COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: Thank you very much, Madam Speaker and on this a grand celebration of Women's History Month you are looking at, with a combined experience, we won't call it age, 300 years of living women's history [cheers]. Which means that one of them is, at least one of them, well over 100 years old. [cheers] And Ethel Plimack is not shy so she raised her hand. [laughter] But, I wanted to honor these three living legends from my district and the first is Miss Mannie Wilson, here in her amazing, amazing self. She has been an amazing

leader in the Ravenswood Houses for many, many 2 She was a member of Community Board One 3 for decades and decades. She was a staff member 4 5 for Assembly Woman Kathy Nolan for many years. She is a mother, grandmother, great grandmother, 6 great, great, grandmother, it keeps on going. She is an amazing woman and just now, this year, I 9 know she worked with our City Clerk, Mike 10 McSweeney. As if she hadn't done enough she 11 wanted to be able to officiate at weddings and she 12 is now an officiant at weddings at the age of 95. So,[cheers] Miss Mannie Wilson, we say thank you 13 14 and salute you. The second honoree is Gertrude 15 McDonald. And I want to say that she is a 16 wonderful, wonderful Sunny Sider for decades. 17 is someone who really paved the way for women in 18 politics in Queens. She ran for the New York 19 State Assembly before I was even born. And at a 20 time when few women were running in politics and 21 she did that in 1968, paving the way for our 22 current Assembly Woman, Kathy Nolan in that 23 district. [applause] She is still on Community 24 Board Two, still on Community Board Two after 40 years of service. And she is an amazing, amazing, 25

tireless person. When we served on Community
Board two together, Gert McDonald, I often would
be tired at the end of the meeting and I would
look over at Gert McDonald and she was firing and
ready to go. She did not want to leave. She is
amazing at our Senior Center. She pushed, pushed
and pushed for the return of the bus stop, which
helps seniors, which Speaker Quinn was able to
help get us done with Community Board Two, Chair
Joe Conley who's here with us today. I want to
recognize Joe. So, Gert McDonald, for everything
that you've done, for everything you're going to
keep doing, [off mic] I know, the Q60 bus. We've
got to fix the Q60 bus as well. I thank you,
Gert, for everything that you've done. It's a
wonderful tribute for you. And our third honoree
is Ethel Plimack, who is 103 years old. [cheers]
[applause] And Ethel is an amazing, amazing and
tireless woman who at a time when fewer options
for careers were available to women, Ethel was a
long time employee of the Board of Education. She
worked at the high school that I went to, William
Cullen Bryant High School for many, many years.
And she retired but then she went back to work.

She took another job and at the age of 90 had to
leave that job and sued that employer for age
discrimination. [cheers] Because at 90 years of
age Ethel Plimack was not ready to stop working.
She had more to give. She was an amazing and
tireless fighter when we were trying to landmark
Sunny Side Gardens, where she has lived for over
70 years. And she went and testified, I think she
was in her late 90's at that point but she gave
amazing testimony before the Commission, I
remember that very well, Ethel Plimack. And she
is just an inspiration to everyone in Sunny Side.
So, it is my honor and privilege to represent
these three amazing women in the City Council and
to recognize all three of them for their amazing
contributions to the City of New York. [applause]
So, with that, I will ask our great City Clerk,
who knows these women as well, Mike McSweeney, to
read the proclamation.

MR. MIKE MCSWEENEY: Council, City of New York Proclamation. In celebration of Women's History Month the Council of the City of New York is proud to honor Ethel Plimack, Gertrude McDonald and Mannie Wilson, who represent 300

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years of living women's history. All New Yorkers
are heirs of their service and contributions. And
whereas Mannie Wilson has shown her strength as a
woman, a mother, a grandmother, a great
grandmother and a great, great grandmother. Always
a trailblazer, Ms. Wilson worked as the Executive
Director of a program in Astoria called the
Resocialization of the Handicapped. As a member
of Community Board One for nearly three decades,
as an active member of the Kohler Goldwater
Auxiliary and also worked with Assembly Woman
Kathryn Nolan for over 20 years. She has inspired
generations of women to follow in her footsteps
and become leaders in their communities. And
whereas, Gertrude McDonald has spent her life
advocating for western Queens. She was an active
member of several influential organizations,
including the 108 <sup>th</sup> Precinct Community Council and
Community Board Two. And she helped found the
Sunny Side Seniors Center in 1974. She ran as a
candidate for the Democratic nomination for a seat
in the State Assembly in 1968 at a time when it
was rare for women to pursue public office. Ms.
McDonald has fought adversity against women in

