2	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very
3	much. Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. My
4	name is Joel Rivera. I'm the chair of the
5	Committee on Rules, Privileges and Elections.
6	Before we begin, let me introduce
7	the members of the committee who are here with us
8	today. We have Council Member Lew Fidler, Council
9	Member Leroy Comrie, Council Member Inez Dickens,
10	Council Member Erik Dilan, Council Member Liz
11	Crowley. To my right, we have Council Member
12	Jimmy Vacca. We have Council Member Robert
13	Jackson. We have Council Member Karen Koslowitz,
14	and I don't see any other members here.
15	We are also joined by the committee
16	staff. We have Chuck Davis, Emerson Sykes, Yasmin
17	Vega, Alycia Vassell, Koramarie Dieguez and John
18	Clarke and Diana Arreaga.
19	Today before us, we have two
20	candidates for our review, for reappointment by
21	the Mayor to the Taxi and Limousine Commission.
22	They are LaShann DeArcy, a Manhattan resident. If
23	the Council gives it advice and consent, Ms.
24	DeArcy will serve for the remainder of a seven-
25	year term that expires on January 31st of 2019.

1	RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 4
2	We also have Edward Gonzales, a Queens resident.
3	If the Council gives its advice and consent, Mr.
4	Gonzales will serve for the remainder of a seven-
5	year term that also expires on January 31, 2019.
6	I will briefly explain the
7	functions of the TLC. The TLC consists of nine
8	members appointed by the Mayor, all with the
9	advice and consent of the Council. Five of said
10	members, one resident of each of the five boroughs
11	of the city are recommended for appointment by a
12	majority vote of the Council Members of the
13	respective borough.
14	Commission members are appointed
15	for terms of seven years, and can serve until the
16	appointment and qualification of a successor.
17	Vacancies, other than those that occur at the
18	expiration of a term, shall be filled for the
19	unexpired term. The Mayor may remove any such
20	member for cause, upon stated charges.
21	The Mayor designates one member of
22	the commission to act as the chairperson and chief
23	executive officer. The Charter provides that the
24	chairperson shall devote his or her full time to
25	this position and as such receive compensation as

2	set by the Mayor. The chair currently receives
3	\$192,198 annually. Other members of the TLC are
4	not entitled to compensation.
5	The commission is responsible for
6	the continuance, further development and
7	improvement of the taxi and limousine service in
8	our city. It shall be the further purpose of the
9	commission continent with the promotion and
10	protection of the public comfort and convenience
11	to adopt and establish an overall public
12	transportation policy governing taxi, coach,
13	limousine and wheelchair accessible van services
14	as it relates to the overall public transportation
15	network of the city.
16	The commission is also responsible
17	for establishing certain rates, standards and
18	criteria for licensing of vehicles, drivers and
19	chauffeurs, owners and operators engaged in such
20	services, and for providing authorization to
21	persons to operate commuter van services within
22	the city.
23	Welcome. We're also joined by
24	Meera Joshi as well. The General Counsel of the
25	TLC is with us here today. You're on the list.

2	Welcome, Ms. DeArcy and Mr.
3	Gonzales. Will you both please raise your right
4	hand to be sworn in?
5	Thank you very much. So whichever
6	one decides to go first, if you have any opening
7	statement or testimony, just please state it for
8	the record.
9	EDWARD GONZALES: There we go. My
10	name is Ed Gonzales. Good morning and thank you,
11	Chairman Rivera, Transportation Chair Vacca,
12	members of the committee, as well as members of
13	City Council. I'd also like to thank the TLC
14	Chairman David Yassky for his leadership, my
15	fellow commissioners, including Ms. DeArcy here,
16	and TLC staff for their ongoing hard work and
17	support. Finally, I would also like to thank my
18	family, especially my wife and two daughters,
19	former TLC Chairman Matt Daus and my coworkers at
20	Citigroup Treasury for their ongoing support.
21	Having spent my entire career in
22	the private sector in a highly regulated industry,
23	banking, I have what I would call a regulatory
24	customer perspective that apply in my role here as
25	commissioner for the Taxi and Limousine Commission

2	with respect to the taxi industry and the for-hire
3	vehicle industry.
4	When I first joined the TLC Board
5	of Commissioners back in 2005, I will admit I was
6	a little apprehensive. What do I know about
7	taxis? I'm a portfolio manager. But what I found
8	as a portfolio manager, the transferable skill of
9	strategic thinking, I believe, suits me well for
10	my role here at the TLC. When challenging
11	decisions are needed, I objectively assess the
12	balance among the passenger, driver and industry
13	perspectives. For the passenger, the question I
14	ask, is the public being served properly? For the
15	drivers, what is the impact on their implied
16	living wage? For the industry, will my decision
17	maintain or enhance the business viability? The
18	only nonnegotiable I will say I have is when it
19	comes to passenger and/or driver safety.
20	If confirmed, I pledge my
21	commitment to serve New York City and the riding
22	public in a professional and responsible manner
23	and I look forward to answering your questions
24	today.
25	LASHANN DEARCY: Good morning, Mr.

