declaring the practice of curative therapy where they take someone who is gay and try to force them to become straight, and to condemn this practice. It is immoral. It is incorrect, and homosexuality was removed from the list of mental disorders in 1973. For some psychiatrists or psychologists to continue to cure people of their homosexuality is outrageous and wrong, and I