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politics and has led the way by inspiring other
women to hold elective office. And whereas, Ethel
Plimack has been a proud resident of Sunny Side
Gardens, Queens, for over 70 years. After she
retired from the Board of Education at the age of
70 she took another job at Marymount Manhattan
College until the age of 90. She continued her
civic activism well into her 90's when she fought
for her neighborhood, Sunny Side Gardens, to
receive landmark status. Throughout her
professional life spanning eight decades, Miss
Plimack has been in inspiration to friends and
colleagues for her dedication, wisdom and
generosity. Now, therefore, be it known the that
Council of the City of New York gratefully honors
Mannie Wilson, Ethel Plimack and Gertrude McDonald
for nearly 300 years of community activism in
western Queens. Christine C. Quinn, Speaker for
the Entire Council, Jimmy Van Bramer, Council
Member 26 <sup>th</sup> District, Queens, Julissa Ferreras,
Council Member 21 <sup>st</sup> District, Queens, Karen
Koslowitz, Council Member 29 <sup>th</sup> District, Queens,

Ethel.

MS. ETHEL PLIMACK: I would like to say, thank for this award and preserving Sunny Side as a landmark. [applause]

MS. MANNIE WILSON: I would like to say thank you very much and I'm honored to be here. I love all of you and I didn't want to stop because I figured that I could go about another good ten to 20 more years.

MS. GERTRUDE MCDONALD: I want to thank, congratulate all the honorees and thank

Jimmy for giving us this honor. [applause]

SPEAKER QUINN: I want to thank

Jimmy too 'cause if it wasn't for Jimmy we

wouldn't have all gotten this great opportunity to

see some of you again and meet others of you for

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the first time. So, I just want to thank you,
Jimmy, and more importantly, thank the three of
you for being such amazing inspirations, such
great role models, and for the three of you,
really having changed the landscape of the City of
New York making it possible for there to be so
many women on the City Council right now. It was
what you all have been doing throughout your whole
lifetimes that have created opportunity for women
and young girls. And we just are in your debt and
it's so wonderful to get an opportunity to say
thank you and meet all of you today. So, thank
you. [applause] And I will tell you one story.
When I came back from Community Board Two and I
said to my Chief of Staff, Gert wants a bus stop,
and Chuck, you better get that bus stop 'cause I
cannot go back to that part of Queens 'cause I was
afraid of Gert if I didn't get the bus. And I
suspect many people could say that about the two
of you as well, which is why you gals get things
done. So, thank you all and thank you, Jimmy.
Congratulations, everybody. [applause] Okay, and
as we move on from this ceremonial the next
ceremonial is going to be led by Council Member

2	Rosie Mendez where we are going to honor Judy
3	Westler, who was the, for over 40 years, a public
4	health advocate, is being honored on her
5	retirement from the Commission on the Public

14	honoring, what is your name? [laughter] Judy
15	Westler. Judy Westler, for many, many years, put
16	the public in public health. And she also put the
17	fire in the girls are on fire.

advocate and understand the issues and walking
into those hearings in the City Council and just

deserved, but we'll be calling you anyway. And
Anthony, you've got big shoes to fill, okay?

