2	SPEAKER QUINN: All right. Better				
3	late than never and [off mic] okay. The first				
4	ceremonial is going to be led by Council Member				
5	Margaret Chin and Council Member Julissa Ferreras				
6	and it is in honor of some of New York City's				
7	firefighters. So, I'm going to turn the mic over				
8	to Julissa and Margaret. Here you go. Yay, let's				
9	hear it for firefighters, for Julissa and for				
10	Margaret, all right. And if we could ask, come				
11	on. All right, Margaret, here you go. [off mic]				
12	COUNCIL MEMBER FERRERAS: Come on				
13	up. So, this is a very special day in the				
14	council. As many of you have heard we had some				
15	amazing, obviously our brave firefighters are				
16	important to every integral part of our city. But				
17	in particular we have some amazing, amazing				
18	officers, firefighter John Ortiz [phonetic] James				
19	Trainor [phonetic] and Shane Clark [phonetic].				
20	They are, through their heroism [applause] they				
21	demonstrated and we have one woman in uniform. As				
22	Chair of the Women's Issues and working with the				
23	Speaker of the City Council we work very hard to				
24	fight against domestic violence. And these three				
25	men, and three companies, Engine 9, Ladder 6,				

Engine 15 and Battalion 4. I know there's some up
there also, they're all here. [applause] These men
helped save the lives of a victim in New York
City, in Chinatown and Margaret Chin, Council
Member Chin will be speaking on that. But she is
amazing. She's recovering well. She still has to
go through several surgeries but one of the four
point plans that I worked on with the Speaker was
that people have to mind their business. They
have to not, and make sure that, you know,
oftentimes people say, mind your own business.
Don't mind your own business is what these
gentlemen did and they helped save a life. So, I
know that many New York City residents are far,
far safer because of the amazing firefighters that
we have in New York City. So, this is your day.
Thank you so much for everything that you do.
[applause] And we are not only honoring the
firefighters but we're also honoring the house,
the dragon fighters. So, thank you so much. Up
there, the dragon fighters. Council Member Chin.
COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you.
You know, we are so proud of our firefighters of
our FDNV 'cause every day they but their lives on

2	the line to protect and serve our community. But
3	in February our firefighter went ever further to
4	save a woman's life. She was being chased down
5	the street by her estranged husband with a meat
6	cleaver, all right? But the firefighters in the
7	Chinatown Dragon Fighter Company, they didn't mind
8	their business. They came out to try to save the
9	woman. And because of their courage and the heart
10	to do so, Jose Ortiz, James Trainor and Shane
11	Clark, you are our hero. [applause] So, we want to
12	recognize you today and we want to recognize the
13	Chinatown firefighters for their heroism and
14	bravery and for sending their loves and prayer to
15	the victim. Today we had an informal meeting with
16	her so that she could personally thank the
17	firefighter that saved her life. And she was
18	crying. She was saying that if it wasn't for you
19	guys she would not have been here today. She
20	still have to go through surgery six months from
21	now and she was wearing a wig because her head has
22	suffered a lot of injury. But she also told me
23	that she actually with her family, she want to go
24	visit you guys, all right, to thank you in person.
25	So, we going to make that happen. We going to

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bring her to the Chinatown firefighters, for the
Dragon Fighters so that she can personally meet
all the hero who cares about her. And that's what
we want her to know 'cause she's here alone. She
only has her sister and her brother in law and
we've been trying to get her mother to come from
China to take care of her. But she's a young
woman and she's full of life and she is so
appreciative. And there are brave men and women
in New York City that care about her. So, thank
you today and can the Clerk read the proc? Thank
you. [applause] And thank you Speaker, for hosting
this. [applause]

York, proclamation. Whereas the Council, City of New York, proclamation. Whereas the Council of the City of New York is proud to honor firefighters

John Ortiz, Shane Clark and James Trainor and their fellow Chinatown Dragon Fighters who make up FDNY Engine 9 and Ladder 6, for their heroic intervention of a gruesome domestic violence act in Chinatown. And whereas statistics from the Mayor's Office to combat domestic violence reveal that family violence related deaths have been steadily increasing from 63 in 2009 to 77 in 2010

