2	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Okay, we
3	are ready to convene the full Land Use Committee
4	meeting for December 6 th , 2012, I'm Leroy Comrie,
5	the Chair of the Committee, we're joined by
6	Subcommittee Chair Mark Weprin, Council Member
7	Robert Jackson, Council Member and Subcommittee
8	member Brad Lander, Council Member Al Vann,
9	Council Member Peter Koo, Council Member Jessica
10	Lappin, Council Member Sara Gonzalez, Council
11	Member Inez Dickens, Majority Leader Joel Rivera,
12	Council Member Charles Barron, Council Member
13	Annabel Palma, Council Member Dan Garodnick,
14	Council Member Diana Reyna, and Council Member
15	Jimmy Vacca. I think we have all the members that
16	were here. We have some items on the agenda
17	today. Our first item is a Landmarks item in
18	Queens, in Council Member Gennaro's district,
19	Community Board #8 area, Land Use #720, known as
20	the Brinckerhoff Cemetery, item #20135041 HKQ,
21	this is to preserve the landmark, or to designate
22	as a landmark, the Brinckerhoff Cemetery located
23	at $69-65$ to $69-73$ 182^{nd} Street. The next item is
24	the Land Use #726 known as the downtown Brooklyn
25	parking deck, within Council Member Levin's

district, and (crosstalk), Brooklyn Community
Board #2, Item #N 120384(A) ZRK, to create the
amendment of the zoning resolution for the Special
Downtown Brooklyn District, to modify the parking
regulations of the Special Downtown Brooklyn
District. The next item is Land Use #733, Ken &
Cooks Restaurant, that is to continue to maintain
a sidewalk café at 19 Kenmare Street in Manhattan
Community Board #4, Item #20135010 TCM in Council
Member Chin's district. The next item is to
continue to maintain a sidewalk café in Speaker
Quinn's district, Manhattan Community Board #2
also, Land Use #734 known as Mole, Item #20135080
TCM, located at 57 Jane Street. Another sidewalk
café to continue to be maintained, Land Use #735
in the Speaker's district, Manhattan Community
Board #2, Item #20135107 TCM, known as La
Bonbonierre Restaurant, at 28 Eighth Avenue. And
we have an amendment to the zoning map at 209
McGuinness Blvd. in Brooklyn in Council Member
Levin's district, that's Land Use #736 and 737,
which are related, it's to amend the zoning map
between McGuinness Blvd. and Eckford Street in
Brooklyn. We also have in Council Member Chin's

district a historic landmark designation known as
the Edward Ridley & Sons Department Store, Land
Use Item #738, Manhattan Community Board #2,
Council Member Chin's district, 20135153 HKM is
the item number, and it's to designate the Edward
Ridley & Sons Department Store buildings located
at 315 and 317 Grand Street, aka 66-68 Allen
Street and 319-321 Grand Street, aka 65 Orchard
Street as a historic landmark. And then we have
in Council Member Rodriguez's district a third-
party transfer my throat is going dry, like all
of a sudden Land Use Item #739 at 273
Wadsworth, Item #20135096 HAM, in Manhattan
Community Board #12. And finally we have in
Council Member Levin's district a UDAAP also for
640 Broadway, Land Use Item #740, Land Use #740,
Item #20135197 HAK, for a UDAAP located at 640
Broadway in Brooklyn Community Board #1 in Council
Member Levin's district. All of these items I
remind the Committee members have been vetted
through the Subcommittee meetings, and we also
have comments from oh, Council Member Tish James
has joined us this morning. I know that Council
Member Diana Reyna had a comment on an item on the

agenda. Council Member Reyna.