New York, proclamation. Whereas in celebration of Women's History Month, the Council of the City of New York is proud to honor a woman who has worked tirelessly to break existing barriers and improve the health of all New Yorkers for generations to come, Judith Westler. And whereas Ms. Westler has been an impassioned and effective public health advocate for more then 40 years. In 1995 after years of honing her expertise and working for MFY Legal Services, Community Action for Legal Services, now Legal Services, NYC, Community Service Society, the Manhattan Borough President's Office, the Children's Defend Fund, New York, and

others. She began volunteering at a new 2 organization, the Commission on the Public Health 3 System, CPHS, a city wide, community based, 4 5 membership health advocacy organization dedicated to fighting for equal access to quality healthcare 6 services for everyone regardless of their race, ethnicity, language spoken, diagnosis or the 9 ability to pay. And whereas, under the leadership of Ms. Westler, CPHS quickly flourished, launching 10 11 numerous community health projects, each involving 12 extensive community involvement and culminating in 13 a widely disseminated report. And whereas, Ms. 14 Westler helped CPHS become an influential voice 15 for the public health and hospital system, a voice 16 for the allocation of public funding in the state 17 and city budgets, a strong supporter of community 18 organizing and supporter of the healthcare safety 19 net and access to healthcare services for 20 everyone, particularly in low income, medially 21 underserved immigrant and communities of color. 22 And whereas, during Ms. Westler's tenure CPHS has 23 addressed everything from language access issues 24 to funding to maintain the very important child health clinics to increase the availability and 25

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enrollment in public heath insurance. And	
whereas, on Ms. Westler's retirement she can	n be
proud of her enduring contributions to publ:	ic
health, whether they were hard fought victor	ries or
less fruitful endeavors. In all of her work	k she
has proven how every individual can play a	
significant role in the health of all New Yo	orkers.
Now therefore, be it known that the Council	of the
City of New York gratefully honors Judith We	estler
for her outstanding service to the Commission	on on
the Public's Health System and to the commun	nity at
large. Christine C. Quinn, Speaker for the	Entire

healthcare of all New Yorkers, particularly the
uninsured and under insured. So, Judy, thank you
very much. I find the concept of Judy Westler as
retired very hard to believe but we will see what

I don't want to get in trouble but I want to thank Councilman Brad Lander, the Progressive Caucus Alliance, the Progressive Caucus of the City Council, the Working Families Party, all the people who made this day possible by standing with a kid from southeast Queens who started here at 19 years old. I've been here. I'm no stranger. Don't term staff members out, by the way, even though I've been here ten years, we should not make sure staff members can't excel here. So, we should be making sure that the next generation can come up here. And that's why I've hired, and I want my staff to come up, some young people who really want to make a difference in their community from southeast Queens. [applause] And you guys should all come up and take a bow. Once again, I said I would be short. God bless you all. Thank you. I look forward to servicing the City, serving this community. Thank you, Christine Quinn, your staff has been phenomenal in terms of the transition for the new office and making sure that we have all the things we need. And lastly, before I get off

	this mic. We need to make sure that there are
	still 2,000 people without electricity in the
	Rockaway's as we speak today. And it behooves me
	to stand here, and even though I should be in a
	celebratory mood, we have to make sure, this City

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: --I echo your comments about the staff because they put in a great deal of time. I think this is a piece of legislation that seeks to strike a balance between the publics right to know who is spending money on

independent political messages and an
organizations right to communicate internally with
its own members. This bill strikes the
appropriate balance by maintaining disclosure of
independent expenditures aimed at the general
public without infringing on member to member
speech. And as you indicated it is a result of
extensive collaboration and discussion between
various stakeholders and it was supported by many
good government organizations. And I want to say
that the way in which we have come to this is to
try to find an alternative to the citizens way in
which the national government has proceeded, which
I hope we do not do. Thank you very much. We
look forward to overriding the veto.
SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you. Council
Member Mendez?
COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Thank you,
Madam Chair, and thank you, Chair Brewer. Intro
978A preserves the intent of the 2010 New York
City Charter Revision process by striking an
appropriate balance between the right of the
public to know who is spending money on
independent political messages and the

