2	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Good
3	afternoon everyone, welcome to the Consumer
4	Affairs Committee of the New York City Council,
5	today is Tuesday, January 8th. My name is Dan
6	Garodnick, I have the privilege of chairing this
7	committee. I'm joined today by Council Members
8	Oliver Koppell, Karen Koslowitz, Julissa Ferreras,
9	and Mike Nelson. And we have a very brief
10	technical amendment that we're dealing with today
11	so this shouldn't take long.
12	Last month, the Council passed
13	Intro 939-A, a bill that will permit 10-foot wide
14	stoop line stands on sidewalks that are at least
15	21-feet wide. That bill also added a definition
16	for stoop line stand, differentiating stoop line
17	stands from displays. On today's agenda is
18	Preconsidered Intro T 2013-5702, a technical
19	amendment that would modify the definition of
20	stoop line stands by removing language that had
21	previously defined displays.
22	The Consumer Affairs department has
23	submitted written testimony in support of this
24	bill. I have a letter from Fran Freedman, the
25	Deputy Commissioner of External Affairs for the

3	Dear Council Member Garodnick, New York City
4	Department of Consumer Affairs supports the
5	technical correction to the Preconsidered Intro
6	being heard by the Consumer Affairs Committee on
7	January 8th, 2013. Sincerely, Fran Freedman.
8	We've been joined by Council Member
9	Leroy Comrie.
10	And with that, I will ask if
11	anybody has any comments?
12	[Pause]
13	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: Quite
14	frankly, I'm a little confused. As I read the
15	language, which I've just read for the first time,
16	I'm a little confused as to what this says. I'm
17	looking at the text of the law and it says that
18	shall not exceed seven feet in height, okay, I
19	guess I understand what that means, but then it
20	says stoop line stand shall not exceed ten feet in
21	length nor four feet in width. Now, I don't know
22	what length and width referred to. You said they
23	can extend ten feet into the sidewalk if the
24	sidewalk is 20 feet wide, is that correct?
25	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: I'm going

2	to have you do it on the record.
3	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: 'Cause I
4	just don't understand it.
5	FEMALE VOICE: I'm sorry, can you
6	ask the question
7	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK:
8	[Interposing] Thank you, Council Member Koppell.
9	What I'm going to do, since this is a highly
10	technical matter, I'm going to ask the counsel to
11	the Committee to answer you
12	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: That's
13	fine.
14	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK:but pose
15	your question again so that we get it.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: Okay. As
17	I understood your introduction, you were saying
18	that the stoop line stand, I assume this is a
19	fruit and vegetable stand
20	FEMALE VOICE: Yes.
21	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL:for the
22	most part. And currently, there is a restriction
23	on displays of three feet
24	FEMALE VOICE: Right.
25	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL:so that

2	a regular store can put out things up to three
3	feet unless
4	FEMALE VOICE: Yes.
5	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL:there
6	areand by thewell I'll, after I clarify this,
7	I want to mention something else, Mr. Chairman.
8	But so the current regulation, at least this
9	paragraph, says stoop line stands shall not extend
10	further than three feet from the front of any
11	premises, that's being eliminated.
12	FEMALE VOICE: Right.
13	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: So now it
14	says stoop line stands shall not exceed seven feet
15	in height.
16	FEMALE VOICE: Right.
17	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: Okay. So
18	I understand that, but that doesn't now deal at
19	all with how wide or how high or how far from the
20	front
21	FEMALE VOICE: Right.
22	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL:and
23	that's a key issue, the front of the premises. So
24	if we go to the end, it says, stoop line stands
25	shall not exceed ten feet in length. Now, that

2	ten feet could be protruding out from the front of
3	the store or it could be
4	FEMALE VOICE: [Interposing] No,
5	it's this way.
6	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL:ten feet
7	long
8	FEMALE VOICE: It's long.
9	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL:from
10	side to side.
11	FEMALE VOICE: Right.
12	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: If that's
13	what's intended, I don't think this expresses that
14	clearly. And then it says four feet in width. If
15	it said ten feet in length nor more than four feet
16	from the front of the premises, using the language
17	that we're eliminating, then that would clarify
18	it. Otherwise, it seems to me unclear because the
19	ten feet could mean ten feet out from the front,
20	which is, I guess, not what you intend. As I
21	understand, what you intend is four feet out from
22	the front. Or do you intend ten feet out from the
23	front? Assuming the front
24	FEMALE VOICE: [Interposing] It's
25	ten feet in length, so it's the length of the

4	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: So wait,
5	sorry, let me interrupt for a second 'cause I
6	think my understanding, I understand the question
7	here. So, Council Member Koppell, you want to
8	know whether or not this is intended to allow ten
9	feet jutting out into the streets?
10	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: Correct.
11	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Or ten feet
12	abutting the side of the store?
13	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: And four
14	feet into the street.
15	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Correct,
16	and the answer is?
17	FEMALE VOICE: Four feet into the
18	street, ten feet the length of the
19	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL:
20	[Interposing] Well then I would suggest to clarify
21	it that you change it, and where it says four
22	feet, you should adopt the language that you're
23	eliminating where it says three feet and just
24	actually you could probably do it just by changing
25	three to four and then