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA: 3 Thank you, Mr. Chair, I just wanted to share with Committee 4 5 members and you as Chair of this Committee on item, Land Use #740, 640 Broadway, it's a property 6 that was sole-sourced back in April 10th of 2010, disposed city-owned land that the City of New York 9 continues to perpetuate discrimination in an area called Broadway Triangle. Its original lines 10 11 included this particular site and the most recent 12 case in court, the community has won against the 13 city, claiming discrimination. And I am going to 14 vigilantly monitor this particular bounded area 15 for the Broadway Triangle in which this particular 16 address is a part of. There is Federal dollars 17 that are passed through the city and state to 18 create what is integrated housing, and this is the 19 second court case that we have won in Community 20 Board #1, where discrimination has been proven in 21 court, and so today I will be voting no on 640 22 Broadway, and I ask members of this Committee to 23 understand the claims as to how this particular 24 project will in fact be another example as to why we have to monitor what would be a very segregated 25

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2	housing built in Community Board #1, which has
3	been already raised to the highest levels of
4	court. Thank you very much.
5	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Any other
6	members want to comment on any items on today's
7	agenda? You know, as questions have come up as a
8	result of Council Member Reyna's statement, but
9	since she is not asking for the members to vote no
10	on this, this is a separate did she? No, she
11	didn't quite say that, so
12	COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA:
13	(Interposing) Mr. Chair, any member can vote no.
14	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Right.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA: I would love
16	for every member to vote no on this project. But
17	at the moment I'm not asking for anyone to go into
18	what would be uninformed voting.
19	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Right.
20	COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA: And if

anyone has a question related to this particular

project, it should be asked, to influence their

decision as far as whether or not they should be

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Was a

voting no. Thank you very much.

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presentation made at the Subcommittee meeting? By HPD, against voting for the property? Or for voting? They made a presentation for passing the property. Right, so there was no ... this, so in other words, this information of Council Member Reyna wasn't vetted at the Subcommittee, was it? Council Member Levin.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I do want to encourage all members to vote in favor of this project. HPD has done a rigorous work insuring that there's not going to be discrimination anywhere in this project or anywhere else in Community Board #1, and if members want to discuss this matter, either in a public forum such as this, or privately with me, I've been monitoring this very, very closely, and this is a project that will provide affordable housing, which we have a real dearth of in Community Board #1, for all communities, all communities need it. There are families that are in desperate need of affordable housing throughout New York City and especially in my district, in Community Board #1, and this is a project that will provide housing for all, not based on any

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measure other than income guidelines and whether
or not people can qualify for it based on the
protocols that are in place throughout the City of
New York. So I do want to encourage my colleagues
to vote ave on this proposal.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: And
before I ask a question, Council Member Rosie
Mendez is here and Council Member Steve Levin is
here. Council Member Vann and Dickens have
questions, but I just wanted to ask a question
first. Who is going to be managing this property?
Who is going to be providing the opportunities for applicants, who is managing the application base
for this?

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: United

Jewish Organizations of Williamsburg, which has a very long track record in the community.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Okay.

And I just want to say to this, and actually to the other projects, that, you know, it ... any item that comes before the Committee, we need to make sure that members are fully aware of all the ramifications of the items before we get to the Committee meeting, it's very difficult at the 9th

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hour to make changes based on verbal information,
so it's just I think we need to ask some
questions on this, Council Member Reyna has a
point regarding her factual lawsuit that's being
put forth, but it's very difficult to balance, you
know, what the position that we should take at the
99 th hour, so I, you know, with this and actually
with any project, if there's it would be smart
for members to make sure that each member of the
Committee knows the details of the project, so
that we can have an informed discussion prior to
the vote. Council Member Vann and Council Member
Dickens.

COUNCIL MEMBER VANN: Right, just seeking a little bit more information so I will be clear, I have two members who take different positions on the same issue, and I'm ... I'd like a little bit more information from Council Member Reyna as to why she feels that the project will indeed be discrimination or reflecting on discrimination in its development. Could you just ... ?

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA: Thank you,
Mr. Chair. Just to answer Council Member Vann's

question, in regards to the party who will be
managing this project, they were one of the
aforementioned organizations in the lawsuit that
was found to have in fact been chosen as the only
entity, along with another organization not from
the Community Board #1 area, sole-sourced land in
the Broadway Triangle previous to this particular
land, for housing construction, affordable housing
construction. And following that particular
zoning, this particular piece of property was
designated in April $10^{\rm th}$, 2010. In the meantime
the administration has over a dozen pieces of land
that are city-owned and are not sole-sourced to
the rest of the Community Board, of which have
been requested by other local non-profits to build
affordable housing, to address the crisis of
affordable housing units in demand. It's also
proven that our schools are under-enrolled, where
we're losing families at a very expedient manner,
2,700 families have been lost in the last ten
years in this Community Board, in this school
district, and all related back to the housing that
is becoming quite difficult to access. They're
displaced from the neighborhood, and what we want

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to be able to guarantee is that and this has
not been there has been no retribution from the
Broadway Triangle case, despite the victory in
court, so that the issue of discrimination
continues to play a role in the housing that is
managed by UJO, as foreseen in the past.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Is the case, has the case been ... no, you're just trying to ask questions, okay. Council Member Dickens.