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associational right of organizations to
communicate internally with its own members.
Accordingly, this legislation exempts member to
member communication from the campaign finance
boards, independent expenditure reporting
requirements, establishing a statute what was the
policy in all city elections prior to the spring
of 2012. This narrow and targeted bill protects
transparency and source disclosure while
simultaneously encouraging membership
organizations to undertake the critical operations
that help voters become aware of candidates. Thus
increasing voting levels in our city, which is a
universal good and desired outcome. It was the
subject of extensive negotiation and compromise
and was ultimately supported by Common Cause,
Citizens Union, the Brennan Center for Justice,
Citizen Action and Nikirk [phonetic]. On February
22 <sup>nd</sup> , the Mayor vetoed the bill giving the clear
merits of this proposal the narrow drafting of
this membership communication exemption and the
consistency of this legislation with the
transparency of disclosure of the Charter
amendment passed by the voters in 2010. Today, we

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seek to override the Mayor's veto. Thank you very much, Madam Speaker.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Council Member Mendez. We also are overriding a intro 814A, a piece of legislation which would prohibit discrimination in New York City based on an individuals employment status. Right now, in New York employers are allowed to put in job ads, which they do on a regular basis, don't apply if you are unemployed. Our bill will ban that. It will also give folks who are discriminated against redress to go to the Human Rights Commission but it will be the toughest law of this type in the country and give individuals the right to also sue against those employers in court. I want to thank everyone who worked on this legislation on the Council's legislative staff and I also want to than Chair Debbie Rose, who is Chair of the Committee for her work on this I want to thank Council Members Leroy bill. Comrie and Vinnie Gentile for their work on this bill as well. Let me first call on Chair Rose, then Council Member Comrie and Council Member Gentile if they would like to make comments.

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2 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Thank you.

I'd like to thank Speaker Quinn for championing this legislation and Council Members Comrie and Gentile for sponsoring it. As Chair of the Civil Rights Committee I am proud to be one of the sponsors of 18A14A, which prohibits discrimination based on an individuals unemployment. And I am proud to cast my vote to override the Mayor's veto of this legislation. Why is this legislation so important? Because the old axiom remains true. How can you get a job if you can't get a job? As New York City continues to rebound from the recession of 2008 to 2009, it is important that we help hard working New Yorkers who through no fault of their own lost their jobs and are now dealing with the toughest job market since the Depression. We will not allow them to be penalized twice, first, through losing a job because of the economy and then again by being denied a job interview because they lost their job. Discrimination against the unemployed is just as bad as not hiring someone because of their race, creed or sexual orientation. And in fact, this practice most likely has a disproportionate impact on

communities of color, as African Americans,
Latinos and Native Americans have higher rates of
unemployment. As a city, we must say no to this
practice and put an end to it. This legislation
will go a long way towards redressing this
insidious practice. Thank you all and I ask you
to vote aye for this legislation.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you. Just before I call on Council Members Comrie and Gentile I also want to thank the Manhattan Borough President, Scott Stringer, who has been working on this issue and this type of legislation for quite some time as well as the National Employment Law Project. And I want to give folks a breaking news update which is that the College of Cardinals has picked a new Pope.

MALE VOICE 5: Argentina.

SPEAKER QUINN: The new Pope, exactly right, the is Cardinal Jorge Bergoglio of Argentina. He is the first non European Pope ever. The decision came after the fifth ballot passed by the 115 Cardinals. And this is not in the CNN news update but according to the Chuck Mayer [phonetic] update he has picked the name

Pope Francis, Pope Francis I. So, from CNN and
Mayer, Pope Francis I of Argentina. Council
Member Comrie who was not in the running for Pope
but would have made a heck of a Pope, Leroy. Just
for the record, Ramon was recently in Argentina,
which leads me to believe he may have whacked a
deal for the Pope and none of us known about it.
I'm just saying, fingerprints is all I'm saying.
[laughter]

thank Council Member Rose, Council Member Gentile,
Speaker Quinn, the Council's legislative staff,
and everyone that has worked to, on intro 814A.
With New York City's economy still recovering from
the recession. We need to do everything possible
to ensure residents have a fair chance to gain
employment. And overriding this intro 8,
overriding the Mayor's veto of intro 814A will
help us accomplish just that. This law does not
require employers to hire everyone who walks
through their door, only that they cannot base the
hiring decision on the employment status of people
who apply for the job. It is important that we
make that understanding and that distinction.