1	RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 8
2	Chair, committee members. I join Ed in thanking
3	you all for considering our candidacy today. It
4	was a little over a year and a half ago that I
5	first appeared before this committee, excited
6	about the opportunity to serve in the capacity as
7	a commissioner for the TLC. At the time, and from
8	that vantage point, I saw the TLC as one of the
9	few opportunities to be able to touch the lives of
10	such a large swath of our community. I was right.
11	The work of this commission is important work and
12	I have been proud to have had the opportunity to
13	be a part of it.
14	Since my installment as a
15	commissioner, I have been fully engaged in the
16	work of the TLC. I have taken the issues that
17	have been presented before us under serious
18	consideration and deliberation. I have worked
19	tirelessly to balance the many competing and
20	diverse interests that are presented by the issues
21	that we are asked to deliberate on, on a regular
22	basis.
23	I believe that I have honored my
24	obligation to the TLC in my approach and I am
25	proud of the many accomplishments that the TLC has

2	achieved in the very short time that I have been a
3	member of the commission. However, I do believe
4	that there is much more work to be done, and I
5	believe that I have much more to offer. So I hope
6	that today that I can satisfy you that I am
7	deserving a reappointment to the commission and I
8	pledge to you, as my fellow commissioner did, that
9	I will approach a further appointment with the
10	seriousness that it deserves.
11	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very
12	much for your testimony. We have Council Member
13	Lew Fidler is going to ask the first question,
14	followed by Council Member Leroy Comrie, followed
15	by Council Member Robert Jackson.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Thank you,
17	Mr. Chairman. I know we like to do these pretty
18	quickly, but I have a number of questions today.
19	I apologize to all of you and to you for that.
20	First, you both have
21	extraordinarily impressive resumes. I have no
22	issue with anything that I've read in this
23	whatsoever. You seem to have, you know, great
24	qualifications and character.
25	Both of you are reappointments to a

2	board, and unlike other boards that the Mayor
3	appoints people to, you're being reappointed to a
4	fixed term. So that gives you, in my view, the
5	freedom to tell the Mayor or the TLC commissioner,
6	whomever that is, you disagree. Have either of
7	you ever voted against the position of the Mayor
8	or the TLC commissioner or openly opposed a
9	position of the Mayor and the TLC commissioner?
10	If you have, can you tell me what issue that was?
11	LASHANN DEARCY: I will start. I
12	believe recently, and when you say voted against,
13	when the e-hail application was first presented to
14	this commission, I believed that Chairman Yassky
15	and the Mayor's Office were very supportive of an
16	immediate vote for us to allow e-hail apps. I was
17	not prepared to vote immediately for e-hail apps.
18	What this commission did, and I was joined byI'm
19	not certain what the exact vote but I was joined
20	by other commissionerswas that instead of
21	immediately voting an e-hail application, which I
22	think was something that was supported by Chairman
23	Yassky, we voted instead for a pilot program.
24	I believe that that was the right
25	approach. I believe that it allows us an

2	opportunity to be able to collect information and
3	determine whether or not ultimately e-hail apps
4	are appropriate and make sense for our city. So I
5	would say that that is an example of where I
б	differed and where I thought was the proper
7	approach for our city. I made that known through
8	my vote for a pilot. I didn't support an
9	immediate vote for the institution of e-hail apps.
10	I will say, with respect to other
11	votes that I had taken, those votes I've taken
12	because they're positions that I strongly believe
13	in. I'm proud of my record. I am particularly
14	proud, for example, of voting in favor of the
15	five-borough taxi plan, particularly proud of
16	voting for a fare increase for our drivers. So I
17	believe that my voting record speaks strongly for
18	my positions.
19	EDWARD GONZALES: Thank you. I
20	will say that as far as my voting record, most of
21	the issues I may have with whatever the stance
22	might be from the Mayor's Office gets fleshed out
23	well before there is a vote. I will say that
24	while on the commission, one of the things I'm
25	most proud of is the revamping of the for-hire

2	vehicle rules. Prior to my sponsorship of kind of
3	overhauling the rules, with my fellow Commissioner
4	Arout from Staten Island, it was very difficult to
5	determine where does the driver, base, and vehicle
6	responsibilities begin and end.
7	When certain issues came up,
8	particularly with respect to dispatching of
9	unauthorized drivers, the TLC staff helped craft
10	did investigation and helped craft a cohesive set
11	of rules which determined this is what the drivers
12	are responsible for, this is what the base owners
13	are responsible for and this is what the vehicle
14	owners are responsible for.
15	When the actual vote was called, I
16	will say that there was a split vote. There were
17	certain issues that were raised at the public
18	hearing that might have led to a vote being
19	delayed. But because this was so important to me,
20	ensuring that the riding public is going to enter
21	into a cab where there's an authorized driver, I
22	worked through a compromise where we had a vote,
23	but should there be new informationbasically,
24	extended the comment period such that if there's
25	new information that presented itself after the

2	vote was taken, we would re-craft the rules if
3	necessary.
4	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: I'm going
5	to take that answer as "sort of" for both of you.
6	I mean, obviously, there are a number of burning
7	issues that I want to take you through.
8	Commissioner DeArcy, you actually touched on one,
9	which we adamantly disagree on. A number of these
10	are issues that are in litigation and I want to be
11	clear that I'm not asking about the litigation.
12	So I don't want you to say you can't comment on
13	pending litigation. I'm going to ask about the
14	policy that is at issue in those matters.
15	You have indicated you're strongly
16	in favor of the five-borough taxi plan. It'
17	pretty clear with everyone in the room that I'm
18	not. Mr. Gonzales, what is your position on the
19	five-borough taxi plan?
20	EDWARD GONZALES: Let me relay to
21	you my impression of the five-borough. First of
22	all, I'm in favor of the five-borough taxi plan.
23	Being a resident from Queens, there is no street
24	hail service out where I live. I mean there's
25	some marginal service in Long Island City or