COUNCIL MEMBER DICKENS: Council

Member Vann.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Oh, I'm sorry, Council Member Vann, are you finished? I'm sorry. All right.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: I just want to thank you, Assistant Majority Leader, I just wanted to add that the Broadway Triangle rezoning, which was voted, this Committee voted to approve in the last session before I joined the Council, is in litigation now. There has been no decision rendered in that case, it's been ... there was a temporary restraining order and an injunction issued, but no decision that has been fully entered. And so I just want to make that clear,

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this project is not part of the Broadway Triangle,
it's in the district that I represent, the $33^{ m rd}$
District in Brooklyn, and has nothing to do with
the Broadway Triangle rezoning, other than the
fact that it is close to it, it is adjacent and
therefore is in the same neighborhood, but in fact
it is not in the Broadway Triangle rezoning area
that this Council passed.

COUNCIL MEMBER DICKENS: Earlier this week at the Subcommittee planning we voted to pass it. Now in all honesty, my colleague from Brooklyn, Council Member Barron, raised the issue, but he did not raise it in a way that all of the members understood, but he did articulate and he did vote it down. But it passed in the Subcommittee. I as the temporary Chair at that hearing would have preferred to hear from Council Member Reyna to come and make a presentation at the Subcommittee, because it is very difficult to now put on the Land Use Chair, when the Subcommittee has voted to pass something, it's difficult to ask the Chair of Land Use to turn around and go against the Subcommittee when we passed it, but had the Council Member come and

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raised the issue -- and to be perfectly honest, now that we are talking about it, I now remember from 2010, I didn't remember it until actually because my understanding was that this is just an amendment, this is not going to make a change to anything, that it goes just the way it goes to whatever the name of the organization is, and that this is just an amendment because the building had to be demolished because it was unsafe. So this, in changing the vote now will not change what is going to be done, other than that it is, now will allow a building to be constructed, a new It's just an amendment, it's not going building. to change anything in it, because the building was destroyed, or had to be demolished, because it was an unsafe edifice. But it would have been preferable had Council Member Reyna come and articulated, or because when Council Member Barron raised the issue, he didn't articulate it to pique everyone's memory, because you're right, Council Member Levin was not here when it was done, and most of us didn't even remember this until just now, that you're raising the issue. But I just wanted to be honest, because Council Member Barron

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA: Mr. Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Any other

member comments?

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA: Mr. Chair, I just wanted to inform members that I reviewed the Land Use agenda, because I don't sit on the Planning Subcommittee, just yesterday and reviewed it so that I ran into the information. Had I known that there was a Committee that was scheduled for that specific site, I would have attended. In addition to that, I had voted no in the Subcommittee when this was disposed of, based on the same argument. And so I just want to make sure that members understand the consistency of my vote, because this is much larger, and the lines as far as the bounded original Broadway Triangle is not what you referred to here in the Committee, the rezoning is just a portion of what has been selected by HPD, because it was a city application, ignoring what was the larger aspect of what Broadway Triangle is.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Okay.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER DICKENS: Excuse me,
3	Chair.
4	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Let me
5	just, Council Member Lander has to leave, so he
6	would like permission for him to vote on
7	everything on today's agenda, since we're talking
8	about one issue. So Council Member Lander,
9	permission to vote.
10	COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thank you
11	very much, Mr. Chairman, and with deference to
12	this debate, which I don't want to interrupt, I
13	gratefully appreciate the opportunity to vote aye
14	on all items on today's calendar.
15	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: All
16	right.
17	COUNCIL MEMBER DICKENS: Council
18	Member Reyna, I in no way meant to infer that you
19	were not consistent. It's just that, you know,
20	there's members that were not in attendance in
21	2010, there are those of us that didn't recall
22	this whole incident, and now that you piqued my
23	memory, I do remember that you voted against it,
24	but it passed even then. And therefore that this

coming up this week, Tuesday, whatever it was, it

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passed in Subcommittee Planning because the
presentation that was made was that it was in
Council Member Levin's district and it was just an
amendment, it was not changing what we had
originally passed on in 2010. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Again, as I said in the beginning, Council Member Reyna has made a presentation, she's clear that there was, in the Subcommittee it was passed, it was passed in 2010. I would recommend that we pass this item again, only because that has been the ... that's been the planning and the disposition of this issue. I would request also that we get some update on exactly how this is actually implemented, so you know ... yes, Council Member Dickens.

