CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Okay. Good afternoon, everybody. I'm Mark Weprin, Chair of the Zoning and Franchises Subcommittee. This is the continuation of a recessed meeting of April 30th of the Subcommittee. We have one item on this agenda that is not quite resolved. Any minute we're waiting for the final resolution. But we're going to start on the agenda, what we have here, and we're hoping someone takes the hint and gets up here really quickly. All right, so, we're going to start with, we have had a hearing on 150 Wooster Street, 793 and 794 in Council Member Chin's District. Council Member Chin has a statement on this particular application. Council

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you,
Chairman. And thank you to the Committee for
holding the hearing. I'd also like to start by
thanking community board two for their hard work
and leadership throughout this process. We worked
very closely during the course of this application
and their contribution has ensured that all party
had an opportunity to voice their opinion. I had
hoped that some agreement about this application

| could have been reached. My staff work with all |
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| the parties to explore option that might work the |
| benefit of the applicant, residents and the |
| community board. Unfortunately, no such accord |
| could be reached. The Soho/Cast Iron Historic |
| District is a vital part of the first council |
| district. It is a community of creativity and |
| activism. It is because of the hard work and the |
| dedication of the resident that turn a former |
| manufacturing district into a haven for artists. |
| This equity of the resident led to the |
| adoption of law that recognize their right to live |
| in these converted buildings, it paved the way for |
| a renaissance of Soho that has made it one of the |
| most sought after and desirable places to live in |
| Manhattan. It is the same steadfastness which led |
| to the creation of the historic district and its |
| recent extension. One of the first land use |
| action to be taken up by my office. The |
| preservation of a particular bill environment is |
| what land marking and establishment of historic |
| district seeks to achieve. The text amendment |
| before the Council is of some concern. It is my |
| opinion that the 40 percent of less amendment to |

| 2 | the zoning resolution would encourage the |
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| 3 | demolition of buildings within the historic |
| 4 | district that continue to have value. It is my |
| 5 | belief that there are other option for these |
| 6 | structures that need to be fully studied. |
| 7 | Adaptive reuse of these structure would enhance |
| 8 | historic district. The revitalization of these |
| 9 | structures represent a unique opportunity for |

property owners that should be more meaningfully explored. It is because of this concern that I

must recommend to my colleagues on the Committee

that they vote to disapprove this application.

Our next item on our agenda is Land Use number

790, this was Café Argentino. There is a letter
that has been submitted to the Council Member,

Diana Reyna, which she has. Council Member Reyna,
you want to read that letter into the record?

Mr. Chair. I just wanted to inform the Committee. I represent 499 Grand Street, Brooklyn, New York, Café Argentino who submitted a sidewalk café renewal permit and they have agreed to the following; the modification of sidewalk café plans will reflect the accurate measurement of the sidewalk, plants will within the boundaries of the café, sidewalk café will be included within those plans as well and the posting of sidewalk café permits as indicated by the code will be located visibly from the outside and delivery bicycles will be locked in another place other than the pedestrian, other than obstructing pedestrian

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clearance which is what was found in the visit for investigation. I'd like to thank Café Argentino's owner, Armando Orfina [phonetic] who was very accommodating in making sure that he was following the rules as was indicated by the application process. Thank you, Mr. Chair, for your

indulgence and thank you to the Committee.

CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Thank you, Council Member Reyna. Just to recap, so on Café Aregentino we are going to be voting on today, two items that are on the agenda, 791, Ofrenda, and 792, Tin Martin, we did vote on the other day at the last meeting. Those of you who were not here at that meeting can vote on those items today as well as Sugar and Plumm which was 801. That also was voted and they can vote today. Great, so we are going to now couple these café's. Okay, Land Use number 790 is the one we are voting on today, although you can leave your vote for the other ones, those who missed last meeting. I am going to couple this along with the Manhattan core parking text amendment that we heard about from City Planning which is Land Use number 795. So, those two items are coupled as well as, if you

| 16 | much members of the Committee. We are going to |
| 17 | stand at ease for a few minutes. And I am going |
| 18 | to try to be clear that it is only a few minutes |
| 19 | that we are going to wait and if not they will |
| 20 | have to put this item over. So, let me see if I |
| 21 | can get an answer. Thank you, the meeting is at |
| 22 | ease. [pause] All right. All right, if I could |
| 23 | have everyone's attention. We are back from a |
| 24 | brief break. We, the Zoning and Franchises |
| 25 | Subcommittee has voted on the entire agenda with |

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the exception of Land, Cornell New York City

Tech's Campus, which is Land Use Numbers 796

through 799 inclusive. So, that's 796, 97, 98,

and 99. I'd like to call on Council Member

Jessica Lappin who represents Roosevelt Island and she has a statement she wants to read into the record with the Administration and with Cornell.

Okay, Ms. Lappin?