This is an opportunity to protect people who are
unemployed through no fault of their own, who are
unemployed due to situations like Sandy which has
rendered them into a situation that this city
needs to be helpful for and thoughtful to them. I
would strongly ask my colleagues to do this
override and I appreciate that the City will
hopefully understand what we're trying to do is to
try to get people employed that were underemployed
due to no fault of their own. Thank you, Madam.

thank my colleagues also and they said it best, this is the newest form of employment discrimination so it is right and it is just or us as a Council to nip this in the bud. And it's unfortunate that our Mayor does not understand the form of discrimination that's going on here. We do, and we will override this veto today. And thank you to the Speaker for her leadership on this.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much Vinnie. We also are voting on two bid amendments and budget modifications today. I want to thank the Finance staff, particularly Tenisha Edwards

2	[phonetic] and Raymond Jeffski [phonetic], and
3	thank Chair Recchia. We are also voting on ULURPS
4	[phonetic], UDAPS [phonetic] and landmarks. I
5	want to thank Chair Comrie and the other Chairs
6	and the staff in the Council. We are voting on
7	the appointment of a number of different
8	individual and I want to thank Chuck Davis for his
9	work on the appointments and Chair Rivera. We are
10	voting on three pieces of legislation from three
11	different committees, all of which deal with Sandy
12	related matters. The first, intro 107A out of
13	Housing and Buildings and I want to thank Bob Hum
14	[phonetic] Laura Rogers, Ed Atkins and Rachel
15	Cordero. This piece of legislation, obviously,
16	came out of the Housing Committee led by Chair
17	Dilan and was sponsored by Council Member Ignizio
18	and Oddo. This bill puts in a set of standards
19	and a process around having to raise homes. We
20	now know that many folks who live in flood zones
21	will more than likely end up raising their houses
22	to a higher elevation. What Council Member Oddo
23	and Ignizio and Martinez when they went
24	recently to New Orleans heard and saw was poorly
25	done work. Construction workers who were killed

while doing house raising that was not being
properly regulated. People were ripped off.
People had their house raised but had no steps
attached to them, which makes it a challenge to
get in and out. We don't want those things to
happen in New York as New Yorkers make the
decision to raise their homes. That's why this
bill is so smart, so ahead of the game and really
puts appropriate provisions in place working
collaboratively with the Mayor's office and
Department of Buildings we want to thank. We know
these will not slow down an important process. So
again, I want to thank everyone who's involved.
Let me first call on the Chair, Erik Dilan, then
Council Members Ignizio and Oddo.

thank you Madam Speaker and I'll be very brief. I just want to, I'm not going to speak on the bill because I know my colleagues will do that after. But I think everybody knows this and it's a well kept secret around here. Council Member Oddo and Council Member Ignizio are really two outstanding Council Members who go to work every day tirelessly for their constituents. And I think

2	this hill is a result of all their hard week
2	this bill is a result of all their hard work
3	because they took it upon themselves to learn from
4	the troubles and tribulations of the recovery of
5	the people with Louisiana to ensure that the
6	people of the City of New York don't go through
7	these same things. Now, in a time of crisis it's
8	hard to think straight and do things the right
9	way. but it's always better when you learn,
10	whether in personal life or governmentally, when
11	you learn from other people's pain. And I think
12	that's what they've done here with this bill. So,
13	I feel very, very comfortable moving forward and
14	moving quickly on this bill because we will have
15	standards in place for our agencies that regulate
16	this type or work to have a certain set to
17	guidelines and protocols going forward so that as
18	we start to rebuild homes in the areas affected by
19	Hurricane Sandy that the people who go into
20	contract with home improvement contractors know
21	that there's a set of rules out there that applies
22	to them and how their houses are going to be
23	rebuilt. And that they are not alone and that the
24	government of this city will stand by them. It's

largely because of the credit of these two

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gentlemen and the Speaker as well. So, thank you,Madam Speaker.