2	to 92 in 2011. The City Council has been
3	unwavering in its commitment to stop domestic
4	violence for decades. In 2012 the Council joined
5	NYPD Commissioner Ray Kelly and NYC and company
6	continue in its fight against domestic violence
7	with a public service campaign called, Don't Mind
8	Your Business. The citywide outreach effort
9	raises awareness and gets the community involved
10	in reporting domestic violence and aids law
11	enforcement in its response. When everyone begins
12	to speak up, speak out and report such abuse
13	domestic violence will lose its accomplice,
14	silence. On this occasion we are proud to
15	recognize the Chinatown Dragon Fighters for
16	demonstrating the importance of not minding our
17	business. And whereas around 10:00 a.m. on
18	Sunday, February 24 th , 2013 on Canal Street in
19	Chinatown an argument erupts between a deranged 28
20	year old man and his tearful, 23 year old wife.
21	He then grabs her by the arm and begins dragging
22	her down the street. Her screams are loud enough
23	to get the attention of firefighters from FDNY,
24	Engine 9 and Ladder 6, popularly known as the
25	Chinatown Dragon Fighters. And whereas three

goes unreported. Children exposed to domestic

violence, whether as victims or witnesses also
need our help. May all New Yorkers learn from our
heroic Chinatown Dragon Fighters to speak out and
intervene whenever we witness such abuse in our
community, on our streets or at home. Now
therefore be it known that the Council of the City
of New York gratefully honors John Ortiz, James
Trainor, Shane Clark and all of our heroic FDNY
Chinatown Dragon Fighters for their lifesaving
rescue on February 24 th and for reminding all New
Yorkers, don't mind your business when it comes to

SPEAKER QUINN: Well, I just, I want to echo what Julissa and Margaret said to you three, to everyone in Engine 9, Ladder 6 and Battalion 4, we just really want to say thank you. You know, we are grateful every day for our fire department but we're usually grateful for you fighting fires. Today, in this event and hearing just how horribly horrific this attack was you

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underscore what we always talk about fire
department here in a broader public safety sense,
and why having fire houses open and out there in
neighborhoods, first and foremost will keep us
safe from fires but will keep us safer, period.
And the fact that you three individuals with the
support of everyone else in your firehouse ran
towards screams, having no idea what could happen.
And then a horrible thing happened, I mean, he
pulled out a meat cleaver and you ran towards that
man, is just another example of somehow people who
grow up to be firefighters, before God sent you
out he gave you a little more bravery than he gave
the rest of us, let me tell you. 'Cause the human
reaction would be to go away from a man with a
meat cleaver. The smart thing to do is to go away
from a maniac with a meat clever who just
butchered a woman and you all did the opposite.
You saved a life, you gave this woman the
opportunity to no longer be a victim but to become
the survivor she is. And you gave us all another
enormous reason to be proud and to remain indebted
to the New York City Fire Department. So, thank
you all very, very much and [applause] I welcome

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any of you to say a few words if you would lik
to. And if you did you would just say you wer
doing your job, which is another example of ho
great you guys are. Please.

MALE VOICE 2: Although we're very grateful to be up here it very much was a group effort with those individuals up there. [applause] So, just, and all the other guys that were working that day. So, thank you very much. [applause]

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you, guys. And be safe and be careful. Thank you all very much. Thank you. All right. And our next ceremonial as, thank you all very much, is, our next ceremonial is our great firefighters, have another round of applause for the Dragon Fighters as they leave the ceremonial. [applause] And the next, if I could ask anyone and everyone who's participating in the final ceremonial, would you, declaring the National Puerto Rican Day Parade Month which will be from May 15th to June 15th. The parade is June 9th. The grand marshal is Chita Rivera. If I could ask everybody who is here for that to come up. All right, if I could ask Melissa to come on up to accept our proclamation

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on behalf of the National Puerto Rican Day Parade Month. It's a lot of words and if I could ask my colleagues to come up. And I wanted to say it in Spanish, that was the problem. And if I could ask my colleagues to come on up and shhh. Well, I just want to thank Melissa and everyone from the parade committee. The parade, but importantly this entire month, and I love the fact that in New York things that are a day we make a month, whether it's Saint Patrick's Day or the Puerto Rican Day Parade. This month is a very important time for all of us in this city to take a moment to thank everyone who makes this parade happen every year but also to take a moment to thank all the members of the Puerto Rican community in the five boroughs. Our city is a better place, a more diverse place, a stronger place, a more creative place because of the past, present and future contributions of the members of the Puerto Rican community. And better looking Maria, you are absolutely right, better looking. By all of the contributions of the Puerto Rican community so I know that all of my colleagues very much enjoy the parade. We have had our majority leader on film

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and in pictures dancing with Senator Clinton at
the parade as well so there's a lot of great
moments with the Council and the parade. But
thank you all. I know these events and these
months take a lot of work. It's almost all
volunteer work on top of everything else, Melissa,
thank you and the parade committee. And if I
could ask the Clerk to read the proclamation.