2	places that are close to where the garages are,
3	but other than that, there's no real street hail
4	service. I take that back, excluding the
5	airports.
6	I will say when we had the public
7	hearing for the five-borough taxi plan, I was
8	pretty much taken aback by the industry. The
9	industry, in their testimony, tried to portray a
10	picture of how detrimental this particularhow
11	the five-borough taxi plan would be detrimental to
12	their financial wellbeing. Not one speaker gave
13	anything from the passenger perspective.
14	There was one speaker who actually
15	gave the most balanced approach, who actually was
16	a cab driver. He expressed when he's driving a
17	cab and he sees illegal street hail pickup, he's
18	outraged. But being from the Bronx, when he's at
19	home and he wants to go hang out with his friends
20	in Manhattan, he's upset that there's no viable
21	hail service in the Bronx where he lives.
22	Again, giving a balanced approach,
23	he felt that there was unbalanced. Better to have
24	a five-borough taxi plan than to not have one, and
25	I share that view.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: I can
3	understand why the industry would be upset with a
4	taking of a property right that they had
5	purchased. So I mean
6	EDWARD GONZALES: [interposing]
7	But
8	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Obviously,
9	I disagree. I respect your opinions on this, but
10	I adamantly disagree with it. The next question
11	is do you believe that it was appropriate or that
12	it is correct that policy like that be done
13	without
14	[Background noise]
15	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER:message
16	from this City Council?
17	LASHANN DEARCY: I'm not certain if
18	you wanted or intended to answer the question
19	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER:
20	[interposing] Either one of you. Either one.
21	LASHANN DEARCY:directly, but I
22	will say that that is at the core of the current
23	litigation and I don't think that it would be
24	appropriate for me to articulate a position. I
25	mean that is the

3	[interposing] What is your view in general
4	LASHANN DEARCY:ultimate issue.
5	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER:of the
6	role of the City Council on policy issues that
7	come through the Taxi and Limousine Commission,
8	including the issuance of new medallions?
9	LASHANN DEARCY: Again, I really
10	believe that that is effectively asking me to
11	expound on an issue that's being litigated. So I
12	will respectfully defer to the Law Department on
13	this issue, respectfully.
14	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Come on,
15	counselor, you're a civil litigator. You don't
16	have an opinion?
17	LASHANN DEARCY: I am a civil
18	litigator, and hence, I know when I should defer
19	to the Law Department.
20	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: All right,
21	fair enough. You got me.
22	[Laughter]
23	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: All right.
24	The other two issues that are kind of front and
25	center are the issue of making all cabs, you know,

2	disabled friendly, you know handicap accessible,
3	whatever term you prefer. Can you tell me what
4	your position is on that as a policy matter?
5	Either one or both of you?
6	EDWARD GONZALES: I'll start. In a
7	perfect world, all cabs would be accessible.
8	Unfortunately, we all live in an imperfect world.
9	I will say, though, that doesn't mean we shouldn't
10	strive for perfection. Now, I believe that with
11	respect to accessibility, the TLC, in the seven
12	plus years that I've been there has made, you
13	know, progressive strides. We are not where we
14	would like to be, but we've made progressive
15	strides towards achieving the goal of having
16	wheelchair accessibility for cabs for New Yorkers.
17	I will say, let me share with you
18	one story that I can relay to the inspection
19	facility in Woodside. There was a wheelchair
20	really, it was a Ford Freestar that was up on the
21	lift being inspected, and one of the mechanics
22	came up and said, "Hey, take a look at this." And
23	he showed me that the brake lines were frayed.
24	That particular cab, what happens
25	is they cut the chassis, insert a lift, and with

2	the vehicle design, it's compromising certain
3	things like the brake system. In my opinion,
4	while it's important to have wheelchair
5	accessibility, I also think it's equally
6	important, as I stated before, driver and
7	passenger safety. I believe that there is a need
8	to really flesh to make sure that vehicle that are
9	wheelchair accessible can handle the 24/7 double
10	shifting that occurs here in New York City.
11	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: If I could,
12	because I know that my colleagues are
13	EDWARD GONZALES: [interposing]
14	Sure.
15	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Councilman, if
16	I can, you're going to have to wrap up and go to
17	other questions from other members.
18	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Yeah, I'm
19	almost done. Wouldn't the argument thenI mean,
20	you just said that because they had to cut the
21	chassiswouldn't it make sense then to make us
22	buy only, you know, originally made wheelchair
23	accessible handicap, you know
24	EDWARD GONZALES: [interposing] But
25	can the vehicle

