CHAIRPERSON CROWLEY: Good morning.

My name is Elizabeth Crowley, and I am the chair
of the Fire and Criminal Justice Services
Committee here at the City Council. Today we are
voting on proposed Intro 943-A, which amends
various code provisions regarding the place of
assembly certificate of operation, which I will
refer to as the certificate and introduces a place
of assembly permit, which I will refer to as the
FDNY permit. This bill is sponsored by Council
Member Inez Dickens and several of my colleagues
in conjunction with the mayor. In 2009, the New
York City Regulatory Review Panel was created by a
local law to review the structure and function of
city regulations and their impact on small
businesses. After garnering input from small
business owners, industry representatives and
members of the public, the review panel issued a
report which detailed the panel's findings and
recommendations on fostering small business growth
by eliminating or streamlining regulatory fees.
Simplifying the place of assembly permitting
process was one of the panel's suggestions.
Proposed intro 943-A would amend several

provisions of the administrative, building and 2 fire codes relating to the place of assembly in 3 order to coordinate and streamline the regulation 4 5 of those places by the DOB and the FDNY. Currently a certificate is required for premises 6 where 75 or more members of the public gather indoors or 200 or more gather outdoors for 9 recreational, educational or social purposes or to 10 consume food. The current application for a 11 certificate is filed with the DOB, which reviews 12 the application and performs an inspection prior 13 to the issuance of the certificate. The DOB 14 issues certificates for one year and they must be 15 renewed on an annual basis. The renewal is based 16 on an inspection by the FDNY prior to the 17 expiration of the certificate. Although FDNY inspects places of assembly, FDNY does not renew 18 these certificates, but rather forwards the 19 20 inspection results to the DOB and provided it is 21 appropriate, the DOB will issue a renewal. 22 involvement of two agencies in the renewal process 23 for these certificates has been criticized as 24 being duplicative and often causes delays in 25 businesses receiving timely renewal of the needed

DOB certificate. This bill would address these concerns by streamlining the process. This bill would allow the DOB to issue the initial certificate, but only the FDNY would be involved in the renewal of these certificates. The bill would authorize the FDNY to issue after an annual compliance inspection an FDNY permit that together with the DOB issued certificate would authorize the continued operation of the business. The FDNY permit would last for a year subject to renewal. The DOB certificate would not expire, but would be inoperative without the accompany FDNY permit. 14 Additionally, the bill specifies that if places of assembly make certain changes, a new or amended certificate from the DOB would be required. businesses are the backbone of our local economy. This bill would reduce regulatory fees and eliminate unnecessary steps by saving money and time in the renewal process. With the passing of the bill, the city will have a better way to monitor whether small businesses are in compliance with buyer and building code regulations, which improves public safety and ensures that all businesses play by the same set of rules. Now I

3	members of the Committee-there is a fiscal impact.
4	Currently, the fiscal impact states that it is
5	350,000 to the city of a net revenue loss, but the
6	fiscal impact statement is still being amended.

just want to preface my aye vote with the 2 following: while I don't mind the city losing 3 \$350,000 of revenue in cutting down on bureaucracy 4 5 two important pieces of information I think were 6 gleaned from the hearing yesterday. Number one is we have an inordinate number of not for profits, which are still subject to these fees that the 9 fire department requires for our inspections and 10 one of those groups is our veterans associations, 11 which include Veterans of Foreign Wars, the 12 American Legion, Jewish War Veterans, Catholic War 13 Veterans, and those locations are continuing to accrue charges from the city. I don't think that 14 this is appropriate and is something that we 15 16 should probably recommend gets looked at. 17 second thing is that the building information 18 system operated by the Department of Buildings has 19 some cross platform abilities that seems to contradict some of the other information we got 20 21 during the storm as to whether or not information 22 in their computers was accessible by other 23 agencies, and I think that something is very 24 important for us to look at particularly as the 25 Buildings Department claimed that the only way for