FEMALE VOICE 1: Council, City of New York Proclamation. Whereas the Council of the City of New York is proud to honor the National Puerto Rican Day Parade for strengthening the cultural fabric of our city and the United States. And whereas since the National Puerto Rican Day Parade was established in New York City in 1958 it has grown into the largest demonstration of Puerto Rican pride in the nation. Each year its 100,000 participants attract 2.5 million equally jubilant spectators. And whereas on June $9^{\rm th}$, 2013 the $56^{\rm th}$ National Puerto Rican Day Parade will celebrate with a focus on health to help promote the healthier lifestyles that prevent some of the largest epidemics affecting Puerto Ricans and Latinos including diabetes, cancer, asthma and

obesity among others. To further this cause the
parade also calls upon mental health professionals
to raise greater awareness of autism, ADD, ADHD
and depression. And whereas by promoting health,
economic development, education, social
advancement and environmental awareness, the
National Puerto Rican Day Parade has empowered
Puerto Rican communities across the country. We
wish a continued success. Now therefore be it
known that the Council of the City of New York
hereby proclaims May 15 th to June 15 th to be
National Puerto Rican Day Parade Month in New York

Member, 4 th District, Manhattan and many other
Council Members.

SPEAKER QUINN: Yay. And Melissa,

trying to prevent in this Council. SPEAKER QUINN: If I could ask my

2	colleagues to please rise. On May 4 th , 2013 Lynn
3	Brooks, who was 82, passed away surrounded by her
4	husband and her family. Lynn was the loving and
5	adored wife of radio legend Stan Brooks. Lynn
6	was born and raised in New York City, attending
7	Julia Richman High School, Hunter College and
8	eventually getting a master's degree at NYU. Lynn
9	loved New York City and all of its vast cultural
10	institutions and parks and all of its different
11	neighborhoods. It was this love that led her in
12	1992 to found Big Apple Greeter, an organization
13	which has New Yorkers volunteer to take tours
14	around the city, not just to the big tourist
15	hotspots but to their own neighborhoods and the
16	own hidden treasures that they have and love in
17	their city. It's important to note that Big Apple
18	Greeter is not only an enormous success in New
19	York, Lynn's leadership has brought that to
20	countless other cities across this country and to
21	five different continents across the world where
22	other people replicate her great work. Lynn was a
23	lifelong activist for civil rights, women's rights
24	and social justice. Lynn's funeral was held

yesterday. She is survived, of course, by our

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good friend Stan, by their sons, Rick, George and Bennett, three daughter in laws, seven grandchildren, two great grandchildren, six nieces and nephews, and by hundreds and hundreds and hundreds of coworkers and friends. Our thoughts and prayers go out to Stan and the entire Brooks family. I also want to note the unexpected passing of Martin Stark, the Governmental Programming Manager and Scheduler at NCYTV. Martin was born and raised in Laurelton, Queens. Graduated from Springfield Gardens High School and earned his bachelor's degree at Barouche. joined NYCTV in 1997 and he scheduled the filming of a vast range of events, from celebrations, including celebrations of his beloved Yankees, the tragedy and the aftermath of the 9/11 attacks, and, of course, endless recordings of thousands of City Council hearings. Martin treated his colleagues and coworkers as a family and touched their lives with his kindness, humor, and above all, strength and faith. This inner strength that carried him through the every day struggles of diabetes and provided those around him with a portrait of courage. At 6'7" this gentle giant

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will be dearly missed by so many. Martin is survived by his sister Beverly, his brothers Gilbert and Tony and their families and Ann Marie Stark who had been his wife and who is with us today and we want to thank Anne Marie for joining us today as we pay this tribute to Martin. to, of course, his second family at NYCTV. April 26th, 2013, Upper West Side resident Mary Thumb [phonetic] who was 68, a chronicler of the feminist movement and former Executive Editor of Ms. Magazine died in a motorcycle accident in Yonkers. Mary, the current editor in Chief at the Women's Media Center was born in Akron, Ohio and graduated Bryn Mawr before joining Ms. Magazine in 1970. Colleagues described her as a zealous advocate for equal pay in the United States and helped spread the ideals of the women's rights movement in this country and abroad. At Ms. Magazine Mary shaped the writing of many of the feminist movements luminaries, including her close friend Gloria Steinem. Although never married the New York Times reported that her friends said that her motorcycle was her true love and she used it to zip around town for meeting to meeting. Ti was

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on her beloved motorcycle that she met her
untimely death. She is survived by a sister
Susan, a nephew Tom, and I would like to call upon
Council Member Gale Brewer to say a few words

6 about her good friend, Mary.