3	don't have to cut the chassis?
4	EDWARD GONZALES: But can that
5	vehicle be double shifted 24/7.
6	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Why not?
7	EDWARD GONZALES: That particular
8	vehicle. I don't believe that vehicle exists
9	currently.
10	[Background noise]
11	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Sorry about
12	that. It's my son. All right, so, Commissioner
13	DeArcy, what's your view?
14	LASHANN DEARCY: I join
15	Commissioner Gonzales in my belief that our goal
16	should be to have an entire fleet of taxis that
17	are 100 percent accessible. I believe that there
18	are some challenges to getting to that point. I
19	believe that there are consideration. Cost,
20	certainly, is a consideration; it can't be
21	ignored. Is it a consideration that I think
22	outweighs the fact that the ultimate goal should
23	be to have a fleet that is accessible to our
24	wheelchair-bound community members? No. But I
25	think that as we march towards that goal, we need

2	to take a multifaceted approach. I think that,
3	yes, we absolutely first and foremost need
4	additional wheelchair accessible cars on the
5	street now. I'll note that while you commented
6	that you were against the five-borough taxi plan,
7	had the five-borough taxi plan been instituted, we
8	would have already increased our numbers of
9	wheelchair accessible cars on the street.
10	COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: [off mic]
11	Could you increase the volume please?
12	LASHANN DEARCY: Oh, I'm sorry.
13	COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: Could you
14	turn the volume up, sergeant, please?
15	LASHANN DEARCY: I'm not general
16	soft spoken. Again, as I was saying, we would
17	have had additional wheelchair accessible cars on
18	the street, which is part of the reason, but
19	certainly not the only reason why I supported the
20	five-borough taxi plan. But again, with a
21	multifaceted approach. We have our dispatcher
22	program, the dispatch program. It's not a perfect
23	program, but as part of a larger whole, I think it
24	is helpful. Perhaps we can explore ways to
25	incentivize our drivers to, while we march towards

2	increasing our numbers, to want to drive
3	wheelchair accessible taxis, and also we need to
4	train them. That's my answer for you.
5	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you.
6	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: My last
7	question. Just a last question?
8	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Councilman,
9	can we circle back around to you, because we have
10	other members
11	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER:
12	[interposing] Sure. Sure.
13	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Sorry about
14	that. Thank you. Council Member Leroy Comrie,
15	followed by Council Member Robert Jackson.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: Thank you.
17	Thank you, Mr. Chair. I wanted to ask Mr.
18	Gonzales, how long have you served on TLC?
19	EDWARD GONZALES: Since November
20	2005.
21	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: And how
22	long have you lived in Queens?
23	EDWARD GONZALES: I've lived in
24	Queens my entire life, except for four years while
25	I attended the College of William and Mary in

2	Virginia. I grew up in Southeast Queens in
3	Laurelton.
4	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: Oh yeah,
5	where'd you go to high school?
6	EDWARD GONZALES: I went to Regis
7	High School here in Manhattan.
8	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: Okay. I
9	was just looking at your resume. It doesn't show
10	that you are a member of any Queens groups or
11	affiliations with any organizations in Queens or
12	that you have any service. I've never had the
13	opportunity to meet you before. I don't think we
14	met in 2005 when you got appointed. I'm just
15	curious to know if there are any groups or
16	organizations that you have given time or presence
17	to. I'm surprised that we haven't met.
18	EDWARD GONZALES: Well currently,
19	most of my time is spent with my career and also
20	with my family. I still visit my family regularly
21	that still lives in Laurelton. I also do
22	volunteer work on occasion through Citigroup. But
23	unfortunately, right now just nothing volunteer
24	wise in Queens. The TLC, as far as the time I've
25	allocated towards volunteer work, seems to take

2	the lion's share of that available time.
3	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: Okay. I
4	see you have an excellent record of attending
5	meetings. You haven't missed any meetings of the
6	commission. I appreciate your dedication to that.
7	Clearly, you know, raising a family is not an easy
8	thing to do, so I commend you for that. I'm just
9	curious that we haven't met and that we haven't
10	had an opportunity to hear from you.
11	I appreciate your comments on the
12	five-borough taxi plan. I have to be concerned
13	about the actual implementations of the plan as
14	well. I think that to speak about what Councilman
15	Fidler said, the ability of the TLC not to ensure
16	that there's something that has been worked out,
17	leaving millions of dollars on the table that need
18	to be realized in creating an opportunity for an
19	increase in medallions is something that we
20	desperately need. We can't afford to leave
21	revenue that's available in a budget difficulty,
22	in a difficult budget year unrealized. I would
23	hope that the commissioners work to find a
24	resolution to make that happen outside of waiting
25	for the courts.

2	So, you know, I think it's
3	imperative that that happens and it's imperative
4	that we do everything necessary to try to make
5	that a resolution and not just wait for the courts
6	to resolve it. There are people on both sides of
7	the issue that are having a real economic impact
8	and a loss of income as a result of this delay.
9	I think that, you know, as
10	commissioners, especially with commissioners with
11	terms of seven years, you have an opportunity to
12	speak beyond what the rhetoric of the Mayor's
13	Office may be to try to get this resolved. I
14	would hope that as commissioners you take a
15	publics stance to try to deal with this issue. I
16	would like to hear if the TLC has talked about
17	anything on a commission basis about resolving
18	that issue, from both candidates.
19	EDWARD GONZALES: With respect to
20	the five-borough taxi plan, as my fellow
21	commissioner mentioned, it's still in the courts
22	and I'd prefer not to discuss that explicitly. I
23	will say, though, that you have my commitment to
24	work towards a solution.
25	LASHANN DEARCY: My sentiment is,