COUNCIL MEMBER IGNIZIO: Thank you, Madam Speaker. I'm sorry for being late. I was watching the Pope Francis the 1st. So, we're happy about that as a proud Catholic. And I want to thank the Speaker, my colleague, Council Member Oddo - - Martinez who are, when we decided to take what I believe was the important trip down to New Orleans to learn the lessons, things that work well in New Orleans and things that failed and to not replicate that which failed. One of he main things people came back to us and said was, beware of the elevation process. People came in from across the country into the communities in New Orleans and basically took advantage of people who were undereducated, as we all are in regards to raising homes and the elevation process. So, what we did is we came back and Council Member Oddo, myself, the Speaker's office, we believe we crafted a piece of legislation that will give protection to people and a direction that people need with the oversight of government ensuring that we don't have fly by night contractors coming

in doing slip shod work on the people's number one
investment that potentially could be dangerous to
those who are living in the house and those that
are doing the work. So, I think this is a great
bill and one that we should all be proud of and I
want to point out as I did in pre stated. That I
show my appreciation for the Speaker in that this
is a body that is one that really does look at the
value of the idea you have. And if you have a
good enough idea you can move it through the
legislative process and pass it. It's not based
upon, I served in other legislatures in the State
where there was other ulterior motives and other
motives that dictated whether you can pass a bill.
And I just wanted to point that out to anybody who
is listening and watching on TV that this is a
body that is based on your ideas and not on your
party affiliation or anything else. And I want to
thank you, Speaker, for that. I appreciate it.

I was a reluctant traveler because I did not, wasn't confident that the things that happened post Katrina translated up north. Vinnie was right, I was wrong. And in every conversation I have had about Sandy, which is literally every day, I have referred back to something I saw or something we heard, something we learned on the ground in New Orleans. And as Council Member Ignizio indicated, Ramone, Peter Spencer from the Mayor's office, Vinnie and I traveled in all the Parishes in and around New Orleans. And we saw the good, the bad and the ugly of elevated homes. And you can elevate homes correctly. You could elevate homes in a manner where they are aesthetically pleasing. It takes the right people to do that. And there are opportunists out there that take advantage of folks in crisis. It happened down south. It will

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happen, or it would have happened here, and thanks to this legislation we are putting a process in place to protect people from being victimized a second time. And I'm appreciative for everyone for making this happen.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you, Council Members Ignizio and Dilan and Minority Leader Oddo. We are also passing legislation today of the Public Safety Committee sponsored by Council Member Oddo. I want to thank Carmine Juga [phonetic] Onna Peterson [phonetic] Jim Carris [phonetic] Lorna Axelrod [phonetic] Peggy Chan, Sal Arona [phonetic] and Alex Pistilnik [phonetic] for their work. This piece of legislation will increase civil and criminal penalties against those individuals who commit criminal acts during a local state of emergency in the areas impacted by the emergency. 99.9 percent of New Yorkers were amazing during Irene and Sandy. A few bad apples were not. That happened during Irene and impacted the thinking of some New Yorkers during Sandy. There are people whose homes, in evacuation areas were looted during Irene. of those individuals chose to stay in their home

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in Sandy. Some of those individuals in Staten Island are no longer with us because staying in their home during the surge, their homes flooded so badly that they drowned to death. So, this is serious in a very real way and I want to thank Minority Leader Oddo for moving forward with this piece of legislation that I believe will send a clear message that targeting and victimizing New Yorkers, particularly during states of emergency will not be tolerated. Let me call on the Chair of the Committee who shepherded the bill, Chair Vallone and then Minority Leader Oddo.

COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: I'm going to pass to Jimmy Oddo on this because I'm sure he's going to say exactly what I would have said.

COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: That sort of conjures up the time when Peter said I'd like to temporarily be excused to explain to Alan Jennings - - it's one of the best lines ever in this body. I would just like to thank Chairman Vallone and his Council and staff for helping crafting this bill and the Speaker's staff as well for taking an idea that really emanated out of Hurricane Irene and turning it into a much better bill. And I'd

simply say that, you know, many of the folks that
we represent were devastated by Sandy and we can't
allow them to be victimized a second time by human
beings. And as the Speaker said, we saw the best
in people and we saw, on occasion, as some folks
who opportunists who tried to take advantage of
this crisis. And this bill is intended to punish
as severely as we can in the Council, those who
decide to cross the line and turn to the world of
criminality. And I'm appreciative for everyone
for making this possible.