And I think that particular experience shaped a lot of us because she taught many people to write. She was very, very clear about clear, concise writing. After Ms. she actually wrote a history of Ms. Magazine and she credited an oral history of her beloved friend Rella Abzouk [phonetic]. And she titled it, this was typical of Mary, Rella Abzouk, how one tough broad from the Bronx fought Jim Crow and Joe McCarthy, pissed off Jimmy Carter, battled for the rights of women and workers, rallied against

war and for the planet and shook up politics along
the way. And every time we saw Mary w would
wonder if she has her motorcycle or not. We would
check to see. She did love that motorcycle. She
had just brought it out of storage in Yonkers and
was riding back to her home on the West Side. She
absolutely adored her nephew Tom, in fact, he was
married some years ago and has one child, another
one on the way, and she loved them as much as she
loved her sister, Susan. They would ride their
motorcycles in Arizona where Susan is all during
the summer. And, in fact, she had a motorcycle
here and a motorcycle there. She will be sadly
missed and she contributed a great deal to the
feminist movement and to all of us who care about

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the sponsor of the bill, Council Member Levin and the Chair of the Consumer Affairs Committee, Dan Garodnick. This is a pretty simple and common sense piece of legislation. It's a piece of legislation that responds to a set of facts that were extraordinarily well presented and well advocated on by vendors in the City of New York. And let's be clear, vendors are small business people. Vendors are a critical part of our mainstream New York small business community. And vendors and vending is often the first point of entry into work in New York City for our ever diverse and growing immigrant community. there are a lot of rules and regulations around vending and we understand that because you're doing your work on the street of the City of New York. But these rules and regs should be applied in a fair way, a transparent way. And if somebody is an inch too close to a door 'cause the, one of the rules is you have to be a certain number, a certain distance away from a door, which makes sense, you don't want to block people coming in and out of a building. But if a vendor is an inch too close should they have to pay \$1,000 over and

over again? Of course not. That's why this piece
of legislation in addition to hopefully clarifying
and streamlining the rules also will reduce the
fines. Now, it won't do that in issues of public
health, it won't do that if you're vending without
a license 'cause that's unacceptable. But it will
reduce those fines and hopefully make enforcement
about education, not about gotcha. And this
Council has done a great deal of work towards
ending the gotcha ticket, 434-A and Council Member
Levin and Chair Garodnick's advocacy is another
example of putting the gotcha ticket to bed. I
want to thank everyone who's been part of the
vendor's rights project and all of their great
work. Let me call on the sponsor of the bill,
Council Member Steve Levin, and again, thank the
Chair who has indicated that he is not going to
speak, but thank you, Chair Garodnick.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Thank you very much, Madam Speaker. I want to thank you for your support of this vital piece of legislation which is, as you said, supporting some of our city's most industrious small business owners. By decreasing these fines we are giving these hard

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working New Yorkers a fair shot of making it here
in New York and being able to support their
families. I want to especially thank you, Madam
Speaker, Chairman Dan Garodnick, Melissa Mark-
Viverito, Council Member, on the street member
project, especially Sean Basinski [phonetic]
Rachel Cordero [phonetic] and Damien Butvick from
essential staff and Rob Newman who worked very
long and hard and thank you to all of the co
sponsors for bringing this bill to the floor and
for voting in favor for this veto override. Many,
many New Yorkers will sing your praises and
thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much Steve. I also want to thank, in our finance division, Tenesha Edwards [phonetic], Jamie Stocks [phonetic] Scott Crowley [phonetic] and Preston Niblack [phonetic]. I want to thank Chair Recchia for his work on what we are voting on out of that Committee today as well. Also, in land use we have a very important project as it relates to Cornell and NYC Tech and the opening of a new and very exciting university on Roosevelt Island, one that's going to bring us a world class applied

2	sciences institution to Roosevelt Island, spur
3	economic development and move New York City

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much and thank you Chair Comrie and Chair Weprin. Last but absolutely not least and last on purpose is a piece of legislation around paid sick leave in the City of New York. And there is a long list of people to thank organizationally. We want to thank everyone who's been part of this coalition but in the Council we want to thank Ray Majefski [phonetic] Paul Stromm [phonetic] Lauren Axelrod [phonetic] Jim Carris [phonetic] Tirza Nazir [phonetic] Mark, Matt Carlin [phonetic] Faith Corbett [phonetic] Preston Niblack [phonetic]