2	or I echo the sentiment of Commissioner Gonzales.
3	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: I would
4	just say hiding behind waiting for the courts to
5	resolve the issue doesn't move the issue of the
6	economics forward. The fact that we have people
7	that are depending on their livelihood to either
8	get additional medallions, or to realize a plan,
9	you know, is something that the commission should
10	look at beyond the courts. I would implore both
11	of you, and Commissioner Yassky to get something
12	done.
13	Both of your resumes seem to be
14	impressive. Your attendance and your focus on
15	being a major part of the commission seems to be
16	very strong. I would still ask both of you a
17	little bit more to try to resolve a major problem
18	that's a major impact on the revenues of the city
19	of \$500 million or almost a billion dollars in
20	revenues that need to be realized quicker and not
21	wait on the courts to do it. I think that
22	reasonable people, especially members of a board
23	that understand and have heard from all sides,
24	should be able to come up with an opinion that
25	could help move this forward. Thank you.

2	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very
3	much. Before we go on to the next line of
4	questions, if we can call the vote of Council
5	Member Dilan, who has to head out to another
6	meeting?
7	WILLIAM MARTIN: Council Member
8	Dilan?
9	COUNCIL MEMBER DILAN: I vote aye.
10	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very
11	much. Council Member Robert Jackson? We've been
12	joined by Council Member Vincent Gentile and also
13	Council Member Jimmy Oddo, who was in and out a
14	second ago.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: Well,
16	thank you, Mr. Chair and good morning everyone.
17	First, let me say good morning to the two members
18	of the TLC. Also knowing from a factual point of
19	view that Ms. LaShann DeArcy is one of my
20	constituents and which we had the opportunity to
21	discuss before, prior to her last appointment to
22	the TLC. I've read all of the documents in here
23	relating to the summary report of investigation.
24	I'm proud to say that I support her re-nomination
25	and reappointment to the TLC.

2	Clearly, one of the things that she
3	touched on back then and continues to touch on,
4	that she knows from personal experience what it's
5	like for her and members of her family to try to
6	hail a yellow cab in midtown or elsewhere and be
7	bypassed. The reflection in my opinion was
8	because of the color of her skin, because as a
9	black woman, and her husband is a black male.
10	Knowing that she lives in Harlem,
11	we know, that live in our community, know that we
12	only really see yellow taxicab not cruising as
13	they do in midtown to pick up passengers but more
14	so heading towards the highway to head to the
15	business district. So we, in our community, we
16	basically hail car services or call them. I've
17	expressed in hearings before that hailing like
18	this for a car service is legal in our community
19	where that's the way we deal from a practical
20	point of view. So I supported the five-borough
21	taxicab plan.
22	I just wanted to comment that all
23	things considered in reading, and I asked our
24	staff about how she voted on the situation as far
25	as the apps, and my understanding that is a trial

2	basis. My concern with that is that some yellow
3	taxicabs would bypass people that they felt were
4	undesirable or felt that they were going to
5	certain neighborhoods and could possibly use that
6	as an excuse if they were stopped, to say, well
7	they had a call.
8	One of the things that we want to
9	make sure is that all yellow taxicab drivers, when
10	they are cruising for a fare, that when someone
11	sticks out their hand to stop them, it doesn't
12	matter what color of your skin. It doesn't matter
13	if you have on work clothes that may be from a
14	construction company or elsewhere, it doesn't
15	matter how tall or short or large in size you are,
16	that that yellow cab is supposed to stop if it's
17	there to do business. No excuse, other than
18	stopping for a passenger is acceptable.
19	I looked at and read the
20	information for Mr. Gonzales and I looked at his
21	attendance record. His attendance record, he has
22	100 percent attendance record at TLC hearings,
23	which is excellent, all things considered, because
24	for one reason or another, there is always a
25	reason, an appropriate reason why someone is

2	absent. I noticed that you had a 100 percent
3	record, so you clearly get an award for an
4	attendance record. I don't know what other TLC
5	members have received that.
6	I just wanted to say
7	congratulations to both of you. I plan on voting
8	yes on both of you.
9	LASHANN DEARCY: Thank you.
10	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very
11	much. We'll swing back to Council Member Lew
12	Fidler.
13	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: See the
14	problem, Mr. Chairman, cycling back to me is I now
15	have two questions.
16	[Laughter]
17	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: That's called
18	retribution.
19	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: I just want
20	to note for both commissioners that a majority of
21	the members of the City Council are sponsoring a
22	piece of legislation that would require that all
23	new medallions be for handicap accessible cabs.
24	So I think that's a pretty strong sense of this
25	Council.