4	change three to four and then leave in the section
5	you already have and then say ten feet in length
6	in the last paragraphlast sentence, sorry, that
7	would be more clear. Or the alternative would be
8	to still take out the part that you're taking out
9	and say stoop line stands shall not exceed ten
10	feet in length nor four feet from the front of any
11	premises in that last sentence. If you did that,
12	that would alsoeither way you would be able to
13	make it clear. I think it's very unclear the way
14	it is now.
15	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Thank you,
16	Council Member Koppell, thank you. We do not have
17	the bill sponsor in our midst at the moment, so
18	let me just recess this for one sec, just take a
19	quick break for a sec, let us confer with counsel
20	on whether thisyou know, they believe it's
21	actually confusing or how this interacts with the
22	rest of the bill, so hang on one second.
23	[Off mic]
24	FEMALE VOICE: So this is not
25	language that we're changing at all, four feet on-

б	FEMALE VOICE: This was not new.
7	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Oh, that
8	wasn't, oh, oh, oh
9	[Crosstalk]
10	FEMALE VOICE: This has always been
11	the way they've described how these stands are
12	permit issued. None of this language is new. The
13	only thing that we're doing now is the
14	administration inadvertently took out the word
15	display here and replaced it with stoop line
16	stands. Displays are considered obstructions
17	under the transportation portion of the Ad Code
18	and they're already not supposed to extend farther
19	than three feet from premises, so this language
20	was just duplicative.
21	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: That was
22	supposed to
23	FEMALE VOICE: So they meant
24	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK:apply to
25	displays.

3	meant to take out displays, and instead they
4	included stoop line stands here. And by no means
5	did we mean to say that stoop line stands
6	shouldn't extend farther than
7	[Crosstalk]
8	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: So is any
9	of this stuff here
10	FEMALE VOICE: [Interposing] New
11	language?
12	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Yeah.
13	FEMALE VOICE: No.
14	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: So okay, so
15	all this was old
16	[Crosstalk]
17	FEMALE VOICE: [Interposing] This
18	was always the way
19	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Okay. So
20	FEMALE VOICE:they were
21	described.
22	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK:Oliver,
23	Oliver, we [off mic].
24	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: But if
25	you

3	sec, we're still in recess for a second so I
4	[Crosstalk]
5	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: Okay.
6	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK:I want to
7	just consult with you for a moment. Why don't you
8	turn off your mic?
9	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: Sure.
10	[Long pause]
11	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Are we
12	ready?
13	FEMALE VOICE: You're not on.
14	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Okay.
15	Folks, we're back in session, thank you for your
16	patience. Council Member Koppell.
17	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: But I'm
18	looking at the entire law, Mr. Chairman, and,
19	obviously, have only had a very short time. I
20	think that the entire law is ambiguous as to what
21	is meant by length and width, looking at the
22	entire law. I think that the entire law needs to
23	be clarified because it's not clear to me whether
24	length and width has anything to do with how far
25	the stoop line stand may protrude from the

2	building because you don't have before you the
3	section of the law that we're not amending which
4	talks about a stoop line stand that may extend up
5	to ten feet in length and ten feet in width. So,
6	obviously, width and length are not directly
7	related to the distance of the stoop line stand
8	from the front of the building, hence, the problem
9	with the amendment that you're proposing, or that
10	is being proposed here, is that it is not clear in
11	this paragraph what we're talking about when we
12	talk about ten feet in length. I would argue that
13	this means length either coming out from the
14	building or along parallel to the front of the
15	building because it's not differentiated, and I'm
16	not sure, to tell you the truth, whether that's a
17	problem, I think it might be a problem because
18	this particular paragraph is not modified by the
19	21-foot sidewalk requirement.
20	I don't think it's clear, I'm going
21	to vote in the negative on it. If you insist on
22	pushing it through, that's your prerogative, Mr.
23	Chairman, I think it's ambiguous and could easily
24	be clarified. It might require a clarification of

some other paragraphs to make it clear what you

2	mean by length and width. As it is now, it's, in
3	my opinion, not at all clear.
4	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Thank you,
5	Council Member Koppell. I am going to ask for an
6	affirmative vote on this on the basis that in the
7	rest of the law, it is very clear that width means
8	the distance of space between the building and the
9	sidewalk, and length is defined as along the space
10	that abuts the front of the building, and,
11	obviously, it's certainly the Council Member's
12	prerogative to introduce further legislation that
13	would amend or clarify this legislation at any
14	point. And with that, I will ask the counsel to
15	call the roll and I'll recommend an aye vote.
16	KEVIN PIN: Kevin Pin [phonetic],
17	Committee Clerk, roll call on Committee on
18	Consumer Affairs, Preconsidered Intro. Council
19	Member Garodnick.
20	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: I vote aye.
21	KEVIN PIN: Nelson.
22	COUNCIL MEMBER NELSON: Aye.
23	KEVIN PIN: Barron.
24	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Aye.
25	KEVIN PIN: Comrie.

9	KEVIN PIN: By a vote of 6 in the
10	affirmative, 1 in the negative, and no
11	abstentions, the item has been adopted. Members,
12	please sign the Committee Report.
13	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: All right,
14	thank you very much everybody. Do I need
15	[Pause]
16	CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: And we are
17	adjourned.