SPEAKER QUINN: And finally, also, in the vein of following up on Sandy, we have a piece of legislation that comes out of the Small Business Committee chaired by Diana Reyna, sponsored by Margaret Chin. I want to thank Jack Compangna [phonetic] and Tirza Nasir [phonetic]. This piece of legislation does two things. It codifies the fees, certifications, registrations, et cetera, that the Mayor has already waived in his executive order. Beyond that it expands the number of fees, registrations, et cetera that are now exempt for small businesses in the Sandy impacted area and also creates the opportunity for

those businesses that have already paid them to get refunds and reimbursement. It also includes those businesses who've had to move to different locations to reopen. We hope this piece of legislation helps make it easier for small businesses that have been so, so devastated by Sandy. Businesses that, no pun intended, were under water before the storm which are now really barely getting by. That helps them have a little more financial leeway to get moving forward for themselves, their family and their employees. So, I want to thank everyone on the staff, Diana, Margaret and the Mayor and the Mayor's office for work on this bill. Let me call on Chair Reyna and then on Council Member Chin.

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA: Thank you,

Madam Speaker. On February 28<sup>th</sup> the Committees on

Small Business and Economic Development held a

joint oversight hearing on the impact of Hurricane

Sandy on small businesses and the City's response.

The Commissioner of Small Business Service

testified that there are over 13,000 small

businesses located in hurricane zones A and B

which were either damaged or destroyed by the

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storm. We heard testimony from small business groups about entrepreneurs who invested their entire lives in their businesses who now have nothing. In case after case insurance companies have refused to cover their losses leaving them struggling to put together loans and grants to resume normal operations. I am incredibly excited by the passage of intro 5909 today. Because of this legislation businesses impacted by one of the largest natural disasters this city has ever experienced, businesses will be able to rebuild and reopen without facing additional costs from city agencies. Intro 5909 will waive or refund permit and inspection fees mandated by the City. In drafting this legislation we attempted to cast as wide a net as possible to encompass all of our impacted businesses and any inspection and permitting process associated with small business recovery. To be eligible for waivers business can be located in hurricane evacuation zone A or B, be in a business recovery zone which may include or may not include a zone C or a building in which the Department of Buildings assigned a red, yellow or green tag. Fees outlined in the bill are from

2	various agencies including the Department of
3	Buildings, the Fire Department, the Department of
4	Transportation, the Landmarks Preservation
5	Commission, the Department of Small Business
6	Services, the Department of Environmental
7	Protection and the Department of Consumer Affairs.
8	The list can go on and on but this is the wide
9	ranger for agencies that have oversight and
10	regulate small businesses throughout the City of
11	New York. The waiver of city fees for recovering
12	small businesses is simply a matter of good,
13	responsible governance. These small businesses
14	form the fabric of the communities in which they
15	existed, the provided goods and services, enhanced
16	the quality of life, employed local workers and
17	paid taxes. They are essential to the economic
18	vitality of this city and we need them back. This
19	is why where there are business owners who want to
20	rebuild we need to encourage them to do so
21	whenever we are able to within their communities.
22	I'd like to thank Council Member Chin, my co
23	author to this legislation who fought fearlessly
24	in order to have relocation within the same zone
25	be possible within this particular bill as well as

[phonetic] who is the Chief Business Officer for
the City of New York, and my very own staff,

Corbett [phonetic] and Tirza Nasir [phonetic]
whose leadership for the bill, whose directed this
staff to an excellent, speedy legislative process.

Madam Chair. First, I'd like to thank you for your support and Council Member Reyna for co sponsoring this bill and the legislative staff who work on this legislation, Tirza Nasir and Jeff Campagna. This legislation is especially meaningful to small businesses in areas of my district like the South Street Sea Port who saw their properties completely flooded and destroyed by Hurricane Sandy. These businesses are rebuilding from ground up and to the tune of hundreds of thousands of dollars. I am also

2	particularly pleased that this legislation also
3	extends the fee waivers to businesses that had to
4	relocate but they're relocating locally. So, I
5	urge all my colleagues to support it. Thank you.
