2	CHAIRPERSON RECCHIA, JR.: Hello
3	everybody. Okay, if I can have everyone's
4	attention. Good afternoon and welcome to the
5	Finance meeting, I'm Councilman Domenic M.
6	Recchia, Jr. Before we start today's meeting, I
7	would just like to thank all of my colleagues and
8	their staff and Speaker Christine Quinn for all
9	that you have done for my constituents. It was
10	greatly appreciated, and it really touched my
11	heart, to see that my Council colleagues and their
12	staff and the central staff and Speaker Quinn came
13	out in full force to help my community, and I just
14	want everyone to know how much we appreciate it,
15	and thank you, and we still need support. So I
16	want to thank everyone for that. Before we begin,
17	you know, I know that many people, you know,
18	throughout New York City still don't have power,
19	and many people in this room as well. We have
20	suffered loss and hardship as a result of
21	Hurricane Sandy, so I just want to thank everyone
22	again, because it means so much. Before we get
23	started, I'd like to start off and thank all my
24	colleagues and recognize them, Joel Rivera, Lewis
25	Fidler Diana Reyna Juliega Ferreras Leroy

Comrie, Gale Brewer, Robert Jackson, Fernando
Cabrera, Darlene Mealy, Jimmy Van Bramer, and Al
Vann, and Dan Garodnick, I got everybody, right?
Okay. Today we have several items on our agenda,
we have a transparency reso, a capital budget mod,
three property tax-fixing resolutions and one land
use item. Let's start with the transparency reso,
the reso sets forth new changes in the designation
of certain organizations receiving local ageing
and youth discretionary funding, as well as a new
change in the designation of certain organizations
receiving funding pursuant to certain initiatives
in FY 2013, FY 2012 and FY 2011 expense budget.
Organizations appearing in the reso that have not
yet completed the pre-qualification process
conducted by MOCS, the Council or another entity
are identified in the attached charts with an
asterisk. Additionally, as with all transparency
resos, Council Members will have to sign a
disclosure form indicating whether or not conflict
exists with any of the groups on the attached
list. If any Council Member has a potential
conflict of interest with any organization, he or
she might want to disclose the conflict at the

time of their vote. Please also disclose any
conflicts you may have with the subcontractors
that are used by organizations they sponsor for
discretionary funding. This disclosure must be
made before the subcontractor can be approved.
Members will be contacted by the Council's Ethics
and Employment Counsel Nadir to complete
disclosure forms as necessary. Next, we have a
capital budget mod, this capital budget mod
relates directly to the impact of Hurricane Sandy.
In order to hasten the recovery efforts necessary
after Hurricane Sandy, the Council will vote on an
emergency capital budget that provides for an
increase in city funding totaling \$500 million in
FY 2013. The capital budget to the School
Construction Authority and Health and Hospitals
Corporation \$300 million will be used for the
construction and repair for school facilities,
\$200 million will be used for the construction and
repair of hospital facilities affected by
Hurricane Sandy. Our next three items on the
agenda are three tax-fixing resos. A class share
of tax levy is limited in how much it can change
from year to year by a mechanism called the class

share cap. Under	current law, no class share of
the real property	tax levy can increase by more
than 5% from the p	revious year's share. On June
$13^{\rm th}$ , 2012, the Cou	uncil passed a home rule to lower
this cap from 5% t	o 1.5% for 2013. To help
minimize the incre	ase in property tax bills for
class-one homeowne	rs, the Governor, however, did
not sign state leg	rislation authorizing the lower
cap until after th	e Council adopted its budget.
That meant that wh	en Council adopted its budget,
we had the 5% rate	cap. Additionally, the
Department of Fina	nce had to send property tax
bills in early Jun	e based on last year's rates.
The Governor has s	ince signed the FY 2013 class
share legislation,	the Council must vote on three
resos, which toget	her amend and restate the
changes in the cla	ss share and set the new tax
rates at 1.5% cap.	This year the uncapped share
for class one prop	erties over 7%. Without today's
amendment, however	r, rates would be capped at 5%.
At the 1.5% cap a	class-one homeowner will save an
average of \$150.	So today we are amending three
property tax-fixin	g resos adopted on June 20 <sup>th</sup> to
help make New York	City a little more affordable

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for class-one homeowners. Once the resolutions are passed by the Council, the Department of Finance will send out revised bills for the second half of the year to reflect the lower cap. I urge all of my colleagues to vote yes on these amended property tax resos. Our next and last item is a land use item, Creston Avenue apartments, located in Council Member Cabrera's district in the Bronx, will receive a full property tax exemption for 33 years for the rehab of 120 units of rental housing for low-income families. Council Member Cabrera supports this item. These are all our items for today. Representatives from OMB are here along with Preston Niblack from our Finance Division to answer any questions you have on the property tax reso and the transparency reso. representatives are also here to answer any questions on the land use. Before we call the roll, I want to remind everyone that the Finance Committee will meet next Tuesday at 10:00 a.m. in the Council chambers to hold an oversight hearing on the creation of the SoHo BID in Council Member Chin's district. The hearing is expected to last three-plus hours. If no one has ... does anyone

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Regarding the very important hurricane capital, how do you keep on top of how the funding gets spent? Is that something that you'll have oversight of, or do we have oversight?