COUNCIL MEMBER LAPPIN: So, first of all I want to thank everybody for their patience and for waiting around. I really do appreciate it. And I want to start by saying that this is an incredibly important project for the City of New York. It is a \$2 billion investment in our city, one that we anticipate should generate around 30,000 jobs. But also it's just a fantastic thing for the city to have Cornell and the Tech - - Universities having this presence here and really growing our city in a very exciting and significant way. From the very beginning Cornell, we discussed this at the hearing, has been a really great partner and has worked incredibly diligently and productively with me, with my office, with the community, and they

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have been very thoughtful and very generous and very interested in becoming a fully integrated partner not just for Roosevelt Island but for the entire city. And so, I'm not going to read the entire document into the record because it is, the document that Cornell is submitting is 13 pages. So, that gives you a sense of the things that they have addressed from MWBE outreach to adopting the school on Roosevelt Island to looking at a parking study that had come up at the hearing. I guess I should at least highlight some of the things that came up at the hearing for those who have questions that I do think are important to a sort of new information, make sure we're entered into the record. One, Cornell has agreed to do construction, air quality monitoring, meaning not just during excavation and demolition but throughout the duration of the construction period. They have agreed to do, to analyze parking needs with their corporate co location and executive education center and also to do a parking study upon the award of the contract with the developer to do the first corporate co location building. I think that will address the

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concerns that came up around the potential need for more parking spots that was discussed at the hearing. They are also going to be seeking to reduce organic waste by 85 percent on site which would greatly minimize the need to have trucks take garbage off of the island. I mentioned that they are going to be adopting PSIS 217 in addition to doing a number of other things to help middle school students all over the city. And barging, barging is, I think the thing that was most discussed in what is really an unprecedented agreement. They are going to reduce by approximately 40 percent the numbers of truck trips that were identified in the EIS by barging materials and not trucking them onto the island. And if you looked at the way a conventional construction project would happen, they're going to reduce by more than half the number of construction vehicles that are going to go on the They're going to use barging to make sure island. that any of the building material onsite that is not reused will be removed by barge. Nearly all bulk materials will be delivered and removed by barge and the heavy materials, such a steel,

curtain wall and large equipment will also be 2 delivered by barge. This really has never been 3 done before in the City of New York and it's a 4 5 very exciting thing and it really will help minimize in a major way any significant impact on 6 the community. These have all been memorialized in what will be a part of the lease document so 9 they will be binding and, as I've said, it's 13 10 pages submitted to the Chairman. In addition, we 11 are awaiting a letter from Deputy Mayor Steel and 12 I hope it is almost here. But the Deputy Mayor 13 has sent a letter regarding two important issues, one is public safety, which, because this is going 14 15 to be a large campus and a partnership with the 16 technical university and we want to ensure that 17 the safety of the students and the island will be 18 protected. The police department has designated 19 Captain Michael Sheehan [phonetic] from the Office 20 of Management Analysis and Planning to serve as a 21 liaison with the community, with the elected 22 officials and other stakeholders to ensure that an 23 appropriate develop, plan for protecting our 24 citizens is developed. The Police Commissioner at his discretion the NYPD will review the public 25

| safety designs of the proposed Cornell campus. |
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| This may include consideration of the |
| comprehensive range of security issues such as the |
| potential for increased monitoring or physical |
| presence as deemed necessarily by the NYPD. And |
| lastly, because transportation has been brought up |
| as an issue I have been trying to arrange for |
| ferry service to Roosevelt Island throughout my |
| tenure as a City Council member and the |
| administration is committing that if we were able |
| to privately obtain the capital funds and get all |
| of the applicable permits that we need from the |
| Coast Guard and the Army Corps and the Federal |
| Government that the City intends to contribute to |
| the operating costs of a one year pilot of |
| recreational summer ferry service. So, I am very |
| grateful for everybody who helped work on this. I |
| have to single out Jane Swanson from my staff who |
| has worked incredibly hard on this project and |
| Chuck Mira [phonetic] from the Speaker's office. |
| Of course, the Chairs, Mark Weprin and Leroy |
| Comrie and really Pete Crokendalis [phonetic] |
| who's worked very hard on this project with Kathy |
| Dove [phonetic] from Cornell and the entire |

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| Cornell team. I really want to thank you for |
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| being, Andrew too and Melanie for being excellent |
| partners and for working so collaboratively with |
| us. So, given this, I am voting aye today and I |
| certainly would recommend that you join me in |
| voting in favor of this project. I think we just |
| are waiting for the signed letter. Do we have the |
| signed letter? We do not. So, we're waiting for |
| the signed letter from Deputy Mayor Steel. May I |
| vote age on the other items on the calendar? Has |
| that been done or that has |

vote, just Council Member Lappin wasn't here for
the vote on the other items so she just wants to
cast her vote on those items while we still wait