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Laura Poppa [phonetic] Laura Poppa, Laura Poppa and Margaret Nelson and Molly Murphy for all of their work and Shayla in Gale Brewer's office. So, let's here it for all of them. [applause] We want to really thank the lead sponsor of the bill, Council Member Brewer and also Chair Mike Nelson who chaired Civil Service and Labor. After we vote today and then when we vote again, because I believe the bill will be vetoed and we override the veto, we will have passed into law a piece of legislation which will bring paid sick leave to just shy of a million workers in the five boroughs and bring required leave with no retribution to more than a million workers. We'll have done this in a thoughtful and a deliberate way. A way at the end of the process where opponents from the Chambers of Commerce who were steadfastly against the bill stood with us on the steps saying this was a fair piece of legislation. That happened almost exclusively because of the leadership of Gale Brewer who listened to small businesses, who listened to health advocates, who listened to workers, how listened to her Council colleagues and today can take credit for passing what I

believe is one of the most expansive paid sick
leaves and worker rights pieces of legislation to
be passed, not just in this City but in this
country in quite some time. So, I just want to
thank everyone who has gotten us to this place
where we will be able to, through legislation,
make sure workers have this important right but
that we also did it in a fair and balanced way
that's not going to cause any small businesses to
choose between paid sick leave and employment of
an individual. This is going to be a great model
for all of us moving forward and for other cities
So again, thank you, the staff. Thank you, the
coalition. Thank you everyone who has been part
of this effort and again, with our deepest thanks
and gratitude let me call on the lead sponsor of
the bill, Council Member Brewer and then Chair,
Mike Nelson. And let's, before Gale speaks, if I
could ask just for a round of applause for you?
[applause and cheers]
COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you,

all. Thank you all very, very much. Thank you,
Madam Speaker. I want to say that your staff is

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York. Many, many workers came to every single
press conference, but Valdez was really one of
the leaders. The New York City Paid Leave
Coalition, Donna Dolan [phonetic] and Martha Baker
[phonetic] Working Families Party, Bill Lipton
[phonetic] and Emmanuel Casaro [phonetic],
Community Service Society, Nancy Rankin [phonetic]
and David Jones. Amazing numbers of public health
professionals, SCIU, Tim Foley as the Head of the
Doctor's Council. The New York State Nurses
Association, FANIC [phonetic] GMAC and Dr. Hill.
S many union including the Center Labor Council
and all of their affiliates, DUFT, Retail, 32BJ
and I want to particularly mention Alison Hirsch
[phonetic] 799, with all of their members, all of
the UFCW Local 1500, DC 1707, New York Community
for Change, many, many clergy members. I think
Rabbi Feinberg [phonetic] is here, Congregation of
Renee [phonetic] and many others. Moms Rising
and so many women, Gloria Steinem in particular.
Community Boards, I know the Manhattan Borough
Board passed a resolution in support of paid sick
days, the New York Civil Liberties Union, Common
Cause, and there are so many others. I want to

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just mention that after four years of non stop advocacy and coalition building I want to thank this coalition, this paid sick days coalition, and my Council colleagues with all my heart for supporting intro 97-A and never giving up. I also thank my, thanks again Speaker Quinn and her staff. Without them and their many hours of work this legislation would not have passed. Approximately one million New Yorkers will now have the fundamental right to a paid day off when they or a family member falls ill and no worker will be fired if they must stay home. This is a tremendous accomplishment of which all fair minded New Yorkers can be proud. The argument over created sick time was always about common sense and fairness. I believe this law enshrines the principal that American exceptionalism is not just about large profits and small elites but a workplace that is safe, fair and respectful of the lives of workers. As many historians have noted when workers get to share in the prosperity the create, everyone benefits. Workers who have an incentive to invest themselves in their jobs will remain loyal and be better employees. Paid sick

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days rewards these qualities. Today's vote
projects a positive message to all New Yorkers
that this government of the people is not only
about those who have everything but that each of
us has a right to benefits created by the labor of
all and I think the City Council should be proud
of passing one of the most progressive pieces of
legislation ever in the history. Thank you very
much, Madam Speaker and to all of my colleagues,
my deepest thanks. [applause]

SPEAKER QUINN: Chari Nelson?