CHAIRPERSON RECCHIA, JR.: Yes.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: It's

incredibly important.

CHAIRPERSON RECCHIA, JR.: No, we will definitely have oversight on that, and we will ... it's definitely going to ... well, those hospitals that are out, those HHC hospitals, those are the priorities that are going to get the money. And to those schools that are out right now, all the schools that have been damaged, they're putting them in priority order. So we have a list of what's going to be done first and how they're going to go about it. And then we could always follow up with a hearing on this money, to make sure it's being used for these properties. Preston Niblack, would you like to add anything?

2	MR. NIBLACK: That's correct, we
3	will work closely, all of this will be submitted
4	to FEMA for reimbursement, and so we'll track very
5	carefully sort of what's going on with it.
6	COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: So all of
7	the money that we lay out will be reimbursed?
8	MR. NIBLACK: Well, we don't know
9	that all of it will be reimbursed, but we believe
10	that it will all be reimbursable. The typical
11	reimbursement rate is 75%, as you know the
12	Governor has asked for some additional aid for the
13	region, so it could be higher than 75%, but at
14	least 75% of these expenses should be
15	reimbursable.
16	CHAIRPERSON RECCHIA, JR.: Okay, we
17	have also been joined by Helen Diane Foster.
18	Council Member Fidler has a question.
19	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Yes, I just
20	want to understand something about the process on
21	the tax cap. So the bills that went out for July
22	did not reflect a 5% cap?
23	MR. NIBLACK: They did reflect,
24	they were sent out reflecting a 5% cap at
25	essentially last year's rates.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: And does
3	that mean that there will be new bills in December
4	and they will reflect for most people a reduction
5	in their real estate taxes?
6	MR. NIBLACK: New bills will go out
7	in the beginning of December, and they will
8	reflect, for most taxpayers, and for pretty much
9	every taxpayer in class one, a reduction in what
LO	they would have paid absent this action. The tax
11	rate still goes up from last year's somewhat, so
12	they will see an increase, it's just a smaller
L3	increase than it would have been otherwise.
L4	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Thank you.
15	CHAIRPERSON RECCHIA, JR.: Council
L6	Member Leroy Comrie has a question.
L7	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE, JR.: I have
L8	a comment more than a question. I just want to
L9	thank the Finance staff for working with us on the
20	tax rate issue, so that homeowners and I hope
21	that we are sending out a complete detailed
22	notification for homeowners so that they
23	understand, because they get very confused about
24	this time of year, and it comes during the holiday

time, that they're actually saving them money from

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the overall tax increase. So I just want to thank you and the entire Finance staff for making that clear, and I hope that we can get a message out to people that we're actually saving them more money than they would have gotten before. I also just want to thank Domenic and the administration and the Speaker for the emergency money that's now going to go out to the people that have been hurt by Superstorm Sandy. Many people throughout the boroughs are still suffering, people in my district, some don't have lights, but at least they have their homes. Many people in Domenic's area and James' area and Jimmy's area don't have their homes. But as someone who was out in the Rockaways and seeing some of the devastation out there, I would just implore people to do everything they can to either help bring, send supplies. They don't need clothes any more, they need supplies, cleaning supplies, and people that are willing to help go out and clean, and help remove debris, help clear out the mold out of homes. So that's what's needed at this particular point. I hope that this fund will be used quickly and be used by also New Yorkers as well, that, you

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know, it's good that many people are volunteering,
but we want to make sure that New York people
that are looking to help out, people in New York
construction crews, have an opportunity to utilize
some of that fund as well. So again, thank you to
everything that the Mayor's office is trying to do
to respond to this, and I hope that all New
Yorkers that are still frustrated will keep
speaking up, because we need to know exactly what
you need so that we can help supply it. Thank
you.

CHAIRPERSON RECCHIA, JR.: Thank
you, Council Member. Council Member Darlene
Mealy. Give her a microphone.

COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: I just would like to know what kind of safeguards are we putting in place, because while we grieve, people could start scheming, and contractors will be getting this money. What are we putting in place to make sure that we don't have people forging contracts and ... do we have anything, or oversight, that's going to be in place for that?

CHAIRPERSON RECCHIA, JR.: We're going to make sure that, you know, all these

2	contractors that are selected have all been
3	vetted. That's a city policy, you know, they're
4	just not going out and hiring any contractors,
5	okay, they're going out and hiring city-approved
6	contractors that have all been vetted, and that
7	have personally had contracts with the city.
8	Preston, do you want to add anything to that?
9	MR. NIBLACK: I mean, they will all
10	be subject to the usual process of letting
11	contracts. There's an emergency contract
12	provision, but they have to be pre-qualified
13	vendors, and the Comptroller's Office, you know,
14	also has to approve all the emergency contracts.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: Would you
16	know how much of the contractors are being in-
17	sourced and out-sourced?
18	MR. NIBLACK: A lot of this work,
19	so debris removal, emergency supplies, etc., and
20	then a lot of the construction work that will be
21	done with the capital necessarily has to be
22	contracted out.
23	COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: Thank you.
24	CHAIRPERSON RECCHIA, JR.: Thank
25	you. Do any other Council Members have a