2	There is also pending litigation on
3	the taxi of tomorrow. Without commenting on the
4	litigation, in the event that the courts rule in
5	favor of the plaintiffs and they throw out the
6	taxi of tomorrow plan as passed, just assuming
7	that, what's your view of: A, requiring that they
8	all be handicap accessible; and B, that they be
9	manufactured within the five boroughs of the City
10	of New York and how would you do that?
11	LASHANN DEARCY: You want to take
12	that one?
13	EDWARD GONZALES: Okay. First of
14	all, I feel very uncomfortable discussing anything
15	on pending litigation.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: I'm not
17	asking you to discuss that. This time I'm being
18	very clear. I'm saying assume that the plaintiffs
19	win. It goes through all the appeals and the
20	plaintiffs win. All right, so you don't have to
21	comment on the litigation. You know, I'm the
22	plaintiff on the other one. I'm not as familiar
23	with this one, so I don't even want to discuss it.
24	EDWARD GONZALES: Well, I will say,
25	again, as I stated before, there is a need to

2	address the accessibility issue with respect to
3	taxicabs in New York City. We also need to be
4	very mindful of the safety aspects of it. We are
5	gathering information via the dispatch program.
6	This dispatch program is the second version of the
7	dispatch program, which right now appears to be on
8	the surface a lot more efficient than what the
9	original one was, in particular by addressing the
10	driver incentive with respect to dead head. Dead
11	head time, meaning the time that the driver
12	receives a call to where he actually has to pick
13	up a passenger and he's not compensated. In the
14	previous version, he wasn't compensated for that
15	time, but now he is.
16	With respect to, you know,
17	designing and building vehicles within the five
18	boroughs, I believe that you're supposed to let
19	the free market decide where the best delivery is
20	supposed to occur. If it's more efficient for a
21	vehicle that is accessible and also is road worthy
22	for 24/7 double shifting in New York City, and
23	it's made within the five boroughs, hey, that's a
24	double winner. But if it's going to be made
25	somewhere else but it still achieves the same goal

1	RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 32
2	at a lower cost, then economically that's the
3	right trade.
4	LASHANN DEARCY: Your hypothetical
5	assumes that the plaintiffs have prevailed and
б	therefore we are starting from square one. If we
7	have the opportunity and if it were feasible, and
8	again, I hearken back to my last response to you
9	that there are a number of considerations that
10	have to be taken into account when considering 100
11	percent accessibility. Again, I believe that that
12	should be the goal.
13	So to the extent that it is
14	feasible, I would support it. The runway,
15	however, between the hypothetical and feasibility,
16	there is some there. We would have to consider
17	those. It's difficult to kind of speak in this
18	hypothetical.
19	With respect to manufacturing a
20	vehicle in the five boroughs, again, if that were
21	possible, if the best made vehicle at the right
22	cost for our drivers and for our citizens could be
23	manufactured in the five boroughs, that would be
24	ideal. However, I don't believe that it should be
25	the driving factor of what vehicle and what

1	RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 33
2	manufacturer we select, because I do believe that
3	if you do a cost benefit analysis, the location,
4	the site of the manufacturer would not win out, at
5	least in terms of my considerations. Would it be
6	a plus? Absolutely.
7	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: If you do
8	get this question back before you, I would urge
9	that you give that a heavy priority. A lot of
10	people are looking for jobs.
11	The second question was in my
12	community we have an issue with dollar vans. The
13	TLC rules themselves prohibit the operation of
14	dollar vans in most of my neighborhoods, yet they
15	operate openly. They are honking at people,
16	picking people up on the street. They're not
17	operating by pre-arrangement, as I believe the
18	regs require.
19	What is your position on that
20	industry and the TLC's role in enforcing its own
21	regulations regarding dollar vans?
22	EDWARD GONZALES: With respect to
23	the dollar van, as I mentioned before, I grew up
24	in Southeast Queens, and I do remember more or
25	less the birth of the dollar van. Where I grew up

1	RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 34
2	in Laurelton, it was about a five-mile gap between
3	the city line to Jamaica station, where all the
4	subways and the trains were. It took well over
5	half an hour via the bus service to transport
6	passengers from Jamaica to Laurelton, Queens.
7	With the vans, though, you were able to get to
8	Jamaica within 15 minutes, in most cases. Because
9	once the van is filled, the next stop is Jamaica.
10	When you look at the productivity
11	of the workers of the city and all other market
12	participants in this economy, that extra 15
13	minutes in aggregate really adds up to more
14	productivity. So as far as the dollar vans are
15	concerned, they have a useful purpose within New
16	York City.
17	Now, to the degree, I'm not
18	familiar with your particular situation. I will
19	say though that with respect to enforcement, if
20	there is an issue, it will be addressed. The TLC
21	has made strong strides as far as increasing their
22	enforcement. If that is an issue, I will bring it
23	up with the chair in enforcement to make sure that
24	it's remedied to conform within the rules, if that
25	is the case.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Well, with
3	all due respect, you just said that when you grew
4	up, that they do the street hails, in violation of
5	your own regulations, but you don't think it
6	should be enforced.
7	EDWARD GONZALES: The situation I
8	described was well over 30 years ago.
9	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Well, you
10	don't think it's still going on?
11	LASHANN DEARCY: I did not grow up
12	required to use, out of necessity, dollar vans.
13	Certainly, as a New Yorker, I am familiar with
14	dollar vans. I believe that to a certain extent
15	that dollar vans represent the kind of livery
16	industry that residents of Harlem are required to
17	use because there aren't available alternative
18	means of transportation. There's a gap, you know,
19	between their home and the subway station and
20	there are no yellow taxis prevalent in those
21	communities. So I believe that they exist out of
22	necessity.
23	My concern, however, is with
24	respect to safety concerns that have been raised
25	with respect to dollar vans. So my concern is