COUNCIL MEMBER DICKENS: I hate to interrupt, but what I would suggest is if we vote and pass it, that because of the concern raised by Council Member Reyna, that we put in that we would like there to be a process, a vehicle in which to insure that the issues that she's raised about discrimination—

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.:

2 (Interposing) But there's a lawsuit pending now, 3 so we'll find out in the--

COUNCIL MEMBER DICKENS:

(Interposing) But regardless of what the lawsuit, the outcome of the lawsuit, if the community, the surrounding community feels that there is an issue, then it's incumbent upon Council Member Levin to address that issue with his community and the surrounding community. And his office should be looking into it to review and to insure that discrimination does not occur, either in construction, soft costs, or in the occupancy of the building.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Okay, now that Council Member Dickens just articulated everything I was going to say again, I will just remind the members that we need to insure that all of the members know all of the issues before we get to the Subcommittee meeting, and even after, if you get to us before the Land Use Committee meeting, I'm more than willing to have full discussions on any item in the full Committee, but I would really encourage members to vet everything prior to the Subcommittee so that we can have a

full discussion. If you want members to have an
opinion on something, you need to make sure that
they are well informed beforehand. And that's not
just on this item, but also on the Brinckerhoff
item, which there was some confusion about the
intent of the landlord that came here and created
a false persona of what her situation was.
Unfortunately, because the local member didn't
come and inform people, and also there was a lack
on LPC as far as the landlord's capabilities to
inform the members as well, there was some
emotional reaction to a person that was creating a
false story. So the only way to combat that is
for the local member to or LPC in this case
to tell us that this was not a landlord that was a
person that was a victim, this was a person that
was trying to manipulate the system, to be frank
about it. So we need to make sure that anything
that's done, the members are well informed and
especially if you want an item decided upon in a
particular way, you should make sure that the
membership is informed. With that I'm going to
close the discussion on this item, and then
Council Member James wanted to talk about the

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downtown Brooklyn parking amendment, I believe.
COUNCIL MEMBER JAMES: Thank you

for allowing me to say a few words. I'm just encouraging all of the members of this Committee to vote in support of the downtown Brooklyn parking text amendment as is. Council Member Levin and I have had several discussions with stakeholders in downtown Brooklyn, and I have spoken to members of Transportation Alternatives and a number of interested parties, and would like everyone to know that our focus, our objective, Council Member Levin's and my objective, was always to enliven the streets and to provide with some more public space, some more public use, including but not limited to affordable housing and some schools. We received promises from the Downtown Brooklyn Partnership, as well as the Department of City Planning, that they will work with both him and me to achieve these objectives and I urge everyone to vote aye, thank you.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Okay.

Any other members have any ... Council Member Barron?

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Mr. Chair,

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I just resent that Council Member Vacca when I got to the microphone, he said, "Oh boy", and I think that that's not correct. Could you please discipline him? Well, let me say this, just a little correction. The Council Member Dickens is correct, I did question it, and my question was more that it was a Jewish group that was receiving no RFP and just getting it, and I asked how many Blacks and Latino groups get the same kind of treatment, and I wanted that information, because that rarely happens to us, we go through the RFP process. And I voted age on all. But rather than, when our colleague comes at the last minute, whether it comes ... whether the information comes to us at the very last minute, because we all do it, there's a lot on our plates, there's a lot going on in our communities, and we cannot ... it's challenging staying up on top of everything. So I appreciate Council Member Reyna coming to us, whatever time it comes, if the information is accurate, then we should move on the information, and not when it came. If she came, and I think she made a very clear, articulate presentation, informative presentation, and I believe we should

act accordingly. I am going to vote no for this item, and I thank you for bringing this to our attention, and then we should make sure that when we get information, the priority should be, is the information accurate, if you feel comfortable, and she was even nice enough to say that, you know, I don't expect you to vote no if you don't have all of the, you know, good feeling about it, but if she comes with the information, I think we should respect that and vote accordingly to our hearts and minds. I'm voting no.