Madam Speaker. At first glance I wasn't for this intro fearing that it would overly burden the business community which wouldn't affect, not help any of their workers or many people as well. But after we worked on it, we tweaked it a bit, I believe a fair bill was hammered out. We struck a balance where neither side is completely happy, that's exactly what compromise is about. New Yorkers may very well, and I believe they will be, healthier by this Council's tweaking and hammering and I want to thank Gale Brewer and her staff so much, Margaret Nelson, my wife, no. [laughter]

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Tweak a little bit of controversy, you know, no
relation at all. And [off mic] oh, yeah, okay, a
little levity in the proceedings. And especially,
of course, Christine Quinn, for bringing this to
the floor and for a vote. And we'll all, as I
said, be a lot safer. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Mike. And that concludes communications for the Speaker and again, I just want to remind folks about the Executive Budget Hearings starting tomorrow. And there is one resolution we're voting on later in want to remind folks about.

very much. My colleagues, as we celebrate I want you to also focus on those who will be excluded from this bill. Too often when bills come down to this body they're watered down from the original version, as in the living wage bill. It's watered down from the original version we're talking about manufacturing workers not included. We're talking about the very workers that brought this bill its attention, the restaurant workers and the

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retail workers and now are going to be in this shifting or changing, swapping their time instead of getting access to sick and paid leave. There's hundreds of thousands of poor, working class blacks and Latino's, immigrants, working class families that will not be included and should have been included had we stayed strong on the first bill we had with all of the support we had for it. We can celebrate today for the million workers but there are hundreds of thousands who will not be celebrating today because they're not included in this bill and it wasn't necessary to water it down to the point that it is now. Now, I'm not going to vote against a million workers getting sick leave because they deserve it. But I'm sick and tired, no pun intended, of having bills exclude the neediest people, sometimes, in this city to appease the other elements. So, while we celebrate, don't forget those who are not included in this and should have been included in this. They will not be getting sick leave and they'll be working in a place where there's 15 workers and 10 workers, they're not going to get it and if they're manufacturing, there not going to get it,

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and if they're in restaurants and in retail,
they're not getting sick leave. They're still
going to be having to go to work because they
can't afford to stay home and be sick. Don't over
celebrate.

COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: Thank you.

[applause] Seeing no others? Seeing no others I

- - oh, I thought we were general orders. Sorry,

Council Member Vallone?

While I understand the goals of the paid sick leave bill and appreciate the hard work and the changes that have been made. As a former small business owner I'm going to speak in opposition to it. Today we just reduced fines on small business owners, our vendors. Last meeting we told the City to come back to us with fines that should be warnings. Now, we're subjecting our struggling small businesses to even more fines and more regulations. And if you don't think the City will descend on our businesses like a swarm of cicadas then you don't know what's happening towards small businesses right now. This is going to hurt all of our businesses, not just the large ones, even

the ones under 50 employees who have to, if, for
example, they own a deli with one person, they're
going to have to keep records now. And they're
going to have to hold onto those records for 18
months or they're going to be subject to a lawsuit
and they're going to be subject to the
jurisdiction of consumer affairs and the health
department. This is going to result in a lot of
extra money and cost to our small businesses. So,
I am, I ask the Council to stop telling our small
businesses how to run a small business before we
run them all into the ground. And again, I do
appreciate the work that's been done on this.
It's a much better bill than the original bill. I
appreciate the goals behind it but as a former
small business owner I'm going to, I will be
voting against it.
COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: Council
Member Jackson?
COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: Well,
thank you, Deputy Majority Leader, my colleagues.
I rise to speak in favor of the bill. Gale
Brewer, let me thank you for your leadership in

working on this particular bill. And let me just

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be quite frank, is it everything that we wanted? The answer is, absolutely not. But it's better to have a half a loaf of bread than to have no bread at all. And that's what this is about. about a start to move towards what we want. Would I rather have us not starting at all? Currently, the MTA uses a practice of discounting fares for children under the height of 44 inches when accompanied by a fare paying adult. As we move to establish a healthier eating environment in our homes and schools for children those who experience growth spurts from healthy dieting and fall out of the predetermined 45 inch height requirement, which is the average height of a four year old, should not have this factored into determining the price for families to use local transportation. In addition, the 44 inch

NYCHA must come to the table 21 for a real, substantive conversation with the 22 resident about how to pay for these future needs. 23 it is so important that the City consult NYCHA 24 residents before it does anything on NYCHA land 25 and they are our City's experts on NYCHA and City