2	less with the existence of them, because I do
3	believe that they are there out of necessity, but
4	the fact that, as I understand it, there are
5	concerns with regard to the safety, with
6	insurance, et cetera. So for that reasons, I am
7	in favor of perhaps increased enforcement with
8	respect to the dollar vans, to protect the riding
9	public. But I believe that the fact that you
10	raise the issue of dollar vans perhaps highlights,
11	again, the fact that so many in our community are
12	undeserved by the taxis.
13	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: I
14	appreciate your answers. I would just say to you
15	that dollar vans compete with mass transit, buses,
16	and not taxis, because taxis do something entirely
17	different. In my view, dollar vans are the
18	privatization of mass transit bus service. I
19	think that is exactly what is happening, because
20	the MTA cuts a bus, every time someone gets on a
21	dollar van, it costs an MTA bus driver its job.
22	If that wasn't happening, we'd have more frequent
23	bus service.
24	But that's not the subject of
25	today's hearing, so I'll leave it alone. I

2	appreciate your answers to all my questions. I
3	thank my colleagues for their indulgence in
4	listening to me go on and on.
5	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very
6	much, Council Member. At this point in time, I'll
7	ask the clerk to please call the role. If we can
8	call on Council Member Crowley first, since she
9	has a meeting that she's running late for.
10	Council Member Crowley.
11	WILLIAM MARTIN: Crowley?
12	COUNCIL MEMBER CROWLEY: I vote
13	aye. Thank you.
14	WILLIAM MARTIN: William Martin,
15	Committee Clerk, roll call vote, Committee on
16	Rules. Council Member Rivera?
17	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: I vote aye.
18	Congratulations.
19	LASHANN DEARCY: thank you.
20	WILLIAM MARTIN: Comrie?
21	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: I'm going
22	to vote aye on these candidates because they have
23	articulated opinions. I would hope that they
24	actually utilize these opinions to make sure we
25	get some resolution. We have a lot of money

2	riding on these medallions and it shouldn't be
3	just tied up by court action. There should be
4	some real forward thinking by the commission and
5	the commissioners to resolve this issue,
6	especially when there is so much money riding on
7	the table, and a need that needs to be resolved
8	quickly. I would also hope that they do take this
9	opportunity in service to make sure that their
10	voices are heard loudly and not just behind the
11	halls or walls of the commission. Mr. Gonzales, I
12	have two children also, so I would hope to see you
13	at some of the events in Queens. So I'm just
14	going to put it out there.
15	I think that the both of you have
16	had an excellent service record so far. I would
17	hope to see you in other opportunities to be
18	articulate and forceful individuals on behalf of
19	the city. I vote aye.
20	LASHANN DEARCY: Thank you.
21	EDWARD GONZALES: Thank you.
22	WILLIAM MARTIN: Vacca?
23	COUNCIL MEMBER VACCA: I'd like to
24	explain my vote. As chair of the Transportation
25	Committee, I feel it's incumbent on me to

2	congratulate you both. I'm going to vote in favor
3	of your nominations. You're both extremely
4	knowledgeable and very conscientious. I think
5	some of my colleagues are expressing concern that-
6	[Background noise]
7	COUNCIL MEMBER VACCA:the Taxi
8	and Limousine Commission. I understand your
9	position as a mayoral appointment, and I
10	understand that with virtue of your being a
11	mayoral appointment there are certain prerogatives
12	relative to your appointment. But I know how the
13	Taxi and Limousine Commission works, and I know
14	that sometimes what members say privately often
15	weighs on the agenda. It weighs on what can be
16	taken off the agenda. It weighs on what can be
17	modified.
18	So although I understand that
19	publicly you my be in a certain place, by virtue
20	of your appointment I urge you to make your
21	counsel known privately in those discussions that
22	really do dictate the agenda, even when those
23	discussions result in a deferral or postponement
24	of action. It gives parties two to three weeks to
25	come together, to get a consensus, to change what

1	RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 40
2	should be changed. That's where I count on you.
3	I fully understand you're in a different position
4	that the council appointees.
5	But I do tell you, and I know you
6	know this, the Taxi and Limousine Commission has
7	taken on an increased significance in the past
8	several years. I think until three or four years
9	ago, the commission was there doing its work and
10	it was kind of very, very below the radar. Well
11	now you're above the radar. By virtue of what
12	you're doing, what you plan to do and what you may
13	do, you're above the radar. People are watching
14	and people are counting on you. We could be going
15	through the most significant transition of taxi
16	service in our city's history.
17	So I appreciate your hard work and
18	your intelligence and I'm impressed with both of
19	you, but just be cognizant of the fact that this
20	Council will be watching. We will be doing our
21	oversight. We are a voice in this process and we
22	are at the table, but you can be at the table in
23	your way. We count on you to do so, especially in
24	the days ahead. I'm honored to vote for both of
25	you and I'm honored to vote yes.

2	LASHANN DEARCY: Thank you.
3	EDWARD GONZALES: Thank you.
4	WILLIAM MARTIN: Jackson?
5	COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: May I be
6	excused to explain my vote?
7	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Yes.
8	COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: Thank you.
9	I appreciate the questions and responses by the
10	members of the TLC up for reappointment.
11	Obviously, I agree with my colleague Jimmy Vacca
12	in clearly both are highly qualified and their
13	responses were appropriate, even though one or
14	more members of this particular committee may
15	disagree with their position. They clearly
16	articulated their positions on particular matters.
17	I somewhat disagree with my
18	colleague, the chair of the Transportation
19	Committee only in that, yes, you are being
20	recommended for appointment by the Mayor. But I
21	do not believe, unless somebody tells me, that you
22	have special privileges more so than anyone else.
23	You are a member, the same and equivalent as any
24	other member, whether you be a mayoral appointee
25	or a City Council borough delegation appointee.