with you 100%, Council Member, I'm sorry if I didn't articulate it, but in the beginning I thought I heard Council Member Reyna ask to set a precedent, but not necessarily to ask members to vote no on this issue, but to raise a problem that she feels is ... needs to be addressed and hasn't been able to be addressed, but she's addressing it in the courts. So I just want to be clear on that, and I also want to be clear that I am not against vetting things in the full Committee, I think it's necessary and it's also informative, but, you know, I just want to make sure that we

have everybody to (inaudible) as early as
possible. And I understand that we're all busy
and we all have crises and we all right now are
trying to help Sandy victims in every way
possible, and that we're moving into the holiday
season, it's a very difficult time for everyone,
but it's good to have things vetted, it's just
very difficult to supersede a Subcommittee vote,
but she did make a clear presentation, and I
thought it was clear to me that she wanted us to
move ahead after she made her presentation, and
you know, I think we should move accordingly with
that. So you know, I appreciate the whole idea, I
understand, but we are working to try to make sure
that all things are vetted as quickly as possible
and that members can have information as quickly
as possible. So I'd like to move to a vote.
COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Okay, so I
don't think Council Member Reyna said she didn't
want us to vote it down, she said she'd understand
if you couldn't, because of the late hour of the
information. She's voting against it.
CHAIRPERSON COMRIE, JR.: Right.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: So

to you, as the co-Chair of the Black, Latino and

and now to have people vote at this point knowing
some things but not other things is not something
I'm accustomed to, and I don't want to get
accustomed to it. So I expect that we will have a
monitoring component on this proposal, and I very
much respect the views of my colleague. I expect
that we will do our due diligence in this matter,
but I'm not happy voting on this item at this
time, but I will vote yes in deference to what
seems to be a majority of this Committee, and our
commitment to monitor this issue.

COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Council Member Koo. Council Member Levin.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: First I
would thank Assistant Majority Leader Dickens for
chairing the Subcommittee the other day, I do very
much appreciate that in my absence. My nephew
also appreciates it, I was out visiting him. But
I do want to just say to my colleagues, this
project, as in all affordable housing projects in
New York City, are monitored by HPD and this

particular not-for-profit organization has a track			
record, has a track record of 50 years in the			
community. I encourage everybody to go down to			
their offices at 32 Penn Street in Brooklyn and			
see the type of work that they do and the services			
that they provide to everybody in the community,			
regardless of creed, color or religion, and I just			
want to say that this is an organization that does			
good work for everybody that needs it, and we need			
more organizations like that in the City of New			
York, and we need to think about providing what			
they provide, and what they provide is services			
for the poor, housing services, social services,			
and in this case, affordable housing, which is			
open and available to everybody. There has not			
been an accusation of discrimination with regard			
to this project, and so I would encourage my			
colleagues to vote aye again, but I do appreciate			
the concerns raised, and this like all projects			
are monitored by HPD and is done so in the			
strictest fashion. Thank you very much, Mr.			
Chairman. Thank you, Assistant Majority Leader.			
And I vote aye on all.

members that we need to make sure that the
Committee is fully informed on issues, so we are
looking forward to full discussions. If I could
just get one more minute of quiet, we have
Subcommittee meetings December 13 th and December

some specific responsibilities regarding this
project, we hope that we can count on you to
follow through and get back to us. So since the
Broadway Triangle issue is still a live issue, and
we want to make sure my understanding from this
is that we want more locally-based groups that
would get the yes easier, and not just one group
that gets sole source, that's my understanding.
And, you know, I know that this administration
tends not to work with locally-based groups, and I
think that's the heart of the problem here, so I
would like to see something, an update on that.
So, you know, I know that this administration
tends to work with super-groups or groups that
have a citywide base on these issues, and I think
that locally-based groups have their own
determination, especially in affordable housing,

2	that's a key part of the issue here, so I would
3	like to hear back from you on that. With that the
4	meeting is adjourned, we will hold the roll open