2	I would say that your
3	communications on matters should not only be
4	discussed within thewith the council and the
5	chair and other members but publicly. The people
б	of New York City, we do not want a private TLC.
7	It represents all 8.4 New Yorkers and we expect
8	the members to uphold a principle of honesty,
9	integrity and transparency. That's what I
10	personally expect from both of you.
11	I agree with my colleague Lew
12	Fidler when he saidthese are my words not his
13	don't be a rubber stamp. You are individuals with
14	your own backbone, your own upbringing, your own
15	experiences in life, both positive and negative.
16	Both of you may have been subject to
17	discriminatory and/or racial because you are an
18	African American woman and Mr. Gonzales, you
19	appear to be, based on your name and everything
20	that I've read, a Hispanic male. Those are
21	members of our great city, and as you know, our
22	city is majority minority.
23	So I hope that you articulate your
24	positions not only privately but as a member of
25	the commission for those in a meeting that is

2	watching, listening, whether it's live or
3	videotaped, so that people could understood. I
4	hope and expect that you will stand up for the
5	people of New York City and not just for the Mayor
б	because you're the Mayor's appointee. With that

8	these reappointments. I think they deserve to be
9	reappointed. Thank you, Mr. Chair.
10	LASHANN DEARCY: Thank you.
11	EDWARD GONZALES: Thank you.
12	WILLIAM MARTIN: Gentile?
13	COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: I vote aye
14	on all.
15	WILLIAM MARTIN: Dickens?
16	COUNCIL MEMBER DICKENS: Mr. Chair,
17	my colleagues have all felt the need to explain
18	their votes. I do not. I will say
19	congratulations and thank you for your service. I
20	hope to see both of you in our communities. I
21	vote aye.
22	EDWARD GONZALES: Thank you.
23	LASHANN DEARCY: Thank you.
24	WILLIAM MARTIN: Koslowitz?
25	COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: May I be

2	excused to explain my vote?
3	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: After
4	following that, you really want to?
5	[Laughter]
6	COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: I just

9	drive and I take taxis. One of my complaints is
10	that you could stand on Queens Boulevard, which is
11	a major highway almost and 9:00 in the morning and
12	you can't get a cab unless you're going into
13	Manhattan. They won't take you anyplace else. On
14	the other side of Queens Boulevard, going west
15	towards Jamaica, they're far and few between.
16	So I'd like you to equalize, you
17	know, the cars that are in Queens, in the Bronx
18	and all the other boroughs and make sure that
19	everybody has the service that they deserve. With
20	that, I vote aye.
21	LASHANN DEARCY: Thank you.
22	EDWARD GONZALES: Thank you.
23	WILLIAM MARTIN: Fidler?
24	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Like it or
25	not, I'm going to explain my vote.

4	record reflect that Council Member Dickens just
5	stuck her tongue out.

10	Chairman Vacca made about how the issues facing
11	the Taxi and Limousine Commission today may not

15	obviously, I would hope to have dialogue with them
16	to convince them that their positions on these
17	issues need to change. But I will say that I'm
18	extraordinarily impressed with both of you. You
19	have a real knowledge, a real grasp of what's
20	being asked of you. I believe the Mayor has the
21	right to appoint people that I disagree with, as
22	long as they're competent and have integrity.
23	There is no question in mind that you're both
24	highly competent and you have integrity.
25	Given that, you know, I'm please to

2	vote aye on both of you. I just wish that we
3	could have some dialogue about some of the issues
4	we talked about, because I think there is a
5	perspectiveI know that some of the issues I've
6	raised have been raised by Commissioner Carone at
7	your own hearings and your own halls that you
8	might consider some of those points, particularly
9	on the disability issues.
10	I wish you good luck and I'm also
11	confident, by the way, that you both have the
12	intellect and character to stand up to the Mayor
13	if and when you do decide to disagree with him.
14	So I vote aye.
15	LASHANN DEARCY: Thank you.
16	EDWARD GONZALES: Thank you.
17	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA:
18	Congratulations to both of you.
19	WILLIAM MARTIN: Oddo?
20	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Hold on one
21	second.
22	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: I got so
23	carried up with Inez sticking her tongue out at me
24	I forgot. The counsel has suggested that I have
25	to disclose for the record that I am, in fact, the

3	taxi case, so I'm doing that.
4	WILLIAM MARTIN: Oddo?

8	all of you policies, which means more likely than
9	not that I agree with most of your policies. I
10	vote aye, yes, and congratulations.
11	LASHANN DEARCY: Thank you.
12	EDWARD GONZALES: Thank you.
13	WILLIAM MARTIN: By a vote of 11 in
14	the affirmative, zero in the negative and no
15	abstentions, both items are adopted. Members,
16	please sign the committee reports.
17	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very
18	much.
19	LASHANN DEARCY: Thank you.
20	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: We're going to
21	leave the roll open for 20 minutes for other
22	members to join us and to vote. Congratulations
23	on your reappointment.
24	LASHANN DEARCY: Thank you so much.
25	EDWARD GONZALES: Thank you very
